Getting more than 99.2 percent of the vote in his home county, Haskell's Rick Perry easily won the Republican nomination for state commissioner of agriculture in Tuesday's primary runoff election against Richard McIver.

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With a 255-2 endorsement from Haskell County, Perry had 96,761 votes statewide to McIver's 44,124 with more than 90 percent of the precincts reporting.

Perry, who led the first primary with 47 percent of the total vote, got 69 percent in the runoff, while McIver increased his percentage by a single point, 30 to 31.

Perry will now face Democratic incumbent Jim Hightower in the November general election.

Haskell County Democratic voters also gave a hearty endorsement to winner Ann Richards in her gubernatorial runoff race against Jim Mattox. Richards received 570 while Mattox got 313. Oddly, Mattox had beaten Richards in Haskell County in the first primary, 514-474.

In other Democratic races, Haskell County went for Tom Bowden for state treasurer, 424-406 over Nikki Hightower who was the state winner; favored Bob Gammage, 585-256 over Ross Sears for the supreme court; and endorsed Frank Maloney, 425-364 over Morris Overstreet for the criminal court of appeals. Gammage won statewide and Maloney was leading Overstreet by a whisker in the incomplete returns Wednesday morning.

In the only other Republican race, Haskell County favored Grady Yarbrough over West Gilbreath for state land commissioner, 92-88, but Gilbreath was the state winner.

Superintendent at Rule to retire

Lavon Beakley, superintendant of Rule schools for the past 20 years, will retire at the end of the present school year.

Beakley has been with the Rule school since graduating from Abilene Christian University in 1957. He was a teacher, elementary principal and high school principal before being named superintendent in 1970.

His successor will be Tom Kutch, who has served as high school principal since 1977, after 20 years as a vocational agriculture

Democrats name state delegates



EARNED INCOME CREDIT: DOES THE GOVERNMENT OWE YOU \$\$?

Uncle Sam is trying to return millions of dollars to taxpayers and not just to those who have had taxes withheld from their wages. No, some people who never paid a penny in tax could get a refund of up to \$910

Who are these lucky folks? Chiefly, they are working parents with modest to average wages. How do they qualify for this bonus? Through a under-utilized tax break known as the "earned income credit."

Some rules apply, of course. For 1989, you must file your income tax return as head of household, qualifying widow(er), or married, filing jointly, and have earned income of lesss than \$19,340. Additionally, you must have a child living with you for more than six months.

Many people who qualify for the credit never file a tax return, because they don't owe taxes. You must file a tax return to get the credit. The credit is applied first to any federal tax due, and the balance is mailed to you as a refund.

If you earned less than \$11,000 in 1986, \$15,432 in 1987 and/or \$18,576 in 1988, you might qualify for the credit and be due a refund for those years too. The IRS has a three year statue of limitations, so an amended return or claim for the credit for 1986 must be filed by April

If you are currently eligible for the credit, you can elect to receive the credit throughout the year as an addition to your wages by filing a Form W-5 with your employer...

The earned income credit is meant to reduce the impact of social security taxes for low wage earners. On a very real level, the earned income credit can mean extra money for rent, food and clothing.

Editor: Farmers are important. They grow cotton. We use cotton to make clothes, underwear,

undershirts, sweat pants, blue jeans, jams (shorts), pants, gowns, shoelaces, some tennis shoes, Tshirts, button shirts, socks. We use cotton for other things too: jumpropes, thread, cotton balls, Otips, toys (the outside and the stuffing).

Farmers are important. They grow food. The hamburger has bread; the farmer grew the wheat. The cheeseburger has cheese; the farmer grew the cow that gave the milk to make it. Onions, pickles; they come from cucumbers. Tomatoes, catsup, it's made out of tomatoes. Salad (lettuce), mustard, mayonnaise; eggs from the chickens and milk from the cow.

The hamburger patty; that's meat from the cow. We couldn't have a hamburger or a cheeseburger without our farmers.

They grow all kinds of other foods, too. Bacon, eggs, pork chops, honey, fried chicken, chicken nuggets, chicken strips, beans, bananas, grapes, cabbage, oranges, apples, watermelons, corn, peanuts, pineapples, lemons, sugar

If you're interested in trying some insect dishes, just gather a bunch of your favorite bugs---ants, grasshoppers, whatever---dry them in a warm oven, grind them in a blender and use them as a flour substitute for almost any recipe, especially cookies.

That's the recommendation of an Oregon State University entomologist who has researched the subject around the world.

Professor Michael Burgett says if you eat a normal diet, you eat about a pound of bugs a year.

Your gut reaction may be one of nausea, says Burgett, but the truth is, they're not bad for you. Dried caterpillar larvae, for example, have more protein than an equal amount of dried beef.

He says bits and pieces of insects are unavoidable in such staples as peanut butter, potatoes and tomato juice. So since we eat insects anyway, we should give up our demands for perfect produce, which would end heavy use of chemicals and pesticides. Besides, he says, a steaming plate of bamboo worm larvae is considered a delicacy in some parts of the world.

"There's always a lot of interest in my insect dishes, says Burgett. They look, smell and taste good. But I can't really say I've made a lot of dietary converts.

Eskimos eat head lice during mutual grooming rituals, he says, and some American Indian tribes of the western United States had native dishes of fly pupae.

"But we're not talking about an appetite for insects only in the distant past or among remote South American tribes," Burgett says. "In some modern, more devleoped nations such as Thailand, virtually everyone eats some type of insects. You buy them in the supermarket like milk and eggs."

While doing research in Thailand, Burgett sampled some unusual fare. A giant waterbug--two inches long, one inch tall and roasted---is a local favorite. The larvae and pupae of ants also add zest to an omelette.

A fine restaurant in Bangkok might offer insect dishes in season, Burgett says, just as a good American eatery would offer shad roe in early spring or fresh strawberry shortcake in June. And, according to him, the country's thriving silk industry offers a fringe benefit for connoisseurs---silkworm pupae "tastes great and are quite

Burgett's favorite recipe for his student banquets is bakuti, delicacy of Nepal.

"Bakuti is based on the larvae and pupae in a honeybee comb," he says. "It's full of protein and sort of looks like a scrambled egg when it's done. In Nepal, they like their honeybee products so much that special climbers risk their lives to harvest the hives of giant honeybees, which are usually found on steep cliffs."

To appease the American palate, Burgett mixes the bakuti with cream cheese and serves it on a

The motivation for the special menu and his lectures on dietary insects is serious: Americans need to accept the fact that their food is grown in a real world full of very real bugs. And, Burgett says, our insistance on pristine products can exact a high environmental price.

Burgett says his dream is for environmental groups to start lobbying the federal government for larger allowable quantities of insects in our foods. This might, he says, permit farmers to use more sustainable, healthy agricultural practices with less reliance on chemicals and pesticides.
