
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

Haskell to host

April 28, Brzozowski said. After that date the county committee has no authority to approve a contract to participate in the program this year.

Brzozowski also reminded producers that new payment limitation forms must be completed by "ALL" individuals who will receive payments in 1989 and they must be reviewed and approved by the county committee.

Committee members must determine that each applicant is actively engaged in farming, the shares are commensurate and whether they are single or joint requests.

The same dates, April 14 for operators and April 28 for owners, apply for the operation plan for payment limitation.


Under current legislation, an operator who does not file a timely operating plan before the deadline is not eligible to receive payments for the 1989 crop year.

Brzozowski also issued other information to Haskell County farmers:

May 1 is the final date to certify any acreage of wheat, barley, rye, oats or any other small grain crop, regardless of the intended use. This includes small grain cover crops for ACR and CU. A request to leave small grain standing as cover must be filed by May 1 and the fee is \$10.

Producers who are going to graze and/or hay ACR/CU are reminded that the acreage must be baled or substantially grazed off by May 1 since that is the disposition date established for Haskell County. Acreage found to be in the "hard dough stage" after that time will have to be considered grain for program Merchants Association, the activity is purposes.

Haskell County's non-grazing period is May 15 through Oct. 14,

### Near-record temperature recorded

The 99-degree temperature recorded in Haskell on March 12 lacked two degrees being the highest temperature ever for the month of March.

The highest March temperature ever recorded was 101 degrees on March 31, 1946, Sam Herren, official weather recorder, said.

The 99-degree reading has been reached two other times in March, Herren said, on March 19, 1907, and on March 28, 1971.

The lowest temperature last month was 15 degrees recorded on March 5.

Moisture received in March totaled 1.64 inches, bringing the three-month total for 1989 to an even 5 inches, nearly 2 inches above the normal of 3.04 inches. The moisture included 2 inches of snow received March 5, just one week before the near-record high temperature.

#### PROS AND CONS OF LIVING TRUSTS

Living trusts have become a popular way to reduce the probate and administrative costs in an estate. A living trust is one you create while you are alive as opposed to a testamentary trust created by your will and taking effect upon your death. A living trust can be "revocable," meaning you can change it or revoke it at any time, or "irrevocable," meaning that you can give up control of the assets transferred to the trust and you cannot change the provisions of the trust.


The advantages of using a living trust include the elimination of probate on the assets in the trust when you die. You specify in the trust document how your assets are to be managed, and if the trust is to end at your death, how the assets are to be distributed. Terms of the trust are private whereas probate proceedings are a matter of public record. Generally, a living trust is less easily contested than a will.

The disadvantages to a living trust include having to actually transfer the titles of your assets to the trust, with whatever resulting complication of your affairs this might entail. A living trust does not eliminate the need for a will because you cannot use the trust to name guardians for minor children, nor will the trust take care of distribution of any property not included in it.

Certain property automatically bypasses probate without having to put it in a trust, including property held in joint tenancy with right of survivorship, IRA and pension benefits with named beneficiaries, and insurance proceeds payable to specific beneficiaries.

Do not attempt to establish a living trust without full consideration of the advantages and disadvantages and without the assistance of your financial and legal advisors.

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
