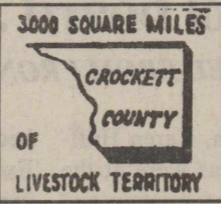

Transported to Huntsville and death row..... White gets death penalty

Convicted murderer Melvin Wayne White left Ozona June 21 on his way to Huntsville and death row. White was sentenced by District Judge Brock Jones Thursday, June 17, in Fort Stockton shortly after the jury returned with a death verdict in the punishment phase of his capital murder trial.

On June 10, the five man, seven woman jury had found White guilty of capital murder in the death of 9-year-old Jennifer Gravell. Jennifer was kidnapped on the night of Aug. 4, 1997, and her body found the following day after White confessed and gave officers directions to the place he had left her.

Experts called by the prosecution and defense during the punishment phase of the trial each said White would continue to be a threat to female children.

Dr. Cecil Reynolds, called for the defense said, "Melvin White, in a free society around female children, is dangerous." The neurological psychologist said that severe brain damage from a car accident, alcoholism and medication might have caused White to lose control.

"I'd be the first one to tell you that that man should be locked in a cage

for the rest of his life," Reynolds said. Dr. Windel Dickerson, former chief psychologist for the Texas Prison System, was called by the prosecution. Dickerson, who was permitted to

the death penalty took longer. Jurors went to the jury room at 12:21 p.m. Thursday after District Attorney Ori White and Kirk Hawkins, who was counsel for the defense, rested their

attend each day of the trial, testified that brain damage did not make White kill Jennifer Gravell. There is "no connection between brain damage and the offense," he said.

"Melvin White is a very serious risk of doing it again," said Dickerson. Both experts said they believe White would be a target for other prison inmates due to the nature of his crime.

White appeared to listen intently as Reynolds and Dickerson responded to lawyers' questioning, something he had not done throughout the trial.

The jury had reached their capital murder guilty verdict quickly, in only about 30 minutes. Deciding on

punishment cases.

Shortly after 1:00 p.m. the jury asked to review parts of the video tape in which White confessed. Portions of the tape that had not been allowed into evidence had to be edited first, and the jury received the tape at 3:35 p.m.

After reviewing the tape for signs of remorse, jurors announced that they were ready with a verdict at 4:24 p.m.

White was brought back to the Crockett County Jail that evening where he remained until his departure for prison Monday morning about 7:45.

He is entitled to an automatic appeal.

Trustees accept resignations, hire new teachers

In their regular monthly meeting that was held on Tuesday, June 15, members of the Ozona School Board approved the sexual abstinence program "Aim for Success" to be presented to all sixth grade students through twelfth grade students during the 1999-00 school year.

Aim for success is an independent, non-profit, educational organi-

zation that promotes a lifestyle of excellence by encouraging the development of self control, self-respect, and self discipline. Through live interactive presentations of approximately one hour students are encouraged to develop strong, responsible character as they deal with sexual pressure. Students learn the wisdom of committing to be sexually abstinent until marriage.

In its first full year (1993-94), Aim for Success gave 526 presentations to over 30,000 people. Today

eight professional speakers on staff give over 1,600 live presentations to over 100,000 participants each year, primarily in public schools. Aim for Success is now the largest provider of sexual abstinence education in the state of Texas and has received letters of commendation from Texas Governor George W. Bush and former First Lady Nancy Reagan.

Ozona merchants warned about sports telemarketer

The Permian Basin Better Business Bureau, Ozona Chamber of Commerce and the public school system issued an alert to the city's merchants Tuesday concerning a telemarketing firm headquartered in Arlington.

According to Larry Taylor, superintendent of schools, the company is calling area businesses, representing themselves as working with the school system in promoting and publishing a calendar of school events. "This is just not true," Taylor stated. "The school system has no connection with them at all. As a matter of fact, we have tried on several occasions to make them stop making these statements, but up until now nothing has worked."

Taylor called the BBB and requested assistance. Dick Rowland, president of Better Business Bureau of the Permian Basin, found that the company was headquartered in Arlington and contacted the BBB in Fort Worth.

