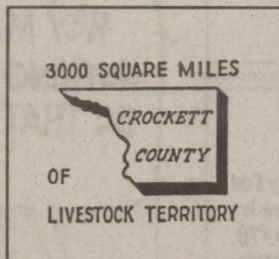

## Hospital/care center administrator resigns

Bob Denson announced his resignation as administrator of Crockett County Hospital and Care Center Thursday night during an executive session of the board. The resignation is effective June 5, but that date is flexible, Denson said.

Denson's 18-month contract expires June 20, 1992. The care center can operate under his license for 60 days from the date of departure, Denson said.

The board took no formal action on the resignation, but did vote to add Diane Schwertner to the permanent personnel committee. Mrs. Schwertner, herself a surgical nurse, replaces John Daniels whose term expired early this year. Other committee members are Mrs. Gries and Concha Zapata, Dr. Robert Owensby, Dr. Marcus Sims and the administrator.

Plans to conduct a community health care survey to evaluate and determine the direction the hospital and care center should go are on schedule, Denson told the board early in the meeting. No report was available at press time on a May 12 town meeting to discuss health care.

Roof replacement and construction of an EMS ambulance building were items voted on by the board.

Members voted to have Denson get resumes, references and prices from architects for roof replacement.

Directors voted to accept an amended bid from Kenny Wood Construction Company of Junction for the EMS building contingent upon

the donation of 10 yards of cement from another source. On the recommendation of Denson, the board voted to have Mrs. Gries be project director for the building.

A recent Medicaid re-survey removed all deficiencies from the nursing home, Denson said. A life safety code re-inspection will be requested now that the automatic dialer for the fire alarm system is in place.

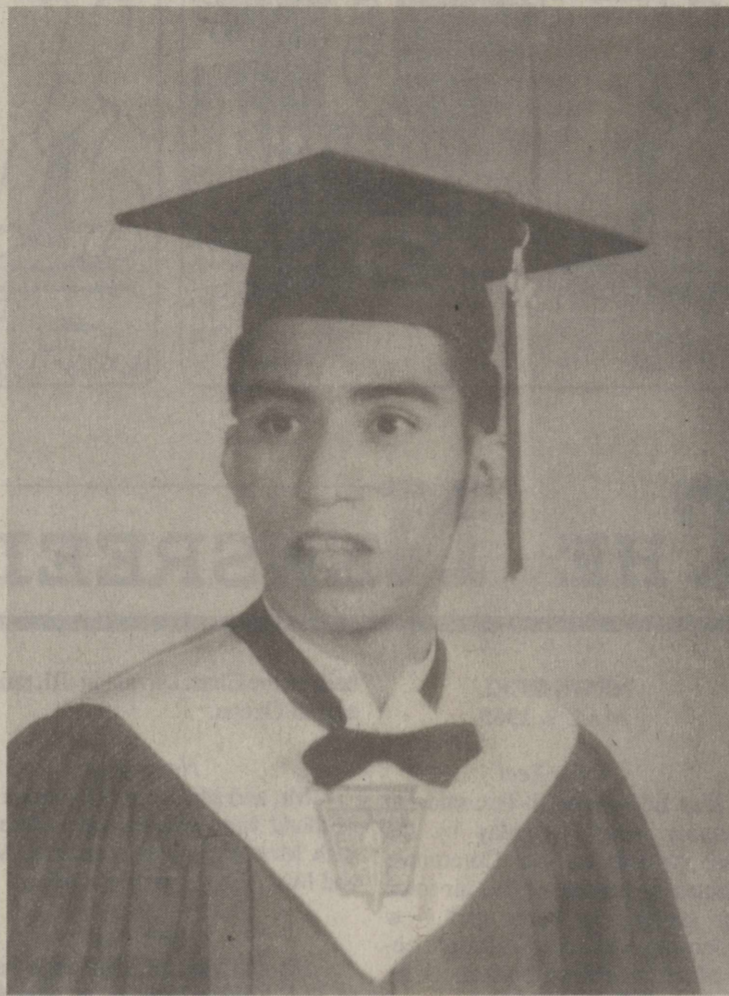
John Nolan of San Antonio, a representative of Transworld Systems Inc., made a presentation for the "accounts receivable management firm". An initial study indicates \$590,000 on the books, Nolan said. No action was taken to retain the firm.

The board discussed physician recruiting, using grant money. Funds allocated for recruiting this year will be lost if not used by September.

