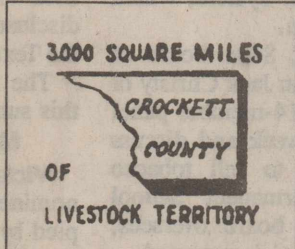
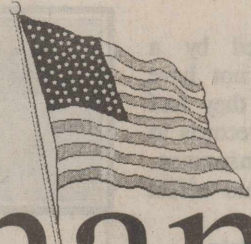


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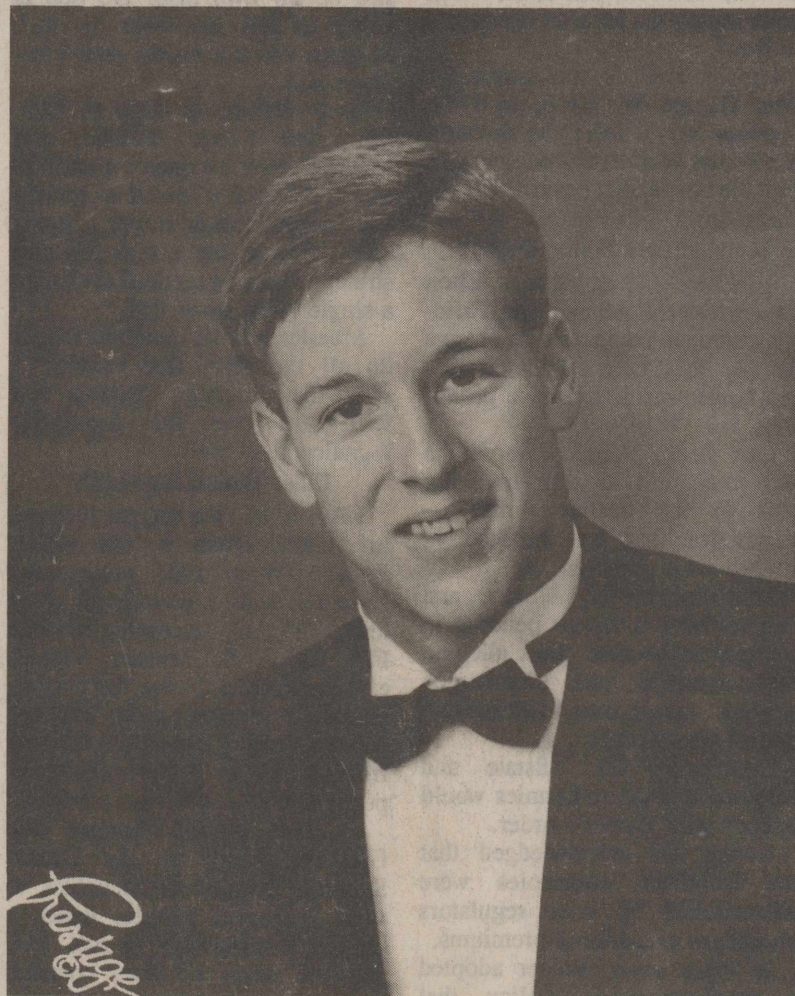

Ozona High Honor Graduates Named

Valedictorian and salutatorian of the Ozona High School Class of 1996 are graduates Tara Denise Wilkins and Lance Douglas Jamerson.

Magna cum laude graduate Tara Denise Wilkins earned a four-year grade point average of 7.106. She plans to attend Southwestern University. Her field of study is undecided at the present time. She is the daughter of Steve and Belinda Wilkins.

Jamerson is a cum laude graduate with a four-year grade point average of 6.898. He plans to attend the University of Texas at Austin and will major in biomedical engineering. He is the son of Kelly and Gwin Jamerson.

The magna cum laude award is given to the graduating seniors whose four-year grade point average is 7.00 and above. The cum laude award is given to the student whose four-year grade point average is between 6.00 and 6.99.

Cum laude recognition goes to four other members of the Class of

1996. Paul David Browne holds a four-year GPA of 6.830. He plans to attend Southwest Texas University where his field of study will be determined at a later date. He is the son of Jeffery and Ronda Stuart.

Mineral Valuations Down

News that there will be no increase in mineral valuations for 1996 greeted commissioners Monday morning. A preliminary report from Pritchard & Abbott, Inc., valuation consultants, detailed proposed values for the mineral base at 14% less (a \$10,000,000 drop in valuation) according to John Stokes, county auditor, than the amount that was appraised for the 1996 tax rolls.

