

# Carter warns Cuba to keep out

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — President Carter warned Saturday against Cuban military meddling in Africa and attacked white racism, saying the day will come when Africans cry out with Martin Luther King, "Free at last! Free at last! Great God Almighty, we are free at last.

In a major speech interrupted more than a dozen times by applause, Carter said the United States is committed "to an Africa that is at peace, free from colonialism, racism and military interference.

Nearly 5,000 invited VIPs at Nigeria's modern National Theater gave the president, a former governor of Georgia, his loudest ovation when he quoted King, the assassinated American civil rights leader, and called him "a great man from my home state.

The president, in fact, misquoted the black minister, who

won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for his desegregation crusade. Engraved on King's tomb of Georgia marble in Atlanta the year he was slain were the words of an old slave song he spoke to civil rights marchers in 1963: "Free at last, free at last, thank God Almighty, I'm free at last.

The president made a small mistake in quoting the black minister, who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for his desegregation crusade. George Clements, a spokesman for the Martin Luther King Center in Atlanta, said King used a phrase from an old slave song when he spoke to civil rights marchers in 1963, saying: "Free at last! Free at last! Thank God Almighty we are

free at last. Denouncing the presence of Soviets and Cubans in Africa, Carter said:

"The military intervention of

outside powers or their proxies in African disputes too often makes local conflict even more complicated and dangerous and opens the door to a new form of domination or colonialism. We oppose such intervention by outside military forces. We must not allow great power rivalries to destroy our hopes for an Africa at peace.

Revised American estimates put the number of Cuban troops in Ethiopia alone as high as 17,-000, contrasted to 11,000 six weeks ago. The president expressed con-

cern that massive deployment of Cuban troops in Ethiopia's northern Eritrea province "will result in greatly increased bloodshed

An administration official traveling with Carter has said Cubans are already operating in "small scale units" against Eritreans fighting to wrest their former Italian colony from Ethiopia. The official asked that his name not be The Cubans this month spear-

headed Ethiopia's crushing defeat of Somali-backed seccessionists in its Ogaden province. Carter, who arrived Friday

on the first state visit to black Africa by an American president, met for more two hours with Lt. Gen. Olusegun Obasanjo, the Nigerian head of state. Carter also placed a wreath at the Remembrance Arcade, a memorial to Nigerian soldiers who died in the two world wars and in Nigeria's 1967-1970 civil war.

The resident, his wife, Rosalynn, and daughter, Amy, spent the evening watching traditional Nigerian dancing in Tafawa Balewa Square.

Obasanjo, who carries a swagger stick and wore a green tunic, said at a formal welcoming ceremony that consultations between Nigeria and the United States have increased since Carter took office and that the visiting president's "commitment to human values has given us some hope."

In his speech, Carter said U.S. relations with white-ruled South Africa "will depend on whether there is progress towards full political participation for all her people ... and an end to discrimination based on race or ethnic origin.

At the same time, Carter, who said he grew up "in a society struggling to find racial harmony," promised that the United States will "hold out our hands" to South African whites outnumbered five to one by blacks - "if they decide to transform their society and to do away with the crippling bur-

dens of past injustices.' He urged immediate acceptance of Western plans for transitions to black rule in Rhodesia and Namibia, the nationalist name for South-West Africa. And he suggested that United Nations peacekeeping forces could help bring a peaceful transition to majority rule in both countries.

The president reminded Nigeria, which is the United States' second-largest oil supplier, that international trade must be a two-way street. U.S. oil purchases have helped create a trade deficit of \$4.25 million in Nigeria's favor.

When we purchase Nigerian products, we contribute to Nigerian development, but unless we can also share our technology and productive capacity, our economy slows down, American workers are laid off and the resulting economics sluggishness means that we buy less from you," Carter said.

## Roads, tunnels, lighthouses

I recently listened to a speaker praise the government for the fine system of roads and highways it had installed in the country. Only the government could have built these thoroughfares. the speaker insisted, and we should be appreciative, for otherwise, auto, truck and bus traffic in this country would be in a state of chaos.

Conceivably the speaker is correct; but I doubt it. If government did not install roads, private companies would have met this demand. There would have been differences, to be sure, and some government assistance would have been needed to acquire rights of way. The owners might have charged users directly, and the location of many thoroughfares might have been different. However, the cost might have been less and the efficiency of the road system and of the nation's transportation greater.

The only certainty is that the private sector would have fulfilled much of the demand for roads and highways. This continually occurs in a private enterprise society. Let me illustrate the point with two examples of where private entrepreneurs have provided service not ordinarily expected from profit oriented companies. The two examples are: tunnels in downtown Houston and lighthouses of the British

Houston has a downtown pedestrian tunnel system most of which is privately owned. Originally conceived as a private venture and primarily, developed by individual property owners, the system is approximately 2.8 miles in length and is said to be the most extensive subterranean pedestrian facility in the world. The private portion provides access to 32 major buildings and parking facilities. Both the city and county governments have also installed connecting tunnels, but these are far smaller in

Houston's heat and humidity during major portions of the year make the air conditioned tunnels a welcome relief for office workers. shoppers and other pedestrians. The first tunnel still in use was privately constructed in 1947 and connected a major department store with a parking garage. Other owners became interested and the growth of the system slowly continued until the 1960s when it boomed as both new and old buildings developed connecting tunnels.

