

I can remember going almost an entire football season without having a front page story about the Lions, this was one of their few losing seasons.



Maybe it's just a sign of the times and maybe it will come full circle and we will once again be bringing up scholars who don't know one end of the football from the other.

I don't think we can look for this in the near future, however. Parents are too sports-oriented, especially fathers. When parents unite and demand more learning and less sports, we might see a change in the trend.

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

The report "urges that Congress consider placing Americans working abroad on an income tax basis comparable to that of citizens of competitor countries."

Ben Jarratt Brown, an expert at the U.S. & Overseas Tax Fairness Committee, said that the GAO findings come as no real surprise. "They confirm what we've been saying for four years and what many earlier privately and publicly funded studies have consistently shown."

Estimates from several sources, including a Treasury Department study, indicate that a 10 percent reduction in American presence abroad produces a five percent loss in exports. According to the Chase Econometrics model of the through the week, as legisdomestic economy, that leads to a loss to the U.S. Treasury alone of approximately \$6 billion in tax revenues on corporate profits.

"The GAO estimates losses in American overseas employment well in excess of 10 percent," Brown points out. Using similar data, a study by the Georgetown Center for Strategic and International Studies found that the resulting job loss in the domestic economy could rapidly exceed one million jobs.

"In light of the billions of dollars it's costing our economy to collect that \$500 million, it is ridiculous to assign any revenue gain to the current tax practice or any revenue loss to a reversal of that practice," Brown argues. "The current practice is robbing the Treasury of at least \$6 billion in potential revenues right now — and will rob it of much more later."

"The fact is that it takes Americans overseas to sell American," Brown says. "And you can't sell American if you force Americans out of the marketplace."

Senator John Danforth (R-Missouri), Chairman of the Senate Trade Subcommittee, says Congress must act soon to reverse the situation.

With trade deficits amounting to \$150 billion since 1976, it's time for trade to become a component of, rather than remain what Senator Danforth calls "the stepchild of

Modest changes in the so-called Foreign Earned Income Act — changes eliminating or substantially reducing the tax bite on U.S. citizens working abroad — would appear to be a fully justified step in the right direction.

Since most host countries already tax these "expatriate" U.S. workers, it seems foolish to punish them, their employers and the economy with the present system of double-taxation.



TEXAS HOUSE SALES DROP DURING WINTER

Sales of existing homes in Texas dropped 15 percent during the first three months of 1980 over previous years, a study conducted by the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University has revealed.

After monitoring housing sales for seven years, Dr. Arthur Wright, research economist, concludes that the coldest months of the year

are a buyer's market. "People are reluctant to move during this period, and since many families are tied to an area during the school year, the greatest amount of activity occurs during the summer recess," he said.



O: I understand a new law will take effect that states that a person's children cannot inherit property that was owned by their parents should the parents die. with or without a will. Can this really be true? I can't believe my husband and I can't leave our

property to our children! A: There is no such law. In Texas you may leave your property to any person you wish. Your estate includes all the property you own as an individual and, if you are married, one-half of all the property which you and your spouse own together as community property. If you die without a will, the law says that you have died "intestate" and your property will be distributed according to a formula set out by statute. You can avoid disposition by this formula only by having a valid will. Q: My will was made in New

York State where I lived for a good many years. I am a widow, 73 years of age, and have recently moved to Texas. Do I have to have another will drawn or is my will legal in the State of Texas? A: A Texas attorney should review your will to determine whether it meets the requirements of this state and to discuss whether it will dispose of your property to your satisfaction.

These items are not considered income, and you owe no Federal Income Tax on them. However, if you receive any money as interest or income from an estate or a trust, you will probably receive notice of such

income, and you must report it

as taxable income in the year re-

O: I couldn't avoid hitting s deer that dashed in front of my car on the highway. I stopped and, after determining the animal was dead I moved it to the side of the road and left it. Was that the proper thing to do or should I have notified someone?