The greatest cause of the decline is the lower gas prices from the 1995 market averages. State property tax laws require using the previous year's average. The drop would have been greater if new wells did not offset some of the loss. An increase in value from the industrial and mineral personal property items also prevented a deepening of the loss.

Pritchard & Abbott has not been

through the total appraisal process for the county yet.

Speculation within the court is that county taxes will have to come up three cents or so per \$100 valuation next year.

Carrol Hollingsworth of the Denwalt-Hollingsworth Company and Bob Falkner were present during the afternoon to talk about early warning systems for the county. Hollingsworth's firm installs low power AM radio emergency information stations which can be used for local broadcasts of public safety information. A siren system would alert people to tune to the station for specific information.

Hollingsworth said the station cannot be used to play music or advertise specific businesses, but that information such as meeting notices, school menus, and directions to local restaur-

rants and service stations could be broadcast over the system.

The most expensive of the three systems discussed is \$18,345.00 and has an eight minute time span that can be divided into multiple messages. This system also has the capability to receive NOAA weather announcements. The system is described as a complete 10 watt AM radio station, remotely programmable, digital audio recorder enhanced with microprocessor control and programming features, extended memory, NOAA receiver capable to automatically switch between your message and NOAA announcements, equipment housed inside a weather-resistant locking enclosure, and mounted to customer installed utility pole, antenna mounted to the utility pole and ground system installed at the base of the pole.

Cost of the four sirens with battery power backup to operate the system is \$69,652.00.

An FCC license could be obtained and the equipment in within three or four weeks from the date of order, Hollingsworth said.

Judge Jeffrey Sutton had asked for emergency warning system information some time ago, according to

Accident Fatal To California Woman

Jill Susan Slavin, 57, of Encino, CA, died in Crockett County May 13 following a one-vehicle rollover on I-10. The accident occurred at 11:48 a.m. at mile marker 362.

A report filed by investigating officer Trooper Ben English said Slavin died at 12:18 p.m. of massive head and neck injuries. J.P. Jim Hearne was called to the scene.

A pet dog was also killed in the accident.

Driver Lynda Chernoff, age 48, of Tamarach, FL, was taken to Shannon Hospital in San Angelo where she was reported to be in good condition with scalp lacerations.

Chernoff was westbound on I-10 when she was surprised by a heavy wind gust. The 1996 Ford Explorer she was driving veered from the roadway into the median and overturned two and one-half times.

Both women were wearing seatbelts.

English was assisted in the investigation by Cpl. Buster Lamb of Eldorado, Sgt. Carl Mayfield and Trooper Roger Dixon of Ozona.

Trustees Prepare For 4.9 Million Bond Election

School trustees will meet Wednesday night, May 15, with an extensive agenda which includes discussion and approval of the order of a bond election. Commissioners are to meet the following evening to consider the same item.

When they met May 7, the school board reviewed costs and time schedules for a proposed new middle school and high school gymnasium. The proposal drawn by Green Harvey Associates, Inc., architects/planners of Lubbock, provides for a two part bond issue totaling \$4,990,000.

Part One - \$3,600,000 is broken down as follows:

1. Demolish existing and construct new middle school \$3,090,000
2. Addition and modifications to existing middle school gym \$185,800
3. New liquid marker boards throughout district \$17,000
4. Remodel intermediate school classroom storage areas \$25,000
5. Upgrade three high school science labs \$150,000
6. Renovations to existing high school stage \$70,000
7. Cosmetic repairs and touch-up to high school campus facilities.

Part Two - \$1,390,000 includes three items.

1. Construction of a new high school competition gymnasium \$1,205,000
2. Construction of a new weight room at the field house \$130,000
3. Cosmetic improvements and whirlpool at girls' field house \$55,000.

If trustees call for a bond election Wednesday night and commissioners follow suit Thursday, the bond election could be set for July 15. An anticipated completion schedule has February of 1998 for the middle school and

April 1998 for part two bond projects.

Also at the May 7 meeting, trustees met in executive session to hear a report on environmental issues pertaining to the property across the street from the high school. No action was taken on this item and it is on the agenda again for May 15.

The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. in the board room of the administration building.

Work Progresses On New Care Center Rooms

Rooms should be available and equipped for the new wing on the care center by July 1, administrator Virginia Box reported at a May 9 meeting of the board. As soon afterward as a state inspector can come and approve the facility for Medicare, skilled care services can begin.

