Jr. High District track meet

The Junior High District track meet was held Friday, April 6, at Crane. This was the first year for both seventh and eighth grade boys and girls to compete in their own divisions.

In the eighth grade boys division, Ozona took first place wins in 5 of the 14 events plus 3 second place finishes. Frankie Reavis won the high jump at 5'4" and was second in the 70 yd. intermediate hurdles. Willie Payne won the 100 yd. dash (11.9) and the 220 yd. dash (25.8). Harvey Huereca won the shot put 46'7", the pole vault 9'6" and second in the high jump. Greg Fierro was second in the 220 low hurdles.

In the eighth grade girls division, Ozona had 4 first place and 2 second place finishes. Brenda Ledbetter placed first in the shot put at 29'6" and first in the discus at 91'9". Darla Lovall was first in the high jump at 4'7" and team members Becky Ybarra, Irma Ybarra, Jana Lilly and Darla ran a 1:59.4 in the 880 yd. relay.

In the seventh grade girls division, Ozona had 3 first places and 4 second place finishes. Lydia Maldonado was first in the long jump at 13'5" and first in the 220 yd. dash with a time of 31.5. The 880 yd. relay was first with a time of 2:02 run by team members Sherri Buckner, Lydia Maldonado, Rita De La Rosa, and Josie Rodriguez. Sherri Buckner was second in the 100 yd. dash at 13.9. The 440 and 1320 relays both placed second with times of 57.1 and 3:31, respectively.

The 440 yd. relay consisted of the same members as the 880 yd. relay. The 1320 yd. relay team was Katrina Burger, Ruth De La Rosa, Ninfa Cervantez and Kristal Williams.

The seventh grade boys division scored 125 points to tie with Sonora for the team title.

Vandalism case is solved here

One vandalism case was solved this week and progress made on another by Sheriff's Department personnel.

Two juveniles were picked up and admitted shooting out the plate glass windows at the Red Apple Drive In. Owner J.B. Miller refused to press charges if restitution was made by the boys' parents. The responsible parties will pay \$300 for clean-up and replacing the windows.

Officers have several leads in the tire slashing which took place at L-B Motor Co. a week ago Sunday. They expect results within the week. Damage was estimated at around \$5,000 when 20 new cars had tires ruined by slashing during the late hours Saturday or early Sunday morning.

OHS qualifies six for regional track

The Class 7-AA District Track Meet was held here Saturday at the recently completed Lion Stadium track and field event facilities. Although the Lions failed to win the meet, six boys and girls qualified for the regional meet which will be held in Lubbock the last part of this month.

Kaye Thompson placed first in the mile run setting a new district record with a time of 5:52.3. She broke her own record of 5:53 set last year. Wilda Martinez ran a 27.85 in the 200 meter dash to place second and qualify for regional. It was Miss Martinez' best time of the year also.

The Lions mile relay team placed second to qualify with a 3:33.1. Fred Garza qualified for regional, placing second in the 110 meter hurdles with a time of 15.4. Randy Ramos won the 400 meter dash with a time of 52.5 to qualify and John Rodriguez won the mile run with a time of 4:46.6. All three boys are on the mile relay team. Running the other leg will be Dan Martinez.

Sonora won district with 161 points, followed by Kermit with 121 and Ozona was third with 109. Crane came in last with 92 points. Kermit won the girls division, followed by Sonora, Crane and

Ozona.

Other Lionettes placing in the district meet were Delia De Hoyos, third, discus, 97'2"; Marilyn Moran, third, 800-meter run, 2:39; and Connie Badillo, third, mile, 6:29.7.

Other Lions placing and getting points for Ozona in the district meet were the 400 meter relay team of Aldo Delgado, Felix Flores, Kim Tambunga and Larry Payne, fourth. Adolph Martinez and Dan Martinez placed fifth and sixth in the 800 meter dash. Dan Sewell came in third behind Garza in the hurdles and placed third in the pole vault.