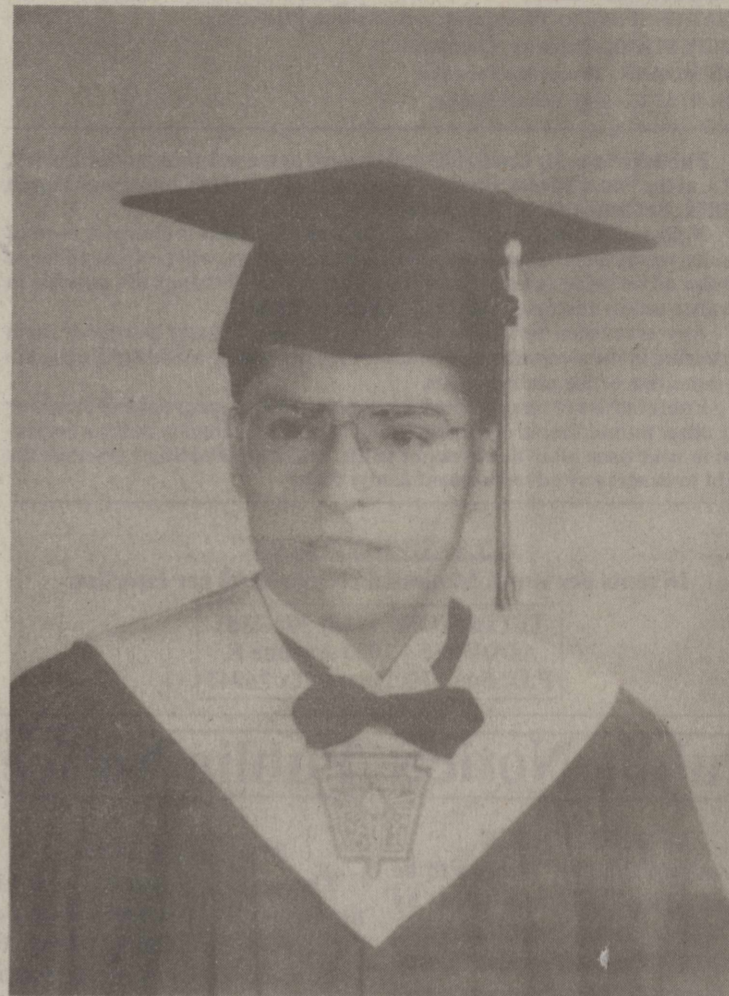
Education committee chairman Concha Zapata reported that she has two scholarship applications to be considered.

Judge Kathryn Mayfield urged board members to communicate with legislators to protest a Texas Department of Health rule under consideration which would require EMS personnel to train at accredited schools. There would be only four in the state, with Lubbock the nearest to Ozona.

During the financial report, Denson said the hospital was \$19,300 over budget for April and the care center \$33,800 over budget for the month.

## Purse in lost-and-found box linked to missing Copperas Cove woman

A purse in the lost and found box at Crockett County Jail may offer clues in the disappearance of a Copperas Cove woman missing since April 25, 1988. The handbag was discovered among items being sorted during preparation for the May 16 Lions Club auction, said Chief Deputy Alton Davis.

When Davis opened the bag, he found a driver's license, social security card, checkbook and military dependent's card. In attempts to locate the owner through the Department of Public Safety, Davis was directed to Copperas Cove where 20-year-old Elizabeth Ann Campbell had been listed as missing.

The handbag has been turned over to Copperas Cove officers and will be examined by forensics experts in an

attempt to develop clues in the case.

No one who worked for the Crockett County Sheriff's Department in 1988 remembers the purse. Prior to January 1989, such items were not labeled when they were brought to the office, Davis said.

Anyone with any information about a maroon shoulderstrap bag which was turned over to the department between April 25, 1988, and Jan. 1, 1989, is asked to contact the office.

Miss Campbell has been the subject of two Unsolved Mysteries television programs and was featured on America's Most Wanted once. Her photograph, other vital information and a picture of the handbag appear elsewhere in this issue of The Stockman.

## Davidson awarded regional honor

Charles Davidson III was honored as outstanding Conservation Rancher at an awards ceremony in San Angelo on May 5.

The awards program was sponsored by the State Soil and Water Conservation Districts in region II of which Crockett County is a part. There are 44 districts and 42 counties in Region II ranging from the Hill Country westward to El Paso. A brief slide program of all the winners with voice narration by Roddy Peoples (Voice of Southwest Agriculture) was presented during the banquet.

In March of this year, Davidson was recognized as the 1991 outstanding resident conservation rancher in the county by the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District. His accomplishments have not gone un-

noticed as the Region II selection committee voted him as resident rancher runner-up for the 42 county area.

Davidson is well aware of the importance of well executed conservation practices to the maintenance and improvement of rangelands. He has served 15 years on the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District Board and has promoted the wise use of resources through his stint as a director and also by example through his conservation accomplishments on the ranch.

"The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District would like to congratulate Charlie and wife, Jo, for this honor and for their dedication in conserving and improving our valuable range resources," said Vaden Aldridge, district conservationist.

