Lions defeat Junction

Defense holds throughout game

Friday night proved a battle of the defenses as Junction picked off four Ozona passes while the Lions returned the favor twice and kept the Eagles to a near stand-still throughout much of the game.

A homecoming win hovered uncertainly until the last second faded with Junction stifled in their final attempt to turn things to their favor.

"I'm proud of our defense coming as well as it did," Coach Don Payne said. "Only one big play gave them their score."

For the Lions, though, scoring came progressively as their first two possessions terminated in interceptions.

"Our offense moved the ball well, but we seemed to self-destruct at times, especially through penalties," Payne pointed out. "I was confident we could put points on the board; it would just be a matter of time."

And Ozona's time came with 2:35 remaining in the first quarter when Oscar Galindo intercepted an Eagle pass, returning it 16 yards to put the Lions on Junction's 30.

A penalty forced Ozona back to the 34 a few plays later. Quarterback Chris Denman responded with a 13-yard pass play to Mingo Perez. On the following fourth-and-one situation, Denman took the ball himself and shoved his way through Eagle defenders for the first down.

He attempted the same play only inches from the goal line, but this time Junction held. Eventually, George Ybarra fired his way in and gave Ozona the lead. Ruben Borrego added the extra point to up the score to 7-0.

Junction quickly replied. A 26-yard pass reception almost turned into a six-pointer if Ozona's Robby Tambunga had not chased the receiver down. Then a fumble resulted in a nine-yard run by the quarterback.

Finally, 11 yards out, Junction quarterback, Brad Sutton, connected with All-Stater Rance Roberts in the end zone, placing the Eagles behind the Lions by only one point.

A big factor came when Junction failed to convert on the extra-point that could have tied the game.

The Lions ran into more bad luck on the following possession when a third pass found its way into Junction hands.

The Eagles faced a good opportunity for another TD at this moment, but the Lion defense held their opponents to moving only 13 yards. Junction's attempt at a field goal came close but instead went off to the left.

Midway through the third quarter, the Lions found themselves in great field position at Junction's 42. Both Harvey Dominguez and Lonnie Martinez made good runs, only to watch as penalties wiped the gains away a play or two later.

Facing a 1st-and-22 at Junction's 27, Denman hit Martinez for a 17-yard gain. Dominguez moved the Lions closer by three yards and Ybarra earned a first down with a five-yard run.

These plays set up Denman's two-yard touchdown run that put Ozona up 13-6 with over a quarter remaining to play and still not out of the woods yet as the extra point failed. This left Junction the opportunity to score a TD, add the extra point and tie, or convert a two-point play and win.

The Lions though, were not keen on seeing that happen. The Eagles watched as Ozona's defense forced them to punt one possession then stalled the other when Tambunga intercepted a pass.

On the other hand, Ozona's offense was giving the Eagles something to worry about as well. On both their last two possessions, they threatened deep in Junction territory.

The last ended to their advantage when an Eagle defender made the fourth and final interception; however, if he had let the pass go incomplete, Junction would have taken control 17 yards upfield since the play occurred on a fourth down.

Despite this, the Eagles proceeded to march toward six points. Going to the air at key times, Junction wisely used the two-and-half minutes to put

them on Ozona's 38 with under 20 seconds remaining.

"I was pretty confident we could properly contain them," Coach Payne noted. "We didn't panic and were able to cover the receivers well just as we had done most of the night."

Junction moved six yards closer with a pass-play and found themselves with only one play left, went to the air, and watched it fall incomplete.

The victory gave the Lions a 3-1 record as they head for Coahoma this week for their last non-district game.

"Coahoma is a pretty good team," Payne said. "Right now they are only 1-3 but they've been in every game they've played."

"We need to make our defense more stingy and keep them from letting the other team convert third-and-three and fourth-and-one situations. Other than that, our passing right on course to jelling into an offensive attack despite the interceptions. The penalties bother me, though. We're going to have to work to keep ourselves from getting in a situation where some can be called on us."

This Friday's game begins at normal, 8:00 p.m. time.

Hands across county theme for 4-H awards program

Crockett County 4-H members are gearing up for a lot of special programs and activities the week of Oct. 2-8, National 4-H Week.

Theme of this year's observance is 4-H for Youth for America.

Some of the planned activities for 4-H Week include the annual awards program, food workshop and high-way cleanup.

