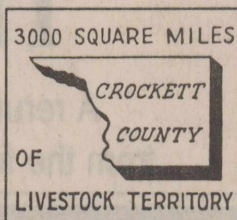

Heavy weekend rains keep road employees busy

Ozona firemen made a rescue mission in Val Verde County Friday afternoon, pulling a pickup driven by an Alabama man from a low water crossing near Juno. Comstock firemen were unable to reach the area just past Juno store because of high water.

Shouts for help were heard by a motorist who could not see the pickup and camping trailer.

The men, who were en route to Langtry, were brought to Ozona where they repaired their vehicle and changed destination.

Rains and road damage in Val Verde County have kept Hwy. 163 south of Ozona closed for weeks. Weekend rains also caused the closing of Highways 2083 and 1971 in Crockett County and 189 in Val Verde and Sutton which serves several Crockett County residents.

Numerous draws on the rise prohibited travel in some areas for several hours.

The Devils River was across the road 42 miles south of Ozona and running an estimated 12 feet deep Sunday morning. The river was expected to crest at 18 feet later in the day at Baker's Crossing in Val Verde County.

Information gathered by Pat Aiguier of Crockett County Road Department showed a countywide rainfall average of three inches from Friday night through Sunday.

County road department workers are busy this week clearing crossings which were flooded. All other county roads that received no major damage are being bladed as crews can get to them and as their wet conditions permit, Ms. Aiguier said.

In the north part of Crockett County in Farmers Field area there was extensive road damage due to wet conditions and heavy traffic. This road will have to be completely reconstructed

and resurfaced, she said.

Paul Perner's Pecos River Ranch road received heavy damage with parts washed out.

B. B. Ingham's road also had damage due to wash outs and draw crossings running water.

Taylor Box Road at Eddie Hale's ranch had pavement washed away due to water running over the roadway. Farther down Taylor Box Road the county had pavement loss in several places.

Kincaid Road in Johnson Draw area had heavy rain washing out the roadway in several places.

These roads that the county maintains will require major repair. Due to caiche pits standing full of water, this repair will be delayed, Ms. Aiguier said. "Right now we are only trying to get the roads passable and open to the public."

Mary Lou and John Vaughn who operate Mayfield Country Store south of Ozona in Val Verde County returned Saturday from a vacation at the coast to find their way home blocked by high water. The Vaughns, who have operated the store for seven years, were still trying to reach home Sunday with little success.

Rainfall records at the weather station south of Ozona showed 3.97 inches from Sept. 20-24.

Water district equipment in Ozona recorded 3.96 inches for the Thursday through Sunday period.

Sonny Malone, who ranches in Crockett and Val Verde counties, received a slow soaking 3.5 inches. The Buddy Mills place between Comstock and Pandale got nine inches, and eight inches plus was reported by Buddy and Elaine Phillips at their place in northern Val Verde County.

The Buster Deaton ranch received 4.70. Frank White recorded 5-6 inches of rainfall. Earl Acton received eight inches.

Commissioners change clerical workers pay scale

An August decision to implement a new pay scale for clerical workers was re-affirmed by commissioners Monday night. Court members voted to make the scale effective Aug. 13, the date the change was originally approved. Notes taken by two commissioners at the Aug. 13 meeting indicated the change was to take place immediately, but that information was not included in the official minutes.

Probation officer Stephanie Chapman and County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos were present to express their dissatisfaction with the change which affects their employees. Treasurer Jim Dudley had also contacted the judge and some commissioners to protest the pay scale change.

Five employees, including the judge's secretary are affected.

After an item by item review of a lease agreement submitted by Crockett County Fair Association for fairgrounds property, court members voted to table any action on the lease and take it under advisement.

Lease changes desired by the court will be brought to the association's attention.

The court agreed to attempt to find an area at the dump for the deposit of dead animals. Carcasses can be accepted if a separate pit is used and the animals are covered daily, Judge Kathryn Mayfield said.

Ozona Veterinary Clinic is not permitted by the state and will no longer be able to dispose of dead animals for the county.

Dump ground fees charged in other communities were reviewed, and commissioners were asked to talk to their constituents about the possibility of assessing fees for dumping here.

A representative of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, the firm doing a study on methods for disposing solid waste here, was to be in Ozona Tuesday. Data acquired this week should be all that is needed to complete the feasibility study, Judge Mayfield said.