Fred Garza, Ernie Borrego and Ernest Badillo came in third, fourth and fifth in the 300 meter hurdles to gain some points. Juan Cedillo placed fourth in the mile run. Shane Fenton was sixth in the pole vault. Joe Rebelez placed fourth in both the shot and discus while Rocky Stephens placed sixth in the discus. Fred Garza placed third in the long jump and fourth in the high jump.

Boys who qualified for the regional meet will be in a practice meet at Mason April 21. They will be in Lubbock for regional April 27-28. Both first and second place finishers at Lubbock will qualify for the state meet which will be held in Austin May 11-12.

Incumbents returned in election

Two incumbent school board members were returned for three-year terms and the splitting of the sheriff's office and tax assessor-collector's office passed by an overwhelming majority in the two elections held Saturday in Crockett County.

Joe Bean led the candidates in the school board election with 236 votes, followed by Sam Perner with 233. Challenger Jack Bailey received 146 votes.

Voters agreed to separate the sheriff and tax assessor-collector offices by a vote of 251. Only 25 voters cast ballots against the split.

Court to try fire station bids again

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday and after lengthy discussion, decided to try again to get bids on the new fire station. The court put the construction out for bids last month and when they met to open bids March 29, not a single bid had been submitted. Bids will be opened on this second attempt May 14, and will be accepted up until 2:00 p.m. on that date.

Architect Atmar Atkinson met with the court and told them several persons took out the plans and he really expected to get at least six bids. He was told at least two builders who looked at the specs said they could not fit the plans into their standard metal building construction. Atkinson suggested the bidders get as near to his plans and specifications as possible within their standards and let the court decide on the desirability of the bids.

It seemed to be the general opinion of the court that costs were getting out of hand and had gone far beyond the \$175,000 allotted for the construction. Atkinson said he had received a good deal of input from members of the fire department and he just was not able to get it all into a construction of that price range. He estimated that the lowest possible cost would be around \$216,000 and would probably run more. He added, however, there would be no way to estimate the cost until some bids come in.

Judge Jones said the court was not in a mood to accept a \$216,000 bid and suggested something be cut from the original plans. Atkinson suggested the court get the bids and then negotiate with the builder to cut down to a cost which would be affordable. He said redrawing the plans to cut down would cost more in the long run.

Some concern was voiced about the 4-foot fill taking up time and money. Again the architect said he had gotten the fill figures from a member of the fire department and said he much preferred less fill, as it made for a more solid building. The fill was changed from the original 4-feet to from 24 to 30 inches.

The full court agreed to accept new bids until 2 p.m. May 14, take two weeks to negotiate and award the

contract Monday, May 28, at 2 p.m. They authorized Pat McMillan, who was also present, to issue the certificates of obligation in the amount of \$100,000, after he explained the certificates would not be printed until the contract was awarded.

Von Parker gave the road report and asked permission to begin work on 1.8 miles of the Hoover Divide Road in Precinct 4. Commissioner Castro gave permission. Parker also asked commissioners to decide where they wanted the three miles of paving allowed in each precinct in order he could make plans for the summer paving work. The problem of streets holding water all over town was discussed and Parker said the only solution would be to redesign all streets and the cost would be in the neighborhood of \$1 million. There was no further discussion.

Judge Jones said after the water bill at the cemetery was almost \$1,000 last month, he had asked Dudley McCary to begin overseeing operations there. McCary suggested hiring a man to supervise the cemetery seven days a week. In the afternoon meeting of the Cemetery Association, the suggestion was well received and someone will be hired in the near future. Also, it was agreed the cemetery gates would be unlocked every morning at 8 o'clock and locked each night by dark. The water will also be cut off when the gates are locked.

Jim Hearne appeared on behalf of the airport and reported rapid deterioration of pavement in the runway and parking areas at the

airport. He was assured the work had been included in the road department schedule and would commence as soon as possible. The runways and pads will be resurfaced and a turn-around built for larger planes. The airport will, of course, be closed while the work is going on.