Because each section of the tunnel is built by the individual property owner, tunnel design is as varied as the design of the buildings they connect. Many owners use the area adjacent to the passages for commercial purposes, leasing the space and virtually creating a second ground floor in the building. Non-zoned Houston has contributed to the effort by not impeding it. The

city enforces the local building codes and otherwise does little more than make annual safety checks.

One of the reasons that is often given for government engaging in a particular activity is that the private sector would never provide it. A number of prominent economists over the years. including Nobel prize winner Paul Samuelson, have maintained that lighthouses could not exist unless the government operates them. Lighthouses protect shipping by emitting beams that advise ships of location and warn against navigational hazards. These economists contended that no private person would ever own one for profit because there would be no way of collecting fees from those who benefit. After all, they said, the lighthouse could not shut off its beam for those who refused to pay.

Economics Professor Ronald Coase demolished this theory in an article he wrote several years ago for the Journal of Law and Economics, which he edits. He found that many lighthouses had been privately built and operated in England in the late 18th and early 19th centuries. The high point was reached in 1820, when, of the 46 lighthouses off the British coast, 22 were operated by private individuals or organizations and the balance by Trinity House, also a private organization, but with certain governmental responsibilities. Of the 46, 35 were originally built by private individuals.

In 1836. Parliament vested all lighthouses in Trinity, which was empowered to purchase those still in private hands. Very high prices were paid, indicating that the business was quite profitable. One sold for a figure which would now amount to \$7 to \$10 million.

Before this law, shippers and ship owners could petition the Crown to allow a private individual to construct a lighthouse and to levy a specified toll on ships benefitting from it. The lighthouses would be built, operated, financed and owned by private individuals who could sell or dispose of them by bequest. The government did, however, control the price that could be charged to shippers and enforced the recovery of tolls (allowing law suits as for any uncollected

The tolls were collected at the ports by agents who might be private individuals but were commonly customs officials. The toll varied with the lighthouse, and the ships paid a toll varying with the size of the vessel, for each lighthouse it was assumed they had passed. In time, books were published setting out the lighthouses passed on different voyages and the charges that would have to be paid. Thus, even a lighthouse service can be provided by private enterprise.

problems are due to trade imbalances caused by large oil imports has deep historical roots reaching back to the 18th century mercantilist period. The idea certainly seems prima facie plausible. If we spend \$25 billion more on foreign goods and services than foreigners spend in the U.S., there will be an oversupply of U.S. dollars in foreign exchange markets. Since 1977's trade deficit for imported oil was about \$45 billion, it seems logical that oil is the culprit in our over all balance of payments deficit.

However, oil imports are not the cause of either the current U.S. balance of payments deficit, or the continuing weakness of the dollar in foreign exchange markets. The cause is quite simply, America's continuing inflation, which makes foreign goods such as Japanese televisions, cars. etc. and services a bargain for American consumers.

Inflation, by expanding at least temporarily people's incomes, encourages them to buy more goods and services. If foreign goods appear to be cheap relative to U.S. made goods (due to foreign prices not rising as quickly), then more and more foreign goods will be imported. For example, foreign car imports now account for an unprecedented 19 percent of all U.S. car sales. This foreign car invasion exists not because their cars are so much better than ours, but because on a relative purchasing power basis, they have

The answer to the apparent paradox posed above - that the large trade deficit due to imported oil or foreign cars is not the true cause of our balance of payments - dollar weakness problems - is as follows:

Nations not only sell each other goods and services; they also sell securities and other financial assets. Unless we can think of the interconnection between goods - services and financial sector, we cannot grasp what is happening in the international market place.

Over the past year or more, the U.S. economy fed mainly by inflation, has been growing faster balance of payments deficit. Since the dollar is currently floating in foreign exchange markets (i.e., there is no fixed exchange rate between the dollar and other currencies enforced either by the Internation Monetary Fund or U.S. officials), its value has tended to decline relative to the currencies of those nations whose goods and services Americans are consuming.

There is no doubt that the U.S. balance of payments deficit has been artificially swollen by the current policy of the Federal government (Federal Energy Agency) of subsidizing oil imports from OPEC nations. But what do OPEC nations do with dollars gained from U.S. trade? They invest in U.S. securities — bank accounts, Treasury securities, and U.S. bank certificates of deposit (CD's). Hence, America, in essence, is buying foreign oil and other goods and services and giving foreigners U.S. denominated IOU's.

A modern economy conducts trade in merchandise goods, including oil and cars as well as services such as foreign travel and aid, and the results are summed up in its balance of trade. However, a country that is buying more from foreigners than they in turn are buying must issue sufficient IOU's to foreigners holding excess currency from trade.

The financial side of a country's foreign transactions (except for official dealings between central banks) is shown in the capital accounts of the balance of payments. Hence, the financial flows of a country (IOU's) are matched against the real flows of goods and services. The financial flows must balance out any discrepancies in the goods and services (real) flows. In this sense, a country's balance of payments is always in balance - the question is how is it balanced?

The weakness of the dollar in foreign exchange is evidence that more and more foreign holders of U.S. IOU's (securities) are dumping them on the foreign exchange markets in exchange for more trustworthy currencies such as West German D-marks, Swiss francs, and Japanese Yen. As more dollars are offered in exchange for foreign currencies, the value of the dollar vis-a-vis those currencies will decline.

'Limited' wage-price controls?

production of widgets. First, the existing supply of widgets gets more expensive. This bidding up of the price helps to limit the available supply to those consumers who value them most highly (or who need them most quickly).

Next, the increase in widget prices tells producers that they have a chance to increase profits by expanding production.



