According to the Texas Attorney General's office, there is no state statute prohibiting the publishing of juvenile names by the press, however, most Texas newspapers do not publish the names of juvenile offenders as a matter of policy. Several states, having such laws, are repealing or changing them. Last year the West Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals ruled that a state statute prohibiting the use of juvenile names in newspaper crime stories was unconstitutional. A new bill introduced in the Georgia legislature would permit the news media to publish the names and pictures of first-time juvenile offenders unless specifically prohibited by court order. And in Cleveland, Ohio, a newspaper publishes the names of juvenile offenders in felony and misdemeanor cases. Juvenile authorities there say it's a deterrent to juvenile crime.

With juvenile crime on the rise, especially in rural areas, publishers of small newspapers must give ser-ious consideration to chang-ing policies. The public's right to know must eventual-ly take precedence over the protection of the identy of the minor, especially if he has committed a prior offense. 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Sen. Tower on Energy

Approval by the Senate today of the President's standby gasoline rationing plan is, "Just another step in the capitulation to a condition we need not endure," and "another instance where neither the Administration nor the Congress has shown any initiative toward solving the problem," according to Senator John Tower (R-Tex).

"It appears that the Administration has concluded that the best way to win acceptance of its position on energy is to continue to create the conditions which will assure a shortage of that energy," Tower added. "First we tried to deal with an ineffectual National Energy Plan. Then, after long delay, a reluctant decision to decontrol domestic crude oil prices, but with the hooker of a 'windfall profits' tax to degrade the benefits; and now, a 'standby' rationing plan which, in all likelihood, is the precursor of its implementation. We have yet to see anything from the White House which indicates any willingness to examine ways to increase production as a means of solving the problem."

Tower said that the Department of Energy estimates the direct program costs of gasoline rationing would amount to tee named this week to settle over \$3 billion a year, including over \$1 billion of oil industry costs, most of which would be passed on to the consumer. In addition, the estimate of federal personnel required to administer the plan runs as high as 15,000.

"We already have a Department of Energy which employs over 20,000 at an annual cost to the taxpayers of more than \$10 billion. Now we are being asked to accept these added prospective costs, with still no plan to drill one single additional well. The industry could go a long way to solving our energy problem with \$13 billion a year," Tower stated.

Tower said the best solution to the gasoline shortage, \$20.3 billion. House plan would spend aside from steps to increase supplies in the long term, is to let the individual states like Texas and California come un with their own plans which would meet their own requirements. "Although the President's plan is based on so-called 'historic' usage of gasoline, we still don't know how much will be available to each state after priority requirements are met. That should be left to local decision, not federal bureaucratic interference."



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

Tips For Gardeners From the **Ozona Garden Club** by Mrs. Bailey Post

Late spring is a good time to divide and reset crowded clumps of cannas. This will ehlp avoid poor flower production and the foliage wilting rapidly in the summer heat. Reset plants at least 12 inches apart in reworked soil, and spread a mulch around the base of the plants. Water thoroughly.

Maintaining a beautiful lawn in Texas can be troublesome, especially during drought-prone summers. Nothing can guarantee a problem-free lawn, but your chances of success, will be helped if you keep a few basic rules in mind, particularly when mowing.

The first rule is to mow frequently, once a week for most lawns, so that you never remove too great a portion of the leaves at any one time. When you let the lawn go for two weeks and then mow at the regular height, you are probably removing up to half of the grass blade when you cut. Such a radical pruning weakens the grass, particularly during hot, dry weather. If this has happened, raise the mower blade to its highest level. When you do mow. Then now again within 4 or 5 days, lowering the blade a notch. In another 4 or 5 days, mow again, lowering the blade a notch. Repeat the gradual lowering until the grass is back to the desired height. During the warmest months, raise the height of the mower blade to allow the grass to grow higher. 

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association has long urged stronger control measures for coyotes and other predatory animals. Such studies simply reinforce the need for control. TS&GRA hopes the powers that be will eventually recognize the importance of that need and act accordingly instead of persistently working at cross purposes with the realities of food and fiber production.

Spacing is another important factor reducing yields of Norgolds. Many varieties respond to higher density plantings by increased total yield but reduced yield of 8to 14-ounce grade.

This has not been the case for Norgold russet and spacings of 7 to 8 inches have resulted in higher yield of 8to 14-ounce grade, as well as total yield increases.

Two important problems in sweet potato production are extreme variability in root production and shape of roots at harvest.

Research by Dr. Don Paterson with the Experiment Station at Overton is aimed at discovering the means to improve both yield and shape of sweet potatoes.

In experiments to determine the feasibility of breeding for sweet potato weevil resistance, about 75 breeding lines have been rated each year for the past 5 years for crown and root weevil infestation at Yoakum, Tex-

Indications are that there is a 5-fold difference in weevil infestation between lines being tested.

Exposure of the root system of Red LaSoda potato plants to an 80% carbon dioxide and 20% oxygen atmosphere for 12 hours resulted in increased tuber formation.


Treatment of potato seed pieces in a similar atmosphere of carbon dioxide and oxygen resulted in an increase in sprout growth and tuber yield. This leads us to believe that such treatment of seed can increase both stand and yield in the field.

"We believe that research can give us the answers that producers need to greatly increase production of root and tuber crops that are so widely nonular '