Jimmy Thompson accompanied Hearne to the meeting and the court held another discussion about moving the television tower. Thompson is going to assist Judge Jones in the effort.

Following a lunch break, the court reconvened and discussed the problem of hospitalization insurance and the paper work created by the rapid turnover of county employees. The court voted to wait until an employee has worked for a period of 90 days before insuring him. They also decided the county would absorb the extra premium for maternity benefits for women as well as men.

In other business the court voted to raise all jurors pay from the present \$5 per day to \$10 per day, effective immediately. They transferred \$65,000 to the hospital fund and \$25,000 to the care center fund.

Saturday's elections were canvassed and Tommy Stokes was appointed tax assessor-collector. He was sworn in by Judge Jones. The canvass of the school board election saw the court certify the incumbents as winners, Joe Bean and Sam Perner.

A letter from District Attorney Dixon Mahon was read concerning county attorney fees. Time was running short and no action was taken on the matter before adjournment.

County responsible for draw conditions

County officials have asked that residents be notified the county is entirely responsible for the keeping of Johnson draw, and they may take action on behalf of the Soil Conservation District.

The easement held by the county states specifically that there will be no dumping of trash or refuse of any kind,

nor is anyone allowed to remove dirt from the draw.

The county is committed to keeping the channel from becoming an eyesore and is presently taking steps to have these practices stopped. They will appreciate assistance from residents in this endeavor.

Investment objectivity a must

Before you embark upon an investment campaign, develop a written statement of objectives, advises Dr. Richard Floyd, real estate economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Investment objectives vary among individuals, so your list should reflect your particular goals. The amount of time you have to achieve goals should also be considered," Floyd advises.

"A general feeling of wanting to get rich is not sufficient to provide a foundation upon which to develop an investment strategy," emphasizes the economist. A statement of objectives should include desired rate of return on the investment, risk, willingness to borrow, desire for liquidity, tax shelter and inflation protection. Transaction costs, including holding expenses and management fees, and personal satisfaction desired from ownership should also be examined, says Floyd.

"Once you've established your investment objectives, compare them to actual performance of various investments," suggests the economist. "This allows you to determine which investments are best suited to meet your needs.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—What consumers pay for a gallon of gasoline will be going up again. Soon.

In the near future, what it costs to fill up your car or truck will definitely jump four cents a gallon. But don't blame the politicians. That price increase is the work of major world petroleum producers, such as Iran and Saudi Arabia, that announced this week an 18 percent jump in what they charge for a barrel of oil.

Down the road even further, another five cents will probably be added to the price we pay for a gallon of gas. This time you can blame the politicians.

That extra nickel we'll be paying at the gas pump will come as the direct result of lifting price controls on what domestic producers of oil get for their product. President Carter appears to be on the verge of making such a move. After June, he will have the power, given to him by the 1978 federal decontrol act, to do so.

Most oil industry executives in Texas and elsewhere have called long and hard for abolishing regulation of domestic oil prices. Gov. Bill Clements wants "immediate decontrol."

The Texas Energy Advisory Council, the state's main source of official advice when it comes to energy, passed a resolution almost two months ago calling on the federal government to lift price controls.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker of the House Bill Clayton are members of the council.

The hope is that doing away with price controls would mean a surge in domestic oil production. Everyone agrees that prices will go up, but maybe, just maybe, it will put a dent in this country's reliance on foreign oil.

Windfall Profits?

With the announcement this week that foreign oil would be costing more in the future, the cry for decontrol was renewed. The only thing that appears to stand between Carter and the gradual lifting of price controls is the decision on whether a tax on predicted windfall profits should accompany deregulation.

Dr. Milton Holloway, executive director of the Texas Energy Advisory Council, encouraged the president to move ahead with plans to deregulate oil production.