**Associated Press Writer** HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Oscar is 50 - the granddaddy of the entertainment awards; older and more prestigious than Emmy, Tony, Grammy or any other honors for show business

When the first awards of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences were handed out on May 16, 1929, movies couldn't even talk. The first statuettes were given to voiceless stars: Janet Gaynor and Emil Jannings, both chosen for three performances.

Mary Pickford and Warner Baxter were cited the following year for talkies, "Coquette" and "In Old Arizona." The best picture of 1928-1929 was the first major musical, MGM's "Broadway Melody."

Year after year, the Academy Awards have added a rich legacy to the American scene. The span of history can be seen with the first winner as best picture, "Wings," a romantic tale of aviators in World War I, and a favorite in this year's Oscar race, "Star Wars," concerning intergalactic flight and warfare.

On Monday night at the Los Angeles Music Center, the Motion Picture Academy will bestow its 50th awards. Bob Hope



# 19 in Manpower indcited

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - After weeks of legal gymnastics, the 19 men indicted here on charges stemming from a Manpower court of inquiry may soon know where they will be

this week The defendants, including suspended Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs director Rogelio Perez, and suspended GOMA program director Joaquin Rodriguez, were indicted on evidence collected by State District Judge Darrell Hester's

and rapport with the press was criticized by defense attorneys

during a venue hearing here Friday.

Several lawyers copmplained of Hester's courtroom remark indicating he felt anyone who pleads the Fifth Amendment must have something to hide. Perez, Rodriguez and others invoked their constitutional rights against self-incrimination during the inquiry. The GOMA officials were later indicted on wit-

ness tamering charges. The criticism came as several attorneys tried to show that their clients could not get fair trials here. However, a majority of the change of venue motions were withdrawn at the

end of the hearing. Those still seeking to have their trials moved include Ed Romeros, former auditor for the Associated City-County Economic Development Corporation of Hidalgo County, and

Harlingen brothers Don and Clarence Gray, who controlled Manpower funds earmarked for a job training school. Attornevs for the Gravs also tried to show that Corpus Christi newspapers have had extensive coverage of the Manpower matters.

But attorneys for Eliseo Sandoval, ACCEDC director: Nick Ramirez, director of the Hidalgo County Manpower program; and Roel Martinez, who worked for a private business owned by Sandoval and Ramirez, decided their clients could get fair trials here.

Sandoval and Ramirez are on leave from their posts. Several of the newsmen who testified Friday were asked if they recalled some of Hester's

At the Advanced Life Support (ALS) level, ambulances may be equipped with intravenous fluids and some form of bio electrical communication (telemetry). This will enable paramedics with proper physician direction to evaluate the patient, provide treatment, and triage (transport to the proper facility) the critical patient. Standardized treatment with medical direction and regionwide triage ensurews a progressive and continued enhancement of critical care for Technicians (EMT's) and

The past year's training courses through the Panhandle EMS including Crash Management - Extrication, Emergency Care Attendant, Emergency Medical Technician, and Respiratory Care of the High Risk Infant have been extended to hospital

ambulance personnel throughout the Panhandle. The transportation subsystem has been developed in the context of a hospital - critical care unit categorization program. To enhance transportation capabilities, a MED-A-VAC helicopter service was started in the fall of 1976 to provide transfer by trained trauma

## Cousin to marijuana stops nausea in cancer patients

HOUSTON (AP) - A new study shows that a synthetic chemical cousin to marijuana is effective against the devastating side effects of severe nausea and vomiting that frequently result from chemical cancer therapy

Human tests at the Indiana University Medical Center in Indianapolis indicate a new drug Nabilone is superior to Compazine, one of the principal drugs used to control chemotherapy-induced sickness, researchers reported Saturday.

The nausea and vomiting associated with therapy is far more serious than a common upset stomach. Doctors say it can become so severe that some patients refuse further therapy that might save their

Past studies show that marijuana and its principal active ingredient, nicknamed THC, are effective anti-nausea agents. Federal health authorities at the request of President Carter recently began re-evaluating the illegal plant to see if it might be allowed for medical uses such as this

But the plant and even synthetically made THC can cause abnormally rapid heartbeats. extreme euphoria and other effects doctors want to minimize Speaking here at the American Cancer Society's annual science writers' seminar. Becky E. Furnas said the experimental drug Nabilone is not a synthetic THC although it has a similar molecular structure. Nabilone, produced by Eli Lilly & Co. of Indianapolis, does not cause rapid heart rate and is much less euphoric than THC. said Ms. Furnas, a nurse spe-

The chemistry is manipulated to enhance certain effects and reduce others," she said. In the study by Ms. Furnas, nurse Catherine M. Nagy and Dr. Lawrence H. Einhorn, the researchers evaluated the reactions of 47 cancer patients receiving intravenous multi-drug chemotherapy

cializing in cancer treatment.

Each patient received oral doses of either Nabilone or the standard Compazine during two consecutive treatment cycles. but was unaware of which drug he or she got.

Each cycle ran for about five days with patients getting an anti-nausea drug a half hour prior to daily doses of chem-

Those desiring more relief could get more anti-nausea drugs between sessions.

# Illegal aliens hard on Juarez

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico-(AP) - On any given day you can see them loitering around the downtown plaza - homesick, hungry for food and desperate for work.

They are southern Mexicans who have moved north hoping they can find & job, any job, that will sustain them until something better comes along. or perhaps, until a cousin in Los Angeles or San Antonio can help them get a green card. (work permit) that would allow them to work legally in the Unite States.