According to that BBB office, the report on the company states "Matters brought to the firm's attention concern selling practices, credit billing and services performed. The company has

resolved some complaints, however, some complaints remain unresolved. Our file experience shows this company has an unsatisfactory record. Specifically, our records show a failure to deliver promised products or services as represented." The company also does business under the name of Multi-Marketing of Irving, TX.

A complete copy of the report is available from the Fort Worth BBB or the BBB in Midland.

"This company makes calls to merchants to promote a school event calendar, and according to companies who have contacted the BBBPB, represents themselves as working with the school system. Then many companies want to participate, to support the schools," said Rowland. "The BBB suggests that if you want to support the school system in special projects, you should contact the school direct, and find out what assistance would be most appreciated."

Frizzell wins goat roping championship

Justin Frizzell, winner of the 1997 World Championship Goat Roping took back his title here last week with an average time of 84.54 on seven head. Justin had placed second last year with 84.03, seeing that win go to his younger brother, Colby Frizzell.

As champion for 1999, the Sterling City man took home \$3,673.37 in prize money accumulated for the entire roping. Of that, \$1,849.52 was for his top spot in the open roping average. He also received a saddle donated by Ozona National Bank.

Ropers and times for the next five contestants in the open were: Tommy Hendry 86.90, Glyn Hutto 92.46, Jesse Banner 92.62, Johnny Bowns 92.96 and Joe Ross Jameson 93.13. There were 39 entries in the open division and \$1,000.00 in added money.

Ozona's Tony Allen, who is president of the Texas Goat Roping Association, won the senior division of the roping with a time of 97.97 on seven head. Allen received a saddle donated by Fort Dodge Pharmaceutical in addition to his prize money.

Following in second place was Freddie Fields with 98.53 and J. B. Hutto with 126.28. There were 12

competitors in the division with \$1,000.00 added money.

Fields, from Knickerbocker, won the senior division in 1998 and was winner of both the open and senior divisions in 1997.

Former Ozona resident Jill House, now of San Angelo, won the women's division with an average of 65.64 on four head. Jill was awarded a bracelet donated by the Crockett County Roping Association along with her prize money.

Second was Candy Everett with 79.11 and in third, Tooter Smith with an 88.85. There were 14 entries in this division and \$500.00 added money.

Novice winner was Colt Arnold who had a time of 71.89 on four head. Arnold earned prize money and was awarded a buckle donated in memory of Ruben Whitehead.

Others in the top four were Ryder

Hohman with 85.80, John Burrus 86.67 and Gene Cooper 91.84. This event had 14 entries and \$500.00 added money.

Junior division average winner was Colby Frizzell with a 97.07 on seven head. Colby was the recipient of the Shawn McMullan Memorial saddle as well as prize money.

Ty Allen followed in second with a time of 133.57, and Kipp Harrell was third with 137.11. The 11 junior competitors had \$1,000.00 added prize money in their division. This is the final year a number of the junior competitors will be eligible.

The World Championship Goat Roping was presented this year by The Texas Goat Roping Association, Ozona Chamber of Commerce, Crockett National Bank and the Crockett County Roping Association.

Arizona coyotes attacking children

Parents of young children in western Arizona are keeping a closer eye on their children these days due to two recent coyote attacks that occurred literally in their own back yards. The first incident involved a 4-year-old girl, who was attacked while playing a mere 20 feet from her parents. By the time they rushed to her aid, the coyote already had bitten the girl behind one ear and across the forehead. As a result the girl had to undergo treatment for rabies. The second incident occurred just a few days later and involved another 4-year-old, who was bitten on the arm while playing in his parents' back yard. The coyote was later captured and killed so it

could be tested for rabies. Wildlife authorities do not know if the same coyote is responsible for both attacks, which one game and fish department spokeswoman attributed to urban sprawl. "As urban sprawl continues... as those residential areas move into these wild areas, things like this are going to happen," said Arizona Game and Fish Department spokeswoman Frosty Taylor, in an Associated Press story. Taylor said the attacks could have been provoked by the warmer weather, since coyotes are fiercely protective of their pups and typically refuse to relocate their dens, even if humans are nearby.

Sergio Gonzales inspired by mariachi tradition

Playing festive, Spanish music is at the heart of Midland College student Sergio Gonzales. At only 19, he is part of an old Mexican tradition - a mariachi.

