Bailey Co. Schools Get Total Of \$4.683 St. Per Capita Funds

Out of the \$5.000,000 per capita state funds distributed this week throughout Texas, Bailey county schools received a total of \$4.683 81. Of this total 2,094-81 went to the common schools of the county, Muleshoe district received \$1.410, Bula district \$738; and Circleback, \$495.

It was a \$3.00 per capita payment, which makes a total of \$7.00 of the \$2.200 due for the year that has been plaid to date, according to M. G. Miller, county school superintendent.

Insurance Commission Warns Against Risks Of Fire In Holidays


Austin, Dec. 20.—Marvin Hall, Texas fire insurance commissioner today called attention to the number of unusual fire hazards which should be guarded against during the festivities of the holidays season.

"A destructive fire is the sworn enemy of the peace and happiness that Christmas should properly bring." Hall explained. "It is important, therefore, to be familiar with the hazards common to the month of December which have.in past years caused wasteful loss of lite and property."



Automobile sales in Texas for No-ember showed a considerable decline, eing 86 less than the preceding nonth and 29.1 per cent less than in lovember last year. Aggregate sales for he entire year to date was 3.6 per ent under last year. Strange to say the decline was least in the intermed-ted price bracket and greatest in the owest price bracket.

Texas employment decreased one per cent duffing November, yet was 5.5 per cent greater than November a year ago. Payrolis declined 2.4 per cent yet were 13 per cent higher than a year ago New business corporations in the state for November declined 3.1 per cent from the month before and 6.9 per cent below November last year. Capitalization of these new corporations was 32. 3 per cent below the preceding month; but 50.2 per cent above a similar month last year. Three firms were capitalized at \$10.00.00 or more, against only one such in November last year, according to the Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Lubbook county lead in cotton ginnings on the South Plains area, according to the last Government report, havng 118,291 bales of cotton ginned Lamb county ranked second on
the 'Plains with 108,070 bales. Balley
county, a much newer county than
either of the preceding named ones,
and not generally producing so much
of the fleecy staple, yielded 29,121
bales, according to the report, which
is also much larger yield than ever before ginned in any one year.

Present indications are the Plains
area will produce by far the largest
cotton crop in its history, 804,813 bales
having been ginned at the last Government report. There is little doubt but
the final total will top 900,000 bales.

Austin, Dec. 21.—"There is a very good excuse at the holiday season to crowd into the day and night as much pleasure as possible. It is the one time of the year when every-day affairs take second place. In so far as individual possibilities permit, the fiesta spirit prevails. That many persons are short' on rest and relaxation at this time is evident to all. However, it is one thing to deprive the body for a few days of the daily quota of sleep and rest required, and quite another one to make a haibt of this practice throughout the year," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

"Hospitals have many patients who are there solely because their desire for so-called relaxation persistently overcomes their judgment regarding nature's demands. And many thousands of others, for the same reason are depriving themselves of abundant vitality and maximum health without which life cannot be lived at its best.

"Undoubtedly, there never has been a time in hitsory when it is easier to remain in high-gear day and night than now. Radio, with its wealth of entertainment, good books and magazines, the brige table and so-called night life develop an appeal that calls for real will power to hold in proper check.

"Nevertheless, the person who really desires to enjoy life to the full will keep his enthulsam for the relaxations and amusements within reasonable bounds. It follows that while at the Christmas Season within limitations one safely may stop up the amusement tempo, it is poor business to adopt a killing pace as routine. In short, nature demands that adequate sleep and rest, nutritious food in proper quantities, fresh air and exercise play an important part in the daily program."


