On June 7, the trail ride will leave Midway Lane campsite and travel to Barnhart where a barbecue and entertainment will be provided by the Barnhart Fire Department.



Tickets must be purchased three days prior to the barbecues



Seidensticker, field representative with the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, said, "The competition in Area II is extremely tough, and the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District was represented by two outstanding nominees."

> Pleas Childress III was chosen as the outstanding resident conservation rancher. He operates three separate units in Crockett County totaling approximately 21,000 acres, and has continued the excellent job

of range and ranch management that his father, Pleas Childress Jr., started many years ago. He primarily runs sheep and cattle and normally stocks light on all three ranches giving him a built-in drought plan. He is a firm believer in proper grazing use and has found through experience that the range recovers faster after periods of dry conditions by stocking lightly.

The outstanding non-resident rancher award was presented to Jim McMullan. He operates two separate units in Crockett County. He runs all three classes of livestock and retains a great amount of flexibility in his stocking operation. To achieve his goals of range improvement and livestock performance, Jim has utilized various grazing systems through the years. He feels one of the underlying reasons for his improved livestock performance is the improved nutrition provided by the grazing systems.

STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN-Each giving a little and taking a little, the Big Four of legislative politics is forging perhaps the most dramatic turnaround in recent history.

The situation remains delicate and can still collapse as the session winds to its June 1 close. Not everyone is happy with the deal, particularly the Texas Republican Party, but many lawmakers see bluer skies.

A compromise forged by Gov. Bill Clements, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Speaker Gib Lewis and Comptroller Bob Bullock promises to dispel the clouds of crisis, indecision, confrontation, and bankruptcy which have darkened the legislative agenda for over a

A few days ago, conservatives and liberals were locked on a collision course to the poorhouse with the prisons, mental hospitals and public education seemingly falling down around them.

Now the plan is to broaden the sales tax base and lower the rate, increase tax revenues, save the institutions with adequate funding and give the governor new emergency budget authority.

Pressure for Tax Hike

the next two weeks without shortchanging any players. Many business lobbyists are working behind the scene to halt the tax reform, because it means their services will include a sales tax for the first

If all goes right, Hobby and Lewis will get a tax hike, Clements gets budget authority to eliminate spending he doesn't favor, and Bullock will have the pleasure of knowing that his tax reform package has brought Texas government back to some semblance of solvency.

The surprise turnaround was Clements, who had just ended his no new taxes tour and had polled House Republicans on upholding a tax veto.

The pressure to raise taxes is enormous. The House and Senate have already passed budgets requiring additional taxes, and they have only to work out the differences in conference. Meanwhile, a group of prominent Texans, mostly Democrats, urged the Legislature to increase funds for public education.

And Clements apparently found some of his House Republicans were for a tax hike, too. Not many, but maybe enough to override his tax veto. The old Clements would have vetoed the bill and used the time before a special session to solidify the one-third majority bloc he needed to hold a veto.

But time is running out on the state Treasury. The new Clements saw that if he changed his stance, he would get half-a-loaf and Texas could move on to some new

Clements Blasted

Immediately, the governor was blasted by the Texas Republican Party for reversing his stand against new taxes.

His own party sent over a resolution urging him and the 56 House Republicans to stand fast against new taxes. It prompted signed the proclamation.

Clements to say he may still veto the tax bill, but not before Houston Rep. Randy Pennington called his actions "disgraceful." Ouite a few House Republicans

were miffed because he did not tell them first about his reversal. "Hung out to dry" was a phrase used by Garland Rep. Anita Hill.

Mason Rep. Gerald Geistweidt has become the closest to being an apologist for Clements: "We believe he's been right all along and should continue to stay that way. But if you don't start talking somewhere, we won't be any further along at the end of this fivemonth session than we were at the beginning.'

Hobby Plan Passed

Meanwhile, the Senate passed two of three bills in Hobby's "Build Texas" economic program, labeled by some as similar to the depression-era public works program.

The Senate okayed \$400 million in bonds for water and flood projects and \$400 million again for local public works projects.

Open Container Bill

Clements signed the open container bill into law, making it illegal to drink alcoholic beverages

The prohibition applies only to the driver, not to passengers.

Crockett County Hospital reviews budget Easterwood chosen cheerleader

When the hospital board met May 7, members were told that the Justice Department must have a copy or facsimile of all election materials, including public notices and ballots, for the hospital district election. Election for the hospital district may be held 35 days following the return of the bill to Crockett

> President Jo Davidson appointed Don Long and Betty Perry to the 1988 **Budget Committee.**

Bill Boswell told commissioners Monday that budgets will be prepared for different levels of care.

Discussion was held on the yearto-date budget. Earned revenue has been greater than was budgeted, and the hospital has been under budgeted expenses. Billed revenue has earned enough additional income, and the hospital has saved enough on budgeted expenses to cover all non-budgeted expenses except \$5,683.00.

Board members were told that the Texas House Appropriations Committee has proposed reducing the income cap for Medicaid patients to \$609 in 1988 and \$509 in 1989. The Texas Department of Human Resources estimates that, over the next three years, this will make 17,404 people now eligible for Medicaid nursing home support unable to receive that support. This includes 6,140 persons already in nursing homes. This will be included in the general appropriations bill going to the full Texas House this week.

Boswell reported that the hospital will be able to save approximately \$10,675 in hospital liability insurance by joining the Texas Hospital Insurance Exchange. These savings do

not reflect the additional premium going into effect this year.

Contract costs for the Care Center fire alarm system will be \$4,995. This will bring the cost to the Care Center to comply with the 1976 Fire Code to \$10,051.00 and reflects an additional cost of \$0.89 per patient per day for

Mrs. Jacquie King reported that total cash deposits for the hospital in April were \$44,006.67 and disbursements were \$77,950.10. A total of 343 patients were seen in April, including 250 visits to the Emergency Room. Of these, 230 were released, eight transferred, and 11 admitted. There were 190 outpatient clinic visits. There were 198 lab procedures done and 138 x-ray procedures. Ambulance runs totaled 18, 13 local runs and five trans-

Cash deposits for the Care Center were \$37,347.72 and disbursements were \$61,492.86.

Dr. Bostick has agreed to become medical director for the hospital and EMS coordinator with San Angelo. This will permit local EMT's to use their skills.

The ambulance service reported a net profit for the year of \$363 and remains under budget by \$379.


Civic and Youth Center Director Garland Young reported that he has been unable to find metal letters for the name to be put on the building. He will obtain prices for plastic