"Hands Across Crockett County" is the theme for the 1988 Crockett County Awards Program slated for Tuesday, Oct. 4, at the Ozona Civic Center.

The theme, which will be carried out in the decorations created by 4-H'ers and leaders, reflects a part of the 4-H Pledge. "I pledge my hands to larger service...for my club, my community, my country and my world."

Community service and leadership activities are a large part of the 4-H experience, according to County Extension Agents Billy Reagor and Tedra Ulmer. The agents explain that community service and leadership are a part of every project the 4-H'ers undertake.

Ulmer noted, "Community service can be something as small as baking cookies for an elderly neighbor, or as large as creating a garden area for the care center, as our senior club did in the past. It doesn't have to be something big -- just some activity that shows you want to become a part of the community."

Leadership is also important to 4-H project work, she said, as older 4-H'ers pass on their knowledge and skills to younger members.

The annual awards given to 4-H members in Crockett County reflect superior achievement in a number of project areas, and for senior 4-H'ers, cumulative achievement over their 4-H careers.

One of the highlights of the evening will be the presentation of the Mother Davidson Award. This award has been presented annually to an outstanding senior 4-H member in Crockett County since 1951.

Another major award is the county's Gold Star Award. Across Texas, the Gold Star is the highest honor a 4-H member may receive. A boy and girl are chosen each year as Gold Star recipients, and are honored further at a District Gold Star banquet to be held this year in

El Paso on Saturday, Dec. 3.

In Crockett County, the Dan Bean 4-H Memorial Scholarship is one of the most prestigious awards, given to the outstanding senior high 4-H member in the Crockett County 4-H Agricultural Program.

The Danforth "I Dare You" Citizenship Award is given each year to two recipients per county all across the United States. It awards achievement and encourages recipients to strive for further accomplishments.

Other awards are given in specific project areas. 4-H members in Crockett County must turn in applications to receive awards, and the applications are evaluated by an awards committee of adult leaders.

The event will begin at 6:30 p.m. and feature a covered-dish supper. According to the Extension Agents, leaders in charge of the supper will be calling each family to assign food items to bring. The Intermediate 4-H Club is in charge of decorations, the Junior High Club is in charge of serving tea and clean-up, and the Senior High Club will present the program.

For more information about this event, which is open to everyone in Crockett County, call the county Extension Office at 327-2721.

Crockett County boasts some 200 4-H members who are among more than 388,000 in Texas and 4.5 million across the country who will participate in the week-long celebration.

Adult volunteer leaders work with 4-H boys and girls in Crockett County through three different 4-H clubs.

4-H'ers can choose from different project and program areas designed to help them prepare for the future, said Ulmer.

4-H helps young people develop skills that will be useful in the real world, Ulmer said. It helps them discover their strengths and weaknesses. It exposes them to activities in a variety of career fields and helps them to build positive self-concepts for directing their lives. And, most importantly, 4-H'ers learn and have fun doing it. And families can add to the fun by learning and growing together.

Soil Conservation District to hold October 11 election

An election for a director to serve in Zone 4 on the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 11, at the SCS office at 401 First St., Chairman of the Board Bill Baggett announced. The election will be held at 6:30 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be at least 18 years of age.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be at least 18 years of age, and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 4 of the district includes all land lying south of Hwy. 290 and west of Johnson Draw and east of the county road following Howard Draw.

Current members of the board of directors of the Crockett SWCD are Bill Baggett, chairman-Zone 1; Earl Acton, vice-chairman-Zone 4; Gene Perry, secretary-Zone 3; Pleas Childress, III-Zone 2; and Bud Hoover-Zone 5.

The purpose of the Crockett SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.



about \$10 billion, should provide health insurance to employees who can't get it elsewhere.

Magic Number 54

Polls have shown Bush leading, but the race is viewed by many as tightening up last week.

Despite grumblings among some Texas Democrats of the Dukakis organizational bumbblings here, the Massachusetts governor nearly put Bush on the spot in the petroleum sector.

Meanwhile, Gov. Bill Clements, speculating on the Texas Republican Party's bid to take over the Texas Supreme Court, said Bush must win Texas by 54 percent or more to carry GOP down-ballot candidates to victory on his coattails.

Frankly, many observers feel the margin may well rest on how well Reagan campaigns in Texas and whether his popularity is as strong in the end-game of his administration as it was at the outset.

Casino Gambling Issue

On winning percentages of a different sort, pro-casino gambling forces have failed three times to establish a Texas foothold in Galveston and now might have to tackle the state as a whole to pass their issue.

