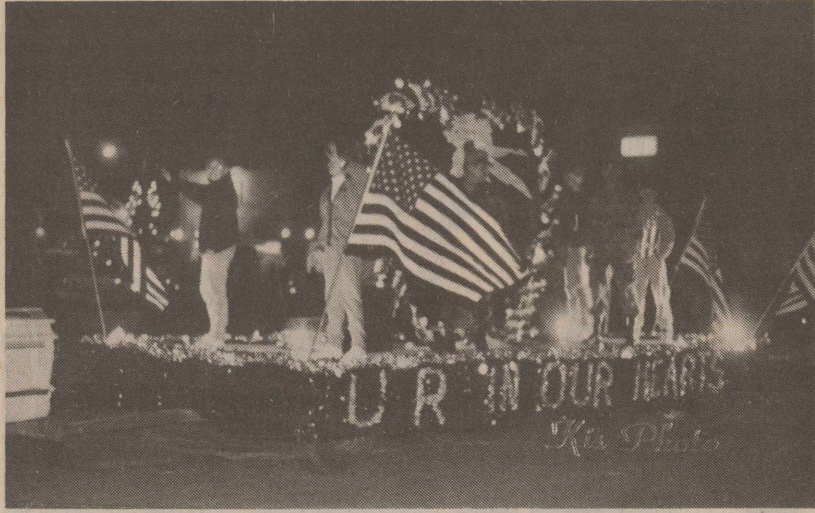


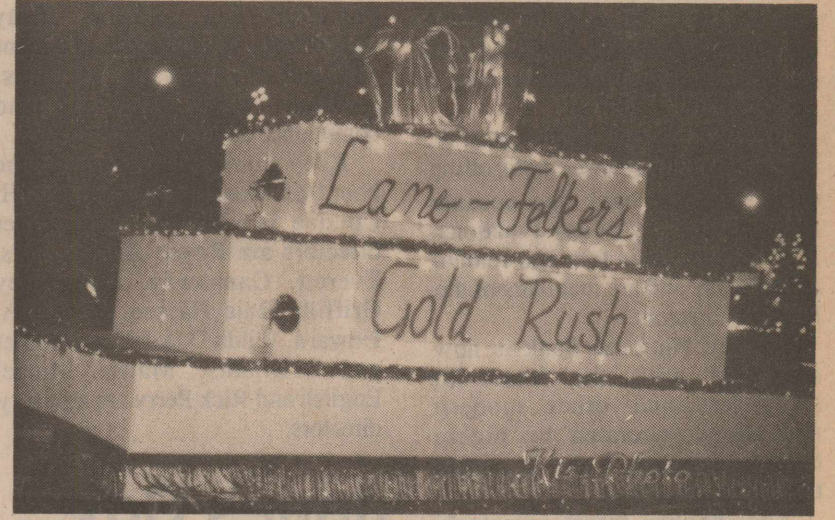
Winning floats in Christmas parade

Each recipient is asked to bring a large grocery sack and identification.