It only takes a day or two for them to realize that they're not wanted here. There's no place to house them, no extra food, and most important, there are

After a week they usually decide one of two things, either to set up a tarpaper shack on the outside of the city and survive as best they can or they sneak across the border into the U.S. Most of them eventually de-

cide on the latter. The mayors of both Ciudad Juarez and neighboring El Paso, Texas, say this influx of people has caused a strain on both cities' economies and that federal agencies of both Mexico and the United States have been unwilling to do much

Mayor Manuel Quevedo Reyes of Ciudad Juarez has been in office only five months. He says Ciudad Juarez's unemployment rate of 38 percent is

his greatest problem, but that he has taken what steps he can to lower it

"First of all, we've gone to the businesses and industries of Juarez and asked store owners and plant managers to not hire anyone who has been a resident here for less than five years.

"That may sound harsh, but we have to take care of our residents here first.

'Next, we've tried to spread the word in the south that if these people are coming here hoping to find a job, they may as well forget it. We want them to know before they get on a bus or train that when they get here, they won't be able to get a job," he said.

Mayor Ray Salazar of El Paso says the Mexicans who cross the border illegally have forced the El Paso police department to hire more officers to do little more than pick up the aliens, and because they've broken no laws, to haul them back across the border.

"We are carrying out responsibilities of the federal government and the federal government is not compensating us

"I've gone to Washington and I've talked to various officials and instead of getting additional LEAA (Law Enforcement Assistance Administration) funds, we've been cut back.

"In both Washington and Mexico City, bureaucrats have a difficult time realizing that between El Paso and Juarez, there are more than a million people, and that what happens

on one side of the border, affects what happens on the other," he said.

Quevedo said he too has had to hire additional policemen. "All of these unemployed people and all of this idle time has caused crime problems. We have 200 young men in our police acaemy now being trained as rapidly as possible to curb

The 38-year-old Mexican mayor said he thought the only thing that would solve the alien problem on the Mexican side was employment but he admits a solution is no where in sight. We have industry going in

here all the time, but most of it is the 'in bond' type where American firms are hiring Mexicans to build parts that are then sent back to the United States. 'Most of these jobs require a

high school education, which many of the transits do not have, and for every opening available, there are hundreds of applicants waiting in line for

He said more work needed to

be generated in Mexico's interi-

Both mayors said they felt they were working together better than any previous other mayors of the two cities to do what they can to cut the number of illegal aliens.

"Both of us are new in office and we've both vowed to work together as much as the law al-

with each other, which is more than has often been done in the past," said Salazar.

Meanwhile, both admit that there is little they can do other than plead with their respective federal governments for help to lower the number of Mexicans who are making their way across the Rio Grande daily.

## Hydro - Tron solves problems of hard water



ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) -A federal judge has refused to rule immediately that a former CIA officer who wrote a book on Vietnam violated the agency's secrecy oath. U.S. District Judge Oren R. Lewis indicated Friday that the case may go to

The former CIA officer, Frank Snepp, said in his book. "Decent Interval," that intelligence failures contributed to the chaotic U.S. withdrawal from Vietnam. The Justice Department, representing the CIA, contends that Snepp violated his CIA secrecy oath by not letting the agency see the book before it was published.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The District of Columbia government will soon begin paying its employees and bills through private banks instead of through the Treasury Depart-

The district government claims the shift, which may come next month, will funnel as much as \$1.5 billion a year through local commercial

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House is to vote Tuesday on legislation that could nearly double the number of White House staff members drawing annual salaries of up to \$57,500.

The president is authorized to hire 55 persons earning \$42,500 to \$57,500 a year. The bill would authorize 100. It also would authorize current practices not covered by existing law, such as hiring aides for the spouses of the president and vice president

WASHINGTON (AP) - The American Conservative Union says it has spent nearly \$1 million on telephone calls, newspaper and radio advertisements in its campaign against ratifia cation of the Panama Canal treaties.

Rep. Philip M. Crane, R-Ill., chairman of the group, claims "tremendous success" for the campaign to get the U.S. Senate to defeat a treaty that would relinquish the canal to Panama in the year 2000. The first treaty, which would guarantee the canal's neutrality after the turn of the century, was approved by the Senate by a 68-32 vote last month. The Senate has yet to vote on the second pact.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Ripon Society says the Small Business Administration has become heavily politicized and must be changed from a financing office to an "entrepreneurial advocacy agency.

. The liberal Republican group also suggests "an evental spinoff of most SBA financng functions to private lending institutions" and the provision of more favorable financing for small businesses selling new

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal agency recommends that pilots be required to submit to sobriety tests and that those refusing have their licenses suspended

The General Accounting Office, an investigative arm of Congress, said Friday the National Transportation Safety Board has found that alcohol probably contributed to 485 private plane accidents that killed 430 people in an 11-year period ending in 1975.

SEATTLE (AP) - A deepocean mining firm says it succeeded for the first time in recovering large quantities of mineral-laden manganese nodules from the Pacific Ocean floor near Hawaii.

John L. Shaw, president and general manager of Ocean Management, Inc., said Friday that hundreds of tons of the nodules were pumped to a ship, the Sadco 445. The nodules, containing manganese, copper, nickel and cobalt, are being mined in water three miles deep in one of the Pacific's prime seabed-mining areas southeast of Hawaii.