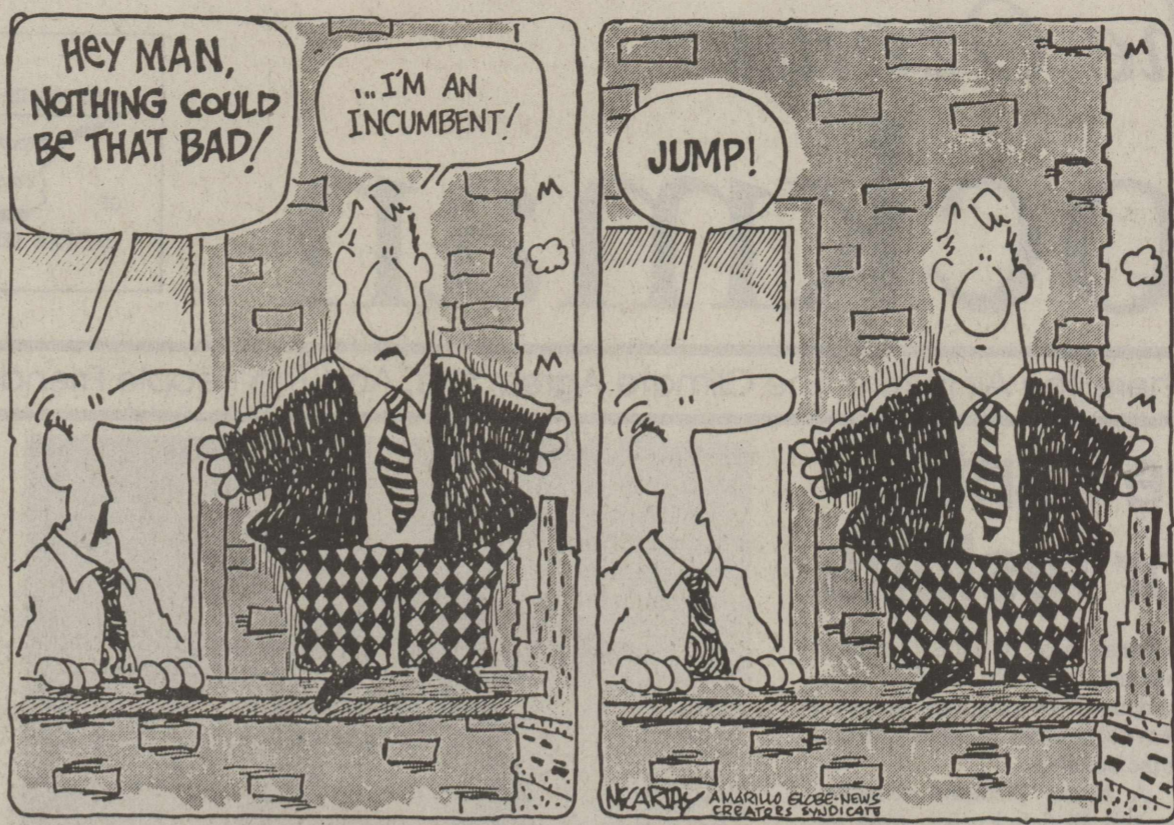

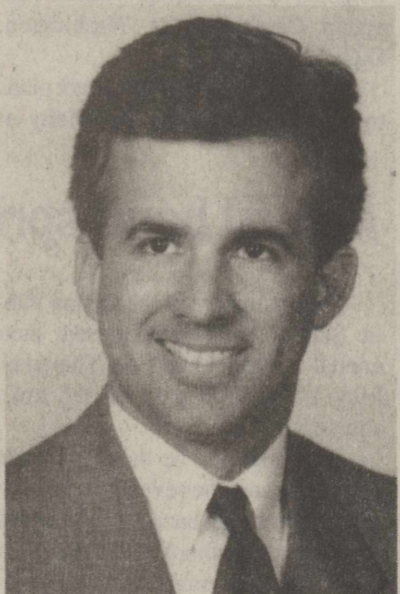

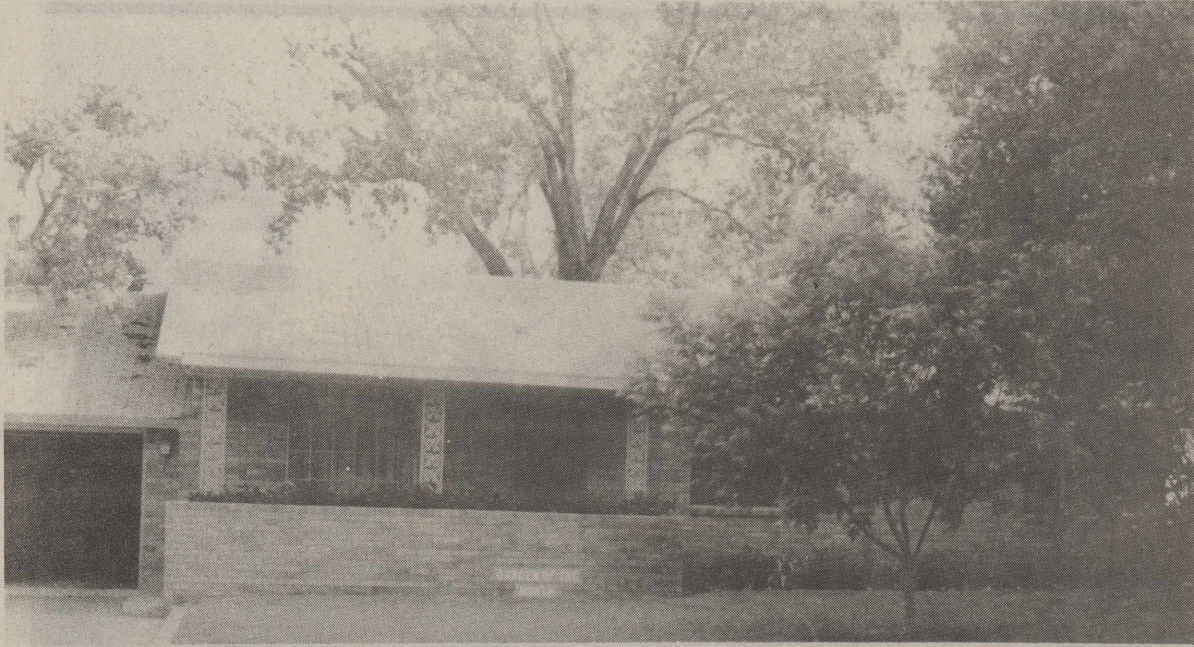

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## Easter Christians

"What God promised the fathers He has fulfilled for us, their children, by raising Jesus" Acts 13:32-33 (NET)

We sometimes speak of Easter Christians as those who attend Church in all their finery on Easter Sunday but then usually stay away until Easter rolls around again. A vaccination is an injection that gives a person a mild form of a disease. That in turn causes the blood to build up antibodies to fight against the disease, which immunizes the body against the real thing. Many people today want a mild case of Christianity in order to protect them against the real thing - ie, they want enough of Christ to get them into Heaven, but not enough to change their lives. So they come to Church at special times like Easter for a booster shot. But there is no such vaccination for salvation! Instead, Jesus Christ

calls each and every one to take up our cross and follow Him - into serving others in His name.

Of course, these aren't they only Easter Christians. Some of us who attend church regularly give thought to Christ risen from the dead only at Easter times, and then let this truth lie forgotten the rest of the year. The Apostle Paul knew the importance of always keeping Jesus' resurrection in mind. From experience he knew how that fact had repeatedly filled him with courage to face life's trials and with strength to bear life's burdens. To a young assistant named Timothy, who was taking upon himself the office of a minister, he wrote: "Keep in mind Jesus Christ risen from the dead, a descendant of David - this is the good news I tell" (2 Timothy 2:8-AAT). And again Paul reminds the church at Corinth: "If Christ didn't rise, our preaching means nothing and your

faith means nothing . . . But now Christ DID rise from the dead, the first fruits of those who are sleeping in their graves. Since a man brought death, a Man also brought the Resurrection of the dead. As in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive". (1 Corinthians 15:14,20-22)