Traffic count records Ozona I-10 exit ramps

A traffic count Sept. 6 at the Interstate 10 exit ramps to Ozona provided encouraging statistics for Ozona Chamber of Commerce. The count, conducted by equipment from the San Angelo Department of Highways and Public Transportation office, recorded 1,062 vehicles exiting into Ozona from three ramps.

The Loop 466 westbound exit registered 179 exits during the 24 hour period. Exits for the westbound SH 163 numbered 609. Eastbound vehicles exiting at Loop 466 were 283. The eastbound exit for SH 163 was not counted due to an equipment malfunction.

"Even if half those exiting were locals, and I don't believe that many were, the numbers look good," said Nancy Moore, coordinator at the chamber of commerce. The chamber is actively working to promote the community as a stop for tourists traveling I-10.

The count was made on a Thursday of a month not traditionally a vacation period.

Soil and Water Conservation District elections to be held

An election for directors in Zones 1 and 2 on the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for Tuesday Oct. 9, at the SCS office located at 401 First Street, announced Earl Acton, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 6:30 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age.

Legal qualifications state that candidates for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone they represent, be 18 years of age, and be actively engaged in farming or ranch-

ing. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 1 of the district includes lands in Crockett County north of U.S. Hwy. 290 and west of State Hwy. 163. Zone 2 includes all lands in Crockett County east of State Hwy. 163 and north of U.S. Hwy. 290.

Current members of the board of directors of the Crockett SWCD are: Earl Acton, chairman - Zone 4; Bud Hoover, vice-chairman - Zone 5; Gene Perry, Secretary - Zone 3; Larry Williams, member - Zone 1 and Pleas Childress III, member - Zone 2.

The purpose of the Crockett SWCD is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

Broncos bust the Lions 42-8

The Ozona Lions tangled with a strong 3-A Sonora football team in wet weather Friday night in Lions Stadium and were downed 42-8.

The Lions turned the ball over to the Broncos after four downs and were greeted with a 86 yard touchdown run by Bronco Domingo Perez 35 seconds into the game on first down. The extra point attempt failed, making the score 6-0.

The Lions again gave up the football to the Broncos after short yardage gains by Michael Ybarra and an 8 yard loss by quarterback Danny DeHoyos. The Broncos drew blood again with a touchdown from a fourth down pass from quarterback David Mirike to Blayze Sykes only to fail on a 2-point conversion attempt giving the Broncos a twelve-point lead over the Lions.

Ozona picked up several first downs with good runs by Adam Alba and Michael Ybarra before giving up the football to the Broncos on their own 14 yard line. The Lions got their defense on track with good tackling by Ruben Borrego, Daun Williams, Mike Kenison and Albert Talamantez, holding the Broncos to one first down and forcing a kick to the Lion 8 yard line in the beginning seconds of the second quarter.

Sonora put points on the board again with 4:29 remaining in the half with a 2 yard pass from Mirike to Larry Chalk, making the score 18-0 after a failed extra point attempt.

The Lions came back to score with an exciting second down 75 yard keeper play around left end by Danny DeHoyos with 3:20 left in the second half. The two point conversion attempt was good, giving the Lions some relief on the scoreboard with 8 points.

Second half action began with fumble trouble for the Lions on a second and nine pitchout from Danny DeHoyos, opening the door for a third scoring drive by the Broncos and an 8 yard keeper play by quarterback David Mirike. The Bronco's two-point conversion attempt was good with 7:57 left in the third quarter.

Ozona again found themselves in trouble, fumbling on the 33, but good Lion defense kept the Broncos to only one first down.

The Broncos continued their scoring parade in the fourth quarter, set up by a intercepted pass and fumble, with a one yard carry by Sam Taylor with 8:48 left in the quarter and a five yard T.D. by Adam Youngblood with 3:38 left on the clock.

Billy H. Reagor, Crockett County Extension agent, was recognized as Agent of the Year when members of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association held their fall meeting

here Sept. 22. Sen. Bill Sims of San Angelo was on hand to present Reagor with an award plaque.

"I am particularly proud of this

honor because selection is made by the producers themselves," said Reagor in commenting on the award.