As it stands now, almost half the oil produced in this country is subject to federal price controls. That oil—which makes up one-fourth of U.S. consumption—sells now for less than half of what it would bring on the world market. That price today, after the most recent increases, is just over \$15 a barrel. The controlled-price in the U.S. is \$5.25 a barrel. Oddly enough, what politicians and energy experts alike hope will happen when

price controls are abolished, appears to be underway, at least, in part.

Last month, the U.S. trade deficit was the lowest it has been in 21 months. The drop in money pouring overseas appeared to be effected heavily by the sharp decline in U.S. oil imports.

The 21-month low deficit almost meant the dollar would be getting back some of the punch it has lost in the last two years while this country grew more and more dependent on foreign oil.

In The House

With the 66th session more than half over, the House of Representatives appeared to be trying to make up for lost time this week as members tentatively approved a wide variety of bills that would aid an even wider variety of people.

Quickly, the House approved a measure requiring health insurance plans to cover chiropractors' costs, gave its okay to a "cancer registry" so that trends of the disease can be studied, said yes to a bill that would give the state the authority to guarantee loans for family farmers and ranchers and voted to restore the voting rights of convicted felons not on probation or parole.

The House also took on the sticky issue of initiative and referendum and came out doing about what the Senate had done up to that point—nothing.

Q: I filed on my ex-husband a year ago for back child support. He learned of the order and skipped town. Even now the papers haven't been served because the law can't locate him. Can you tell me what can be done to have him located?

A: In Texas there are two agencies that will search for your ex-husband. If there is a domestic relations office in your county, this office will often have an investigator who can search for the missing individual.

The Texas Dept. of Human Resources also provides child support enforcement services for a nominal fee. If such an individual goes into hiding the local child support unit can draw on statewide as well as local and occasionally national resources to try to locate the delinquent spouse and have the warrant executed for his arrest.

Q: I live in a condominium in the county. My neighbor has fenced in property beyond his boundary. My air conditioning unit is inside his fence and he has all sorts of building materials stacked up against it. He won't allow anyone inside the fence. Would I be breaking the law if I knocked down part of the fence, making an entrance to my air conditioning unit so I can clean

around it and have it serviced?
A: If your neighbor has fenced in your property or the property of the condominium developer, you or the developer should take steps to make the neighbor move the fence or buy the right to use the enclosed property. If that is not done, after 10 years the neighbor may come to own the enclosed property by what is known as "adverse possession." But you should not knock down the fence. To do so would make you liable to your neighbor for damage to the fence, and perhaps be a violation of criminal law as well.

Q: If a car pulls in front of me to switch lanes and I'm unable to avoid hitting the car from behind, who is at fault? After an accident, is it necessary to leave the cars where they stopped? What can you do if the police report on an accident is incorrect?

A: State law requires that any change of traffic lanes must be accompanied by a signal and must be done safely. After an accident, the cars involved should be moved out of traffic to avoid creating a hazard. A copy of the official accident report may be obtained from the Department of Public Safety in Austin for a fee of \$2; both drivers also may file reports.

Dr. David B. Mellor, poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says it's easy to see how the egg came to be a traditional Easter symbol. "The egg has long been a symbol of renewed life, especially in the pre-Christian spring festivals. In some faiths, it even symbolizes the beginning of the world.

"According to American folklore, Easter eggs really come to us from the Easter bunny. This tradition supposedly comes from Germany and France," Mellor explains. "Some French children still believe the rabbit runs to Rome to get eggs from the Pope."

Even though our custom of decorating and giving eggs at Easter is a symbol of resurrection, this custom actually started in China about 750 B.C., points out Mellor.

The specialist believes one of the most unusual eggs is the pysanka--a Ukrainian Easter egg. The highly decorated egg is developed with stylus, beeswax, dyes, artistic ability, and a lot of patience.

"But no matter how you decorate your eggs, be sure to use pure food dyes and to prepare them properly so they are safe to eat," Mellor cautions. He offers these suggestions, taken from a leaflet, "About Eggs...Cooking in the Shell," available at any county Extension office.

First, age eggs at room temperature for 24 hours before cooking to simplify peeling. Place eggs with small ends down during this per-

iod.

