## BUDGET BOOK BURNING

With Congress now sweating out the arduous task of meeting the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit targets, the "Washington Monument
Ploy" (WMP) is making its annual appearance. WMP is shorthand for a tired old budgeting argument that goes something like is his: if spending is cut for, say, the e.S. Park Service, then th.

closes at $5: 30$ (except on Wednesday) and Sunday hours have been eliminated. This was bound to raise howls of protest on and off Capitol Hill, since many Washingtonians use the library as part of their work in the public policy process.

As anybody who has ever manazed any business or program knows, having to resort to extreme measures. But that's not the way of $U . S$. budget politics.
The political Left has now seized upon the unfortunate circumstances of the Library to get a little free television coverage, staging demonstraions at which such cacthy slogans as books, no bombs. are chanted
This, of course, is not the choice the President and Congress made budgeting, especially a t the federal level, is not a binary proposition, here are many priorities to weigh.
All of which leads to a
All of which leads to a final point. Boorstin may lack the fortiudde to make tough budget choices, but he has dramatized the great defect in
the much-touted Gramm-Rudman-Hollings budget law, which is that in the absence of political resolve, the budget axe will fall automatically. The Library of Congress case shows exactly what is wrong with the
federal budget process. Nobody wants to make tough choices. Everybody hinks their work is special. We have whining, and pleading, and demon-
