

Local Men Attend Agri. Ammonia National Meeting

Neal D. McAllister and John McFarland of the Western Fertilizer Co., Muleshoe, have returned home after attending the second annual national meeting of the Agricultural Ammonia Institute, held last Thursday and Friday, Dec. 6 and 7, in the Claridge Hotel, Memphis, Tenn.

The two got there in time to attend the concluding sessions Dec. 5 of the Cotton Insect Control Congress.

The Ammonia Institute meeting is held on a national basis for the purpose of acquainting everyone with the latest developments in anhydrous ammonia equipment methods of application, etc. The Institute was formed, the local men said, to "see to it that the farmers, as well as the dealer gets information as it develops" concerning this comparatively new form of fertilizer and everything that pertains to it.

There were 200 or more representatives of manufacturers of equipment used in applying anhydrous ammonia, of the producers of the fertilizer, and of the distributors. Thirty-seven states were represented among the distributors attending against some six represented at the first meeting. Several states were represented by state officials.

The next meeting will be in Dallas, and will be a three day affair instead of the two day program given this year. Western Fertilizer is distributors here for anhydrous ammonia as well as dry fertilizer which the company mixes in its plant here in Muleshoe.

Well Steel Requires NPA Okay By Fri.

If you're a farmer and intend to build a new irrigation well for next summer's crop you have until 5 p. m. Friday to get permission to buy casing and wiring during April, May and June.

It's already too late to get permission, which is granted by the National Production authority, to buy the steel casing necessary to sink the "average" South Plains irrigation well before April 1. NPA officials say.

NPA Order Necessary

Well companies say that over two tons of carbon steel casing which is usually of 16 inch diameter with a quarter inch wall, can not be used without an NPA order. This goes for over 200 pounds of copper wire (used to hook electrically driven pumps.)

If the material is on hand on the farmer's property before Oct. 1 the order does not apply.

The NPA's Department of Commerce controlled material plan regulation No. 6 states that drilling and equipping an irrigation well is considered a construction project—the same as building a church, school or cotton gin.

Proper Form Required

Farmers must apply on form CMP-4C (construction projects) for a purchasing allotment. The forms can be obtained from the area offices of NPA in the Cotton Exchange building in Lubbock or from the state Production Marketing administration offices in College Station.

The form should be filled out and filed with either of these offices. It will be forwarded to the Department of Agriculture in Washington and subsequent approval or rejection notices sent the applicant.

6 Inch Snowfall Friday Covered Most Of The Plains And Panhandle

24,000 Bales In County To Dec. 1

Unofficial figures for Bailey County ginnings are 24,000 bales to December 1, from the crop of 1951.

Latest estimates are that the county will gin 35,000 bales from this year's crop. Snow and bad weather of the last few days have halted harvesting, but with good weather most of the cotton will be ginned by the first of the year.

Postoffice Open Saturday P. M.

Muleshoe postoffice will remain open until 5 p. m. on each of the next two Saturdays, Dec. 15 and Dec. 22, A. J. Gardner, postmaster announced today. The office has been closing at noon on Saturdays.

The move was made to expedite Christmas mailing and prevent a pile up of mail in the local office.

Mr. Gardner reminded the people that it is now time to mail Christmas cards and packages. He said that if mailed now they will have a much better chance to reach their destination on time.

He said the postoffice workers will do everything in their power to keep everything dispatched. Mail volumes is getting heavier from day to day, however, and if the workers get "snowed under" it takes longer for them to work things out.

A low of 1 degree below zero was registered here in the early hours of Sunday morning, R. J. Klump, weather recorder here said. And it didn't warm up very quickly afterward. A low of 17 was registered Sunday night or early Monday and Monday night's low was 13 above.

As a consequence of the cold, the snow which covered the countryside Friday night was still much in evidence on fields and pastures.

Mr. Klump said the snow was measured at 6 inches and moisture content of the snow was .36 of an inch.

The snow was pretty general over the section and must have been of great benefit to the wheat crop. It was very wet snow and as it melted it deposited lots of moisture in the ground. There was no high wind to cause the snow to drift and pile up so mostly it lay where it fell.

The snowfall seemed to augur well for a good crop in 1952, since many believe snowfall during the winter months is a harbinger of a good season in the ground.

DEATH PENALTY ASSESSED FOR STEVENS

Livesay Trial For Murder Will Be Heard After The First Of The Year

CROP Gifts Are Being Received

A jury in Bailey County district court last Thursday night deliberated only 20 minutes before assessing the death penalty against Lester Douglas Stevens at the conclusion of his trial for the murder of Josh Blocher, Bailey County citizen last August.