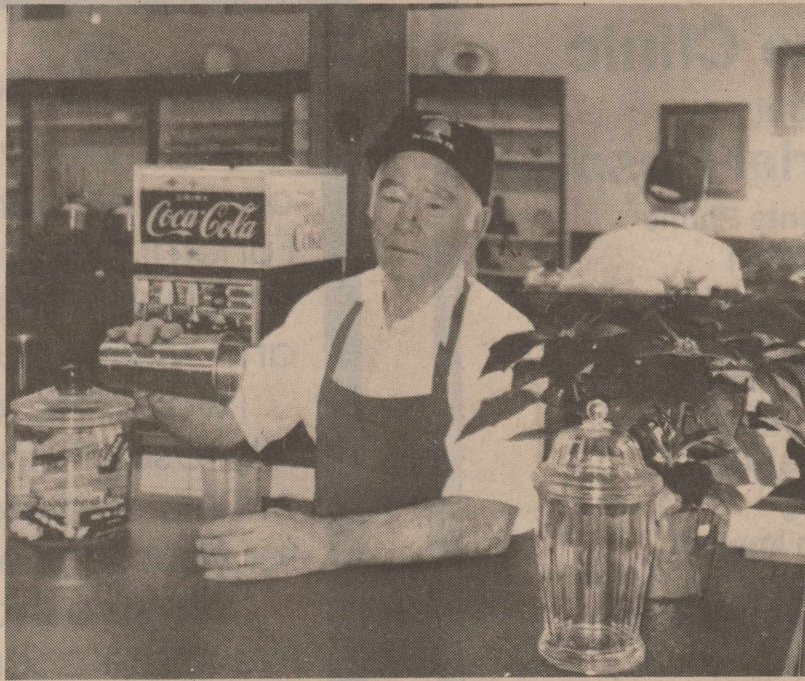

Rule restaurateur opens new cafe

A longtime Rule restaurateur has come out of retirement to open another eatery in that Haskell County town.

Lamar Casey, who owned and operated Rule's Bluebonnet Cafe for 38 years, last week opened the Drug Store Cafe.

It is located in the building formerly occupied by Woods Pharmacy which closed its doors earlier this year. The place had been a drug store for more than 60 years, hence the name of the new business.

And in keeping with the drug store theme, Casey has retained, and is operating, the soda fountain, being one of the few businesses around where customers can "belly up to the bar" and enjoy a Coke, a milkshake and other fountain sundries.

The Drug Store Cafe is open from 5 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday, and from 5 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

A luncheon buffet is served seven days a week from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. In addition, there are three week-night buffets, Mexican food on Wednesday, catfish on Thursday and hamburgers on Friday. Evening buffets are from 5 to 8 p.m.

Casey does his own cooking. He

said he started cooking when he was 10 or 11 and has always enjoyed it. His wife, Margie, is his associate. "I couldn't do it without her," he says. A son, Gary, also helps out.

Casey sold the Bluebonnet two and a half years ago with the intention of retiring. Since then, he suffered a heart attack, underwent triple bypass surgery and took on a pacemaker, but he says he feels fine now. "I couldn't stand retirement," he says. He worked as a cook at his former cafe and then worked in Ruidoso, N.M., before deciding to open another cafe in Rule after the Bluebonnet went out of business.

Jones Cox to quit business

Jones Cox & Co., a leading Haskell business since 1905, will close its doors early next year.

Wallace Cox Jr., third-generation owner of the hardware and furniture store founded by his grandfather, announced last week that he is closing the business.

The business will be closed after completion of a liquidation sale now in progress.

Jones Cox is the oldest retail store in Haskell County which has operated under the same family.

It was founded April 5, 1905, by Burwell Cox and W. L. Cason and was known as Cason Cox. After a few years, Cason sold his interest to John Jones and the business name became Jones Cox. It operated as a partnership of Jones and Burwell Cox and then of Jones and Mr. Cox's son, Wallace Cox Sr. until Jones sold out to Cox in the 1930s. For the past 10 years, Wallace Cox Jr. has been sole owner.

To this day, the store retains much of its turn-of-the-century character with wood stoves, lard cans, steel traps and tin bath tubs still among its offerings, earning it a wide reputation as the place to find hard-to-get items. And since its beginning, it has stressed high-quality merchandise in both hardware and furniture.

The building and fixtures, as well as the merchandise, have retained the charm of long-ago Haskell. The tin ceiling is part of the original store and merchandise is still displayed in the store's original wooden cabinets.

In years past, the store also served as a funeral home and a farm implement dealership. It was an International Harvester farm equipment franchise in the 1920s and 1930s and a funeral home from the early 20s to the mid-40s.

Wallace Cox Sr. began working in the store in 1914. He remained active in the business until he retired in 1978.

Wallace Cox Jr., like his father, worked in the store as a boy. He began working full time in 1954

Haskell National plans birthday open house

The public gets an opportunity next Sunday (Dec. 16) to help Haskell National Bank celebrate its 100th anniversary.

The bank's year-long observance of its centennial year will be climaxed with an open house between 1:30 and 4 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Haskell National Bank has been a fixture in Haskell County since Nov. 13, 1890, when the bank first opened for business. Since that time, the bank has not only had a vital influence on the financial structure of the area, but it has been at the forefront of virtually every project to better the community.

The bank was started with \$50,000 in capital stock, divided into 500 shares of \$100 each. M. S. Pierson served as the first

president until his death in 1909, after which his wife, Maggie Pierson, was president of the bank until 1947.

