Create goods, not jobs

| Hardly a day goes by that one does not | Mexicans entering the southwest tolook for |

| from one job to another and even from one place to another. And though every worker should have a specialty, a line of work in which he excels, he also should be somewhat versatile. He cannot be sure that demand for his specialty will not decline, leaving him unemployed unless he can adapt to another kind of work, often a more lowly kind. Lack of worker willingness to move his location and lack of adaptability are two frequent causes of unemployment. <br> If workers are to be free, they must accept responsibility for finding employment. The world owes nobody a living, nor are employers responsible for providing jobs. The employer's role, on the contary, is to economize all costs of production, including labor, so that goods can be produced and sold to consumers at minimum prices. <br> The purpose of the economy is to create abundance, not to create jobs. All people are benefited by abundance but only a fraction by jobs, yet oddly enough government functionaries at all levels cater to people who want jobs, not those who want goods. The consumer is the forgotten man. For example. municipait or state government officials try to lure an employer to locate in the area of their jurisdiction. Then they, can boast:"We created X number of jobs in this area." <br> Often a firm is bribed to come by offer of a tax advantage. Any firm that escapes taxes should be congratulated. However, the taxpayers as a whole gain nothing when a firm is lured to move from one location to another. Firms should locate where their own business interests are best served, without regard to the bait that may be offered <br> At the point where imported goods are taxed, the consumer again gets short changed. The politicians of every country, this one included, think they must "protect" domestic producers against foreigners who might undersell them. Domestic consumers would enjoy those lower prices being quoted by the foreigners, but not, they must pay and pay. American consumers, not foreign producers, pay the cost of American protective tariffs. Nothing is protected but inefficiency. <br> The joker in all this is, of course, that the producers are all consumers too. I the consumers got maximum abundance at minimum cost; demand would be maximized and this would result in a abudance of jobs at good wages. |

Editorial writers, like their readers, have difficult Editorial writers, like their readers, have difficulty
grasping the size of a billion. So when someone working grasping the size of a billion. So when somene working
for the magazine U.S. News \& World Report put his calculator in high gear, we thought you would be interested in the results.
To give you an idea of the size of the government's
budget: -Laid end - to - end and side - by - side, 532 billion $\$ 1$ bills would pave a strip three quarters of a mile wide
from New York to Los Angeles, or cover an area the size of Delaware. - At February, 1979 prices, $\$ 532$ billion would buy 41 billion barrels of oil, as much as the U.S. imports in 14,3 years at 1978 levels. 532 billion $\$ 1$ bills would take the government's printing bureau 121 years if it worked - In new Susan B. Anthony $\$ 1$ coins, $\$ 532$ billion would 000.000 pounds.

And do you think it would been given $\$ 532$ billion, how could manage to spend $\$ 100.000$ per minute? The answer is that you would have a full-time job spending money day and night, for slightly more than 10 year Well. back to the 1040
