His visits to the Soviet Union and ties to Cuba, seem more than sheer coincidence.

One thing is certain, the day has arrived when U.S. presidents and aspirants to that position must resist the urge to "plunge into the crowd" as it were. When a killer is allowed to get within 10 feet of the president, there is a serious security breach and there are some freedoms which should be denied. The freedom to shoot at public officials is one of them.

'HAPPY GROWTH DAY'

There's no three-day weekend to commemorate National "Growth Day," and you can't buy "Happy Growth Day" cards to send to your friends and relatives. But that doesn't mean "Growth Day" isn't very, very important. "Growth Day" - April 15 - was inaugurated in 1980 by a grass-roots coalition of academics and public-interest groups, to celebrate the accomplishments of the American free-enterprise system. The founding members of the National Coalition for Growth --- of which I am one -- believed that both the government and the media needed to be reminded that more people had found freedom and economic opportunity under our system than in any other place or time in history.



There are a lot of flaws in the arguments of the "limits to growth'' zealots, but let me mention the two biggest. First, when they argue that we're out of resources, they are engaging in "static analysis." That is, they are assuming that we won't develop new technologies, new energy sources, and new methods of food production, that are undreamed of today. To argue as they do is to ignore history, especially recent history; because while there may be limits to, say, our oil supplies, there are no limits to human ingenuity. It's much more likely that our scientists and inventors will continue to grapple with and solve the problems of resources and energy than that they won't.

The second crack in the "limits to growth" philosophy is that it ignores human nature. Redistribution works well only in very special circumstances - in a besieged city, for Legislature to prepare to cut example, or in a religious order. The ordinary human being has to feel he's working toward a brighter future, for himself and for his children. George Gilder argues in his brilliant best-seller, Wealth and Poverty, that capitalism itself is founded on altruism: men work to support their loved ones. They also work because they hope tomorrow will be better. To slap limits on growth, to throw up barriers to opportunity, is to drown that hope.

"Growth Day" celebrates the fact that in America there is still something to look forward to. But that brighter tomorrow is in danger of being snowed under by government restrictions on expansion and opportunity. The new administration seems to be trying to get us back on the right track with growth-oriented policies: government spending night to cut the budget and reductions, tax cuts, deregulation.

If it follows through, the freedom and opportunity those into the limelight," said one. policies will provide to all Americans will be an accomplishment worthy of celebration.

By focusing our attention on the future on April 15, perhaps we can deaden the pain many of us will feel when we write our checks to the Internal Revenue Service to pay for the mistakes of the past.







Extra Cash Means Extra Taxes: **Tax Estimates Eliminate Surprises**

As with all good things, extra money has its price. The price is extra income tax, and the trick to paying extra taxes is to stay a jump ahead of them. If you don't, you may find that April holds a very unpleasant surprise for you in the form of an overwhelming income tax bill

Wage earners who earn extra cash by taking a second job for regular wages usually can count on the tax withholding system to cover most of the additional income tax they'll owe. Some people, however, may find themselves in a higher tax bracket. They might want to increase their tax withholdings by giving either or both of their employers a revised Form W-4, Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate.

Millions of individuals, on the other hand, earn extra cash that is not subject to the convenience of our pay-asyou-go tax withholding system. These people need a different way to help themselves avoid surprises at tax time, and that way is to Estimate Taxes. Americans extra cash by selling plasticware, cosmetics, health care products, encyclopedias, and household products. Off-duty firemen often moonlight by doing handywork. Teachers might paint houses during the summer. Journalists free-lance. This list is endless, and the extra income is fully taxable, but not subject to tax withholding. These people, and others

like them (self-employed individuals, for example) who have gross income of more than \$500 from which no tax is withheld, are often unaware, sometimes painfully so, about their obligations to pay estimated taxes.

What are estimated taxes and who pays them? Estimated taxes, just as the name implies, are taxes based on what you expect your tax liability to be by the end of the year. You might think of them as a sort of selfimposed withholding system because you calculate the amount yourself, and pay in quarterly installments. The installment payments are necessary because the law requires that all income tax payments be made on a pay-as-you-go basis rather than in an annual lump sum. ble to decay than other fence parts because of direct contact with the soil," Stayton says. "Use either metal posts or wood posts that have been pressure treated with a preservative.'

horizontal Normally, stringers are fastened to posts to provide a surface for attaching vertical fence boards, notes the specialist. Leave a space of one-eighth to one-fourth inch where ends of stringers meet to permit air circulation. This reduces water collection between ends of stringers, thus reducing the chance of decay. Wood used for stringers should be naturally decay-resistant heartwood or be pressure treated with a preservative.

'Vertical boards fastened to stringers should not touch the ground," Stayton warns. "This is the most serious mistake made. Ends of boards take moisture from the ground and can decay or be attacked by termites in a short time. Use either naturally resistant heartwood or pressure treated wood and

Errors delay refunds

Many of the errors that delay tax return processing, slow refund checks, and inconvenience taxpayers are avoidable, the Internal Revenue Service said.

In 1980, 7.1% of all Form 1040's and 6.2% of all Form 1040A's contained at least one taxpayer math error of some type. Errors ranged from incorrect addition and subtraction to failure to compute the Earned Income Credit when eligible.

error on both forms last year was incorrectly reporting the tax from the tax table. Problems resulted from taxpayers using the wrong tax table for their filing status, following the line for the wrong income level, and looking under the incorrect column for number of exemptions for that taxpayer.

Other common errors on tax returns are not using the peel-off label and instead writing incorrect or illegible social security numbers, only one signature on a joint return, failure to attach W-2's, "Wage and Tax Statements," and failure to attach supporting forms and schedules