We do well to remember at all times that Jesus Christ was raised from the dead, lives forever, and rules this Universe with the Father and the Holy Spirit for the sake of His people. Daily clinging to this Truth by faith will take the tension out of our lives and remove all frustrations - to make living an unending triumph, now and forever.

## Commissioners terminate airport consultants

Commissioners voted Monday to terminate their association with the firm charged with drawing up a master plan for Ozona Municipal Airport. The plan West Texas Consultants was to prepare was being paid for through grant funds. Grant money already expended on the project will not have to be repaid, according to Fred Deaton, commissioner.

Deterioration of the runway may require part of the highway paving

allocation to be used at the airport until grant funding is approved and available for construction.

Court members voted to enter a contract with the Texas Department of Community Affairs to obtain rental assistance funding for residents. The HUD program must be approved by the county before the Section 8 certificates can be issued.

Commissioners approved: the Sheriff's Department surplus property list of items to be auctioned, a new

roof for the fire station, amendments to the budget, authorized the judge to engage an independent auditor for the annual county audit.

Reports were heard from: Bob Denson, hospital and care center administrator; Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent; Garland Young, civic and youth center; and Sheriff Jim Wilson. Judge Kathryn Mayfield read the report from Helping Hands for the Elderly.

## Silver Haired Legislature absentee balloting continues

Absentee balloting will continue through May 22, 1992, for the fourth Texas Silver Haired Legislature election throughout the Concho Valley. Four representatives will be selected from the 13 county region. Absentee ballots are available at designated polling places and from the Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging located at 4860 Knickerbocker Road.

Candidates for the two Tom Green County spots include Bryan Lane and Cooper Rutherford.

The sole candidate for the Southern legislator spot is Troy Williams of Ozona. The Southern region consists of Crockett, Kimble, Mason, Menard, Schleicher, and Sutton Counties.