Judge E. A. Bills will sentence the man after the legal time has elapsed, ten days.

The death penalty, first ever to be assessed in this county, was voted by the jury on its second ballot. The trial had consumed nearly a week, beginning Monday morning with the selection of the jury. The end of the trial came with surprising suddenness after the state had completed taking of its testimony just before noon Thursday; the defense testimony consumed only 10 minutes. After the jury had heard the charge of Judge Bills and final arguments of attorneys for the state and defense they brought in a verdict in a very short time.

Trial of Thomas C. Livesay, also charged in the murder of Blocher will not be heard until after the first of the year. Judge Bills had to hold court in Plainview this week and will be busy with court in other counties of the district until after Jan. 1.

Meantime Livesay will have to remain in jail since this is not a bailable case. Karl Lovelady, Muleshoe attorney, and Bill Shecan of Friona were appointed by the court to defend Stevens. He appointed W. G. Street and J. R. "Billy" Hall to defend Livesay.

Dist. Attorney Joe Sharp of Plainview was assisted in the prosecution by Norman W. Bays, Bailey County attorney.

The trial attracted state wide attention. Harry Hoare, of the Amarillo News and head of its regional staff spent most of the time here and covered the trial not only for his publication but for other papers and the Associated Press.

A. F. Personnel Survey Conducted In Bailey County

LUBBOCK, Dec. 12—Bailey Co. has been added to those comprising the area for Air Force personnel survey being conducted here by the 14th Air Force and volunteers of the 9172nd VART Group.

The survey, with headquarters at 710 No. College, the Naval Reserve Training Center building, is undertaking to bring all Air Force Reservists before a reviewing board to determine the individual's position with the Air Forces.

"Greatest gain is by the individual," according to Lt. Col. Harlan Hodges, project officer for "Project Lubbock", "Since his leaving the Air Force after World War II, he likely has developed a new skill which will serve him and the Air Force to a better advantage when the time comes, if ever, for his re-entering the Air Force. This is definitely not a survey to bring men back in to the armed forces," he said.

Already more than 150 men from nine counties have taken survey, in the first week of the project. Since then nine more counties have been added to the area and very likely nearly 800 men will be reached before the project is completed in a few more weeks.

BABSON DISCUSSES— Pension Systems

Babson Park, Mass., Dec 7 — A new and very important development is taking place in the investment and labor world in connection with employees' Pension Systems. It is of utmost importance to every employer and every reader of this column. Pension Systems may greatly improve labor relations, or can result in colossal trouble. At the present time they are not controlled by legislation and usually unsupervised by the corporations and wageworkers enjoying them.

WHAT IS A PENSION PLAN?
There are various forms of Pension Plans and all should be "custom made" for each different corporation. Usually they provide for compulsory retirement at 65 years of age and optional retirement after thirty years of employment. Each wageworker receives a pension based upon his salary and number of years of service, less his

social security pension. A full pension usually averages about \$150 a month for wageworkers, and up to \$600 a month for executives.

For a new corporation without any back obligations, this is a very simple matter. Even for old corporations it is simple to care for new employees and to make current appropriations for old employees. But, when it comes to providing the money to take care of the back years of old employees, this requires heavy appropriations. To encourage corporations to adopt these Pension Systems, the Government allows (if definite rules are followed) the corporation to charge all such appropriations to EXPENSE. This means that Uncle Sam will pay about one-half of the bill. The corporation also can have the Trustee purchase some of its own stock, which may be very advantageous to all concerned.

METHOD OF OPERATION

The usual method of operation is to have a Committee appointed, one member representing the stockholders, one member representing the wageworkers, and on member representing the executives. This Committee selects a lawyer to draw up the proposed Pension Plan, an Actuary to determine the annual payments (unless an insurance company is used), and a Bank to receive the funds for investment. If the Committee is wise, before any plan is adopted, it will first employ some impartial statistical organization to give independent advice in the interest of all parties.

Some Pension Plans are "contributory," in which case the wageworkers make a contribution, but in most cases the entire burden is carried by the corporation. After the above steps have been consummated, the work consists of an actual study each year to determine how much should be paid to the Bank and How The Bank Invests The Money. The payments to retiring employees are made by the bank.

WHERE IS THE DYNAMITE?

