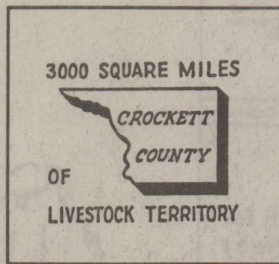

Davidson and Miller honored as outstanding conservation ranchers

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District recently honored Charles Davidson III and Pierce Miller as the outstanding Conservation Ranchers for 1991 at an awards banquet in San Angelo.

Charlie was selected by the local district as the outstanding resident rancher while Pierce was the outstanding rancher in the absentee category.

Charlie has carried out an excellent overall program throughout the years he has been ranching. A combination of cattle, sheep and goats used to get the most efficient utilization of existing forages. Range improvement has been achieved through proper stocking, rest, controlling unwanted brush species and by maintaining a great deal of flexibility in his ranching operation.

Brush control has been carried out in selected areas of dense stands of mesquite, cedar and pricklypear. Aerial spraying for mesquite and

pricklypear control began the early 1970's. Treedozing of mesquite and cedar have also been carried out on a large scale to reduce competition of moisture. He has initiated a re-treatment program by individual plant treatment to control re-growth of mesquite, cedar and pricklypear. Control by farm tractor mounted hydraulic grubber and plow and hand spraying area the techniques which have been used with tremendous success. Treated areas have been systematically deferred to allow sufficient rest for desirable plants.

Charlie has also installed several miles of livestock water pipelines, water storage facilities and troughs to facilitate his grazing program. He is well aware of the importance of well executed conservation practices to the maintenance and improvement of our rangelands. He has served 15 years on the Crockett Soil and Water Conser-

Juveniles detained in Emerald House vandalism case

Sheriff's deputies detained three Ozona Anglo juveniles March 26 and charged them with vandalism at the Emerald House. A 15-year-old boy, 15-year-old girl and an 11-year-old girl were detained by officers after the investigation led to their identities.

Crockett County juvenile authorities released the youths into the custody of their parents pending the out-

come of a hearing in Crockett County Juvenile Court.

Discovery of a break-in at the historic building in fairgrounds park was made March 16. Entry to the structure was made by breaking a back window. Broken dishes and lights, and spray painted walls and pictures were included in the damage.

The damage has been assessed at \$2,850 by an insurance adjustor.

New trash service begins April 1

Pack Rat Services Inc. will take over trash collection in Ozona April 1 as scheduled.

Representatives of the company spent several days last week placing containers throughout town. Containers are being placed where trash barrels are when possible. Some of the new containers may be across the street or across the alley.

Residential trash will be picked up once a week on the same day as usual for now. Some schedule adjustment may be necessary later.

All residential trash should be placed in plastic bags and tied. This will keep the containers much cleaner and more sanitary.

Yard trash is not to be placed in the containers. Leaves and limbs will be picked up by the water district as usual.

Other items not to be placed in the containers are: tires, batteries, dead animals, cans with paint or any other flammable liquid or solid. No ashes

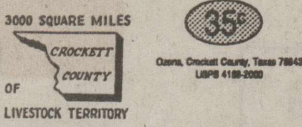
The soldiers are coming to Ft. Lancaster

NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK

To rally public support on behalf of libraries, librarians and the Right To Know, the American Library Association has launched a "Call for America's Libraries" campaign. The campaign aims to stimulate public interest in and support for all types of libraries, and to generate names (and numbers) of library supporters that can be used to impress key congressional leaders come ALA Legislative Day on April 7.

"Numbers count," explained ALA President Patricia Glass Schuman. "It's time to show the policymakers who spend our tax dollars that Americans value library services and want to see them fully supported."

A toll-free 800 telephone number, 800-530-8888, will allow members of the public to "Say Yes To Your Right to Know!" and to register their support for libraries. The number will be in operation from March 16 through National Library Week, April 5-11. "The 800 number will give everyone who loves and appreciates libraries and librarians a chance to stand up and be counted," Schuman said.