Leo Kilmer is running for the Northern representative position. The six counties comprising the Northern region are Coke, Concho, Irion, McCulloch, Reagan, and Sterling.

The Fourth Silver Haired Legislature will meet in Austin in August, 1992, for an orientation and training session followed in September, 1992 with the official legislative session. During that session, the TSHL will consider and vote on proposed legislation that concerns the needs of older Texans.

The Silver Haired Legislature election will be conducted May 22, 1992. To be eligible to vote in the election, a person must be 60 or over, a registered voter and reside in the Concho Valley region.

## Looking to broccoli to help reduce cancer

Ready to join the broccoli bandwagon? Despite President Bush's negatives views on the taste benefits of this vegetable, it's a food that has found increasing popularity with the general public. Statistics show broccoli consumption has grown by some 800 percent between 1970 and 1989.

Scientists are paying more and more attention to broccoli, too, as new research indicates it may be a strong potential cancer fighter. Studies by Dr. Paul Talalay, a researcher with Johns Hopkins University, identified the chemical sulforaphane in broccoli as the element which appears to give broccoli its anti-cancer punch.

Researchers have known for some time that the family of cruciferous vegetables, which also includes cabbage, cauliflower, brussel sprouts, kale, turnips and others, seem to have the ability to reduce cancer risk.

For a number of years the advice from health organizations, such as the American Institute for Cancer Research, has been to increase consumption of fruits, vegetables and whole grains, while limiting the amount of fat in the diet. Current recommendations are that a healthy diet would include at least five half-cup servings of a variety of fruits and vegetables each day.

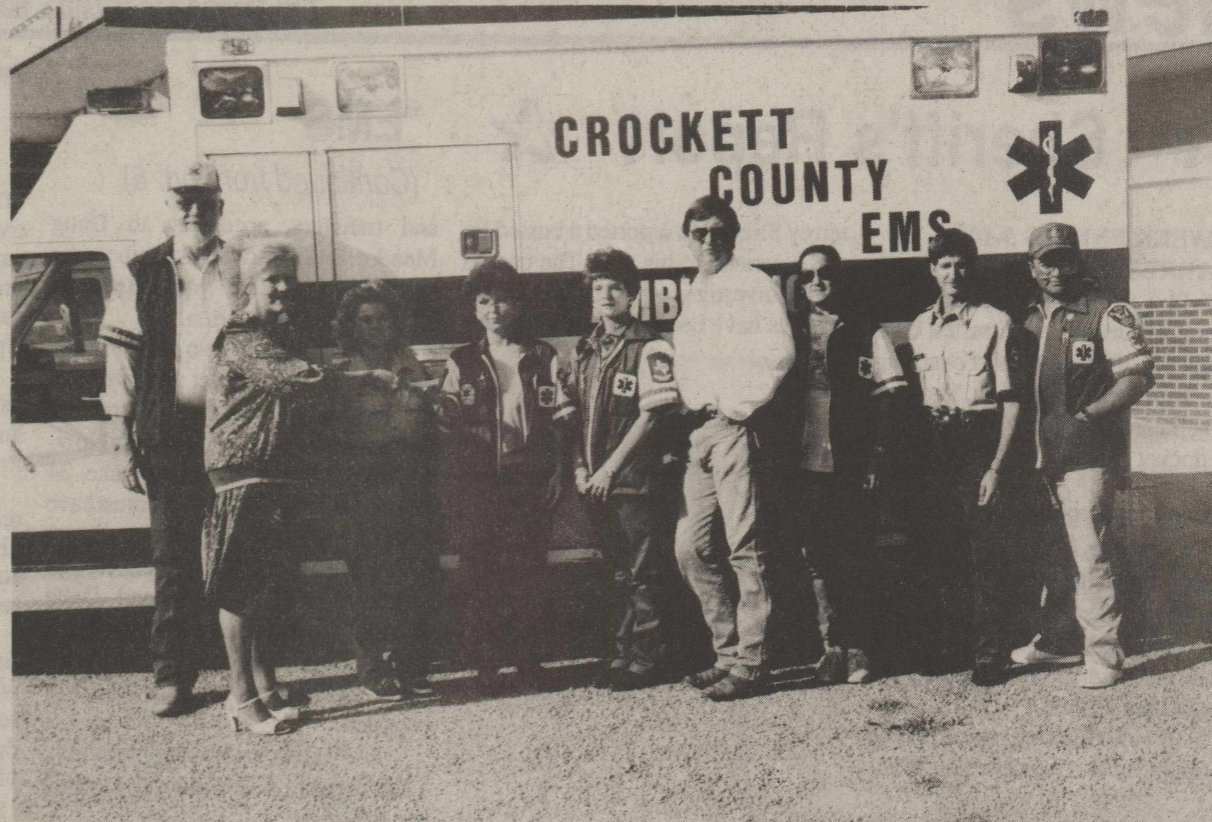

To help Texas citizens to know what to do in a medical emergency and to recognize the lifesaving efforts of emergency medical services personnel, Governor Ann Richards proclaimed May 10 through 16, 1992, as Texas Emergency Medical Services Week.

