Only other Haskell County city government receiving a check this month was Rochester which got a check for \$1,137.01.


Assembly of God program tonight

Hosting the reception will be their nieces and nephews.






Couple plans June wedding





Pennies equal millions

Paying another three cents to mail a letter is not likely to wreck anyone's family budget, but the recent postage rate increase has numerous indirect cost hikes to everyone.

Take the State of Texas, for

Comptroller Bob Bullock said last week that the new postal rates will cost the state an additional \$8.6 million during the current budget.

"When the cost of stamps goes up, housekeeping costs to the state go up just like they do for everyone else," he said.

More than \$2.7 million in additional postage will be needed to cover state postage costs through the end of the fiscal year in August, and about \$5.9 million will be needed for

additional costs next fiscal year, according to the comptroller.

The new postal rates will increase the state's first-class costs by 13.6 percent, first class pre-sort costs by 16.76 percent and third-class costs by about 24 percent.

The overall cost to the state should average about 17 percent during the next 17 months.

"The cost of doing business for the state has just gone up and there won't be any relief from these postage increases," Bullock points out.

During fiscal 1987, the state spent \$35 million on postage. The state's 11 largest agencies account for about 65 percent of the postage costs, or about \$23 million a year.

Two top officials believe state wrong

AUSTIN-Two top state officials said the state's position is wrong in the lawsuit over fair school funding. One, a defendant in the suit, said he considered asking the attorney general not to defend him because the state "broke its word" to poor school districts.

Comptroller Bob Bullock, one of the defendants in the lawsuit contesting the fairness of the public school funding formula, said he expects the state to lose and the formula to be changed.

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who manages part of the funds for public education, filed a brief in support of the poor school districts. He said his office has deposited over \$41 billion into the school account, and he is concerned how it is allotted.

Clements Supports Formula

Bullock said the Legislature in 1984 agreed to correct the flaws in the funding process, but subsequent sessions did not carry out the promise.

Even Attorney General Jim Mattox, who defends the state's appeal of the court decision ruling the formula unconstitutional, indicated his responsibility in the matter is "unfortunate."

So far, only Gov. Bill Clements, the lone Republican in the fray, supports the present formula. He said it will be the single most sensitive issue before the new Legislature.

Clements said the only real issue is local control and whether independent school districts will be abolished and elected school board members appointed.

Disclosure Errors?

The head of a public watchdog group put the magnifying glass to campaign contribution reports and said several state officials may have violated the law by failing to report expenditures made by credit cards.

At issue is whether legislative intent is being sidestepped.

The intent, according to the Senate sponsor, was to make public exactly what political contributions were spent on.

But Mattox, who was among those listed, said the intent was "to get away from contributions being just in cash."

He said the intent was never to go into as much detail as critics are demanding.

State Bar's Bar Bill

One detailed expense list reported via another route was the State Bar of Texas' bar bill.

A legal profession newspaper reported the state bar in Austin spent almost \$20,000 for liquor over three years, and averaged almost \$19,000 per month last year for travel, hotels and meals.

The bar is a state agency. Other state agencies are prohibited by state law from buying liquor.

Cost of smoking

Editor: Recently published statistics of the cost of smoking to the taxpayers of Texas are staggering and unacceptable. According to the November issue of "Texas Preventable Disease News" smoking costs Texas about \$2.9 billion per year in prevention, diagnosis and treatment of disease, and associated loss of economic productivity.

This contrasts with the annual income to Texas from cigarette taxes of \$354 million. Thus, the net annual deficit attributable to smoking is about \$2.5 billion.

On this basis, it costs Texas an estimated 63 cents per pack of cigarettes for direct health care costs and 92 cents per pack for lost income from premature death or disability, for a total cost of \$1.55 per pack sold. The cost to each Texan, whether they smoke or not, is about \$170 yearly.