In 1947, their son, Alfred C. Pierson succeeded his mother as president and served for 20 years in that capacity. W. R. Johnson then served two years as president until 1969 when the present president, Abe Turner, was elected to the position.

After the depression-era "Bank Holiday" of 1933, The Haskell National Bank was reorganized and the "The" was dropped from its official name.

In July 1948, Haskell National Bank purchased the assets of Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Haskell. Assets at that time had

grown to \$3,715,961.55.
After 69 years in its original location at the corner of Avenue E and North First, the bank moved into a new building at its present location in 1959. This building was completely remodeled and enlarged in 1978.

after getting out of the Army.
In an interview with the Abilene Reporter-News in 1986, Wallace Cox Sr. recalled that in the old days the store took mules and horses as trade-ins on farm machinery and

then sold most of the animals on credit.

He also recalled accumulating about 400 bales of cotton in exchange for farm equipment in 1932, allowing 10 or 12 cents a pound. The price dropped to 4 cents but they rode out the drop in prices and eventually sold the cotton for 9 1/2 cents.

Wallace Cox Jr. said he has no specific plans for the future. At 62, he says he enjoys good health and expects to be doing something else in the near future.

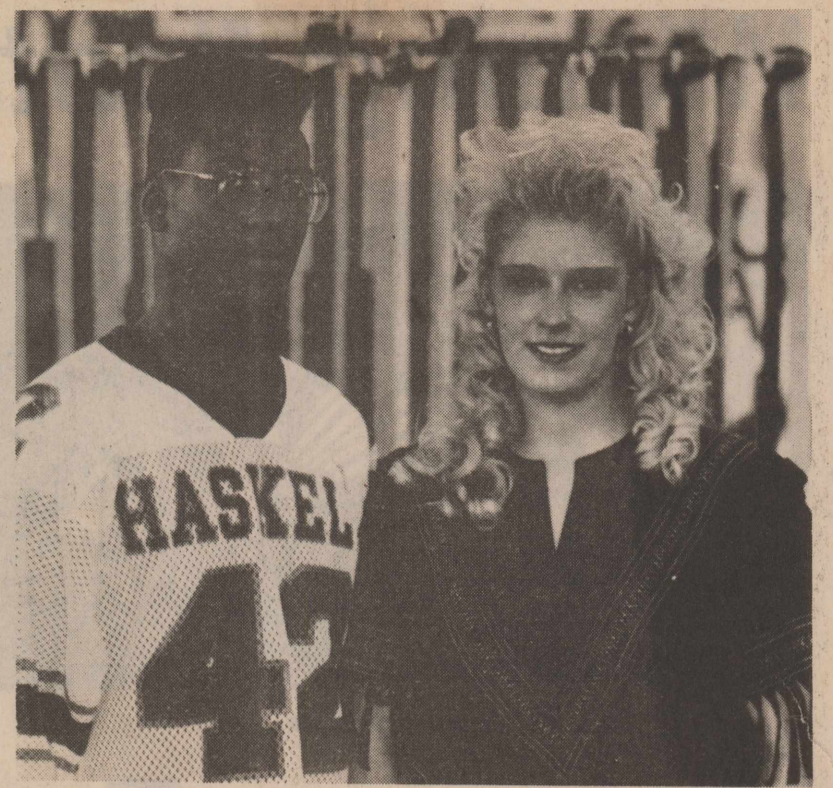

Haskell is headed toward one of its most bountiful years, rainfall-wise.
Through the first 11 months of 1990, rainfall has measured 33.28 inches, according to Sam Herren, official weather recorder. The 11-month average is 23.24 inches.
November rainfall measured 1.96 inches, surpassing the normal of 1.23, Herren said.
Temperatures during the month ranged from a high of 84 degrees on Nov. 1 to a low of 30 degrees on Nov. 29, Herren reported.

Mary Kaigler:
From the Inside Out

"Trees have been known to speak," Shakespeare wrote in *Macbeth*, and I've got to agree with the Bard.

The trees, this fall, are telling me that Haskell is one beautiful place. In six years here I've never seen it so full of heart-wrenching color. It's as if the trees all got together and said, "Let's go for the gold." With the winds teasing at them, the leaves are now beginning to pour off of the loaded branches, spilling out across the streets like bright, new coins in the sunlight.