The work of the Trust Departments of Banks has heretofore been limited largely to handling Family Trust Funds, serving as Executors of Wills, and operating Agency Accounts. In these cases, only a few beneficiaries are involved. If the Bank then makes a mistake, only two or three children may be affected. When, however, a Bank is investing this money for 1,000 wageworkers, whose families are dependent almost solely thereon in their old age, the situation is very different. All parties involved are sitting on a keg of dynamite! Hence, the greatest care should be taken.

Some Banks want to invest all the money in Government Bonds, forgetting this policy was followed by the big banks of Germany where these Pension Plans started. As a result, the money was entirely wiped out with a total loss to everyone. Other Banks want to buy stock now selling at an average of \$270, forgetting that these stocks sold at only \$42 in 1932 and may again. Other Banks want to buy only corporation bonds, ignoring the continual decline in the value of the Dollar, as do the Life Insurance Companies. Finally the "shotgun" theory. The correct procedure is for the Committee, after employing outside independent advice, to consult with the Bank about the policy, and Inform The Wageworkers Quarterly Thereon. This cannot be done by using an insurance company.

PIGGLY WIGGLY
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Mahon Says U. S. Now Waging History's Greatest Peace Offensive

Several hundred local people heard Congressman George Mahon give his "final report for the year 1951" to the people of his district when he spoke in the Muleshoe high school auditorium last Thursday night. The Congressman, during the recess of Congress, has spoken in 23 of the 25 counties of this, the 19th Congressional District.

He had made two speeches Thursday before appearing here. This was his last such speech before returning to the capital for the opening of Congress.

The Congressman came here at the invitation of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, Ben Richardson Post American Legion, Rotary Club, Lions Club, and Junior Chamber of Commerce. He was introduced by Noel Woodley.

He discussed the national and world situation for about 40 minutes then threw the meeting open to questions from the floor. Much interesting information came out of this part of the program. Mr. Mahon said he had never addressed a more attentive audience, and he said that in general the interest of the people in what is going on in the world and in what Washington is doing is at a record high.

Praises 82nd Congress
Congressman Mahon praised the 82nd Congress for its comparative conservatism and for its courage. He said the body has refused to pass so-called "leftist" legislation or legislation suspected of tending further toward socialism, mentioning specifically Congress' defeat of socialized medicine.

It has showed its courage, he said, by itself instituting the

various investigations which have revealed graft, improper conduct of office, and influence peddling in high places, that have so shocked the American people in recent months. The chief executive, he said, at first intimated the investigations by saying "red herring", but that recently he has taken action of his own in the tax scandals.

Breakdown In Morals
Yet, he asserted, there has been a general breakdown in morals all over the U. S. "You can't clean up Washington, clean up the Government, without cleaning up everywhere in the nation," he declared.

But he had a cheering word for his listeners. He said that all over the U. S. the great rank and files of people, here and everywhere, are people of principle, people of integrity. There have been exceptions, he says, but these have been and are being weeded out, just as rotten apple is weeded out of a barrel in which all the other apples are sound.

We are threatened within, he said, by moral decay and by economy situation. The military has been criticized for spending money too freely; what the military needs, he thinks, is better management, just as each of us needs to exercise better management in the conduct of our offices, shops, or farms. We need to reduce our long range military expenditures and get more for each dollar spent.

The Korean Situation
The speaker then went into a discussion of the Korean situation where the United Nations is fighting to prevent South Korea from being overrun by Communists from the north. "There is no quick or ready solution to this situation in which we find ourselves," Mr. Mahon said. The present world situation may last a long, long time he fears.

On aid to foreign nations to help them resist world Communism: "We didn't win World War I alone, and we didn't win World War II alone, and we certainly didn't want to fight with our backs to the wall against Communism."

But, he said, "my firm opinion is that when historians write about these times they will say that the invasion on June 25, 1950, of South Korea was where the Communists made their greatest mistake, for they aroused America." We are dealing, he said, with a ruthless, implacable foe and so we have decided to re-arm at once.

As chairman of the House Committee on Military Expenditures, he told his audience, he has personally presented to the Congress bills involving the appropriation of \$108 billion for the Armed Forces since Korea. On one of these measure called for the appropriation of \$56 billion.

Unanimity Is Seen
Congressman Mahon saw this as proof that in the U. S. there is more unity than some would have us believe. Republicans and Democrats forgot party politics and voted solidly for these measures which they thought were designed for the good of the whole country.

We are not yet ready to wage all out war, the Congressman reminded his listeners. Discussing our preparedness drive, he said there is "no pushbutton that production of military weapons and equipment are not up to schedule; they are on schedule all right but schedules have been revised downward. Yet he

reminded the audience that it takes a long time to proceed from drawing board weapons "in being." We have had 18 months since Korea to produce but we still need time, the Congressman said.