"Almost everyone has witnessed an emergency at some time," said Doug Meador, ambulance coordinator, "but not everyone knows what to do." Everyone needs to know that if they witness an automobile crash, the injured victims should be left in the vehicle until EMS arrives unless the danger of fire or an explosion exists.

"We are trained to remove victims from car crashes without further injury to an injured neck or spin," said Meador. Also, said Meador, if you stop at a motor vehicle crash, do not park your vehicle directly behind the wrecked vehicles, but pull in front of the crash site and park approximately 50 yards ahead.

In Crockett County from April 1991 to April 1992 there were 235 ambulance runs made with 144 transfers to hospitals in San Angelo. Taking care of the patients aboard were never less than two volunteering EMTs (Emergency Medical Technicians) and a volunteering driver.

Nearly one out of three Americans will visit an emergency department this year. In fact, the number of emergency department visits—an important measure of EMS utilization—continues to rise dramatically, from under 66 million visits in 1973 to more than 90 million in 1990, according to the American Hospital Association.

Prehospital care didn't surface as a national concern until the 1960's.

Prior to that, the victim of a medical emergency didn't receive much medical assistance, other than transportation to the hospital. Often staffed only by a driver, ambulance services at that time offered little in the way of lifesaving care. Hospitals were not set up to treat life-threatening emergencies. Emergency rooms did not have trained medical staff or equipment available on a round-the-clock basis to treat serious illnesses or injuries.

Although the first recorded ambulances date back to the Crusades, the first actual prehospital care was created during the Napoleonic Wars in 1792 when the first field care and the first air evacuation—by hot air balloon—occurred. It is not surprising that many of the concepts of modern EMS were introduced by military medicine in Korea and Vietnam. The lifesaving benefits of rapid field evacuation and paramedics, and medical advances in stabilization and resuscitation, were proven as a result of the medical care provided to troops.

In 1966 the National Research Council published a report that concluded that more than 50,000 Americans died as a result of traffic accidents. This report established EMS as a national priority. The U.S. Department of Transportation began the development of national standard curricula for Emergency Medical Technicians which became the nucleus for forming EMS systems nationwide.

In 1973, the Emergency Medical Services Systems (EMSS) Act designated federal dollars for the development of regional EMS systems. Specific requirements outlined by this Act—training and certification, inter-agency cooperation, equipment development, communications, and public education are recognized today as the key elements of effective EMS.

Individuals involved in EMS—whether career or volunteer—commit to anywhere from 40 to 1,000 hours of training initially, and years of continuing education, as part of their professional commitment as providers of quality patient care.

Approximately 60% of the more than 750,000 emergency medical providers in the United States are volunteers. Today 60-80% of the 34,000 fire departments in the United States provide EMS to the citizens they serve.

If you are in an accident or have an illness which involves an ambulance run, you will ordinarily be accompanied to the local hospital or to a San Angelo hospital by two EMTs and a driver. Depending on the severity of the illness/accident a nurse or a doctor will also go along.

Ozona is fortunate to have 15 EMTs who serve the community and five drivers who volunteer for runs

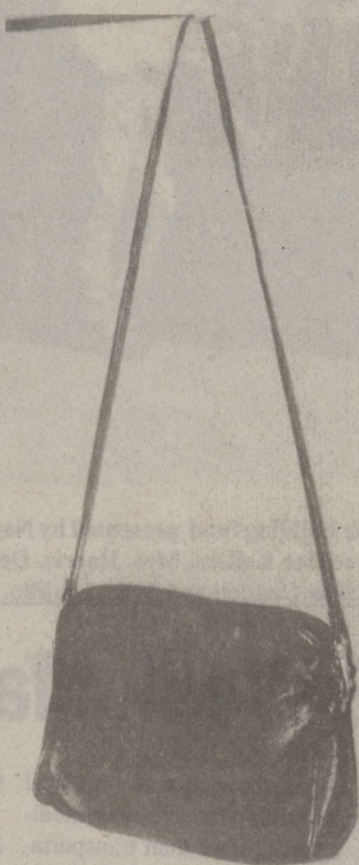

and transfers, according to Doug Meador, EMT/Paramedic. To become certified as an EMT you must take 120 hours of instruction.

Ozona also has two persons who are qualified to instruct and two who are certified to examine. Instructors are Sandra Gonzales and Tasha Nowell who were required to take 24 additional hours. Examiners must have eight hours additional training to test EMT candidates. Qualifying in that area are Doug Meador and Della Moore. Doug Meador also is classified as a paramedic. He has more than 500 hour invested in the EMS program.

EMT's receive no compensation. They perform their duties as a public service only.

