County Judge B. O. Roberson and Precinct 2 Commissioner Ronnie Chapman were re-elected in Tuesday's Democratic primary runoff election.

Roberson won over J. M. "Stick" Raughton by a vote of 910 to 785, while Chapman's victory came over E. L. "Elmer" Adams by a vote of 401 to 317.

Roberson and Raughton had finished 1-2 in a four-man field in the first primary, while Chapman and Adams were the top votegetters among three candidtes in the earlier election.

In the U.S. Senate race, Haskell County Democrats gave Richard Fisher a 949-648 edge over Jim Mattox. Fisher also was the statewide winner and will oppose Republican incumbent Kay Bailey Hutchison in the November general election.

In the only two other state Democratic races, Haskell County also followed the state trend. Raul Gonzalez bested Rene Haas, 878-654, in their race for Supreme Court Judge, and Betty Marshall led Gene Kelly for the Court of Criminal Appeals by a vote of 757-590.

In the Republican runoff, Pat Lykos led Don Wittig for Attorney General, 17-6, in local voting and Sam Bayless edged Sharon Keller for Court of Criminal Appeals, 12-11. The state winners were Wittig and Keller.

Another vote coming on sales tax

In addition to voting for a mayor and two council members in the May 7 city election, Haskell voters will vote on a half-cent city sales tax increase to be earmarked for economic development.

It will be the fourth time since 1991 the proposal has been presented to Haskell voters. It was defeated 131-116 in 1991, 486-408 in 1992 and 428-279 in 1993.

If passed, the increase would boost the local sales tax rate from 1.5 cents to 2 cents. Coupled with the state sales tax rate of 6.25 cents, the overall sales tax rate in Haskell would go from 7.75 cents to 8.25 cents.

Proponents of the tax point out that it is needed for Haskell to attract new industry, pointing out that Haskell is at a serious disadvantage in competing for industry with communities which have tax.

The first day of spring is one thing, and the first spring day is another. The difference between them is sometimes as much as a month.

Henry Van Dyke Just as spring rediscovers our old world each year, bringing it new ways of doing things, we too rediscover new ways of doing old things. Recently, I've rediscovered the city park after a long winter of practically walking-in-place inside.

Finding the Baptist Family Activity Center gym busy with volleyball games, I decided to walk my Miracle Mile (the miracle being that I'm doing it at all) in the park. After one time around the jogging trail I was hooked on it again.

It was not yet officially spring, but families picnicing under the pavilion, children on the playground equipment, optimistic anglers baiting hooks on the creek banks, mothers pushing strollers, the neat, young business woman enjoying her lunch break, various walkers and the ducks, didn't seem to notice. For all their intent and purposes it might as well be spring; and the world seemed just right.

By the second time around I knew it was just right for me. I could feel my heart pumping with fresh oxygen and filling with fresh joy for the yearly ritual and promise of new life for all of creation.

Not wanting to lose the buoyant mood of that day, I continue to go back. The path's smooth surface, allowing for safe stepping, frees me to confidently look up as I walk, and I've become aware of and interested in some of the details of the park.

Even the young, new trees along the water's edge have become individual and familiar to me. Appropriate to the season, each day new buds swell and new, green leaf springs appear. Although some of the little trees look like goners, I keep encouraging them anyway, hoping and looking for signs of

As I walk by I envision them in future years, properly nourished and prudently pruned to reach their full potential; spreading their deep shades along the creek bank for new generations of children and ducks. And I'll be there, still toddling around the trail, still talking to the trees. "Oh yes," I'll say, "I remember you when you were just a skinny sapling set out by the Parks and Recreation Department way back in 1993. My, how you've grown, and what a great contribution you have made to the quality of life in Haskell." They will wave their branches, and maybe they will remember me, too.

Low clumps of tiny, yellow wild flowers and purple, verbenalike blossoms are thick and lovely along the walk as it winds away from the water, up and around the ball park, RV campgrounds, pool area and back down to the gazebo. These flowering weeds, considered so abominable growing in our lawns, seem just right here in the park; proving again the truth of there being "a time and place for

Certainly for me, this is a great time, and the park is a great place to get my walking muscles in shape for my trip to New York City in May. This is not Central Park we have here, but it is our park, and it didn't just happen. A lot of vision, dedication, planning and labor have gone into make City Park the plus it is for all of

According to the calendar it was not the first day of spring. But when my Miracle Mile led me back to the park on that first spring day, just in time to witness again the wonderful miracle of the season as it awakens and unfolds in West Texas, it was the beginning of spring for me.