Galveston's anti-gambling voters, led by "Mr. Democrat" Shrub Kempner, want an end to costly local casino elections until Texas legalizes the industry.

They'll try to change the city charter to provide such protection.

State Halts Radio Calls

After thousands of outgoing phone calls knocked the state Capitol phone system out of service earlier this year, officials

have halted attempts by state employees to win cash from radio station call-in contests.

Carl Stringfellow, state director of telecommunications, said the change was made after phone service was disrupted several times by workers trying to reach a radio station offering a \$1,000 prize.

Officials reset the phone system to prevent any calls to telephone numbers beginning with 390, the exchange assigned by Southwestern Bell for radio call-in contests.

- Gordon "Doc" Arnold resigned as executive assistant to House Speaker Gib Lewis and will be replaced by state Rep. Mike Milsap, D-Fort Worth, when his legislative term expires Jan. 10.

- Lauro Cavazos, president of Texas Tech University, became the first Hispanic to serve in the Cabinet when he was sworn in as U.S. Secretary of Education.

- A recent Texas Poll indicates 75 percent of Texans favor and 20 percent oppose increasing the minimum wage from \$3.35 an hour to \$4.45 over the next three years.

- Attorney General Jim Mattox and State Sen. John Whitmire led the media on a tour of the Harris County jail to underscore crowded conditions there.

- Mattox is reviewing the Texas Real Estate Commission's policy recommending that agents tell prospective buyers if the seller of a house has AIDS.

- The Texas Racing Commission intends to license Class 2 racetracks by Spring 1989 and asks all parties applying for a racetrack license to file a letter of intent by Oct. 31. The Class 2 license application period is Nov. 1 to Dec. 30.

AUSTIN-Playing to soft spots in the Texas economy, Dukakis Democrats pitched to the beleaguered oil industry, while Bush Republicans pushed new jobs in the Houston-area space program.

President Reagan, stumping at Bush's Houston fundraiser which raised more than \$3 million, visited the Johnson Space Center where he called the Discovery astronauts "space age pioneers" and said the U.S. space program is back on track.

"America is going to space again—and we are going there to stay," the President told more than 3,000 space center employees and their families.

Mr. Reagan stopped first in Waco to address Baylor University students and assist Beau Boulter, the Republican congressman who is opposing the Senate re-election of Lloyd Bentsen.

New space exploration means thousands more jobs to the Houston economy, while higher oil prices boost the entire state.

Dukakis scored points with some Texas oilmen by promising that Lloyd Bentsen will head a blue-ribbon panel to hammer out a U.S. energy policy, strongly implying that Texas needs will be addressed in the future program.

It was considered the smartest move of late by the Dukakis camp in Texas, and an obvious one considering Bush's publicized failure to address concerns of Texas oilmen.

But Bush has plenty of time to respond and Dukakis may have alienated other businessmen by saying private business, at a cost of

7th grade Cubs fall to Junction Eagles

Spurred on by a rushing attack that racked up 180 yards and two touchdowns, the Junction 7th Grade Eagles seized a 12-0 victory over the Ozona 7th Grade Cubs and thwarted the Cubs' chances for a homecoming win.

Relying heavily on a potent power sweep play, the Eagles moved the ball consistently throughout the game on offense, and held the Cubs to a mere three total first downs on defense thanks mainly to a hard hitting crew of young linebackers.

Junction made clear their intentions on their very first series of the game. The Eagles received the opening kickoff, and, on the second play from scrimmage, burst into action with a 57-yard reverse. This play set up a 1-yard touchdown by tailback Eddie Gonzalez with 3:54 left in the first quarter.

After the excitement of the first series subsided, the game hit a sloppy phase. Ozona took the ball but could only gain three yards on

three plays. The Cubs punted back to Junction, but all they did was run five plays and then fumble the ball to Ozona...who in turn fumbled the ball back to the Eagles.

After gaining a first down, Junction stalled and was forced to punt. However, after running the ball two times for 12 yards and a first down, the Cubs went to the air and lost the ball via an interception.

After the half, both teams came out onto the field ready to take control. The Cubs started from their own 20 yard line and cranked out 60 yards on 10 plays, but ran out of gas and lost the ball on downs.

In turn, after a penalty, Junction mounted a drive that amassed 60 yards on six plays, culminating with a 40 yard touchdown scamper at the 3:12 mark of the third quarter. The PAT failed (as did the first one) and Junction took a 12-0 lead.