## Tim Scott new with probation office

Crockett County's new probation officer, Tim Scott, is part of a relatively new program in the state. In his capacity as intensive supervision probation officer, Scott will manage cases in Crockett, Sutton, Reagan and Upton counties.

There is an intensive supervision probation officer in Pecos County and another who works Jeff Davis, Presidio and Brewster counties.

Scott's work is mostly with felony probationers. He estimates 22 of his current 25 cases result from substance abuse. Most crimes are drug rather than alcohol related, Scott said.

Probationers under intensive supervision must see Scott once a week in his office. He is required to see each probationer a second time during the week at their home or place of work.

Scott prefers working in a small town to a large city where there is little opportunity to do more than process probationers like so many numbers.

"I'm there (for the probationers) if they have any problems," said Scott. He encourages those under his supervision to contact him at any time.

This job is not all that different from previous work where he dealt with three or four-time offenders. Before starting in Ozona on April 1, Scott had worked as a parole officer for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice in San Antonio. He was employed with a firm that did legal investigation immediately before moving here.

A native of San Antonio, Scott understands smaller towns from spending several years in Comanche. He earned a bachelor of business administration degree from Sul Ross State University at Alpine in 1982. He also graduated from John Marshall Law School, now part of Georgia State University in Atlanta.

Scott then returned to Alpine to work for the U. S. Magistrate's Office for 3 1/2 years. He was also in the Air Force Reserves and served six months on active duty.

## Don't confuse reporting requirements of IRS and SS

Anyone who receives Social Security benefits and who continues to work has to report his or her earnings to two government agencies - the Social Security Administration (SSA) and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Earnings must be reported to IRS for tax purposes and to SSA because they may affect the amount of benefits payable.

"The fact that both SSA and IRS have an April 15th filing date apparently causes some confusion about the need to file both reports," said Edwin Draughon, assistant district manager.

"Sometimes, Social Security beneficiaries think filing an income tax return takes care of the Social

Security earnings report requirement," he said. "And while the IRS does share tax return information with SSA, the tax return does not provide all the information that SSA needs."

A second confusing area, according to IRS officials, occurs when Social Security beneficiaries think that they do not need to file a tax return if their income is under the Social Security earnings limit - in 1991, \$9,720 for people 65 through 69, \$7,080 for people under 65. But there is no connection between the Social Security earnings limits and the requirement to file an income tax return.

A third confusing area arises when

Social Security beneficiaries request an extension of the filing date for their income tax return and assume that they will also get an extension of the filing date for their Social Security earnings report.

"Again, the two reports to our two agencies are not related," said Draughon. "And any action taken by one agency does not affect what is required by the other. However, we always try to do all we can to clear up this confusion, and anyone with a question can call Social Security's national toll-free number of 1-800-772-1213 or call our office at 949-4608.

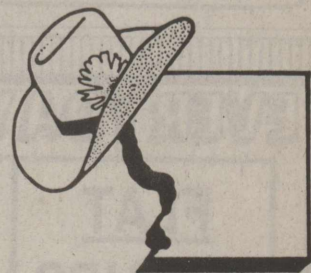

## Texas ASCS leads the way in improving environment

The Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) is the principal and most widely used program through which the federal government assists farmers and ranchers in carrying out needed conservation practices. The ACP, administered by the Crockett County Office of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), was the first conservation program involving the federal government in every agricultural county in the country. The ACP is a joint effort between agricultural producers, Federal and State agencies, and other conservation groups to restore and protect the Nation's land and water resources and to preserve the environment. This public/private partnership leads the way in government programs by making efficient use of government funds so that everyone benefits.

Donnie G. Bowman, State Executive Director of the Texas ASCS, stated, "The ACP is a public/private partnership designed to protect the environment by reducing soil erosion and improving water quality. All Americans benefit from the wise use of public funds to protect the environment."

Bowman further stated, "The program in Texas has been very successful. For every \$1.00 spent by the government, farmers spent an average \$1.06 of their funds to carry out conservation practices and agreed to maintain the practice from five to 10 years."

During 1991 the ASCS cost-shared \$15,306 under the annual ACP and under special long term agreements on almost 10,000 separate farms in 237 Texas counties. The practices were carried out to solve severe erosion, water quality, and water conservation problems that affected farmland and rangeland across the state.

According to Bowman, ACP practices applied in Texas during 1991 resulted in an annual soil savings of 4,286,676 tons at an average cost of

\$1.48 per ton of soil saved. This soil would have polluted Texas rivers and lakes or blown into Texas skies and destroyed the productivity of the land.

In Crockett County under the "continuing" sign up provision, producers may apply for cost sharing to

do conservation work at any time throughout the year. Practices available to county producers include brush controls livestock water wells, pipelines, water storage tanks, and cross fencing. Application may be made by coming to the ASCS office.

## Texas Wildlife Expo '92 poster deadline draws near

The deadline for submitting entries to the Texas Wildlife Expo '92 essay and poster contest is June 1.