A: You should immediately notify the game warden of the county where you hit the deer. He will retrieve the dead animal. Under no circumstances can you keep the deer. There is no open season for animals hit on public

Q: What can I do to have my maiden name removed from my Texas driver's license? It causes nothing but confusion. If it is possible to do this, what steps should I take? A: Texas law requires that

holders of driver's licenses notify the Texas Department of Public Safety, Drivers License Division when the name of the licensee changes because of marriage. The proper procedure is to apply for a duplicate license, with satisfactory evidence of the name change, along with the payment of \$1. Texas law further requires that this procedure take place within 30 days of the name

Q: If I purchase a home that is being sold by the owner, is it necessary that I hire a realtor or attorney to handle the required paperwork, or can I handle it

A: While you are not required to hire either a realtor or an attorney to purchase a home, you should consider hiring one professional to assist you with financing, proration of taxes, title, and possession questions. The purchase of a home involves a significant outlay of money. Hiring a qualified attorney is inexpensive, compared to the prob lems that could arise before closing, or even many years from

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

00000 We have seen so fortunate to have timely showers this spring, I am go to be optimistic enough to hope that between April showers you will make the most of your gardening opportunities. Much of the success of your summer garden and lawn depends on what is done this month.

Now is the best time to remove suckers that often grow on trees, shrubs and roses. They should be removed as soon as they are noticed, for they can weaken a plant in a short time. These suckers usually grow on the root stock of the plant, and have foliage that is different from the foliage of the main plant. Dig soil from around these shoots and trace them back to their origin. If tender, they can be jerked off with your hands, or cut them out close to the root system.

When going to a nursery to buy plants, get full information on their growth, size, soil requirements, and if hardy for this area. The nursery man may have more time to give this information on a week day, for they are usually swamped on weekends. Be sure and check to see if plants are free of disease and insects.

If you are impatient for color in your garden, purchase seedlings already in flower. Most nurseries and garden supply shops have petunias, marigolds, alyssom, ageratum, and many others for sale.

Teranium plants massed in a flower bed or border will have a colorful impact. They are easily grown and will tolerate a wide range of conditions. Any good, welldrained soil with several inches of compost or peat moss spaded into the top 6 inches will produce good plants. A half cup of 8-8-8 fertilizer for 50 square feet should also be added to soil. Allow 15 inches for the plants to grow and develop. Water and fertilize plants regularly and they will provide a solid blanket of green foliage with attractive flowers.

April 23 is Flower Show time, so begin grooming, watering and fertilizing if needed All plants that may want to enter in horticulture. Any one may enter in this section with all entries named properly. We are bridge play hoping to have another beautiful show of both horticulture and design.







Time for home canning check

Get ready for home canning with inventories, tests, canner, be sure to look for checkups and plans, says Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist.

Ms. Haggard is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension

Inventory jars, lids, rings, freezer bags and any other equipment necessary for your special home canning

Test dial-gauge pressure canners every year.

For information on testing sites, call your county Extension agent. Many County Extension Offices have testing equipment and they hold pressure-canner-testing clinics early in the canning

season. Tests should include making sure safety valves, petcocks and safety plugs are in good condition.

Replace any worn parts. Remove any corrosion by soaking in vinegar.

Finally, when testing the steam leaks around the canner lid. If the lid has a rubber gasket, make certain it's clean and grease free. If the gasket leaks steam, turn it over, stretch it gently and replace it. If the rubber has hardened, replace it with a new gasket.

Check jar rings. Discard any that are bent, dented or rusted. Estimate the number of lids you'll need.

Check jars for chips or cracks. Chips along the jar mouth usually result in an unsealed product after processing. Cracked jars usually break in the waterbath or pressure canner.

Make plans for clean storage areas, and plan ways to use leftover canned food. Group "last year's" canned foods so they're easy to reach and use--and so they're separate from "new" canning.

There are also separate publications on many of the individual tax credits. These publications tell who qualifies for the credit, and what forms, if any, you need to claim the credit.