On their last series of the game, the Cubs racked up 25 yards on three plays, then hit an offensive rut and were forced to punt. Junction then moved the ball all the way to the Ozona 3 yard line before fumbling

the ball into the end zone where the Cubs recovered for a touchback. However, time finally ran out on the home team, and the final score was 12-0 in favor of the Junction Eagles.

Ozona's leading rusher was wingback Juan DeLuna who rushed one time for 42 yards. Following DeLuna was quarterback Michael Fay who carried the ball three times for 23 yards.

Fullback Ryan Morris was the Cubs' workhorse for the game, rushing five times for 17 yards. Also in plus yardage for Ozona was Sammy Hinostrroza who had nine yards on seven carries.

Defensively, Javier Perez led all tacklers with six. Michael Fay and Bart Grimes each followed with four tackles. Defensive back Keith Miller took away two tackles, while Ryan Morris and Juan De Luna each had one. Morris also had a fumble recovery.

The Cubs' next game will be Thursday, Sept. 29, in Iraan against the Iraan Junior High Braves. The 7th grade will begin at 5 and the 8th grade will follow at 6:30.



Challenged books on display

"Students have no need to understand life in a black ghetto." So Claude Brown's *Manchild in the Promised Land* was challenged at a high school in Oregon. Stephen King's books *Carrie* and *The Shining* were removed from libraries in Iowa and Washington. *Death of a Salesman* was deemed "junk" in Kentucky. And in Florida, 64 works of literature were banned from the schools, including *A Farewell to Arms*, *The Red Badge of Courage*, *Lost Horizon*, *Hamlet*, *King Lear*, and *Wuthering Heights*.

Books like these, challenged or banned on similar grounds during the past year, will be displayed at Crockett County Public Library during national Banned Books Week 1988 - Celebrating the Freedom to Read, Sept. 26-30. Most of these books are well known but are considered dangerous or objectionable by individuals or groups who would deny others access to them.

Other books challenged recently are F. Scott Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby*, for "language and sexual references"; Glenn M. Linden's *A History of Our American Republic* because it promotes the "religion of secular humanism"; John Steinbeck's *Of Mice and Men* for "pro-

fanity" and Jeremy Kingston's *Witches and Witchcraft* because "young or immature minds may become intrigued by Satan".

Crockett County Public Library is participating in Banned Books Week, 1988 - Celebrating the Freedom to Read, which is sponsored by the American Library Association, the American Booksellers Association, the Association of American Publishers, the American Society of Journalists and Authors, and the National Association of College Stores. It is endorsed by The Center for the Book of The Library of Congress. The sponsoring organizations believe that most would-be book banners act with what they consider to be the highest motives - protecting themselves, their families and communities from perceived injustices and evils and preserving the values and ideals they would have the entire society embrace. The result, however, is always and ever the denial of another's right to read. 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

Families significant teachers

Some teachers are parents, but more importantly, all parents should be teachers, according to child development experts.

On the isolated American frontier in the old days, parents had to teach children everything they needed to know, from readin', writin' and 'rith-metic -- to planting, plowing and preserving. The classes were small, students learned at their own pace, and there were few dropouts.

Naturally, with our population, education in the 1980's can't really follow this model, but families still can. Families, in fact, continue to be significant teachers as they teach their children about culture, values, beliefs, getting along with others, self-reliance, love, goal-setting and work.

To support these ideals, families are charged with providing children

with experiences and opportunities that will give them educational skills to reinforce each of the family's values.

If parents want their children to be happy and successful in today's advanced, technical and often impersonal world, they must give them a strong emotional and educational foundation.

Mass production may have been okay for Henry Ford, but it doesn't work in education. Children can't be placed on assembly lines and expected to grow as individuals -- families must continue to be the nurturers of children and their beliefs, values and skills, and families must also take this responsibility seriously.

When families and schools support each other, the child grows in strength and maturity.

Scott to train in Angelo

Lane Scott, computer science instructor at Ozona High School, has been selected by the Education Service Center, Region XV, San Angelo, to participate in regionwide training for educational technology. The campus-district plans are being formulated in the fall of 1988, and agency training is being provided prior to this effort.

Anticipated training will include

administrator and school board awareness in addition to sessions for actual writing of campus-district plans.

School personnel have been chosen by the service centers to assist in this portion of the planning process based on experience and expertise in the area of educational technology.