Prior to cooking, put eggs in a pan of warm water. This helps prevent cracked shells when eggs are placed in hot water.

Bring water to a rapid boil, using enough water to come one inch above eggs. Transfer eggs to boiling water with a spoon. Reduce heat to keep water just below simmering. Hold for 18 minutes.

Cool eggs promptly and

thoroughly in cold water.

This makes the shells easier to remove and helps prevent dark surfaces on yolks.

Be sure to use only clean, sound eggs--Grades Fresh Fancy, AA or A--for cooking in the shell," advises Mellor.

"To prevent gray-green discoloration of egg yolks, avoid overcooking. Immediate plunging into cold water also helps prevent yolk discoloration."

Soot and smoke stain removal

Soot and smoke create special removal problems--especially from synthetics, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Soot or smoke damage is usually the result of a fire either from a fire damage sale or from a fire in the home.

When trying to remove these stains, take the article to a dry cleaner first.

The more different treatments used at home first, the harder it will be to remove the stain, the specialist cautions.

In fact, tumble drying would probably set the stain permanently.

Explain the stain or discoloration to the cleaner. They can remove the greasy component easily.

If discoloration remains in the fabric, it can be bleached with sodium proborate especially in white fabrics, she adds.

Solve condensation problems

Homeowners can help solve paint problems caused by cold weather condensation, says Sue Young.

Paint the ceilings and the interior surfaces of the outside walls to increase the resistance to vapor penetra-

tion. Aluminum paint serves this purpose well. It protects against vapor and can be painted over with decorative

paints. In remodeling and including new paneling, a polyethylene film placed over the surfaces to be covered will be more effective than the aluminum paint.



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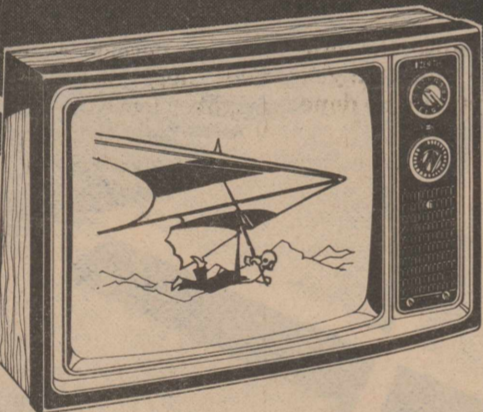
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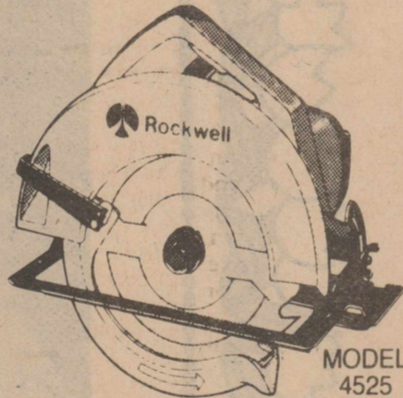
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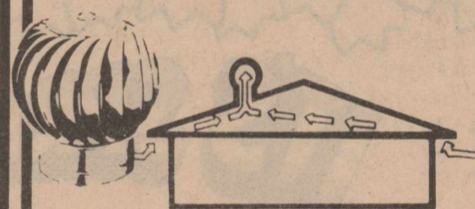
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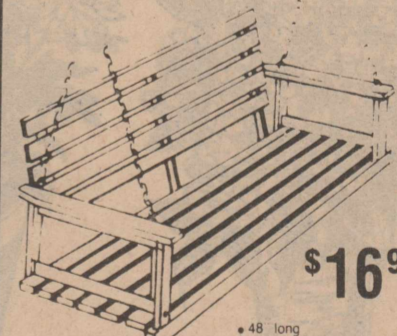
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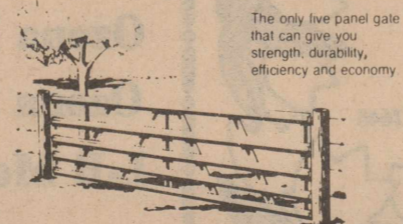

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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Though Easter is near and we haven't had a killing frost, we are keeping our fingers crossed. It has been several years since our garden club had a fine display of iris, roses and peonies in bloom at the same time for the April 24 Flower Show.