The air conditioner in the kitchen barely maintains minimums for food care standards, and the board decided at that meeting to solicit bids for a 10 ton unit.

The home health issue was tabled pending gathering of start-up cost information and a workshop for board members.

Ambulance coordinator Doug Meador reported that four EMTs, Paula Westmoreland, Beverly Preddy, Dee Keilers and Della Miller, are taking the intermediate training at their own expense. This involves about 150 hours of training.

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Work Progresses On New Care Center Rooms

Pledges for the defibrillator matching fund had amounted to \$2300 by board meeting time. The EMS is soliciting donations to match a state grant for the machine. At the time the county budget was finalized, this opportunity was not available, therefore it is not covered by tax funds.

Mason Files As Independent

Bill Mason has filed as an independent candidate for county attorney in the November general election.

Mason's petition was filed with Judge Jeffrey Sutton on May 9.

To file as an independent, the candidate must present a petition with a number of names equal to 10 percent of those voting in the last gubernatorial election. Those signing may not have voted in the primary or primary run-off for the general election in which the candidate wishes to run.

An independent candidate can not file for a place on the ballot until after the primary runoff.

AUSTIN — Attorney General Dan Morales continued to wage war on the tobacco industry last week when he suggested Texas sell more than \$500 million in tobacco stocks it holds in its pension and endowment funds.

"Texas should not be in business with those who seek to do our children harm. Our state should repudiate its financial involvement in these unconscionable efforts to profiteer at the expense of our children's lives," Morales told the *Dallas Morning News*.

But Jack Maroney, an attorney for Philip Morris Inc., a defendant in the lawsuit, characterized Morales' plea to dump tobacco stocks as "another attack on business."

In late March, Morales filed suit against the tobacco industry on federal racketeering charges.

Last week, Morales wrote letters requesting the sell-off to the Teachers Retirement System, the Employees Retirement System, the Permanent University Fund and the Permanent School Fund, the *Morning News* reported.

Morales spokesman Ron Dusek said the attorney general was obligated to tell the state funds that "tobacco stock will plummet" as a result of litigation against the industry, and that his letters were made public because his advice could affect the stock market.

The largest investor in tobacco stocks of the four funds is the Teacher Retirement System, which holds \$413 million.

Also last week, State Board of Education chairman Jack Christy of Houston said the 14-member panel would meet this week and discuss Morales' request to sell tobacco stock in the Permanent School Fund, which the board oversees, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Christy told the *Chronicle* he believes it is morally wrong for the state to invest education dollars in tobacco stocks. "On one hand we're telling the kids (smoking) is evil, and on the other hand we're taking the tobacco industry's profits."

Ray Sullivan, a spokesman for Gov. George W. Bush, said the governor would leave the decision of whether to divest tobacco stocks with the boards that govern the four funds.

Bomer Orders Billing Change
Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer ordered Allstate and Farmers insurance companies to change the way they have calculated auto and homeowners insurance premiums.

Last week, Bomer ordered the two companies to stop rounding bills to the nearest dollar — a practice that has resulted in allegations of overcharging.

Policyholders of Allstate and Farmers have a lawsuit pending in a South Texas state court alleging the companies have overcharged customers more than \$100 million over the last decade.

Spokesmen for Allstate and Farmers said the companies would comply with Bomer's order.

Bomer has acknowledged that the insurance companies were misinformed by state regulators about how to calculate premiums.

In other news, Bomer adopted a fraud-prevention policy that requires new insurance agents to be fingerprinted and submit to criminal background checks.

Bomer said that every year

consumers are defrauded by a few agents who would not have been issued a license if they had disclosed their criminal records to the Texas Department of Insurance.

The policy will go into effect this summer.

Morales Gets Party Help
Victor Morales, the Democratic nominee for the seat now occupied by Republican U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, said last week he would accept help from party headquarters in Washington, D.C., but he would not take orders from a campaign coordinator.

"The bottom line is that I will still be my own man. No one is going to tell me what to do," Morales told the *Austin Statesman*.

Greg Weiner, an aide to U.S. Sen. Bob Kerry, D-Neb., and Morales' new campaign coordinator, said Morales' desire to remain the decision-maker is not a problem. "Victor has got a winning strategy. There is no need to change a single thing about that."