ALA President Patricia Glass Schuman answers some questions about the National Library Week campaign. (Why is this campaign important?) The "Call for America's Libraries" campaign is an opportunity to tell our story, to talk about the value of libraries and librarians and important Right to Know issues facing not just our profession, but our society. (What are the Right to Know issues?) Library support is certainly the major one. We have an "education President" who has practically zeroed

libraries out of the federal budget. As always during a depressed economy, we are getting reports that library use is on the rise. You can't exercise your right to know if your library is closed. Other issues are censorship, illiteracy and less access to government information. You can't exercise your right to know if you don't know how to read, or if someone else is telling you what you can or can't read.

How will the 800 number work?

The 800 number will be in operation through National Library Week, April 5-11. Callers will be asked to endorse a statement of support, and they'll receive a brochure with tips on how they can support their libraries. Names and addresses of callers will be collected and processed by congressional district. Names will be forwarded (with permission) to key congressional leaders along with a statement of support for America's libraries. If every school, public and college library generates one call, that will be more than 100,000 calls - a significant number that will help demonstrate the extent of public support for America's libraries.

CCPL will be celebrating National Library Week during April 6-10, 1992. Please exercise Your Right To Know and call the 800 number to show your support for libraries. 800-530-8888. This free call will have long-range good effects for our libraries and we appreciate your support. To show our appreciation, CCPL will have an Amnesty Week during NLW and all overdue books returned will have free fines. Take advantage of Free Fines Week and get those overdue books back to the library. Come check out our new books arriving daily.

vation District Board. Charlie has promoted the wise use of resources through his stint as a director and also by example through his conservation accomplishments on the ranch.

Pierce Miller operates approximately 29,000 acres of rangeland in Crockett County under the ranching interest name of VIP Livestock. His knowledge and skill have allowed him to carry out a very successful operation.

Pierce runs a combination of cattle, sheep and goats on the ranch to diversify the grazing and to average the highs and lows of the livestock market. Brush management has been done to better utilize rainfall, improve ease of working livestock and to improve wildlife habitat.

Pierce is a firm believer in proper grazing use for the improvement of range condition. To assist with range improvement, he initiated several grazing systems. Approximately 15 miles of electric fence has been installed for the implementation of a rapid rotation grazing program. Several deferred rotation systems and switchback systems are also used to enhance range improvement. With the initiation of these systems, range trend is steadily on the increase, providing excellent protection from soil erosion. With the implementation of various grazing systems, more flexibility is built into the ranching operation.

Pierce has been very active in the wool and mohair industry. He is the past president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and is now serving as secretary/treasurer of the American Sheep Industry Association.