Greatest Peace Offensive
Mr. Mahon said that the United States is engaged in the greatest peace offensive ever waged by a nation in all history. Even in Korea, we are trying to fight a small war in order to prevent a big war."

Banks Of Texas Sell Christmas Merchandise Also

The banks of Texas will sell about \$5,000,000 worth of Christmas "merchandise" during December.

This is the estimate of Nathan Adams, of Dallas, who said that while banks are not ordinarily thought of as "Santa Claus headquarters," about one third of their sales of U. S. Defense Bonds this month will be used as Christmas presents or year-

end bonuses. Mr. Adams ought to know, because at 82 he is dean of Texas bankers and has been state Defense Band chairman for almost ten years.

Mr. Adams said that parents are probably the principal buyers of bonds as gifts, with grandparents and aunts and uncles not far behind. Business concerns also are heavy buyers at this time of year, with many of them preferring to give bonds instead of cash or merchandise as bonuses to employees, he added.

Normal sales of Defense Bonds in December would be \$8,000,000 or \$10,000,000 for the state, but gift buying will raise the total to a possible \$15,000,000, he said.

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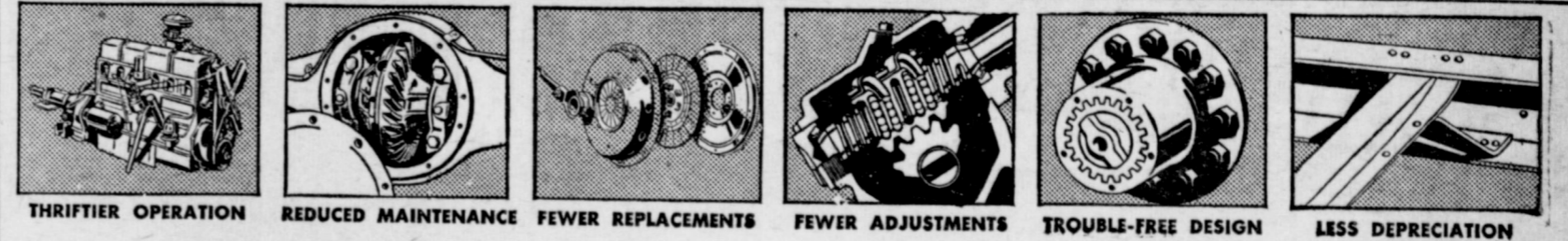
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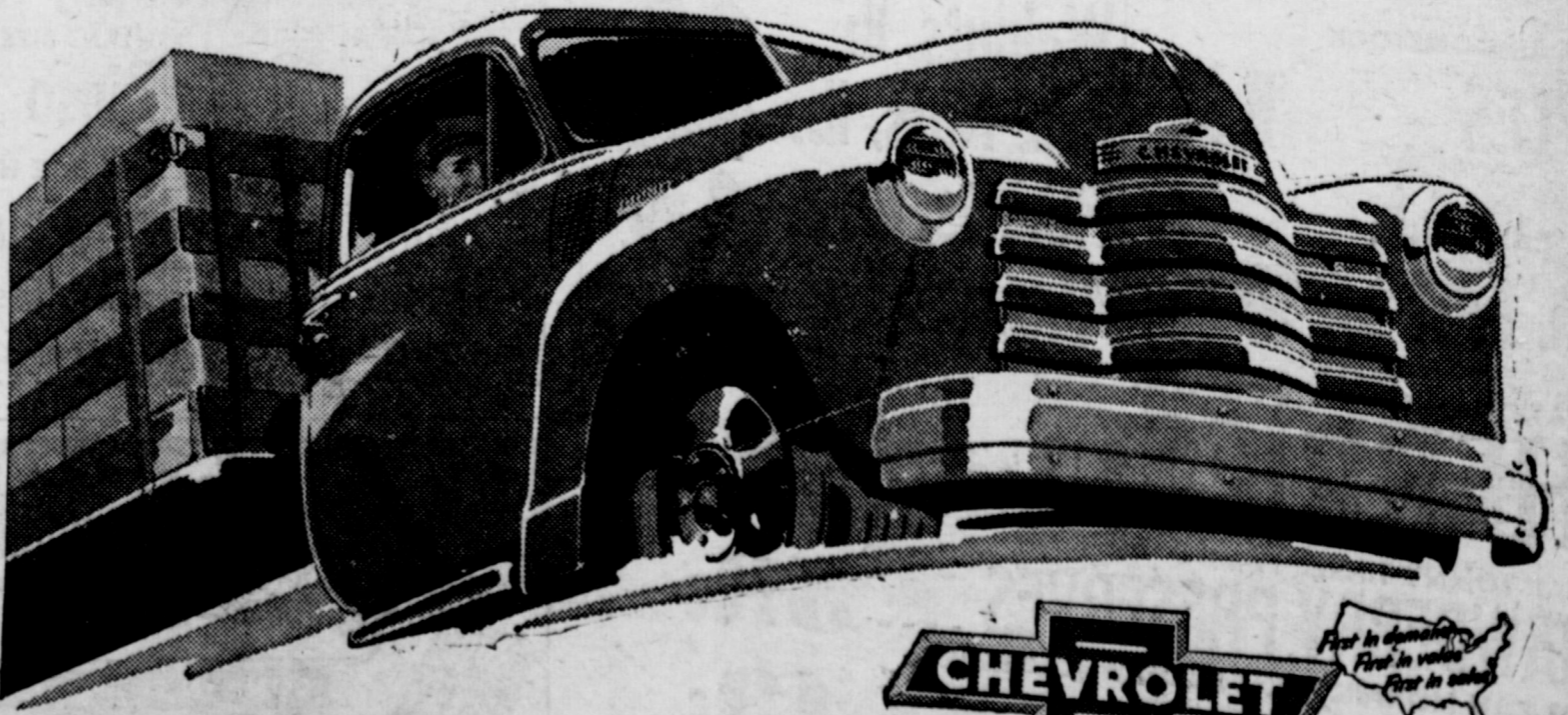