A veteran County Extension agent with 26 years' service, Reagor emphasizes educational programs in sheep and goat production and total ranch management. The strong 4-H agricultural program and closely linked producer educational programs complement one another to stimulate the quality of lamb and wool production in Crockett County.

A graduate of Texas A&M University where he was active in the Saddle and Siroin Club and a judging team member, Reagor received the Distinguished Service Award from the TCAAA in 1976 and the Superior Service Award from TAEX in 1978. He is recognized as a market lamb judge, serving in that capacity at many county, area and major shows.

Reagor started his Extension career in 1964 as a Junior Assistant County Agent in Ward County, and in Matagorda County as Assistant County Agriculture Agent from 1964-66. In 1966 he transferred to Martin County where he served as County Agriculture Agent until 1974, when he moved to his present position as Crockett County Extension Agent.

Reagor, a native of Llano County, is an active member of the Ozona United Methodist Church. He participates in many community activities such as the annual Lions Club All-Youth Rodeo.

He and his wife, Judy, have three daughters, Julie, Vickie and Tamie.

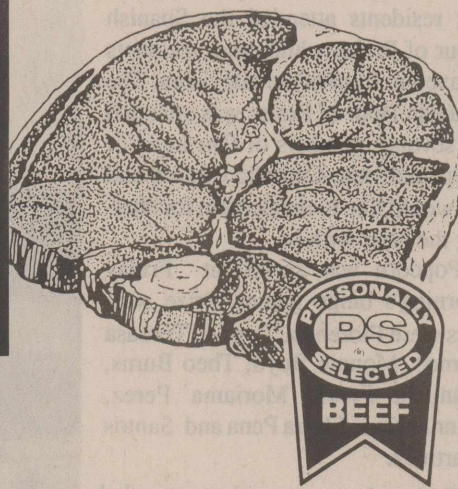

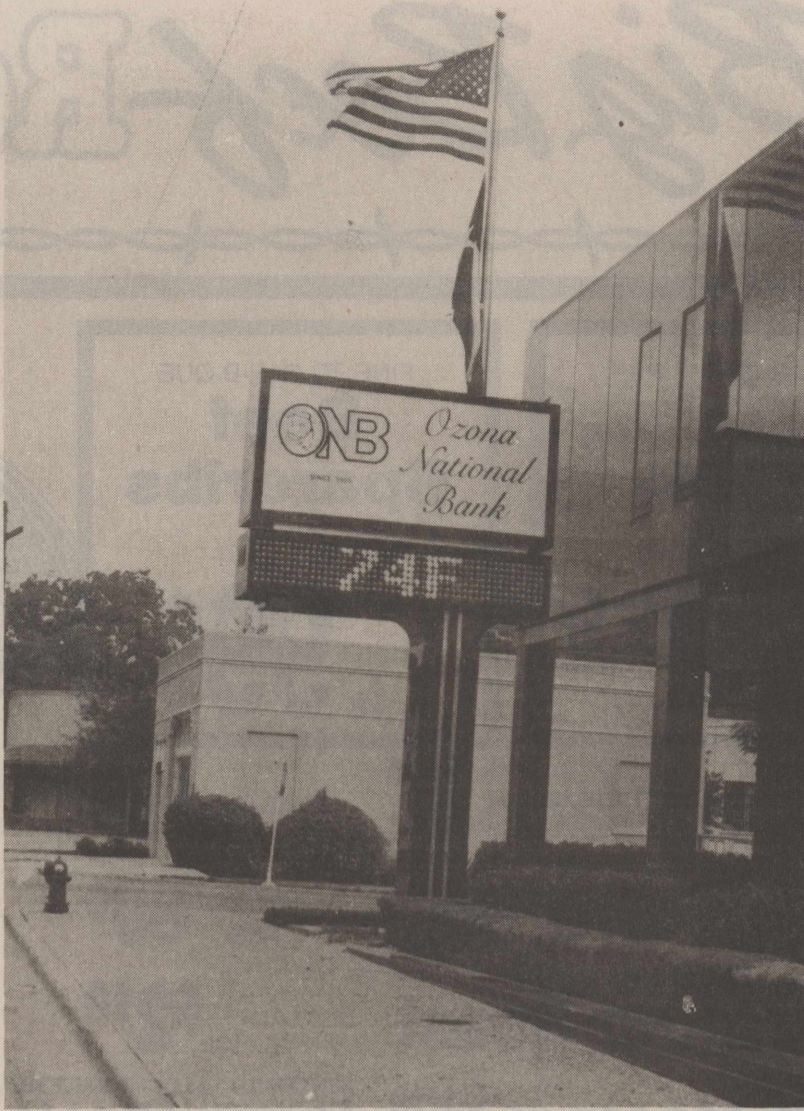

Wanderers

I met another wanderer recently. In my book, a wanderer is someone who roams the highways. They go from East to West, return, then start all over again. They are always on the move. They survive hand to mouth on a day to day basis.

