C.R. Fuantoz easily won reelection with Bunger polling 240 votes and Fuantoz leading the ticket with 283. The other candidate, Cecil Buckner, received 146 votes.

Incumbents running unopposed for county school trustees were Bob Bissett in Precinct 2, 203 votes; Ted Lewis in Precinct 3, 206 votes and Marshall Montgomery, Precinct 4, 201 votes.

local option beer sales election Saturday has been brisk, indicating a great deal of voter interest. At 3:45 p.m. Tuesday, 156 voters had cast absentee ballots.

The central voting place will be the Civic Center. There will also be boxes at Powell Field and the WTU Power Plant. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Forces for both sides have been busy this week trying to get the vote out. The ballot is a scratch ballot and the voter must mark out the statement he/she is against.

A liquor election differs from most other elections and no ballots will be counted until the polls are closed, so results will come in later than usual. The election is for beer only for off-premises consumption, in

Absentee voting for the Crockett County Justice Precinct 1. Justice Precinct 1 differs from commissioners precincts and takes in all but the very southmost part of the county and the northeast corner of the county.

The forces to keep Ozona "dry" contend that beer sales is the forerunner of open bars, joints, etc. and a bad influence on the youth of the town, plus more beer cans littering the streets.

The "wets" claim beer sales will be good for business, the economy of the town and will create more

This will be the second election for alcohol sales this year. The first, held January 10, was for the sale of all alcoholic beverages for offpremises consumption. It failed by the narrow margin of 664 to 553.



Any retailer-hamburger stands, gas stations, drug and grocery stores-could sell beer if this proposition is approved.

Fact: The legal sale of beer only will not stop any bootlegging which may be done in Crockett County. The source of bootlegging is legal alcohol! The Internal Revenue Service estimates that seventy-five percent of the bootlegging in the United States is done in "wet" communities.

Fact: The legal sale of beer for off-premise consumption only will provide very little tax money for Crockett County. Since Ozona is not incorporated, there is no city sales tax; therefore, the only tax money that the county would receive is half of the ten dollar yearly state license fee for retailers. So, if a hundred retailers in Ozona secured a license to sell beer, the County would receive \$500.00 in tax revenue each year. The only monetary benefit that would come from the legal sale of beer in Crockett County would go to the distributors and the retailers who sell it. The "benefits" for the county would be increased law enforcement costs, increased court costs, and increased welfare costs.

The facts are obvious! The legal sale of beer for offpremise consumption only is simply: "Same song, second verse.'



Growing herbs is increasingly popular today among home gardeners. And if you have noticed all spices are going up in price each time you shop, so you may want to try growing some of the favorite and easy to grow herbs in your garden. Too, they make very satisfactory patio or indoor plants. You can buy small plants at most any nursery or plant seed. For growing, northup King Co. offers 18 varieties of seeds and suggests these for indoor growing-sweet marjoram, English thyme, summer savory and caraway. A combination of caraway, sweet basil and rosemary provided variety and decorative, delicate blossoms.

This means that the seeds should not be covered by soil, whether started indoors under lights or in a garden row. Make shallow furrows by pressing the edge of a thin board into moist soil or planting mixture. Sow the seeds to wash away the seeds or guilting. bury them under soil. 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
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

However, certain factors apparently contribute to this

longivity of life. Genetic influence relates to long life.

For instance: Offspring of long lived parents live longer than those whose parents die young. The first offspring of a union will tend to live longer than those born later. Children of parents who contract heart disease and some forms of cancer are more likely to contract these diseases themselves.

Another factor, physical activity, has produced a high level of physical fitness.

Excercise brings a lower heart rate, greater pumping capacity of the heart, lower blood pressure, greater lung capacity, more efficient fat metabolism, lower cholesterol levels and improvement in blood sugar levels.

Another factor in the search for long life is diet and nutrition.

"Among those very long lives people in remote areas, it was found that they consume between two-fifths and two-thirds of the average daily American caloric intake.

"Their diet consists of foods rich in protein and low

'The fat-rich American diet is associated with both obesity and heart disease.

"In contrast, low-fat diets are associated with a high level of fitness and low incidence of heart disease," Mrs. Blair states. Psychological and cultural







Taxpayers Can Extend the date of their filing dead-Deadline

Taxpayers can receive an automatic 2-month extension of their tax return filing deadline by filing a Form 4868, the Internal Revenue Service said. Form 4868, "Application

for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return," is available at local IRS offices or can be obtained by filling out the handy order blank for free forms and publications found in the tax package.

When requesting an extension, the taxpayer must make two copies of the Form 4868, filing the original with the IRS on or before the due date of the tax return. On this original, the taxpayer must estimate his or her tax bill for the year and enclose full payemnt for the tax liability.

When the taxpayer later files the actual tax return, the duplicate of Form 4868 must be attached and the amount of tax previously paid entered on the appropriate line of Form 1040 Taxpayers receiving an ex-Form 1040A or have the IRS compute their tax bill.

If a taxpayer underestimated the tax bill on Form 4868, he or she must pay interest on the unpaid amount. In addition, if the unpaid amount is over 10 al penalties on the taxpay-

Deadline extensions past the 2-month extension date are granted only under unusual circumstances, according to the IRS. Taxpayers can apply for a further extension by letter or by filling out Form 2688, "Application for Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return." The applicant must include the reasons why the additional extension is nec-

Requests for an additional extension should be filed early so that the taxpayer will be able to file the return on time should the request for extension be rejected.



Update Property Insurance

Property insurance needs an update to keep pace with inflation.

Most people have some form of insurance on their property, but few understand what their policies do and do not cover, Linda McCormack with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service explains.

Since a family's largest and most important investment is usually the home, they need to insure it against the most common risks.

The amount of property insurance depends on the value of the home and household goods. Some policies require that the dwelling be insured for at least 80 percent of the home's replacement value.

To determine the home's replacement cost, contact an insurance company and ask for a dwelling evaluation worksheet. In most instances, the homeowner can make the analysis and have a satisfactory estimate.

However, if the home was constructed before 1930, a professional appraisal may be needed.

If the insurance does not cover the replacement cost, the policy limits may need to be raised, or else, the homeowner must pay some of the replacement cost in event of a partial loss.

To keep pace with inflation, ask about the Inflation Guard Endorsement. which increases policy limits by a fixed percent-usually one or two percent quarterly--to assist in keeping coverage current with construction costs, the specialist con-

Also, personal possessions in the home may not be adequately covered. As a general rule, most household possessions are automatically insured for 40 to 50 percent of the coverage on the home.

As an extra safeguard, insure valuable possessions separately. These might include furs, special collections, paintings, silver, fine jewelry and certain musical instruments.