CHICAGO (AP) - A federal appeals court temporarily has blocked a neo-Nazi march through Skokie, a predominantly Jewish suburb.

The action Friday night by the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld a 45-day delay imposed by U.S. District Judge Bernard M. Decker, who also struck down three Skokie ordinances designed to block the neo-Nazis from marching. The National Socialist Party of America, led by Frank Collin of Chicago, asked to march April 20, Adolf Hitler's birthday.

MIAMI (AP) - Venezuelan and U.S. authorities will confer on how to deal with the crew of a Venezuelan freighter who were rescued in the Caribbean after apparently setting the ship ablaze to dispose of its contraband cargo of 10 tons of marijuana.

The Venezuelan freighter Lemar III was under Coast Guard tow Saturday from near the Bahamas island of San Salvador. On Friday, the Coast Guard reported rescuing eight crewmen from the burning 65-foot vessel, which apparently had been doused with fuel and set afire.

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) - A questionnaire devised by bureaucrats to demand intimate details of the sexual lives of welfare mothers has been "thrown in the garbage," a high-ranking state official said.

Deputy Revenue Commissioner John Messeger told a group of angry state legislators Friday that issuance of the query 'should have never happened and I apologize.'

# Airport improvements likely in '79

Pampa News Staff

Improvements at Perry Lefors Field within the next year are likely, the chairman of the Gray County Airport Board said Saturday after a Thursday meeting in Albuquerque with representatives of the Federal Aviation Administration.

Jack Hood, chairman, flew to meet with four FAA officials to discuss funding for the resurfacing of a dip in the primary runway at the field. Cost of the repair job is estimated at between \$40,000

But members of the airport board as yet have no official cost estimate and Hood said FAA will not fund all the improvements hoped for at the

Accompaning Hood -to Albuquerque were J.O. McCracken, Ted Simmons and O.L. Presley, county commissioners; Milo Carlson, a member of the Chamber of Commerce; Marvin Bridwell, chairman of the Chamber avaiation committee and pilot; Terry Lamberth. co-pilot; and

Merriman and Barber.

Hood said FAA representatives were impressed by the variety of Pampa and Gray county groups represented at the meeting. The jets and pilots were furnished by Cabot

Barber will now start preliminary work for a cost estimate, Hood said, and members of the airport board will then meet with county commissioners for approval of the application for funds.

If approval is granted the application will be submitted to FAA officials and plans will be drawn up for the resurfacing.

The FAA will fund 80 percent of the project, but 20 percent would need to be funded through the county, Hood said. No mention was made of a bond

Although a repair job for the dip and a 1,000-foot extension of the orginal runway is the airport board's top priority Hood said the FAA might help fund other improvements at the field. Application for improvements, such as taxiway lights and the resurfacing of an asphalt ramp

Gene Barber, engineer from that is deteriorating, will be Merriman and Barber. I made later.

And Hood and Barber Tuesday will meet with a member of the Texas Aeronautical Commission, which also helps fund. improvements for airports.

Long range plans discussed with FAA officials Thursday included the conversion of Perry Lefors Field to what is called a basic transport category airport.

That would require a 7400-foot runway, compared to the 4,500-foot and 5,500-foot runways at the field, making landings easier for executive jets.

Cabot planes can't leave when the temperature is more than 80 degrees with a full load, Hood said, becuase the runways aren't long enough for the speed required.

He said an airport must average 750 jet operations a year to fall into the basic tranport category, and Cabot alone averages that many. The extension of a runway, he said, might attract other companies

"A good airport means to a

# Trull to jury Monday

TYLER, Texas (AP) - The fate of businessman Don Trull. who claims he held a man hostage in a desperate attempt to retrieve \$1.5 million he says he was owed by paroled swindler Billie Sol Estes and Tyler millionaire Billy Pyron, will be put in the hands of a jury Monday.

That jury, however, never heard testimony about the alleged swindle. State District Judge Glenn Phillips ruled that the testimony wasn't relevant to the Aug. 9, 1977 incident for which Trull faces kidnapping

Denied the opportunity to question Estes and other de-fense witnesses before the jurors, defense attorney G. Brockett Irwin abruptly rested his case Friday morning without calling Trull to the stand. Phillips recessed the trial for

the weekend. Lawyers for both sides will make their final arguments beginning at 9 a.m. Monday and present the case to

Trull is charged with holding Bill May, a Pyron employee, hostage last August in Pyron's gasoline-splashed office. Trull allegedly sloshed gasoline around the office and threatened to ignite it unless he got back the money he says Estes and Pyron owed him.

Irwin subpoenaed 55 witnesses, including Estes and Py ron, in an effort to show Trull was swindled. But most of the witnesses, including Estes, gave their testimony to an empty jury box because of Phillips' ruling.

Irwin then changed tactics and began trying to discredit

a quick hearing.

presented to the jury. Out of the presence of the

jury, Estes, responding to questioning by Irwin, called Pyron "a bald-faced liar" and a "perjurer.'

That charge by Estes came when he was informed Pyron had denied signing over a power of attorney to Estes' secretary on several business ventures in which Pyron had an interest. The document gave Sue Goolsby, Estes' secretary, the right to use Pyron's financing for those firms.

It was those same Abilenebased businesses, along with some land in West Texas, that Trull claims to have been swindled on. Trull said he bought the property from Pyron at Estes' insistence. Both men denied owing any money

Attorneys for both sides suggested both Pyron and Estes had lied under oath.

AP Special Correspondent NEW YORK (AP) — Who is the greatest heavyweight fighter who ever lived? Who is the greatest fighter of any size?