For two or three weeks the view out of our big south window has been a picture, framed by the pecan tree in our yard and filled in with the brilliant yellows, golds and greens of the pecan leaves towering above the Jim Isbell's house and garage. Transparent and shimmering in the sunlight of early morning and late afternoon, they remind me of a French impressionist painting. With clear blue air above and green grass below, the golden leaves spiral down like gentle gyros, falling as snowflakes on a still, winter day. Quite a contrast to past fall seasons that I can remember.

As a child of the '30s, living on the South Plains, I read with wonder about the fall leaves floating down to gently cover and protect the lost "babes in the woods." With the reality of the Dust Bowl being what it was--harsh and unrelenting--the fairy tale place in the story book sounded wonderful to me; a kind environment giving nurture. During that time West Texas was a place where Nature was severe and sand-colored--not a pretty sight in the

fall--neither kind nor nurturing to the aesthetic senses.

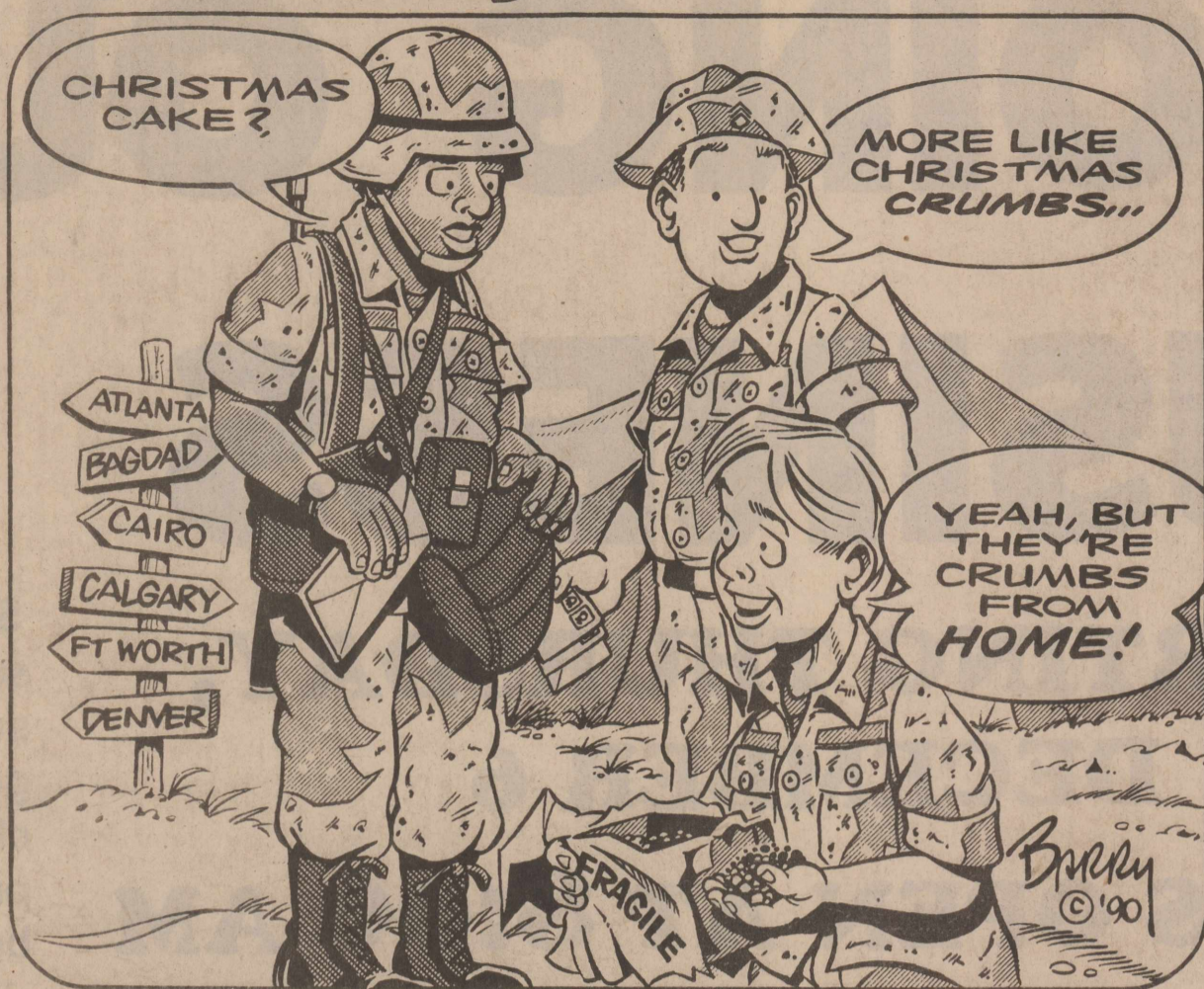
Leaves from the few trees in our Panhandle town split from the branches at a 90-degree angle during the early, driving winds of blue "northers," and didn't alight until several counties to the south, if ever. There was no gentle floating of fall colors to be enjoyed, nor enough leaves accumulated to cover even a lost red ant. If the trees said anything, as they permanently bent toward Lubbock, it was, no doubt, "Times are rough all over, folks."

