Members of the Crockett County directors agreed Center board of long-range plan when the week. A study to determine the feasibility of a return to Medicare certification will be done as one phase of the plan.
Board members voted to hire a consultant who is a specialist in the ticipation to make conditions of parproximately 1.5 days will be requirdo the study.

Texas Senate week in review
AUSTIN - Facing a June 1 court because it favors property-rich dis
takeover of public school funding in Texas, Senate and House negotiators mate with Gov, Bill Clements over education finance reform.
A compromise $\$ 555$ million education reform bill is expected to emerge this week from a Senate/House conference committee amid renewed plan. the Legislatre last session passed by proval last week in both houses, but went to conference committee to resolve differences in the Senate and House versions.
If Clements vetoes Senate Bill 1, as he did earlier this month with a halfcent sales tax hike that would have funded a similar education reform
plan, a newly-appointed court master will present his funding plan to State District Judge Scott McCown on June 20.

Last week, McCown named former State Supreme Court Justice Willam Kilgarlin as master to devise an equitable plan for distributing state funds to pubic schools. Under the may draw his own plan or he may select the compromise plan now being negotiated in the Legislature if Clements and lawmakers fail to reach an accord.
Lawmakers have been in continous special sessions since February 27 attempting to design a funding plan money among 1,068 public school districts in Texas. Last year, the State Supreme Court ruled the current fund distribution plan unconstitutional

alsofound some enlarged lymphnodes and a couple of questionable places on the bone scan. She went into surgery on March 23 rd to correct the bile duct problem and they took some lymph nodes for a biopsy. The test results of the biopsy came back nega
tive, which left the doctor's scratch tive, which left the doctor's scratch
ing their heads. They sent the biops out again for further tests, this time it came back positive indicating she has a form of lymphoma cancer. The \#1 option was chemotherapy.
On April 17th Patti and I with the Lord's guidances, reached a decision and that was to stay here in Taiwa
and take the treatment. On April 20 Patti began a six month chemother apy treatment. In light of all this, the good news is that the doctors say tha this type of lymphoma cancer respond well with chemo treatment and has a success rate of about 75 to 80 percent