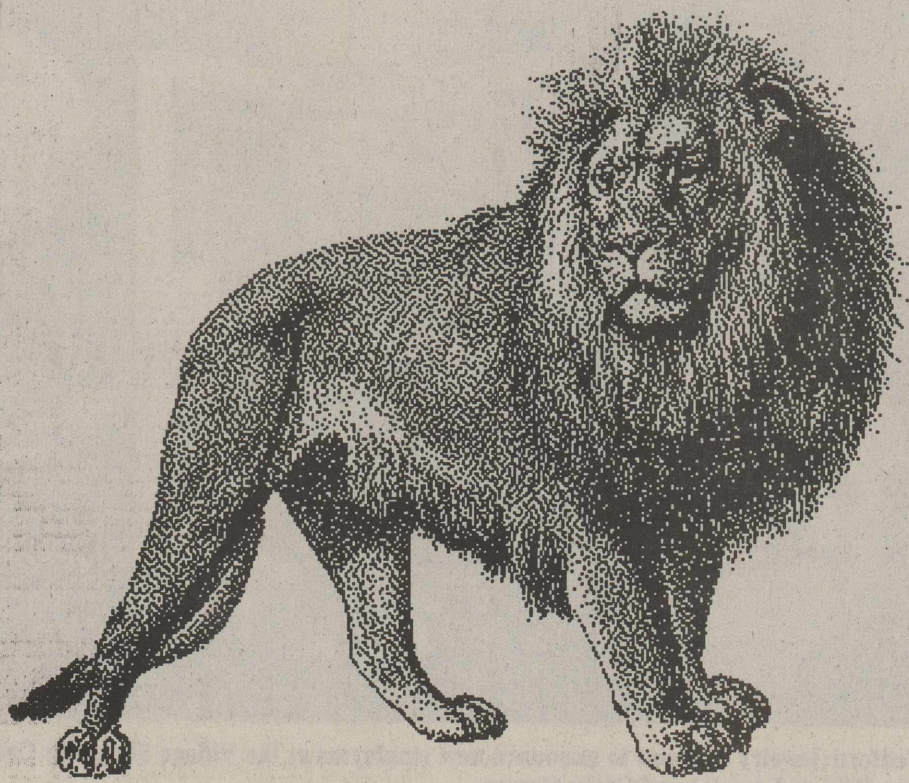

Players are divided into three doubles teams and six singles players.

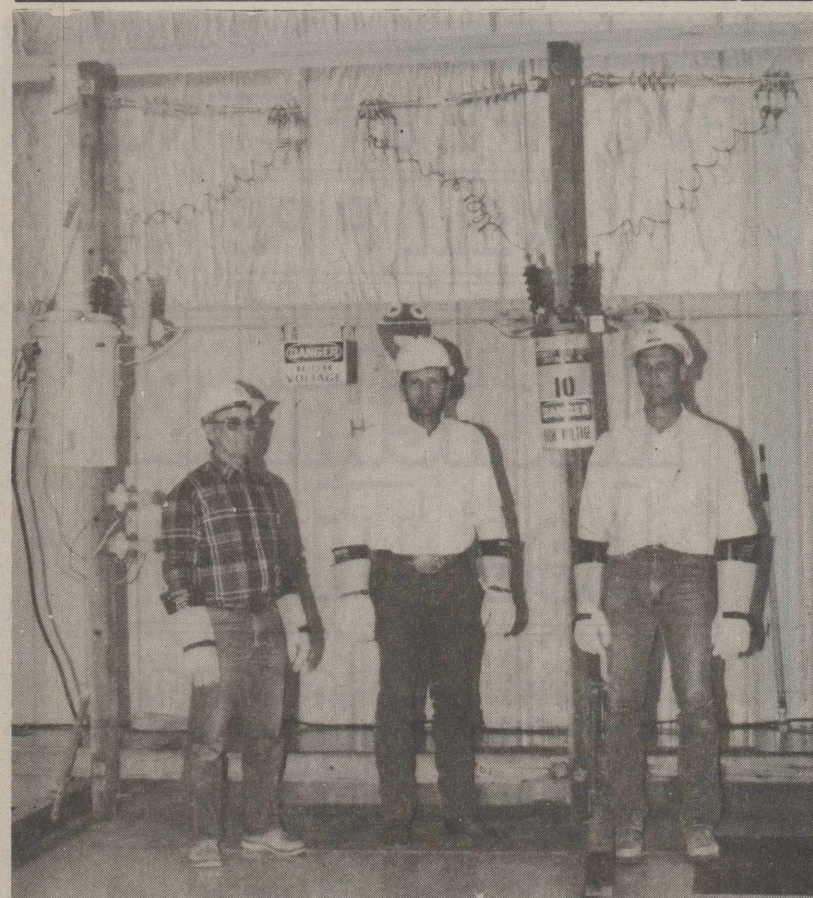

Brian Mendez of Ozona was fourth with 64.72. Paul Perner finished sixth with 66.66.