A walk in the park; a miracle, any way I look at it.

Three coffee drinkers at the DQ Monday reported three different

"Bread isn't the staff of life.

Grease is," said James Ward Lee in a recent talk in Victoria. "Grease is lard---without which biscuits just lie there looking and

tasting like those dry rice patties they sell to dieters." Dr. Lee, an Alabama native turned Texan, and author of Texas, My Texas, was talking to members of the Texas Folklore Society and his remarks are taken from Kent

Biffle's "Texana" column in The

Dallas Morning News. He recalled the crock of bacon drippings that sits off the right hand side of the back burner on the stove of every decent Southern cook.

"Many a time have I seen my Aunt Rene dip a big spoon into the grease crock and plop a mound of white and brown hog fat into a stewer of green beans---a stewer that already had a chunk of hog jowl simmering pleasantly among the beans.

"Then my Aunt Rene would pause, look deep into the green beans that had been cooking for about two hours, and, with a shake of her head, dip back into the crock, and this time get enough grease to do some good.

"Every morning of his life, my Uncle Henry Pickens ate either sausage or bacon or ham---often all three---about three biscuits the size of Model A hubcaps, and a teacup of grease gravy or sawmill gravy. "Coffee gives grease gravy that

red eye. Spooned on a biscuit, it will leave a red spot in the middle and soak the rest of the biscuit in fine, clear, pure grease. "Sawmill gravy, (flour gravy or

cream gravy) has as its main ingredient grease, though the flour hides the part of the gravy that makes it so good---the grease.

"Think about this: a few gravysoaked biscuits, some grits floating in the same gravy, a big piece of smokehouse ham, a sausage patty or two, and four or five strips of bacon, all complementing a couple of hen eggs fried in grease saved back from the gravy-making.

"Then you sop the last of it with a couple more biscuits slathered with fine yellow cow butter to provide a bed for the sorghum syrup that's required throughout the Deep South and the more civilized parts of Texas.'

A breakfast like that, he said, sticks to your ribs (or aorta) until "dinner" at noon, consisting of a pork or beef roast or some fried chicken and about six vegetables. Supper was dinner's leftovers, reheated enough to melt the grease.

Later in his talk, Lee took a jab a Wilford Brimley of TV's oatmeal commercials, saying he bet he didn't get his girth by eating oats.

Food Allergies Can Be Fatal: In a review of fatal and near-fatal anaphylactic reactions in 13 children and teenagers, all patients were receiving medication for asthma and all had had allergic reactions to the offending food in the past. Because no one was aware that the substance was contained in the food eaten, the authors recommended that children with IgE-mediated food allergies have epinephrine always available and that they and their caretakers know how to administer it. Also, parents of these children should ensure that schools and other public institutions have a mechanism of response to this emer-





New Rules for Charitable Giving

Under the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1993, you will be burdened with new requirements for your charitable donations. When making charitable contributions this year, you should be aware of the following changes in the tax law:

 Deductions for donations of \$250 or more now require "written substantiation" from the charity; a canceled check

 Charities must now tell donors how much of a donation is deductible when the donor receives something for his contribution. This requirement applies to donations of more than \$75 where the contribution is partially for goods or services provided by the charity. To illustrate, suppose you contribute \$200 to a charity and receive a ticket to the charity's fundraising dinner. The charity must tell you in writing what the value of the dinner is and how much of your contribution is tax deductible. In this illustration, if the dinner is valued at \$35, your tax deductible contribution is \$165.

 Donating appreciated property, such as stocks, bonds, artwork, collectibles, real estate, etc., can now be done without concern for the alternative minimum tax. Under prior tax law, donating appreciated property created a tax preference item which could be subject to the AMT. Under the new rules, taxpayers can take a deduction for the fair market value of their contributions and not have the appreciation in the asset subject to either the regular income tax or the alternative minimum tax.