Morales said he could no longer do all the work that running a statewide campaign requires and will turn over the day-to-day logistics to Weiner.

Other Capital Highlights
■ Austin had the biggest increase in violent crime in the nation from 1994 to 1995 among the 73 cities with a population of at least 200,000, according to the FBI and U.S. census. Violent crimes reported during the period, including murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault, increased from 3,249 to 4,050, or 24.65 percent.

■ Austin could become the first major city in the United States to require all bicyclists to wear protective helmets under a proposed mandatory helmet law. Thirteen states and many counties and cities have bike helmet laws, but most of those laws only require children to wear helmets, according to the Bicycle Federation of America.

Museum Notes From Mary

"Ozona, Biggest Little Town in the World." Our famous sign located on the southwest side of the town. Some of those travelers stop to see the monument of David Crockett. They come from all over the world and most are surprised when they see such a pretty town. They really enjoy our square and many stop to picnic on the tables there.

Stories about Ozona abound at the museum through the treasures kept there, but also in our history book. That book is used every day as visitors learn about the struggles and successes of building a town around a tree and a water well in this semi-arid land. Most of those early settlers had long hours in the hot sun before they had a permanent roof to sleep under. Many lived in tents for awhile. Pioneer legacy is sometimes romanticized in movies and novels, but the living descendants can remember hearing how it really was around here a hundred years ago.

We haven't forgotten those brave and solid folks who gave up their lifestyle elsewhere to settle this area and build this beautiful town for us to enjoy. Even though they had a frugal existence I'd believe they were happy as they worked, for it is work that gives us a sense of belonging to this world. Without a feeling of accomplishment what is life? From what I've heard, the early Ozona people didn't even know what "being bored" meant. In remembrance of these pioneers, the Crockett County Heritage Sculpture Organization was formed, with members who represent a cross section of the area residents. This group of folks has invited Judy Black,

who is a native of Crockett County, to express her talent for bronzesculpting by creating a very special monument for our town square. The sculpture organization members chose the image of a lady beside a man holding a little boy. It will be worked in life-and-a-quarter size and will be mounted on a base. The whole thing is expected to be nearly 13 feet tall.

The sculpture organization members are offering two miniature sizes, hoping the sale of these, along with special memorials, will fully pay for the large statue. It will take its place of honor in the center of the square where the sidewalk crosses. The walk now separates to go around a garden so there is already a space for this exceptional piece. Wouldn't those early people be pleased.

Soon the folks who drive by our square will see more than our "braggin' sign." They'll see our memorial to our settlers, and they'll realize that those who live in "the Biggest Little Town in the World" also have the biggest little hearts!

Further note - Tuesday, May 7,

four members of the Massey Foundation came to present to the museum a very special model of this statue. It is on display for all to see and enjoy, and a treasure for the museum. Like parents who love their children, the Massey Foundation has been a wonderful source of support for the museum many times, and the museum is most grateful. Thank you, again!