Don't forget to be grooming, watching for insects and protecting all plants from harsh weather if needed. Anyone who wishes may enter specimen of flowers or potted plants if grown by exhibitor and variety named.

Iris are beginning to bloom, so it's a good time to select the varieties you would like to plant in your garden. Though iris has an exotic look, they are easy to grow and require little care and will tolerate neglect. These characteristics ensures the popularity of iris in our Southern gardens.

In our area the bearded is the best known type and most dependable perennial. These require well-drained soil that is rich in organic matter, especially cow manure. They perform best in full sun in most of the south.

Spring and fall are good planting time for iris. The planting area should be well prepared by working manure and bonemeal into the soil. Dig a hole about 12 inches deep for each rhizome; then mound soil in the bottom of the hole, and firm it. Set the rhizome on the mound, being sure the fan of leaves is above ground; then firm back fill soil around each plant. In a massed planting, space rhizomes 8 to 14 inches apart, depending on how soon you want them to form a dense mass. But the closer you space them, the sooner you will need to dig up crowded clumps and divide them.

During the growing season, fertilize iris monthly with a low-nitrogen complete fertilizer, such as 5-10-10 at the rate of 1/2 cup per sq. yard of area.

Debra Says

Badly stained tile--especially in showers--presents a cleaning problem. Often, there's a rough, white build-up on them, a brownish soil along the grout lines and a dark, varnish-like stain in the center of the shower base. Actually, the blame falls to three different culprits--so, three different cleaning methods are needed. Avoid using abrasive cleansers--they harm the ceramic glaze. Just follow these three treatments:

These are hard water salts left when water evaporates. The same thing happens in a tea kettle. Use a commercial tile cleaner weekly to dissolve the scale, and then wipe it clean.

Brownish soil on grout lines is mildew. Scouring and scrubbing will work, but the mildew will grow back. Spray an ordinary household spray disinfectant on the dry tile, and let it stand overnight. In the morning, sponge the mildew off. The mildew should not return if this treatment is repeated monthly.

Varnish-like stain on shower base is a build-up of body oils and soap scum which most cleaners will not remove from ceramic tile. Remove the stain with liquid laundry detergent. Pour it on the stain full strength and let it stay for a few hours or overnight. Then, sponge or scrub, and rinse with plenty of water.

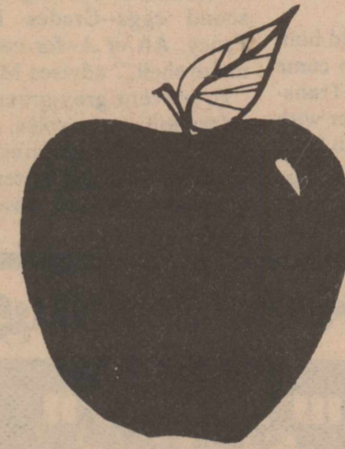

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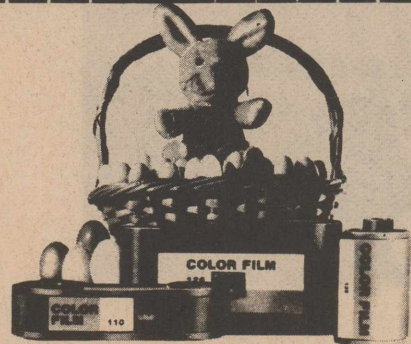