I recall, as a child, seeing hoboes come through our town. Most were down and out and looking for a hot meal. They were not necessarily destructive or dangerous, just hungry and hurting. Generally speaking, they were older men, who for whatever reason, had taken to the road.

Times have changed. The modern day wayfarers are both men and women. Some are young, some are old. But they hold one thing in common - they are travelling a circuit without plans to put down roots anywhere. A bite to eat here, maybe a place to sleep for the night, then they are on their way to another town to start the routine over again.

Some of these nomads are dangerous, some are demented. Most are distraught. Whatever their case, they are a growing number, and they present to society a perplexing problem. No one wants to turn away a needy stranger, but no one wants to finance a freeloader either.

I have mixed feelings about these vagrants. On the one hand, I am compelled to consider those who are really in need. Like you, I want to be "a good Samaritan" and help those who have fallen to some injustice or injury in life. On the other hand, I've seen too many professional bums to give help without investigation.

As a minister, I'm torn between the admonitions of Scripture that say to feed the hungry and those that say

if a man will not work neither should he eat. I have seen both types. A few are honestly needy and deserve help. Many are crafty pretenders that blight society with their constant lies and laziness and they merit no help. It takes a wise person to differentiate between them and meet their needs.

Christ calls us to be compassionate in dealing with the hungry and homeless. We must listen to our hearts and respond with kindness and help. But Christ also calls us to good stewardship and demands that we use our resources wisely. We must listen to our heads when logic says it is a sham.

Please know that all who come calling for food and lodging are not deserving. Many are polished professionals who hide under a ragged coat and appearance. They freeload from coast to coast without shame. As a community, we must not open our coffers to such pretenders.

But, we must, as a caring community, serve those who are truly in need. It is neither sinful or shameful to be in real need. I pray that God grants us both wisdom and resources to care for those who have legitimate requirements.

Oh, by the way, that last wanderer that I met was given food, clothing, and lodging. She was also told that it was done in the name of Christ. My hope is that an impression was made that speaks more of compassion than of corruption.

Think about it.

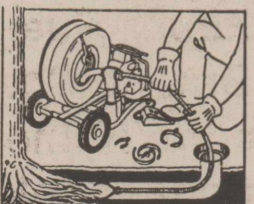

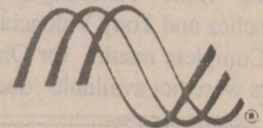

Perry and Kirby couples enjoy Mexico trip

A June vacation provided high adventure for two Ozona couples as they made their way from Chihuahua City, Mexico, to the coastal city of Los Mochis via the Chihuahua al Pacifico Railroad. Traveling by train through Copper Canyon offered breathtaking scenery to Willa and Jerry Perry, Shirley and Dick Kirby.

The 162 miles from Chihuahua City to the coast require 289 miles of railroad track to traverse the steep grades in the mountains, they explained. At one point, three layers of track are visible at the same time winding up a mountainside. The journey can be made in 12 hours if the train has no problems.

Completed in 1961, the railroad took 90 years to build. Light at the end of the tunnel became a familiar sight along the way; the route has 86 tunnels. Thirty-seven bridges are part of the railway.

A family of Tarahumara Indians captured the attention of the tourists at the train station in Chihuahua City. An Indian cave dwelling with an adjacent cave for animals was photographed along the way. Women washing clothes in streams was a common sight on the trip.

During an overnight stay at Casa de Margarita in Creel the couples met travelers from several foreign countries. Casa de Margarita is known to college students from everywhere, said Shirley. Lodging and two meals for a couple cost only \$17.50 a night there, a bargain in any country.

