Bill Willis placed second in the discus throw, and third in the shot put.





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

The advantages of a private always work under a boss or whether you hope to own your own business or farm. Not only does the owner or employer benefit more under private enterprise but the worker or em-

You ask what the word "enterprise" means. It is defined as an undertaking of importance or risk. "Enterprise" is defined as boldness, as energy, as invention. The law dictionary says it is a hazardous undertaking. So, 'private enterprise" simply means a personal , not a public, but a personal undertaking or risk of a business or professional venture. "Private Enterprise" and de-

mocracy go hand in hand. You can hardly have one without the other. So when we talk of our private enterprise system, we are talking about our democratic system of government and our democratic system of economics. In this 1954 topsy-turvy world, there are three distinct systems of government. Broadly speaking, this means that there are three distinct types of economic systems. These three are: the Lee Pool DEMOCRACY or private enterprise type, SOCIALISTIC, and for us to briefly discuss these three systems of government or

economics. "Private Enterprise" means that the individual operates his own business, or his profession, in an undertaking which is most times a risk. But it is an independent venture with little or no interference from a man's government. This is "Private Enterprise" but we will talk more about it later.

Next, we have the SOCIALIST. IC type of government or economics that is between the "Private Enterprise" and Communistic forms. Perhaps it is a middleground. Yet, once a government becomes socialistic, it is easy for it to slip into a totalitarianism, or communistic form of government. In a socialistic form of government or in a system of socialistic economics, individuals are allowed to own only certain businesses. But they are tied down on every hand. In socialism, the government controls and usually owns the banks, the railroads, the mines,

the waterways, the shipping industry, the gas companies, the electric companies, the phone companies, and we could go on and on. In some countries socialism means the direct government control of newspapers, radio, the law profession, the medical profession, etc. There is little left for the individual in a socialistic country. He might run a little shop or he might own a little farm or run some small business. But he can never get very big because the government is standing there ready to take him over if he does. Socialism is being tried on a large scale in England today. It is prevalent in many countries of the world. While it is not as rotten as communism, socialism can, however, become rotten to the core and can stifle the ambitions of every man and woman within its reach.

The direct opposite of private enterprise is COMMUNISM. We read and hear more today about communistic influence than about any other thing in the

world. We must rid our government, our labor unions, our colleges, and our other institutions of any form of communistic influence. I do not hold to the theory that communism should not be discussed in our public schools. I do not believe that all books which mention communism should be burned. I have always thought that things which are rotten should be studied and exposed. In my opinion, a West Texas Senior high school student can study communism 15 minutes and decide that it is all wrong. I do not think that communism is a hush-hush word. On the contrary, I think it should be studied, explained, and then thrown in the gutter where it belongs.

To understand communism is relatively easy. Communism operates under the theory, and it is a false one, that the people own and share everything alike. Communists say that everybody is to share in the profits, every worker is to be well taken care


Through the ages there have been many attempts to operate community projects where everybody did some work and everybody shared equally in the total production. It has never worked. Three, years ago I passed by an abandoned project in the state of Kentucky where the people had tried a form of socialism or communism. The Bible tells us of an experiment or two that was tried but history tells us that these failed. Then I always think of that socialistic experiment that was tried by our pilgrim fathers when they first came to America. For a couple of years the men folks were assigned certain tasks and at the end of the year the harvest was divided equally among all the families. But there was not much production. Not enough food was

grown to adequately supply the colony. And soon the women folks began to complain. Mrs. Smith did not like the idea of having to wash the clothes of "that no good Mr. Jones", when she saw that he was only working two days a week and when her husband worked six days a week. And Mrs. Brown did not like the idea of the Jackson family getting more out of the store house than she thought they deserved. Governor Bradford saw that this socialistic or communistic experiment would not work. So he changed the entire setup. Each family was given certain jobs and certain land to work and they kept all that they made. Within a couple of years production was up and the colonists were supplying more than their needs. And most of all, the

women folks were happy. I think private enterprise means that you can go after and get just about anything you really desire and are willing to pay the price for. Some people are smarter than others. Some men

work harder than their neighbors; some men have more initiative; some plan better and some are better managers than their neighbors. On the other hand, some people are plain lazy.

Our democratic form of government gives a man the right to pursue the job or profession he desires. It gives him the right to work and it gives him protection while he is working. The rest is left up to him and his ability and initiative. Prvate enterprise gives a man the right to own his own home or his own farm or his own ranch or his own place of business. He has no fear that the government will take over his grocery store or his farm for its own use. Through our private enterprise system a young man can work for wages and save his money and later buy and own his own business or his own farm or ranch. Or he can save his money and buy stock in a utility company or an automobile manufacturing company or the hundreds of other manu-