No issue in sports stimulates greater passions. In no other form of athletic combat are there fiercer loyalties or firmer opinions set in concrete. Probably because it is the most primitive of confrontations. man against man in a restricted area, eye to eye, toe to toe, matching speed, skills and endurance to a possible finish, boxing fires endless debate.

If you remember the unshakeable insistence of your father - Jack Dempsey was king of them all, there never was and never can be another Dempsey. Yet vou lived through the impressive eras of Joe Louis and Rocky Marciano and may have formed other ideas. And today's kids are equally adamant - the greatest has to be Muhammad Ali

Now the baton has been passed to a panel that should come up with as definitive a conclusion as anyone - the Boxing Writers Association. A nationwide poll is the first step in a series of planned closed circuit TV shows depicting history's most memorable fights.

## 14-to-1 shot wins

LIVERPOOL, England (AP) - Lucius, a 14 to 1 shot, edged Sebastian V in a desperately close finish Saturday and won a thrilling, rough-and-tumble Grand National steeplechase.

Out of 37 starters, 23 horses came to grief at the 30 fences which make the 41/2 miles course at Aintree the toughest in the world.

Red Rum, who won three times and finished second twice in the five previous Grand Nationals, was declared out of the race Friday because of injury. But he had his share of the glory. In a gesture unprecedented in the 141-year history of the race, officials allowed the great 13-year-old to lead the post parade.

Five horses were bunched together over the last fence and in contention for the first prize of \$72,355. But jockey Bob Davies edged Lucius into lead, and he crossed the finish about a half-length ahead of Sebastian. Drumroan was just a head behind in third place.

The triumph of Lucius, a 9year-old, was something for the story books. His owner, Mrs. Fiona Whitaker, bought him as a 3-year-old at a bargain price of about \$2,990.





citizens to eat, meet, play games, get to know others and plan projects — and Mrs. Wilson is devoted to its continued success.



# She's 'Mama' to county's youth

Pampa News Staff She is "Mama" to some 200 kids. She is a woman equally at home caring for a tiny baby or slapping a 400-pound boar away from a feed trough. She is a 41 year - old human dynamo.

She is Mrs. Ruby "Mama" Gage of 639 Faulkner. "When you have a child who loves you, who respects you ... well, that's really something." "Mama" Gage is something herself.

For "eight or nine years" now she has devoted countless hours to hundreds of Gray County kids. She serves as adult leader for the Gray County Top Of Texas 4-H Club and as an adult adviser to the county 4-H council. She also works many hours the with local Future Farmers of America kids.

"I thoroughly enjoy children. But to have their love and respect you have to earn it first. You have to be willing to do the same things they have to do."

And that can be everything from spreading mustard on fairstand hamburgers to spreading straw in livestock exhibition pens

"I never ask a child to do something that I won't do myself. That's why I can be found feeding and grooming livestock during county fairs and shows to. yes, even cleaning the pens.'

But never has a scoop shovel been handled by a more hardworking, thoughtful person.

"There's just no way to begin to describe how 'Mama' Gage has helped me personally and the total program," said Layton Barton, Gray County 4-H

Extension agent.

Of the petite mother of three whose small frame packs a heart bigger than the state of Texas, Barton said, "She's really a remarkable person. She's always there when you need her.

And being there when you are needed is a daily credo of "Mama" Gage. She not only helps area kids ready their livestock for county shows "the busiest time of the year" but finds time to babysit, direct 4-H and FFA fund drives and serve as a volunteer fund raiser for local cancer and kidney drives.

"You're only as old as you feel," said the dark haired "Mama", Gage whose energy and youthful appearance belies her 41 years. "Believe me, working with kids keeps you feeling young.

Asked how she came about the nickname "Mama" Mrs. Gage replied, "One day a friend of one of my sons came up to me and said, 'Mamma Gage, I love you,' and the nickname just sort of stuck.'

And she will smile softly with just a hint of that knowing wink in the eye and say, "No, being called Mama doesn't make me feel like an old lady. I think it is a label of respect."

But why does anyone, especially someone who has children of her own and who also babysits grandchildren want to spend more time with kids? Most people get more than they want with their own kids, don't they? "That's just it. Too many parents don't spend

enough time with their children. Too many of them

throw their kids into something like 4-H and then just leave them. You just can't do that. You have to be there to help guide and direct the children or else the lessons to be learned through working with other people, animals and competition go by the wayside.

"I love kids and I feel I have a personal responsibility to them. I don't mean to say that I want to take another parent's place, I just simply treat every kid as my own.

And rumor around the livestock pens has it, that 'Mama" Gage is also a pretty good hand at sittin' down on a rowdy youngster.

As for the future? "Well," the lifetime Gray County resident drawls, "I hope to be a part of both 4-H and FFA for a long time to come. They are good organizations. They can help a child, any child, achieve a sense of accomplishment.

However children are not the only ones to achieve awards from the youth organizations. "Mama" Gage is a lifetime member of FFA and, in 1975, was named the Outstanding Adult Leader for Gray County in the 4-H program.

She is the mother of Steve, 23, Kenneth, 19 and Cindy, 16, an FFA student at Pampa High School. Her husband, Rex, raises registered hogs and has an oil well service company.

And just as she detected her baby granddaughter needed a diaper change, "Mama" Gage sighed and quietly reflected upon her past years working with youth. "I pray and hope that I have given the kids as much happiness as they have given me.