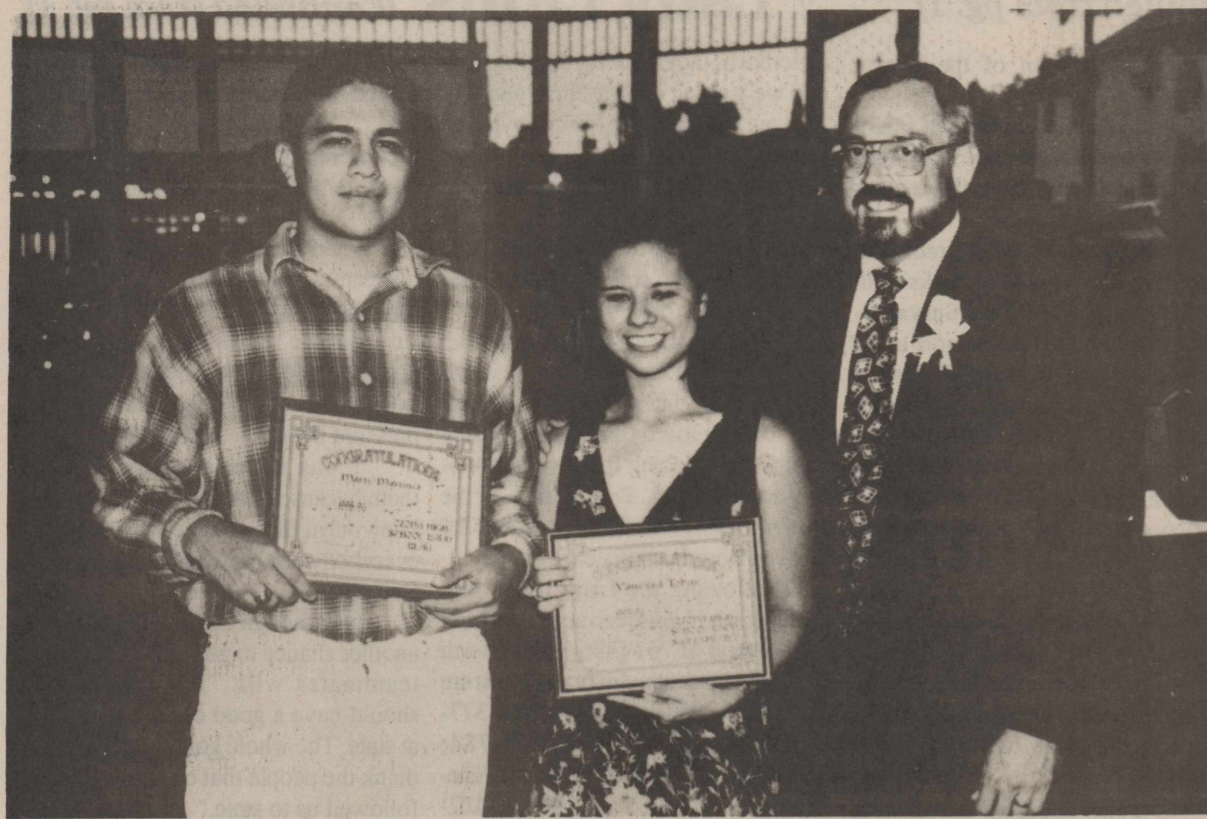

Bryson is currently undergoing treatment at St. Jude's Children's Hospital in Memphis, Tenn. While she is not yet at the stage for receiving a bone

marrow transfusion, the more people who are tested, the better the chances for finding a match. The bone marrow test is done with a blood sample taken during the blood drive--no extra tests are required.

Exciting Summer Programs Offered To Texas Teens

Teens in Texas have tremendous opportunities for learning about state government, the environment and wildlife in three unique programs sponsored by Texas 4-H. This summer, teenagers will have the chance to visit the Big Bend of Texas or the Gulf Coast to learn about wildlife management and the environment, or to actually pass legislation on the floor of Texas' State Capitol Building.

Texas 4-H Congress in Austin, slated for July 14-17, is open to 15-19 year olds. A prestigious event held biannually, Congress is the learning opportunity of a lifetime for a 4-H member interested in government. The youth actually hold legislative sessions and pass bills during their time in Austin, serving as county "delegates" to the 4-H House and Senate.

Adventures in the Big Bend are a significant part of the Trans-Pecos 4-H Wildlife Camp slated for July 8-10 in Alpine at Sul Ross State University. Ages for the camp are 13 and up. The participants learn about habitat, wildlife management, trapping and hunting, and land use issues through hands-on activities while being exposed to the expertise of personnel from Texas Parks and Wildlife, Sul Ross State University, Soil and Water Conservation District, and Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The subject matter is intense, but learning proceeds with a great deal of fun and excitement.

An introduction to the fields of wildlife, conservation and management for students entering their sophomore, junior or senior year in high school is set for July 8-13 at the Welder Wildlife Foundation in Sinton. The Wildlife Ecology Camp focuses on outdoor field work and hands-on activities taught by wildlife professionals.

Topics include conservation eth-

ics, species diversity, habitat management, census techniques and prey/predator interactions.

Registration deadlines are approaching rapidly for these opportunities. For Texas 4-H Congress, the deadline for applications and fees to reach the County Extension office is this coming Friday, May 17. Cost for congress is \$210, which includes hotel, nine meals and snacks, and a registration fee. Other costs delegates will be responsible for include transportation with the district group, meals enroute to Austin, and three breakfasts while in Austin. Some incidental spending money will also be needed.

For the Trans-Pecos Wildlife Camp, registration is due to the Crockett County Office on June 14 and the cost is \$75 per person plus transportation (on your own). Cost includes a dorm room at Sul Ross University, meals and educational materials.

The Wildlife Ecology Camp costs \$125 each and includes housing and meals. Transportation is not included. Deadline for applications to reach the County Extension Office is May 23.