Don't miss those tax deductions

Uncle Sam asks adherence to number of forms is over 30, ed, as can travel expenshonesty as millions of us file there are about six or seven es incurred when working for our income taxes, two Texas A&M University business experts offer advice for those filling out long forms.

"Before filing, first check with an accountant, tax consultant or a representative of the Internal Revenue Service for possible changes in tax laws," advises Dr. Charles Maurice, head of the Department of Economics at Texas A&M.

Maurice said because tax laws often change, long forms could be confusingparticularly for those being pushed by inflation into higher income tax brackets who want to reduce the amount of taxes they will pay.

"Frequently people don't know what they can claim against their income," Maurice said, "and some pass up deductions simply because they don't know tax laws."

Although most Americans will file the 1040A, or short form, this year, those who choose the long-form route, the 1040, will fill out an average of two to three addi-

"Records are necessary if the IRS decides to audit you," Nixon said. "If you underpay, the agency will impose a 12 percent interest charge. Penalties will vary depending upon the situation. However, working with the IRS in making corrections could alleviate penal-

The IRS has up to three years to check tax statements and an unlimited time in cases of fraud. Nixon noted the penalty for fraud is up to 50 percent of the tax liability, plus interest.





The "suspect" is a "stem cell" which may be the key to these types of cancer if its origin can be traced. Once identified, the cell could be made the target of specific chemicals. Presently, chemotherapy kills off or checks the growth of the wildly-growing leukemia cells, but some escape and these cells may be the ones that are the progenitors of future growth.

Use of a new technique, 'monoclonal antibody' production, will be used in seeking out the suspected stem cell. This method employs hybrid cells to produce clones that generate specific antibodies continuously. Scientists use antibodies for reactions that can identify a

Quilted fabrics, good year round

An old winter friend will be a new spring-summer fashion item.

Ouilted fabrics are an important fashion item for the 80's--vear round, says Nancy Brown, a clothing specialist.

They offer a texture dimension to fashions, and they add interest and variety

to the wardrobe, she says. Quilted fabrics do require special cutting and sewing techniques if you're trying for a professional look in homesewn fashions, the specialist says.

Below are her suggestions: Select a pattern with a straight silhouette. Avoid gathers and curved stitching lines, since the batting in quilted fabrics can make them bulky and prevent drape and ease.

When cutting, use the "with nap" layout. Horizontal and vertical quilt stitching will need to be matched at the seams just as you would a stripe or plaid de-

Because of the fabric's thickness, hold the scissors at a right angle to the fabric as you cut. This will assure same-size pattern

Mark the fabric with chalk tracing wheel, because it may mar the quilted surface or ruin the paper pattern.

When stitching, use a cotton-covered polyester thread in the luster and strength suitable to the fabric. Always test stitching on a

fabric scrap. Match the stitch length to the length of the quilting stitch lines. This is usually eight to 10 stitches Because of the fabric's

bulk, you may need to lessen the presser-foot pressure and loosen the stitch tension. For stitching, use a regular sharp-point machine needle. A size 14 needle for light-

weight quilted or a size 16-18 for heaviest weights should do the best jobs. To prevent the shift of the bulky fabric when stitching,

pin it generously. If stitching with two different textures, stitch with the smooth side up. An evenfeed foot attachment will help the fabric feed smoothly

without puckering.

To avoid distorted seam lines, stitch from center to outside and from bottom to

To finish seams, trim away the batting in the seam allowance. This will cut down on bulk. Then you can bind the seams with seam tape.

Spring and summer fashions will have that "something extra" with a little quilted-fabric fashion fun.

Food prices up in 1980, but increase is small

Food prices continued to rise in 1980, but the increase was the smallest in 3 years and well below the inflation rate for all prices in the economy. For domestically produced foods, both the farm value and food-industry charges for processing and marketing rose less in 1980 than the year before, limiting the retail price rise. However, retail prices for fish and imported foods, partiularly sugar, rose more sharply.

The farm to retail price spread rose more than the farm value of foods in 1980. and was the principal contributor to the increase in food prices again last year.



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
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
