



Obituary



Rodney Ayres Knight, Sonora

He lived the life of a legend, the kind of life that books are made of and ONLY after making sure all that knew he had a story to tell, a chuckle, a good olí belly laugh or a great adventure, Rodney left this earth to be with our Lord and Savior.

Rodney A. Knight was born in San Antonio, Texas, on April 4, 1945, to Robert and Betsy Knight. The oldest of three boys, Rod grew up in and around San Antonio. After graduating from Pleasanton High School in 1963, he attended Texas A & I, in Kingsville, for three years. He worked on the family dairy for a few years. On February 27th, 1971, he married the love of his life, Kathy. In December, of that same year, he started Game Warden Academy, in Austin. In May of 1972, after completion of the Academy, Rod received his orders and was stationed in Sutton County. He served Sutton County for 30 years, until his retirement in 2001. He told his grand kids that he was catching ibad guys.î He loved Sonora and the people of Sutton County.

In 1992, he began a Hunter Education Camp for young hunters at the McPherson 4M Ranch. During the fifteen years of the camp, hundreds of boys and girls from all over the state attended Mr. Knightís camp. These camps were never advertised, but always filled up in advance and always had a waiting list. It wasnít just the lessons that drew the students to the course, but the special attention from the Game Wardens.

In 1998, Rod received the prestigious award of Shikar-Safariis Wildlife Officer of the Year. It was an occasion celebrated by the whole family.

In all of his travels, Rodney never met a stranger. If he didnít know anyone when he walked into a room, just give him five minutes and he would know half of their life stories. He was known and respected by many and loved by all. Rodney will be greatly missed.

Pappaw, as he was known by his grandchildren, touched more hearts and people's lives than most can imagine. From the iHey Boyî greetings, the crushing handshake that would drop you to your knees, or the stories he'd share, you always knew it was Rod. He is leaving his children and grandchildren with wonderful memories of family camp outs, fishing and hunting trips and being the center of attention when they danced to the song, iShout!î He made life fun.

From card games to protecting wildlife, he always gave it his all. When it came to loving Kathy, he gave even more. They did everything together; cooking meals, gambling adventures with friends, fishing trips to the coast and setting up for craft shows.

On May 9th, 2015, with his wife, Kathy by his side, Rodney Ayres Knight was welcomed into Heaven by his father, Robert A. Knight; his brother, Volney S. Knight; and his cousin, Brooks W. Knight.

Rodney is survived by his wife Kathy, his mother, Betsy Knight, his brother Kurtney Knight and Fran, his daughter Edie Knight and Barry Mathieu, son Lonnie Knight and Honey, daughter Betsy Knight-Gonzales and Luie, son Joe Shannon and Tammy, daughter Debbie Norment and Darold; grandchildren - Emery and Sara Dunn; Madison and Garrett Knight; Drew and Taushlyn Riley; Bryce and Kodee Smith; Ryan, Matt and Kaycie Shannon; Hunter, Michelle and Kristen Norment; great-granddaughter ñ Dakota Tucker; along with numerous nieces, nephews, family and friends.