For more information on these or other opportunities, contact the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721, or come by the office, located at 1301 Ave. AA next to the Fair Park Convention Center. Educational programs and activities conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or disability.

Falkner. Commissioners had praise for Virginia Box, hospital and care center administrator, upon completion of her report. Stokes had told them earlier that the hospital is about even for the first time this year, and the care center is under budget by about \$23,000 after receiving a large payment from Medicaid.

Extension Agent Miles Dabovich and Brent Pool, ag teacher and FFA sponsor at OHS, presented a set of rules for use of the Fair Park Convention Center, rodeo arena and 4-H/FFA feeding barn. Several points were discussed, and some changes will be made. Commissioners accepted the recommendations of the convention center committee which drew up the rules.

Civic and youth center director Garland Young told the court that Project Graduation is about \$4,000 below where it was last year at this time. Young and the directors and Teen Council are excited about the Go For The Gold Olympic theme.

Commissioners voted to approve a resolution presented by Mrs. McDaniel setting a minimum fee of \$25.00 for persons living in Section 8 certificate housing. The fee was announced at a federal meeting she attended last week, and \$25 is the lowest amount that can be charged.

The April fire department report from Bob Falkner, fire chief, showed six grass fires and one response each for a structure fire, investigation and mutual aid. There have been 31 calls to date for the year.

Librarian Louise Ledoux brought a floor plan of the library as it will be with the addition and interior changes. There is now \$160,000 in the building fund, but \$250,000 is the project goal. She questioned the possibility of beginning the project before the goal is reached and working in phases. Judge Sutton said unless it was just way out of line, he would be willing to accept

the recommendation of the library board.

Mrs. Ledoux' request that salary be approved for a parttime employee will be looked at during the regular budget preparation time.

An air hammer will be rented to break away the remaining rocks from the new annex site. Judge Sutton reported that he has a rock sample in his office which will be suitable for the exterior of the building. Purchasing the rock will be much less expensive than having the stone cut from that removed from the hill.

Road and parks superintendent Eddie Moore said two bump gates on County Road 409 had to be repaired seven or eight times last week. He suggested that the gates, which were not built by the county, be removed and single swing gates put in. Cattle guards at the gates will also be removed.

The court accepted a bid from Productive Business Machines for a Xerox 5352CAS copier for the Extension office and also approved a bid from HillTop Ford of Denison for a 1996 Ford for the sheriff's department.

Approval was given to hire San Angelo attorney Charles Wittenburg for legal representation in pending litigation. Commissioner Rudy Martinez abstained from voting.

Crockett County Historical and Scientific Society members Camille Jones, Carmen Sutton and Belinda Wilkins met with the court to request a letter of commitment showing that the county will donate the present annex building for a museum. The evidence of commitment would enable them to seek grant funding, Mrs. Jones said.

The court voted, with Judge Sutton abstaining, to lease the building for 99 years once the county offices vacate the building.

A night meeting will be held later this month to consider addition of a detailed drug policy and safe driving policy to the countywide personnel policy.

Commissioners will meet at 6 p.m. Thursday to consider calling a bond election for the school.


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
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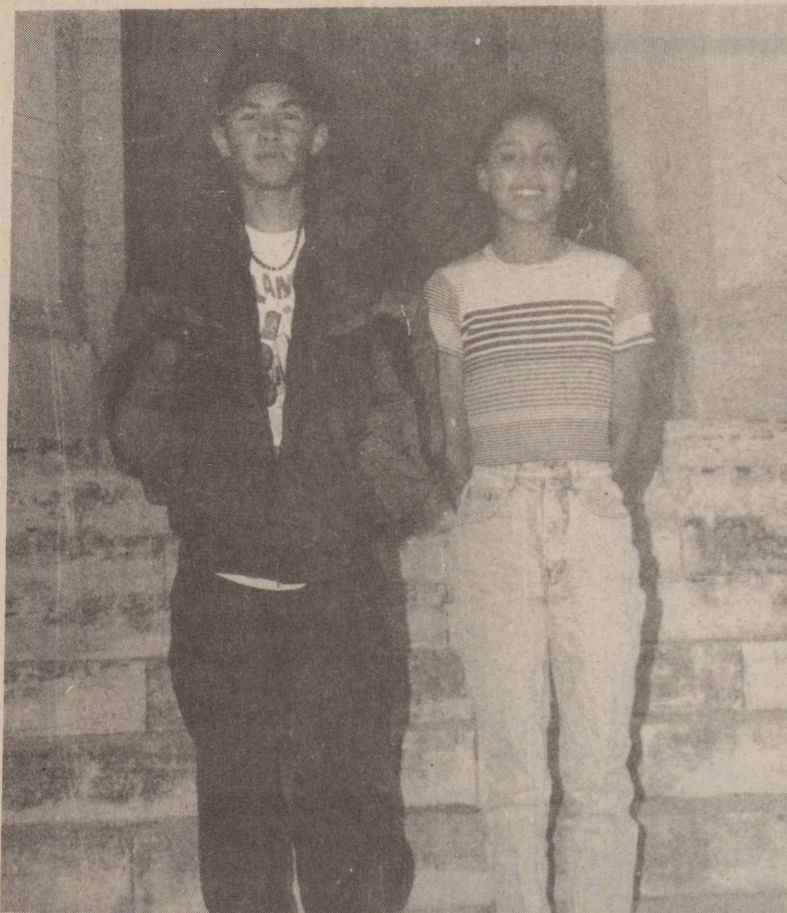