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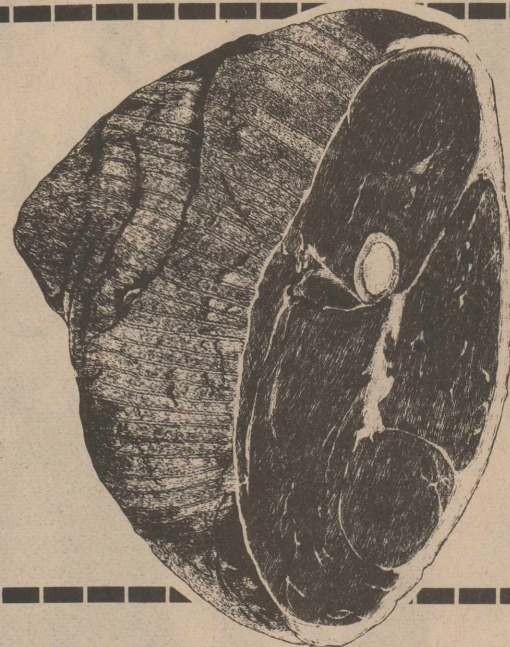

Ham is longtime Easter favorite

Baked ham, juicy and flavorful, makes a big hit anytime of the season, says Marilyn Harrard, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Therefore, appearance, inspection marks and the number of people to be served are pertinent in the ham selection:

Look for the inspection marks that indicate that the meat was inspected and passed by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Choose hams with a higher proportion of lean to fat and bone.

Fresh hams should have a grayish-pink or red color-cured hams, a deep pink color.

Size—allow one-half pound per person for bone-in hams.

Ham, as well as other pork products, are high in nutritive value and can ease into any calorie-conscious diet. It is rich in protein and thiamine (B 1), as well as the other B-vitamins and iron, too, the specialist continues.

Calorie-wise, a three-ounce serving of cured ham, fat trimmed off, contains about 160 calories.

Preparation-wise, hams are best when roasted in an open, shallow pan with no water added.

Some tips on cooking ham are:

It is easier to remove the rind from the ham when it is hot.

Follow cooking directions on the wrapper or container when available.

A shallow pan is better than a deep one for roasting.

A rack under the ham holds meat up from drippings and allows heat circulation.

A meat thermometer is the best guide to the doneness of ham.

For easier slicing, allow 15 to 20 minutes after removing it from the oven.

To eliminate the fuss of carving the ham at the last minute or even at the table, here is a recipe that calls for slicing the ham before putting it in the oven.

Baked Stuffed Ham
1 2½-pound canned ham
½ cup chopped onion
½ cup chopped celery
2¼ cups fresh bread cubes (¼-inch)
½ cup chicken broth

1 tablespoon minced fresh parsley
1 egg
Cut ham into 10 slices (3/8-inch thick), and place on foil-lined jelly roll pan.
Saute onion and celery in melted butter in skillet until tender.

Combine bread cubes, broth, egg, parsley and sauteed vegetables in large bowl. Mix lightly but well.

Arrange stuffing between slices, leaving two slices between stuffing layers. Tie securely with string. Cover loosely with foil.

Bake at 350 degrees F. for one hour. Remove foil and continue baking one more hour or until stuffing registers 165 degrees F. on meat thermometer.

Remove from oven. Let stand 10 minutes. Makes six servings.

