### **Pioneer** Memorial Day Program



He is the grandson of Marjorie Jordan Bennett, the great-grandson of Mable Fulton Jordan and the great-great-grandson of Virgil and Lena Belle Avers Fulton, who operated a dairy farm in Cottonwood in the 1920's and 1930's. He is the greatgreat-great-grandson of Joseph and Theodosia Ernest Ayers, who operated the general store in the early days of Cottonwood.

So much for genealogy. 

Henry Ward Beecher said, "The first hour of the morning is the rudder of the day."

We are probably all familiar with the rudder of a ship. Once while in Seattle, Washington, I rode the ferry across Puget Sound to Bremerton to see the U.S.S. Missouri. I forget how large the ferry was but it was virtually a floating parking lot capable of carrying several hundred cars. "The Advantages and Disadvantages of Living In A Small Town"

As anyone who has lived in a small town can tell, there are advantages and disadvantages to living in a rural area. 





#### 7 Proposals Presented for ( **State Veteran's Cemeteries**

ans' Cemetery (TSVC) Committee, today announced receipt of on or before the May 1 deadline, are being evaluated, and action place around mid-June.

"We received seven good proposals from seven great communities," Dewhurst said. "Now we have the difficult task of deciding which one or two of these will be nominated for federal funding for fiscal year 2003."

The communities and organizations that submitted formal proposals for a TSVC are the City of Killeen, the Hidalgo County Advisory Committee on Veterans Affairs, the Lamesa Economic Development Corporation, Tyler County, Duval County, the Winters Area Business and Industrial Corporation and the Remembrance Foundation Charitable Trust in Lamar

Three other communities—the City of Wichita Falls, the City of Amarillo, and the Nueces County State Veterans Cemetery Advisory Committee- also expressed interest in being considered in the future for selection as

a TSVC site, but did not file formal proposals at this time. The TSVC Committee has indicated that it may issue requests for proposals in future years to consider these communities or any others that might then be interested.

The TSVC Committee met Friday, May 10 to begin evaluating the proposals. The Committee instructed staff to do an in-depth analysis, including site visits, of the three proposals that requested consideration for Fiscal Year 2003 funding. These are the proposals from the City of Killeen, the Hidalgo County Advisory Committee on Veterans Affairs and the Lamesa Economic Development Corporation. From these three proposals, the Committee will select at least one site for a TSVC to compete for federal Fiscal Year 2003 funding, and personnel at the Texas Veterans' Land Board (VLB) will prepare the federal grant application, which must be filed by July 1 with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (USDVA). The USDVA will probably announce the award of Fiscal Year 2003 grants by October 2002. Other sites, including the four which submitted proposals

The TSVC Committee was created by the 2001 Texas Legislature to set guidelines on the location and size of the state's veterans' cemeteries, to determine eligibility for burial in them and to select up to seven sites.

The Committee is composed of the three members of the VLB, the chair of the Texas Veterans Commission (TVC) and two persons appointed by the TVC chair to represent the state's

The VLB is composed of Dewhurst, who serves as its chairman, Col. Ladd Pattillo, USAR (Ret.) and Mr. Mike


TVC Chairman James Duncan appointed retired U.S. Air Force Brig. Gen. Sue Turner, and Mr. the TSVC Committee as representatives of the state's veterof the TVC, and Gardner is Chairman of the Texas Coalition of Veterans Organizations, as well as Adjutant Quartermaster of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Department of Texas.

"I feel fortunate that my fellow Committee members are so dedicated and capable," Dewhurst said. "With their help and that of our talented staff members, I'm sure we'll select the very best locations to honor our loyal Texas veterans."

Texas State Veterans' Cemeteries will complement the four USDVA national cemeteries in Texas, located in San Antonio, Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth and El Paso. There are no known plans for additional national cemeteries in Texas, and approximately 500,000 of Texas' 1.7 million veterans are 65 or

"We can never fully repay our veterans for all they have done for us," Dewhurst said. "They gave, and continue to give, so very much to our nation and state. We must never forget their noble self-sacrifice, and the freedom they secured for millions of people around the world.'

#### SBA economic injury disaster loans available for drought victims

can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Drought, high winds, and high temperatures (excessive heat) that occurred from January 1, 2001, and continuing, caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. However, nurserdisasters can apply. Businesses in the following counties are eligible to apply: Brewster, Brooks, Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Dimmit, Eastland, Erath, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Jim Wells, Jones, LaSalle, Live Oak, Maverick, McMullen Palo Pinto, Presidio, San Patricio, Shackelford, Stephens, Taylor, Throckmorton, Webb and

Due to the weather, many profrom the U.S. Small Business ducers experienced crop losses Administration (SBA). These and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. The loan can help a business meet installments on longterm debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of longterm debt, however, is not eligible under this program. The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disasteries that are victims of drought related needs and is intended to supplement monies the business owner can provide from other sources.

Loans may be approved for up to \$1,500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent (4%) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses To obtain an application or must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.