On behalf of the Executive Committee for the Department of

Editor: I am writing to thank the Preventive Medicine and Community Health, I am bringing these statistics to your attention because they illustrate the severe drain smoking causes to our economy.

The consequences of smoking on health are well known, but the economic costs are perhaps less well appreciated. The 10-fold increased risk for lung cancer, two-fold increase in risk for myocardial infarction, and 10fold increased risk for chronic obstructive pulmonary disease are not only substantial risks to the well being of smokers, these diseases and other disabilities that affect smokers result in a substantial expenditure of resources that we, as a community, can ill afford.

What practical solutions might society use to solve this problem? Increased anti-smoking education, establishment of smoke free areas in public buildings and public conveyances, and regulation of advertising all help to some extent. However, none of these measures directly addresses the economic burden of smoking.

An approach that would restore resources to Texas is a cigarette tax that is proportional to the estimated cost of smoking to our economy. By implementing such a tax we can overcome the drastic economic burden of smoking.

17 Texas hospitals closed during 1987

In 1987, 17 Texas hospitals closed. This compares with 18 closures in 1986, nine in 1985 and eight in 1984. Of the 52 hospitals that have closed in the past four years, five have reopened under either different ownership or management.

"Nearly all of the 52 hospitals in Texas that closed during the past four vears were relatively small, and the majority (31) were located in rural (non-metropolitan statistical areas) counties," said Karl Shaner, vice president, research and information services, Texas Hospital Association

Only two of the 52 closed hospitals had more than 100 beds. A total of 692 beds were closed in 1987, compared to 627 in 1986, 355 in 1985 and 272 in 1984. The five facilities that reopened account for

"With regard to their ownership status at the time of closure, nine hospitals were publicly owned, 13 were private/non-profit institutions and 30 were investor-owned, either by individuals or a corporate system," Shaner noted.

In Texas, small and rural hospitals account for 220 of the 530 hospitals

in the state, and serve an estimated 3 million people. Of the 52 closures, 29 hospitals were the only providers in their communities. "This means that in 29 small Texas towns, people's access to health care services has been curtailed and compromised," said Charles Bailey, vice president of legal affairs for THA.

Why have so many hospitals closed in Texas? The bottom line answer is financial problems, Bailey noted. "The problems experienced by small, rural hospitals are caused by many of the same factors affecting urban hospitals, such as lower occupancy rates, more intensely ill patients who require more complex care, increased regulatory requirements, and inadequate payment from Medicare/Medicaid programs,"

"Because small, rural hospitals also serve a greater than average proportion of Medicare patients, recent changes in the payment and review of care provided Medicare beneficiaries have had a more profound effect on their facilities and their ability to preserve financial stability," he added.

"Rural hospitals also face the problems of attracting sufficient numbers of qualified professional personnel and physicians, less access to capital and insufficient funding for marketing and diversification in order to respond to a more competitive health care environment," Bailey

Since 1980, hospitals have seen a decline in discharges and in their average daily census; however, this has affected small and rural hospitals more severely. "In the first half of 1987, average occupancy rates were 25 percent in small hospitals with fewer than 25 beds, and 33 percent for hospitals with 26-49 beds," Bailey

Small, rural hospitals are more affected by declining patient revenue margins. Higher inflation in the goods and services hospitals purchase, more severely ill patients with increased lengths of hospitalization, and slowed growth in outpatient visits, which in previous years offset the financial effect of drops in inpatient use, contributed to the continued downturn in revenue margins for 1987, according to economic analysts for the American Hospital Association.

Combined with declining revenue margins is an increase of nearly one percent in the average length of stay for 1987, which had declined during much of the 1970s and in each year from 1982-85. The increase in length of stay in the first half of 1987 was highest among patients over age 65, a group for whom hospitals have incentives and pressures to reduce

"This places an additional strain on hospital expenses, as they are paid a fixed rate for Medicare patient hospitalization," Bailey said.