DEAR DR. LAMB - Is it true that we get an insignificant amount of sodium from drinking water as compared to the sodium we get from food and the common medicinals? I am a person in normal health. I would be grateful if you could confirm what I have read in a booklet published by the Water Quality Association. It states that although our total sodium intake is usually far larger than the body requires, a person of normal health readily excretes the excess. Is this true?

DEAR READER - Yes. However you have to qualify that answer. A person cannot survive on sea water because there is too much salt in the water. For the normal kidneys to eliminate excess salt you need to drink sufficient water or liquids containing water relatively free of salt. In short you have to dilute the salt with adequate amounts of water.

Usual commercial water has very little salt in it but the amount does vary from city to city. The amount present is not harmful to healthy people but in individuals who must be on a severely salt restricted diet the amount can be signifi-

Our eating habits do lead to our consuming far more sodium salt than our body needs. There is plenty of sodium in fresh meats, vegetables, milk and cereal to meet all our needs without adding any sodium salt (table salt) at all. In fact most people get far too much sodium salt. If a person has large normally efficient kidneys he may never be affected by an excessive salt intake. Another person with fewer kidney cells - perhaps as an hereditary characteristic - or with an underlying predisposition to

faulty kidney mechanisms may develop medical problems related to a prolonged excessive sodium salt

Because prepared foods are commonly a part of the modern diet our sodium salt intake has been sharply increased compared to our potassium salt intake. I am sending you The Health Letter number 10-12, Salt: Your Vital Sodiam and Potassium Balance to give you more information on this and which foods are loaded with sodium salt.

There are a number of studies that implicate an excess intake of sodium salt with high blood pressure that leads to heart attacks, strokes and other medical problems. I think our population would be healthier if we quit using the salt shaker so liberally. Along this line I approve of using the new half sodium, half potassium salt mixture marketed as Lite-Salt and available in your grocery stores . You will soon adjust to its taste. For those who must have salt it helps some. It is not a true salt substitute, though, and if your doctor has restricted your sodium salt intake you can't use it with-

out his okay. Another good trick to cut down on the salt habit is to use spices. Many people can enjoy vegetables with curry powder or other seasonings. Vinegar helps with some dishes. It is an individual

matter and you should learn which ones you like. Commercially canned foods usually have had a lot of the potassium depleted and sodium added in the process. In general, food processing tends to add sodium and eliminate potassium. You can avoid this by relying more on fresh foods that you prepare in your own

**Knowing Wife's Worth** Can Help Protect **Families In Future** 

Placing an economic value today on a woman's contributions to her family in the future can help protect families financially in the event of her death or disability.

In placing these values, the family needs to look at the possible economic loss they face if the homemaker dies or is disabled, and the family needs to look at information on the value of a woman's contribution to the family. The value of her contribution is needed so couples can realistically decide how much it would cost to hire someone to do that work, in case the need arose.

In addition to more financial responsibilities in the marketplace, homemakers continue to assume major responsibility for household work, which include managerial and physical activities in the household by and for family

members for no pay.

Although household work generally is not valued in monetary terms unless it goes through the market system, its value is getting greater emphasis in legal settlements and the housewife's social role is being considered. Cornell University research used "time" spent on household work as an effective measure of a study on the subject. They concluded that three major factors determine the amount of time spent on household work number of children, age of youngest child and whether or

Using these three variables, the researchers estimated the economic value of household work for a wide range of family compositions, educational backgrounds and job skills. For example, based on the calculations, a 1972 judgment of \$235,000 was awarded to a family as compensation for the loss of the homemaker's economic contribution for the next 19 years, when the youngest of three children would have reached age 21.

not the housewife is employed.

In planning for the future, families should also remember that insurance companies keep up - to - date estimates of the monetary value of women's contributions to families - to encourage families to insure the wife for disability and death and to assist in fair insurance claim settlements.

Prudential Life Insurance Company estimates that in 1977, the full - time homemaker with a husband and two children contributed 99.6 hours of work per week - valued at \$238.49, or more than \$15,000 per year.







## **BC** shots 'dangerous'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government is preparing to declare a controversial three-month birth control shot, widely used in other countries, too dangerous for contraceptive use in the United States, sources say.

The sources, who asked not to be identified, said Food and Drug Commissioner Donald Kennedy already had notified the drug's manufacturer and planned to announce his decision to Congress today.

The drug is medroxyprogesterone, marketed by Upjohn Co. under the brand name Depo

Depo Provera is approved by the FDA for use as an anti-cancer drug. But like many chemicals used to fight the disease, it is known to cause cancer in some animals and has been linked statistically to increased cervical cancer in humans.



# April is for greening

(Editor's note: The column by Lois Boynton, one of Pampa's top authorities on gardening, appears in The Pampa News on the first of each month. She reports on tips for the month and on gardening by moon signs. She has been contributing to The News for three years.)

This is the beautiful time in the garden. The beds are turning greener and we have new surprises each morning. The daffodils and hyacinths are blooming. The tulips are pushing their foliage taller and taller each day and will soon be blooming along with the early blooming shrubs, the forsythia, snowballs, spirea guince, lilac and others

April is the greening month. The weather is generally fine and inspiration abounds. It is a great time to be a gardener. Don't get to enthused and forget that nature just could run a frost by even up into May.

So take precaution, and be ready to protect plantings. We cover ours with plastic bags or glass jars if the top growth has already begun, this will protect them from freezing, and being harmed by frost.