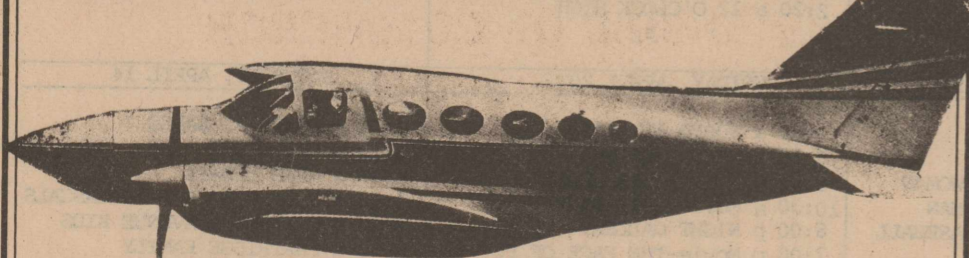

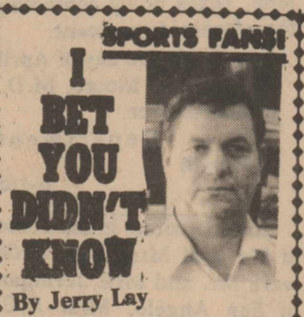

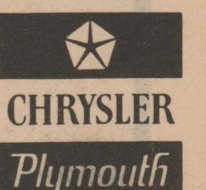

Pursuant to this Department's "Drinking Water Standards" and Section 1415 and Section 1416 of Public Law 93-523 (USC), the Texas Department of Health is proposing to issue a variance for the fluoride at the following level 2.5 mg/l. A summary of the proposed variance follows:

1. No treatment technique for the removal of fluoride is economically feasible.
2. A water source meeting the fluoride MCL is not available at this time.
3. The Crockett County WCID - Crockett Heights will continue investigating alternate sources of water.

The Division of Water Hygiene will hold a public hearing on the variance for the Crockett County WCID - Crockett Heights if a valid request for a hearing is received by May 13, 1979. A valid request may concern the following:

The variance results in unreasonable risk to the public health.

Hospital Board discusses losses and increases

The Crockett County Hospital Board met in regular monthly session Thursday evening at the hospital. Three board members were present, Gary Vannoy, Chester Wilson and Bekie Diaz, along with Dr. R.M. Owensby, Mrs. Don Carlisle, Dub O'Bryant and Harold Taylor, hospital administrator.

Financial information for March was presented. Hospital loss for March was \$16,217.63 and care center loss was \$3,617.88. Both figures were down from that of the previous month.

A meeting between county officials and hospital staff to discuss cutting down losses was brought up. County Judge Johnny Jones and County Auditor Dick Kirby met with the administrator and medical staff early in March to attempt a solution to the problem.

It was decided the areas needing the greatest attention are pricing policies. Drug charges have not been updated in 18 months and other charges such as lab, x-ray, rooms and supplies also need to be increased. The hospital does not have to

submit drug cost increases to Medicare/Blue Cross for approval, but must submit other charges.

Room rates have been increased from \$50 for a semi-private to \$55 per day and private from \$55 to \$60 per day.

The board voted to eliminate employee laundry services which have been offered to some employees in the past instead of providing the service for all employees. It also recommended all free meals be eliminated for licensed personnel.

A letter of resignation from Sue Arledge was read and accepted.

A report from the open hearing held in the care center in March was read. The facility received only compliments and no complaints, which is unusual for a nursing home, according to Harold Taylor.

The meeting was adjourned after some discussion on proposed rate increases in laboratory and radiology fees.

The Ozona Tennis teams traveled to Sonora April 6 and 7 for the District Tennis Meet.

The senior division saw Gary Smith and Lupe Gonzales take a third place in boys doubles by posting two wins over Sonora teams. Lori

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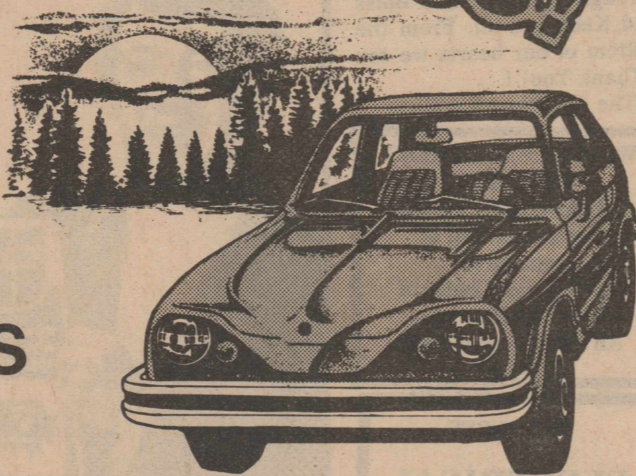
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