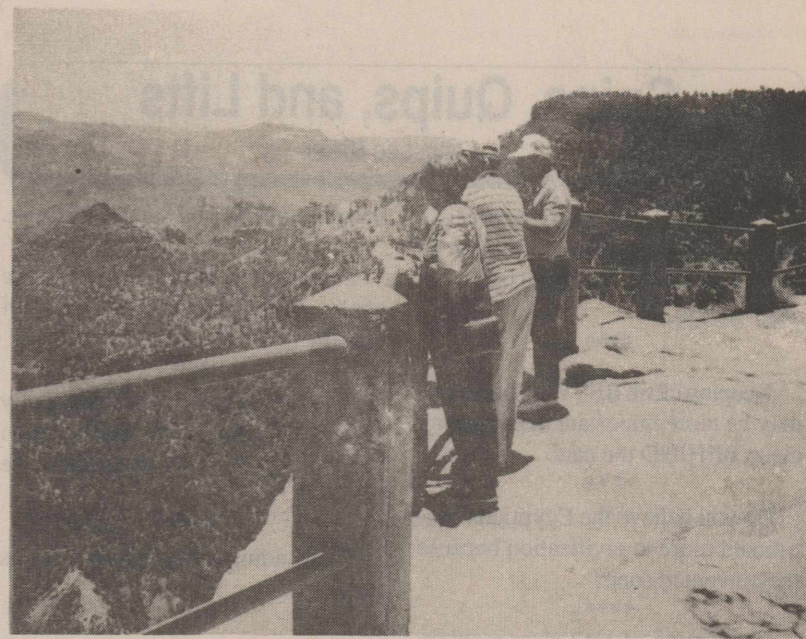
Homemade brownies taken by the travelers for dessert were quickly given to village youngsters whose diet includes no such luxuries.

T.E.A. monitoring team report

Members of the Ozona School Board, at its regular monthly meeting that was held on Monday, September 17, heard a report by Superintendent Jim Payne on the results of a Texas Education Agency accreditation compliance monitoring team visit which took place in Ozona schools on February 21-23, 1990. The official report concerning the local school system was not received until mid-August.

Mr. Payne reported that the compliance monitoring team found many good things taking place in the school system. In the area of planning, the team found that the district was utilizing district and campus improvement goals very effectively, particularly in implementing computer technology in the district. In instruction, the team wrote: "Teachers and students at Crockett County Consolidated CSD were observed using time effectively. Halls cleared quickly between classes, and teachers started classes immediately after the tardy bell sounded. Teachers were using effective re-teaching strategies for students who did not initially master objectives. The team noted minimal class interruptions during the accreditation visit; therefore, the instructional focus allowed students additional time on task."

Also in the area of instruction, "On February 12, 1986 the Crockett County Consolidated CSD Board of Trustees approved the district's management plan. This plan was later revised and approved October 10, 1989, to incorporate the changes in student discipline rules created by House Bill 1153 and Senate Bill 424. The plan focuses on many areas, including a code of conduct, regulations, rights, and responsibilities. Teachers are free to develop classroom rules within the confines of the district plan. Offenses and infractions are classified into three categories based on their severity. Several discipline management techniques, including reality therapy and assertive discipline are listed for each class of offense or infraction. The team commends the district in the development and implementation of this plan."

"The team found evidence of excellent lesson planning by teachers in all classrooms visited. Lesson plans are in various formats and contained objectives, activities, materials, and evaluation measures. Resource teachers provide regular education teachers with modifications for special education students. The campus principals check lesson plans on a regular basis and provide teachers with feedback about the format and effective-

ness of the activities listed."

In student services, the school nurse received favorable comments from the team. "The district nurse helped the district acquire the services of the Texas Department of Health Office in El Paso. The department makes available a van equipped for providing dental examinations and services. These services are provided at minimal cost to the district. According to the nurse, more than 40 district students benefited from these services. The team compliments the district nurse of her initiative in pursuing these services."

In the category of instructional resources, "Teachers on each campus indicated to the team that the district's administrative staff and board of trustees support their instruction and provide resources to help implement it. Supplies and materials for classroom instruction are ordered by teachers, based on need, and submitted to the campus principal for ordering. Budgets for supplies and materials were found to be adequate at all district campuses."