Texas Wildlife Expo '92, scheduled for October 2-3 at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department headquarters in Austin, will celebrate the legacy of hunting and the role hunters have played in conservation efforts in the state.

The essay contest is open to students in seventh grade through college—a winner will be named in each grade class. Essays must be 500-1,000 words on any hunting related topic. Possible topics include the traditions of hunting in Texas, the role of sportsmen as conservationists, the future of wildlife management, family traditions in hunting, hunting in the 21st century, the value of hunter edu-

cation, hunting and outdoor ethics and my first hunting trip.

The poster contest is open for kindergarten through 12th grade—a winner will be named in each grade class. Drawings can be on any paper medium with a size not to exceed 36 inches by 36 inches on any outdoor/conservation related topic.

Winners will receive a Texas lifetime combination hunting and fishing license valued at \$800. Winners also will be honored at a banquet as part of the Expo on Oct. 2. Winners will be notified in September.

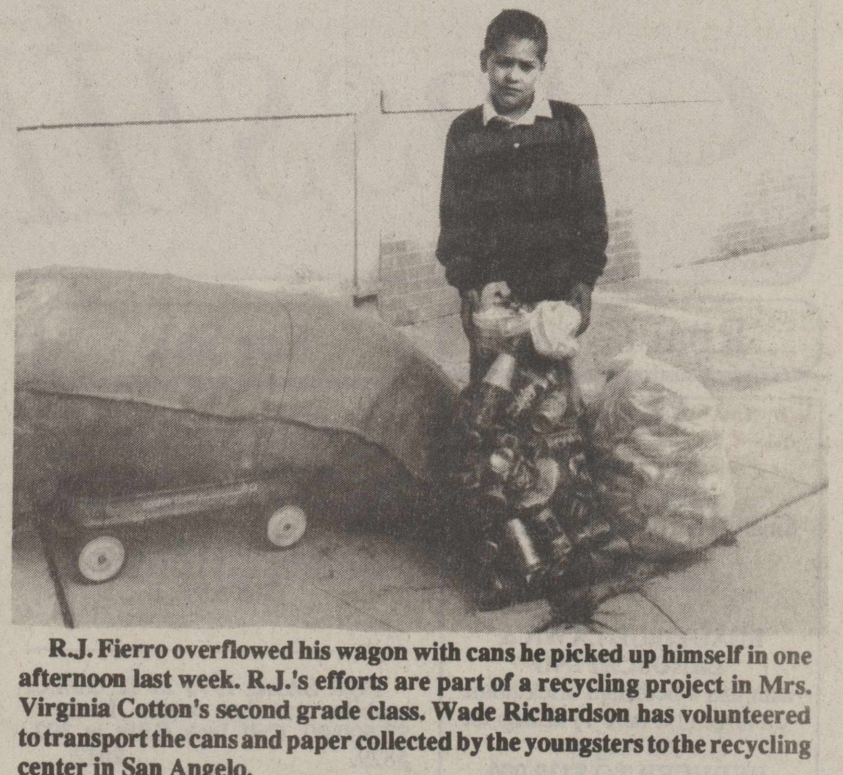
## Mothers honored at tea

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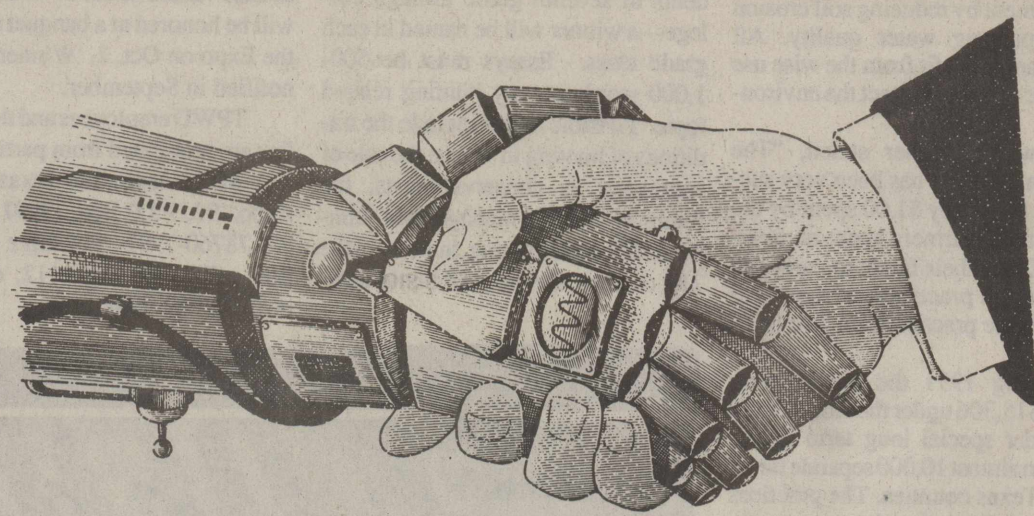