Foods festival to kick-off 4-H projects

Foods and Nutrition projects for Crockett County 4-H members will begin with a bang on Saturday, Oct. 1, as 4-H'ers who have signed up for this year's project attend a one-day workshop at the Ozona Civic Center.

The event, which will last from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., will include at least six different learning experiences, according to Crockett County Extension Agent-Home Economics Tedra Ulmer.

"The 4-H'ers who attend this workshop will learn about the four basic food groups, some basic food preparation and sanitation skills, table setting, will have the opportunity to test their fitness, and will learn how to plan a menu," said Ulmer. Adult leaders are in charge of the programs.

By lunchtime, Ulmer noted, the 4-H'ers will have prepared the basic ingredients for pizza -- just in time for a pizza party.

Following the lunch, 4-H'ers and parents will travel to the junction of Hwy. 163 and 137 to pick up trash on "their" stretch of highway. "We try to include community service activities in all of our projects, so the 4-H'ers learn the importance of becoming a part of their community," said Ulmer.

Leadership skills will also be an important part of the day, as teen and junior 4-H leaders assist younger 4-H members at the workshop, lead activities and present part of the program. "Any 4-H'er who has

completed at least two years of foods projects and has been to district competition is eligible to present a short (two minute or less) commercial on some aspect of foods and nutrition," Ulmer explained.

A \$1 registration fee will be charged each participant to cover the cost of materials at the workshop. Each child should wear jeans and sturdy shoes for safety during the trash pick-up activity. Ulmer said leaders have also asked that participants bring pizza pans and cheese graters, if they have some.

"It's particularly important that parents make an effort to attend this workshop with their children," Ulmer noted, "because we'll be going at a rather fast pace, and the younger ones will especially need a lot of assistance to get the most out of the lessons we present."

A letter has been sent to each child who has enrolled in 4-H and signed up for the project. If your child is not

enrolled yet, or did not sign up for the Foods and Nutrition project, there is still time to do so. Call the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721 or come by the office, which is located on the second floor of the courthouse annex.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.

Parks department to hold workshops

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has a series of one-day public review/workshop meetings scheduled in October to obtain public input for the regional components of the 1990 Texas Outdoor Recreation Plan (TORP).

These meetings will provide members of the Riverside and Landowners Protection Coalition an excellent opportunity to discuss specific problems, ideas and solutions with other interested persons from governmental agencies, including Texas Parks and Wildlife staff, the commercial sector and private citizens.

All landowners are urged to attend these meetings to make concerns and problems known to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Meetings in this area are in Midland on Oct. 11, at 10 a.m. at the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission, Midland-Odessa Regional Airport.

In Alpine Oct. 13 at the City Hall in the City Council Room, 309 West Ave. D at 10 a.m. another meeting will be held.

A meeting/workshop will also be held Oct. 3 at 1:30 p.m. at the Concho Valley Council of Governments Meeting Room at 5014 Knickerbocker in San Angelo.

"You can be sure the recreationalists and environmentalists will be there. This is our chance to let them know how we feel about our private property rights," said Ginger Perner, local coalition chairman.

Corn may be toxic

Livestock producers as well as corn growers should be aware of a possible toxic problem in corn due to this year's drought.

Aflatoxin, a type of mycotoxin produced by fungi, can be deadly to livestock fed the contaminated corn, said Dr. Cloyce Coffman, an agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Whether or not corn is contaminated with mycotoxins can be determined by a blacklight test, but a more sophisticated chemical test is needed to determine the actual aflatoxin level, Coffman said.

Ranchers purchasing truck loads of corn should be aware of this potential problem and request that corn be tested prior to purchasing it.

Various commercial companies offer testing kits. Also, corn samples can be sent to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory at Texas A&M University for testing.

"Aflatoxin is highly toxic to livestock; the permissible level is only 20 parts per billion," Coffman said.

"Aflatoxin problems normally occur when hot, dry weather persists while corn is in the pollinating and grain filling stages," said the agronomist. "This year we had ideal conditions for aflatoxin to develop in many corn fields. Aflatoxin problems have been suspected in the Coastal Bend as well as in parts of Central and North Central Texas."

If corn is found to be contaminated with aflatoxin, a determination must be made as to whether extensive cleaning -- separating out

chipped and cracked kernels -- will help lower the level of contamination. If it doesn't, then the corn cannot be used for livestock feed.