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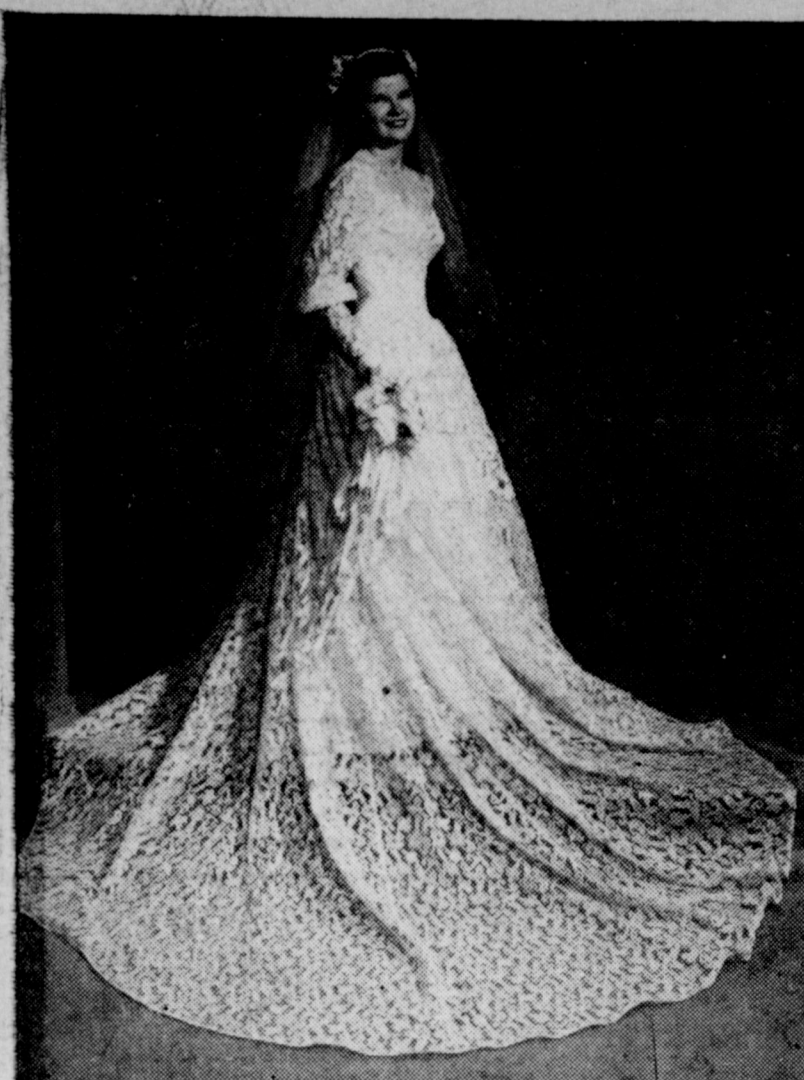