Two of Ozona's best tracksters, Lori Sanchez and Charles Villarreal placed fifth in their respective running events in the U.L.L.'s State Class 2A boys and girls track and field competition in Austin May 11.

Last year Charles Villarreal competed in the 1600m race in the 1995 State Track Meet in Austin but this year he traveled only half as far--that is, he qualified in the 800 meter run this year. Lady Lion freshman Lori Sanchez made her first trip of hopefully several to come as she tried her best in the 3,200 meter run.

It took a lot of extra effort from Sanchez and Villarreal to get this far as Ozona's track coach Pete Maldonado said, "It was an accomplishment to get there, but we didn't have the best of days. Villarreal placed second in the 800m run in the Regional 1 meet two weeks ago with a time of 2:00.15 minutes.

"There was more pressure at regional because you had to work harder to get to state," said Villarreal. "Once we got to state, we just had to run."

A person can't go to state and not be nervous, especially going in for the first time. Such was the situation for Sanchez. "Yeah, I was nervous. It was a new experience for me," she said.

Sanchez placed fifth in the 3,200m race with a time of 12:39.12 minutes. Cassidy Watson from

Goldthwaite won the event with a time of 12:10.52.

Sanchez took second place in the 3,200m run two weeks ago in the regional meet with a time of 11:51.7 minutes.

Coach Maldonado has had a successful track program in Ozona for many years. With these young athletes and others coming up, it appears there will be many more trips made to regional and Austin.

"This is the thirteenth year out of fourteen years we have had someone represent us at the state track meet," said Maldonado.

This is quite an accomplishment for Coach Maldonado and an even greater accomplishment for Sanchez and Villarreal.

District 6 4-H Horse Show Scheduled For June 18-19

The 1996 District 6 4-H Horse Show is set for June 18-19 in Fort Stockton. Classes will include timed events such as barrel racing, poles, stakes and roping. Judged events are showmanship, mare and gelding classes, western horsemanship, western riding and western pleasure. A new addition to the open show will be mule showmanship, mule western pleasure and mulemanship. The mule classes are on a trial basis. Participants that earn enough points in the qualifying show, which is judged events, poles, barrels and stakes, will qualify to participate at the State 4-H Horse Show in July in Abilene.

Participants in the open show event, which includes roping, team penning, jumping, reining, working cow horse and cutting, do not have to earn points to participate at the State Horse Show Open Division. Fees include a \$10.00 administrative fee plus entry for events. Entry fees range from \$5-\$30 depending on the event.

Anyone interested in participating at the District 6 4-H Horse Show need to come by the Extension Office by June 3 to fill out an entry form. Stalls will be available at the arena

and will cost \$10 per day per horse. Stall fees are due when you arrive in Fort Stockton.

All ownership must be certified, and all participants must mail in a certificate from the County Extension Agent verifying ownership or a photo copy of registration papers. Please bring these with you when you come to visit with me about writing a statement verifying ownership.

Be sure to bring your checkbook when you come to the Extension Office to register for the District Horse Show. The Extension Office is located at 1301 Ave. AA, next door to the Fair Park Convention Center. Remember, June 3 is the deadline to enter.

Programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, disability or national origin.