USDA wants comments on new rules


Public comments on proposed rules defining a "person" for payment limitation purposes and for determining whether foreign persons will be eligible to receive certain program payments are being sought by the USDA's Commodity Credit

The maximum payment limitation provisions of the proposed rule apply to the commodity price support and production adjustment programs beginning with the 1989 crops, including the Conservation Reserve Program, the Rural Clean Water Program, the Agricultural Conservation Program, the Forestry Incentive Program, the Emergency Conservation Program and the Colorado River Salinity Control

In addition, the proposed rule provides that non-citizens, any person who is not an alien lawfully admitted into the U.S. for permanent residence. and entities owned by these persons would be ineligible to receive certain payments, unless these persons are providing land, capital and a substantial amount of personal labor to the farming operation.

Details of the proposal appear in

Some vehicle owners will see a new message on their registration enewal forms beginning in May: "New Plates Required."

Bobbye Collins, tax assessor/collector, said the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will start a program of recalling plates more than eight years old to comply with a state law that calls for issuance of "safety plates."

Highway department testing personnel have found that the reflective value of license plate sheeting begins to deteriorate dramatically after eight years," said Dian Neill, head of the department's motor vehicle division. The dull plates are difficult to see in the dark.

Over the next 12 months, the department expects to issue 1.4

million replacement plates for all light trucks and passenger cars with tags originally issued from 1975 through 1980. Next year, recalls for 1981 plates will go out in the continuing program, conducted through county tax assessor/collector

Vehicle owners who volunteer to trade their 5- to 8-year-old plates may still do so free. "The state collects fees sufficient to replace license plates every five years, so you're getting your money's worth if you trade them in on time," said Mrs. Collins.



IRS COLLECTION PROCESS

The Internal Revenue Service has a legal right to collect taxes owed. It is also empowered to collect certified child support obligations. The collection process is similar for both the collection of tax and child support.

If, after your tax return has been checked for mathematical accuracy there is a balance due, you will receive a "Notice of Tax Due and Demand for Payment." In most cases, you are given ten days from the date of such notice to pay before the Service will enforce collection action.

If you're unable to make full payment on your balance due, you may make arrangements for installment payments. The IRS will review your financial condition to determine how you are able to pay.

Enforced collection is normally used only after the IRS tries to contact you and give you the opportunity to pay voluntarily.

Any type of property, personal or real, may be seized and sold to satisfy your tax bill. Before the date of sale, you may regain your property by making an acceptable agreement for payment of the tax. You may also have the right to redeem your property at any time prior to the sale by paying the tax due, including interest and penalties, together with any expenses of the seizure.


Real estate sold through this collection process may be redeemed by you at any time within 180 days after the sale. To redeem your property, you must pay the purchaser the amount he or she paid plus interest equal to 20% simple

Some of the items exempt from levy by federal law are:

- * Fuel, provisions, furniture, and personal effects not to exceed \$1,500 in
- Books and tools used in your trade, not to exceed \$1,000 in value.
- Certain annuity and pension payments.
- An income exemption of \$75 per wek plus an additional \$25 for each legal dependent.

Crosbyton man joins PCA board

Lance Morris, PCA member from Crosbyton, was elected to a three-year term as director of the Rolling Plains PCA board in the stockholders' annual meeting in Childress Friday and in Stamford Saturday. Other board members are W. J. Boykin of Childress, B. H. DeBusk of Anson, Dan Henard Jr. of Wellington and Garon Tidwell of Munday.

William H. "Snooks" Williams of Spur, director since 1976, was presented a plaque by Garon Tidwell, chairman of the meeting, on behalf of the membership and staff in appreciation of his 12 years on the board. Williams, who elected not to place his name in nomination for the director's position, served as vice chairman of the board for the past

Henard gave the board report. He pointed out that with a capital-to-total assets ratio of 30.21 percent, Rolling Plains PCA is one of the strongest capitalized of all Texas lending institutions. 