Unlike the resourceful, brown West Texas birds who tenaciously clung with toes clinched white around bare branches, I never adapted well to the drab, gritty landscape; physically or mentally. From early on I strongly felt that life needs some color to make it interesting and more palatable. True, I've long since learned that we each have the responsibility of finding, recognizing and creating our own life's color, but this year Nature is giving us a gift of beauty we can all claim as our own.

All over Haskell fall is bursting at the seams with it. Take a fall foliage tour of our town; you'll find that the trees are talking in colorful tones. Listen to the beauty of it. Just as it is with all golden moments, this one may soon be gone with the wind.

Of course, to some practical souls (who small remain unnamed), the trees are only saying, "Rake my leaves." To these hapless victims of reality-thinking we can only answer in the words of Miss Scarlett, "Well, I'll think about that tomorrow."

NEW TAX LEGISLATION PASSED

After much political maneuvering and debate, Congress finally passed the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990 the last week of October. President Bush signed the bill into law on November 5. The new law cuts federal spending in some areas and increases taxes for many Americans, particularly those with higher incomes. For the most part, the provisions in the new law become effective in 1991.

In a nutshell, here are the key provisions in the new law:

- Increases top income tax rate from 28% to 31%.
- Sets top capital gains rate at 28%.
- Limits itemized deductions for those with adjusted gross income over \$100,000.
- Phases out benefit of personal exemptions for upper-income taxpayers.
- Levys 10% luxury tax on expensive cars, boats, jewelry, furs, planes.
- Raises tax on gasoline, tobacco products and alcohol.
- Extends Medicare payroll tax (1.45% for employees, 1.45% for employers) on wages up to \$125,000.
- Increases Medicare monthly insurance premiums for the next five years.
- Increases annual Medicare deductible from \$75 to \$100.
- Increases "user fees" charged by a wide range of government agencies.
- Expands the earned income credit to include higher credit for families with more children, families with a child under one, and families whose health insurance premiums include coverage for a child.

We'll have more details and suggestions for tax planning under the new law in future articles.

Notes From The Rolling Plains

(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

When I was 14 years of age I became interested in the sport of coyote hunting. Interested is not really the appropriate word. Obsessed is more like it. Day in and day out I hunted the prairie wolf on the ranches north of the Brazos river in Knox and King counties. I did not dislike the coyote but instead found the sport quite challenging, especially for a young boy. After entering college I began studying the coyote and was finally granted funds to study this interesting animal. Even after finishing college in 1974 I spent over five years professionally hunting the coyote, living in a half dugout in Dickens county and finally, after some coaxing from college officials, joined the staff at Texas Tech University as a research associate to study the coyote under a 2 1/2 year grant. During my years of working with and hunting this interesting animal I have acquired information that many people would find interesting. Did you know that November is the month for the spring pup population to begin emigration from their denning grounds into surrounding areas? How many times have you heard that if something is not done about the coyote population they will eat us out of house and home? This is a false statement. Coyotes are very mobile animals and will, when necessary, move out of a region if the food supply becomes scarce. The coyote population will regulate itself even if no mortality is evident either through disease or man induced factors. Ranchers who see coyotes mingling with their cattle herds often feel that the coyotes are about to attack and kill the calves. The main reason for the coyotes presence in a cattle herd is the critters love for calf droppings. Some predation will occur on abandoned calves or heifers that have been crippled while giving birth but this behavior is not the norm. Even when a calf comes in with his or her tail chewed off, usually the culprit is an individual coyote and not the mischief of the entire coyote population. So when you hear the yip yap of a pair of coyotes or the lonely howl of a single animal on the cold winter nights, fear not this creature of the dark hour. He's just out trying to make a meal at the expense of a rabbit or mouse or if all else fails, the steaming pile of calf droppings.