"At the high school campus, the team found supplies and equipment for the cosmetology program to be commendable. In addition, the district provides adequate budgets to support effective teaching in the industrial arts, and the agriculture, welding, and woodshops. The district's commitment to provide a strong vocational program is complimented by the accreditation team."

In personnel, "All teachers and administrators impressed the team by demonstrating a dedication to the premise that all children can learn. They know their students on a personal basis; and they are able to identify student problems, both academic and personal, during early stages of development. The team recognizes the rapport among staff members and commends them for developing a close working relationship."

In physical facilities, "Facilities at Crockett County Consolidated CSD are kept clean and neat, and they receive proper maintenance. The custodial and maintenance staff of the

district help promote a positive school climate by keeping building and grounds clean and attractive."

Superintendent Payne reported that the monitoring team made several recommendations for improving the district. Some of the recommendations were: extending the district's curriculum guides to include re-teach and enrichment activities for students, improving consistency in regard to grading procedures, keeping students' prescription medicines behind lock and key, development of a long-range plan to construct and/or remodel facilities to accommodate and provide better access to handicapped persons, and the development of a plan to weed and update library books and materials, particularly in regard to the areas of science and technology. Mr. Payne reported to the trustees that the district had already started to work on some of the areas mentioned in the report.

Following Board discussion and review of this report, the members approved a local school district teacher appraisal calendar and schedule which will be used to evaluate personnel this year, and then heard a report from Mr. Payne on the present condition of school-owned buses and other vehicles. The trustees gave Payne permission to begin preparing bid specifications for a 16 passenger school bus, a four-door school car, and a 12 passenger van.

One ounce of dried chili contains as high as 20,000 units of vitamin A (two times the minimum daily requirements).

Fresh chili pods have even higher levels.

Vitamin A is not the only benefit derived from chili. The vitamin C content can run as high as 16,000 mg. for each 25,000 calories of plant. It is also high in calcium.

Red chili has an additional quality. It retards the oxidation of meat and fats, and serves as a natural preservative in stored and frozen meat dishes.

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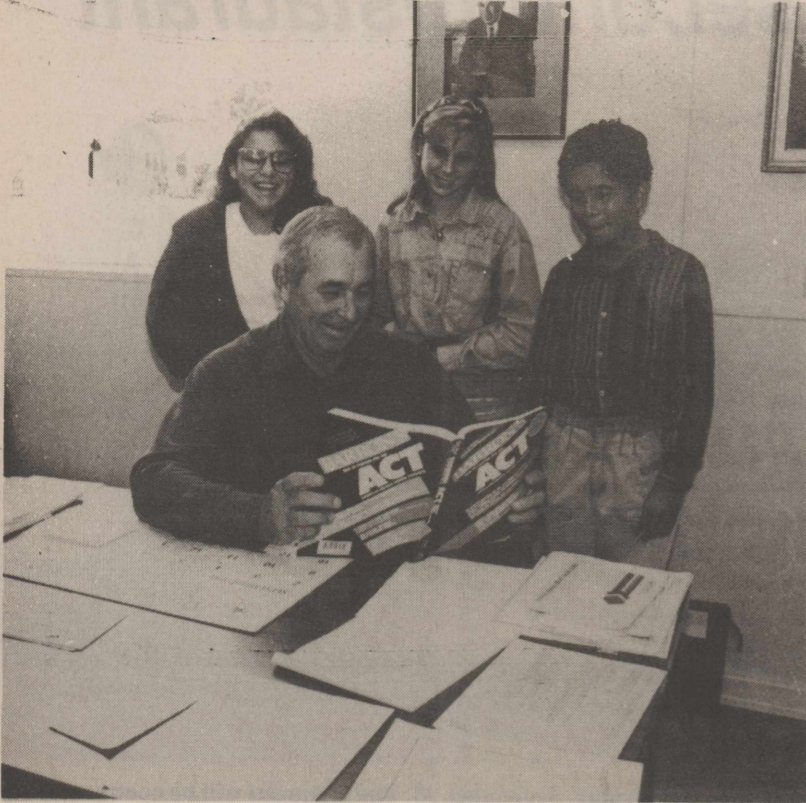

Ozونا students eligible for talent search

Three students from Ozona Junior High, Stephanie Madris, daughter of Nora Madris, Tara Wilkins, daughter of Steve and Belinda Wilkins and Eli Hernandez, son of Herlinda and Eliser Hernandez Jr., have qualified and applied for participation in this year's Talent Search for mathematically and verbally brilliant students sponsored by Duke University's Talent Identification Program. The program identifies bright seventh graders from a 16-state region in the south, southwest, and midwest.