After your Easter Lily is through blooming, cut off the blooms but leave the flowering stalk to wither away naturally. Lily bulbs rot easily, so do not keep the soil constantly wet, allow the soil to become quite dry to the touc before watering

As the last buds open you may want to remove the pollen bearing anthers. We like the

beauty to the throat of the lily. Florists say purchasers dislike untrimmed plants because they look "messy.

The truth is the grower removes the pollen sacs, because if these were not cut out the flower might be fertilized. and a fertilized flower, its mission accomplished, fades much faster than one that is untrimmed.

Sometime after Memorial Day, when the weather has settled down, dig a hole several inches deeper than the pot itself in a well drained place in the yard. Either in full sun or where it will get morning sun, deep shade would not be good. There will probably be stones or gravel in the bottom of the pot put these in the bottom of the planting hole, these should be about two · inches deep. It is very important for the lily to have good drainage. Don't add fertilizer. After throughly watering the pot, knock out the plant, keeping as much of the soil intact as possible. Center it on the pad of stones and fill in the dirt around

is buried, it will not matter. The old foliage will soon wither away, mark the spot so you will not disturb the bulb. We have had them to grow and bloom again in August. In a year or two when the lily has formed a nice clump (it will not bloom at Easter, it will be possible in June) you may pull up a bloom stalk, which will have a small bulb at the end of the stalk, plant this with the stalk attached. where you would like to ave another lily, it will probably bloom for you the next year.

We plant to put ours under hotcaps about twelve inches deep. The hotcaps will protect them from wind and cutworms. Milk cartons can be used in the place of the hotcaps.

If you have deficiencies in your soil you may correct this by moistening the rows before planting with liquid manure or a solution of liquid fish fertilizer before you plant seeds. Mix one

PH is the term to describe the acidity and alkalinity of the soil. The term comes from the French expression "puissance de hydrpgen" and is a measurement of the hydrogen ions in the soil. In soil science the pH scale runs from 1 to 14.7 is neutral. Our soil is alkaline higher then pH7., this is partly due to the lack of enough rain to wash away the alkali salts and our constant need of irrigating with hard water

Fertilize the asparagus bed and water well, you should be able to start cutting spears about the middle of the month. that is if your bed is three years old, if it is younger, the spears should be left to grow. Pull out the weeds when cutting each day, in this way you should have a clean bed at the end of the season and the tops will soon shade the bed so the weeds will not grow

Glad bulbs may be planted now for the earliest possible bloom, continue to make a planting every two weeks, this will give you a succession of bloom all summer.

This is the time to carefully check for winter kill in your fruit trees. Treat them to plenty of compost or fertilizer and water

If you have fruit trees that are not self - pollonating, plant pollinators among them as soon as you can. For this spring. when the trees are blooming borrow a bouquet or spray from a friend or neighbor set them in pails of water under your trees. and maybe the bees (if they haven't been killed by sprays) will pollinate your trees for you. This will work for nut trees also.

You may have received a beautiful azelea for Easter, or some other pretty blooming plant. Most of these are tender and will not survive our winters. Sink the pots in a shady spot when all danger of frost is past, water daily. Bring inside before the first frost in the fall.

Oh! The miracle that comes from a packet of seed. We are astounded each year. We have begonias and dwarf crape myrtles growing from seed. There is nothing like the excitement and satisfaction of growing your own flowers from seed.



# Texas water: the creeping crisis

(Cont. from page 1) ways be politics involved in bureaucracy, and especially in an area as emotional as water.

"But the climate now is much improved. Everyone is aware of the gravity of the issues confronting texas, and most are working together to find the solutions.

One thing is certain-it will be expensive.

"Sure, it's going to cost us more money. The day of cheap resources is over with," said Davis. "We got more people now and it costs more to provide them water.

When we had what we considered unlimited resources, so what, just help yourself. But no more. We don't live like we used to, and it costs more.'

As illogical as it sounds, it is

the state's numerous charms that are contributing to the problem. People are moving to Texas by the droves.

"The growing population of Texas in recent years has made it the most economically dynamic state of the Sun Belt and the third largest state in the nation," said Black, the water development board chairman and gentle czar of a prospering agribusiness enterprise headquartered in Friona.

"Texas' population is increasing faster than every state in the Union except California Our studies show that water development, and especially water importation, are no longer interesting conversation pieces but are economic necessities."

According to the water resources department, Texas uses more than 23 million acre-feet of water annually, nearly 60 per cent of which is for irrigation.

An acre-foot of water is the amount of water it takes to cover an acre of land a foot deep. That's 325,850 gallons of water

While the state has a relatively adequate water supply at present, the combination of increased population and declining ground water supplies poses a potentially critical situation in the years ahead.

Most experts feel many areas can meet their long-range needs if - a big if - reservoir sites are developed on a timely schedule. As a scare tactic, one might point to Cooper Lake in Northeast Texas. It was



## EPA to phase out use of chlordane, heptachlor Protection Agency (EPA) said it

will begin phasing - out the use of two agricultural chemicals used for insect control. EPA officials said that all uses of chlordane and heptachlor, except for underground termite control, will be banned by 1983. Agency spokesmen said it will take five years before present stocks of the chemicals can be

depleted. Corn and other grain farmers have used chlordane and heptachlor to control insects which attack the roots and leaves of plants.

Between now and July 1, 1983, the two insecticides will be permitted for use only on flax and certain grain sorghum seeds. However, all agricultural use will be prohibited after that date. The EPA announcement ends