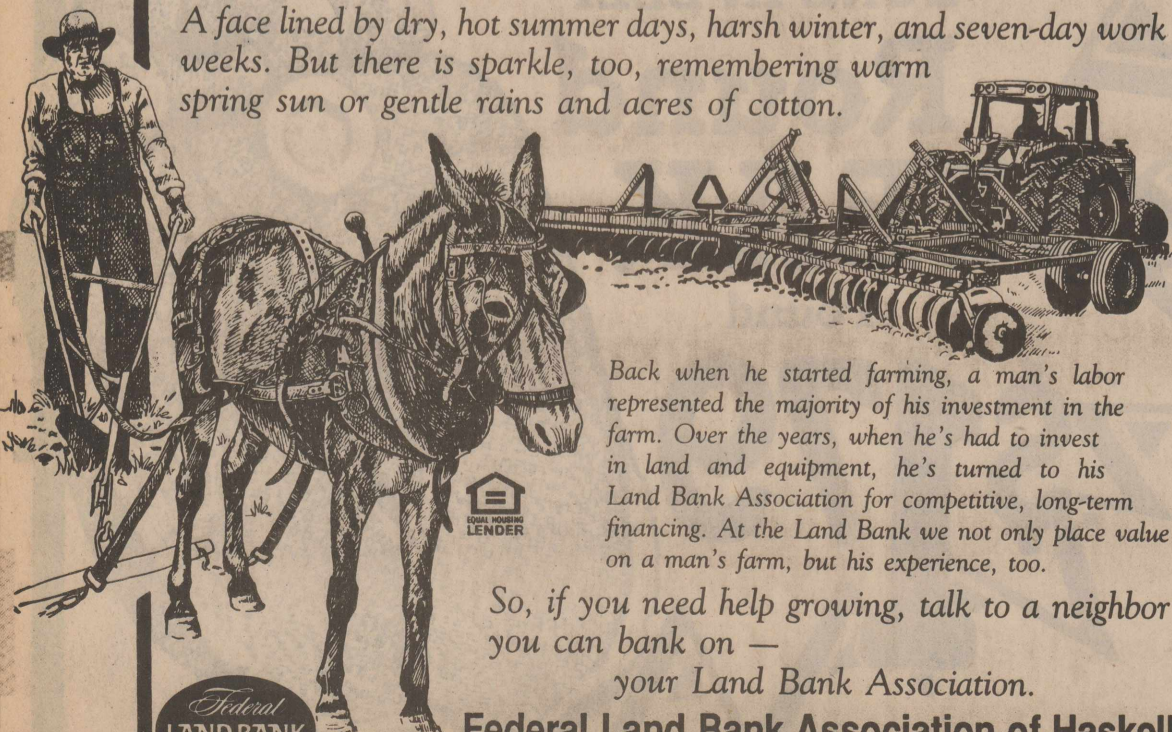

Study calls for Haskell bypass

A state highway department study recommends the development of long-range plans for a US 277 bypass route through Haskell.

Bypasses also were recommended for Munday, Uvalde and Carrizo Springs.

The recommendation came in a study presented to highway commissioners last Thursday which also recommended against upgrading US 277 and SH 83 connecting Wichita Falls and Brownsville.

The report maintained that traffic is insufficient to warrant the upgrading, but it recommended that the route continue to be monitored so that additional lanes may be added when traffic justifies them.

Various officials along the 739-mile route have lobbied the state to construct a four-lane divided

highway all the way.

The route begins at the Oklahoma border near Wichita Falls and runs to Brownsville in the Rio Grande Valley. It passes through Munday, Haskell, Anson, Abilene, Ballinger, Eden, Junction, Uvalde, Crystal City, Laredo, McAllen and Harlingen.