To be eligible, students must have scored at the 97th percentile or better on an in-school achievement or ability measure. They will sit for the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or ACT assessment (ACT), normally

taken only by college bound juniors and seniors, in December, January, or February. Many of these students score as well or better than the average college-bound senior on these measures. All participants receive Certificates of Merit and some become eligible for state-wide recognition ceremonies or a variety of educational programs.

TIP, established in 1980, has provided thousands of students with information about their abilities and educational options. The purposes of the program are to help academically able students develop their special abilities, to assist schools in working with their brightest students, and to understand the nature of exceptional mathematical and verbal ability.

Just before the end of the first

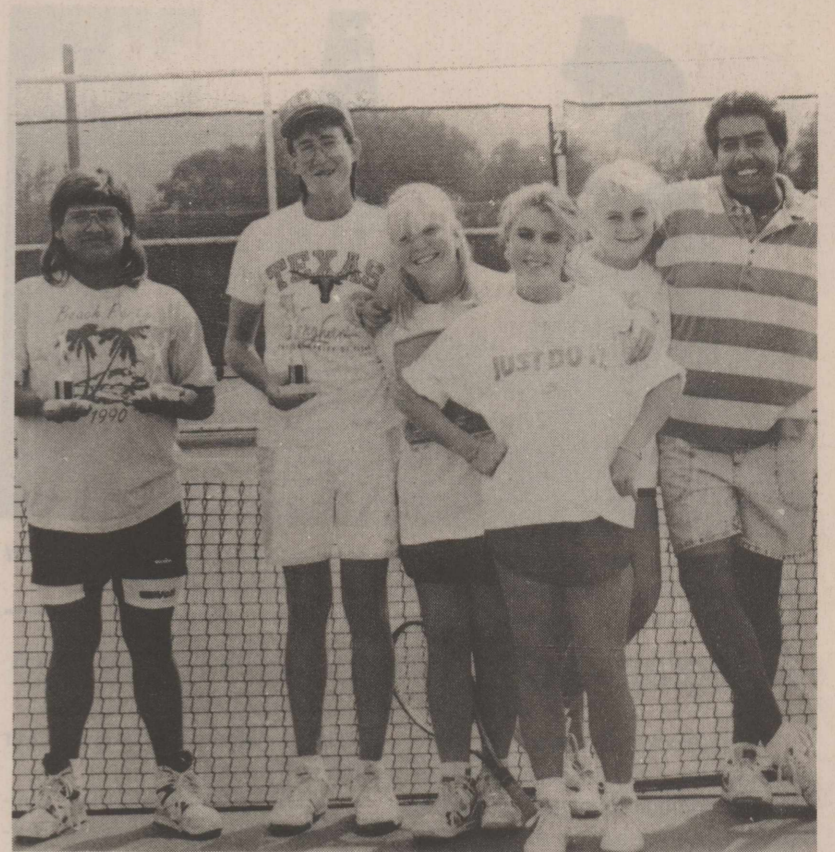

Crockett County Public Library News

"Students have no need to understand life in a black ghetto." So Claude Brown's *Manchild in the Promised Land* was challenged at a high school in Oregon. Stephen King's books *Carrie* and *The Shining* were removed from libraries in Iowa and Washington. *Death of a Salesman* was deemed "junk" in Kentucky. And in Florida, 64 works of literature were banned from the schools, including *A Farewell to Arms*, *The Red Badge of Courage*, *Lost Horizon*, *Hamlet*, *King Lear*, and *Wuthering Heights*.

Books like these, challenged or banned on similar grounds during the past year, will be displayed at Crockett County Public Library during national Banned Books Week 1990 - Celebrating the Freedom to Read Sept. 24-28. Most of these books are well known but are considered dangerous or objectionable by individuals or groups who would deny others access to them.

Other books challenged recently are F. Scott Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby* for "language and sexual references", Glenn M. Linden's *A History of Our American Republic* because it promotes the "religion of secular humanism", John Steinbeck's *Of Mice and Men* for "profanity" and Jeremy Kingston's *Witches and Witch-*

craft because "young or immature minds may become intrigued by Satan".