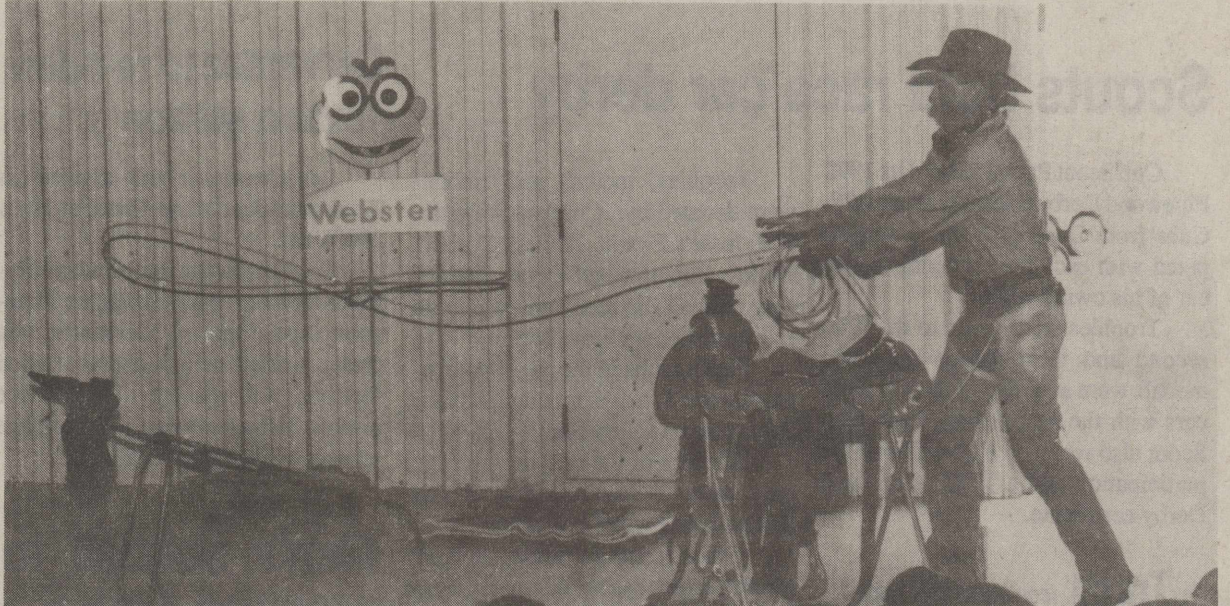
Browne also placed first in the pole vault with a nine foot leap. He was fourth in the triple jump with 32'2".

You may take your large items to the disposal site between 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. This is a tentative schedule. Hours will be adjusted later as needed.

Commercial trash will be picked up three times a week. All commercial trash that is uncooked food, produce or scraps should be in tied plastic bags. All boxes must be cut flat due to the container size.

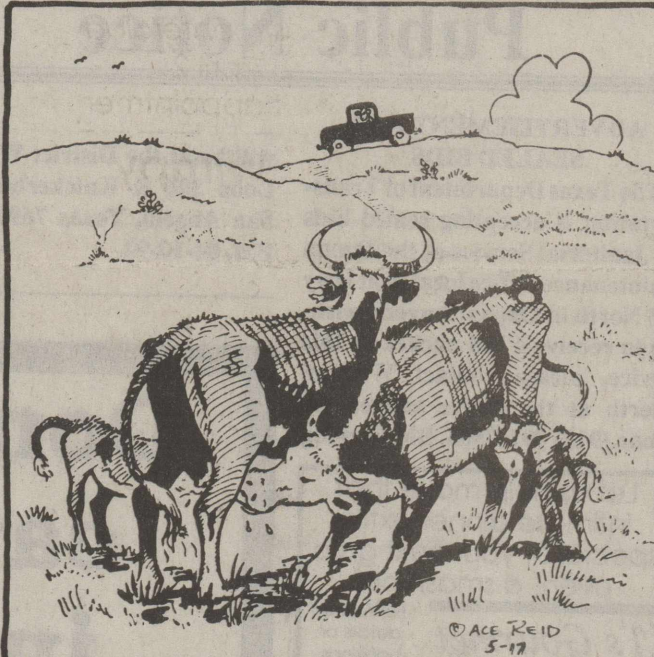