CCPL is participating in Banned Books Week 1990 - Celebrating the Freedom to Read, which is sponsored by the American Library Association, the American Booksellers Association, the Association of American Publishers, the American Society of Journalists and Authors, and the National Association of College Stores. It is endorsed by The Center for the Book of The Library of Congress. The sponsoring organizations believe that most would-be book banners act with what they consider to be the highest motives - protecting themselves, their families and communities from perceived injustices and evils and preserving the values and ideals they would have the entire society embrace. The result, however, is always and ever the denial of another's right to read. CCPL believes that Americans support our basic right to read guaranteed in the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Reading your baby's personality

Is your baby "easy", "difficult" or "slow to warm up"? How you describe your infant may provide clues to later personality characteristics.

Researchers are discovering that basic personality type is apparent from birth or shortly after. Although there's much debate regarding the emotional expression of newborn infants, there's general agreement that the behavior of newborns is not merely a system of reflexes as once thought.

Newborn infants are not only acted upon by their environments, but they also act upon their environment. A growing body of research indicates that differences in newborns are apparent from the moment of birth. Three basic personality types have been identified.

First, easy babies exhibit positive moods, are regular in their bodily functions, are adaptable, and are open to new situations. Parents can be flexible in their approaches to child rearing and receive a favorable response from their "easy-going" baby.

Second, difficult children are generally negative and have intense reactions to new experiences. They are slow to adapt, are irregular in bodily functions, and tend to withdraw from new situations. Caregivers need to be consistent, patient, nonpunitive and objective in their childrearing approaches. Parents of difficult babies need to recognize the need for unusually painstaking handling of their infant.

Third, the slow-to-warm-up child is slow to adapt and therefore likely to withdraw from new situations. He wants to "survey the scene" before he enters into the activity. Parents need to respect his style and allow him to adapt at his own pace.

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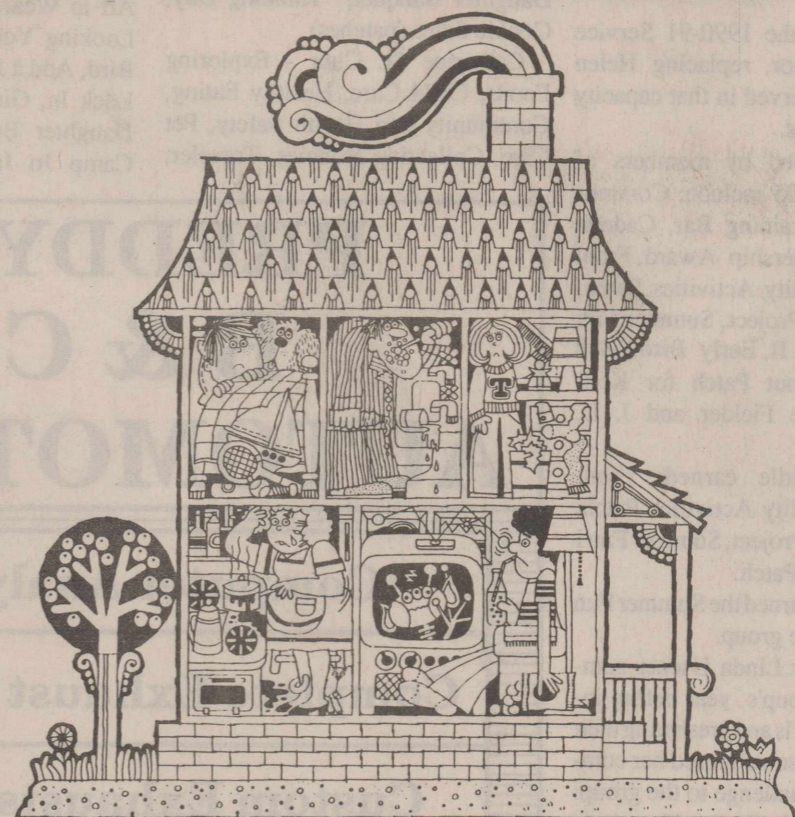

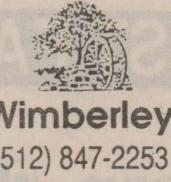
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