"Sergio Gonzales was asked to join the local mariachi group, Mariachi Estrella, when a security guard at Lee High School heard him practicing the violin in the orchestra room.

"He came up to me and asked if I would be interested in going to a practice session for his dad's mariachi group," Gonzales said. "I didn't clearly understand what a mariachi was, but I wanted to go and find out."

When Gonzales arrived at the practice session, he said he liked the music immediately.

"I quickly grabbed the sheet music and my violin and began playing with them. I was having so much fun," he said.

Even though he had never played Mexican mariachi music before, he was quickly accepted by the other mariachi members who taught him about the mariachi style, beats and fast tempos.

Now, Gonzales' compact disc collection includes the rap and R&B recordings of most college students, but it also includes an extensive mariachi collection by such artists as Pedro Fernandez singing Jose Alfredo Jimenez.

Playing with Mariachi Estrella allows Gonzales to pursue his love of music as he pursues a degree in management information systems at Midland College.

Gonzales first started playing the violin in the fifth grade orchestra. Since his dad liked the fiddle, he encouraged Gonzales to play the violin.

"I think they regretted ever handing me a violin, because the first four years all they listened to was screeching and noises," Gonzales said. "It wasn't until the ninth grade, and with the help of private lessons, I started improving my technique and style."

His love for the violin flourished when he joined the Lee High School orchestra.

"My music teacher, Karen McAfee, was a true inspiration for me," he said. "I now understand her dedication to the music and the or-

chestra - it's just like my dedication to the mariachi."

Mariachi Estrella is a Mexican folklore music ensemble, composed of two trumpets, one guitar, one vihuela, one bass guitar and three violins. They have traveled all over West Texas and Eastern new Mexico.

Gonzales proudly wears his mariachi traje, or suit, while performing at festivals, weddings and quinceaneras. Gonzales' hard work - which includes long practices, midnight performances and long drives - has earned him a traje, and he said he wears it with honor and respect.

"It's very difficult sometimes to balance school, homework, practices and performances," Gonzales said. "But its worth it - not only for the music and the audience but to keep the Mexican mariachi culture alive."

Gonzales said that he and the other members of Mariachi Estrella also are dedicated to helping out future mariachi members as much as they can. They started a program at Casa de Amigos for students in the fifth and sixth grades wanting to learn mariachi music. Each week they volunteer their time to teach singing, dancing and playing.

"It is very inspiring to see children interested in this kind of music, it makes us play better and enjoy it more," said Gonzales.

His parents also are a great encouragement to him, he said. Gonzales is the son of Sergio and Virginia Gonzales of Midland and grandson of Leandro and Josefa Flores of Ozona. His mother is his biggest supporter and his dad his biggest fan. "My parents were very happy when I decided to start playing with Mariachi Estrella."

His interest in computers is equal to his love for music. He said he hopes to one day transfer his computer course work to Texas Tech and try out for the symphony. He also wants to coordinate his own mariachi band and write his own music.

"I would love to teach children how to play mariachi music. I believe its important to have them grow up with a good cultural background," Gonzales said.

Mariachi Estrella has performed with many famous Tejano artists including Little Joe y la Familia and Polo Urias y la Maquina Nortena.

The center will be offering the following preschool classes: Kiddie Club - ages 4-5, Tinyville - ages 3-4, and Little Stars I & II - Under 3 yrs. Home ownership, make it a reality

In celebration of National Home Ownership Week June 6-12, USDA-Rural Development will hold a meeting June 30 in Ozona to discuss the possibilities of home ownership for families of very low, low to moderate income. A house is more than a roof over our heads; it is often the cornerstone upon which rests our ability to live near good jobs and to gain access to good schools and other public services. Home ownership builds economic stability. RHS thus not only helps rural people acquire homes, it helps build better lives and stronger communities.

RHS offers two types of home ownership loans: guaranteed and direct. The purpose is to provide financing - with no down payment required, and at favorable rates and terms - either through direct loan with RHS or with a loan from a private financial institution which is guaranteed by RHS. These loans are for the purchase, construction and related facilities for low and moderate income rural persons.

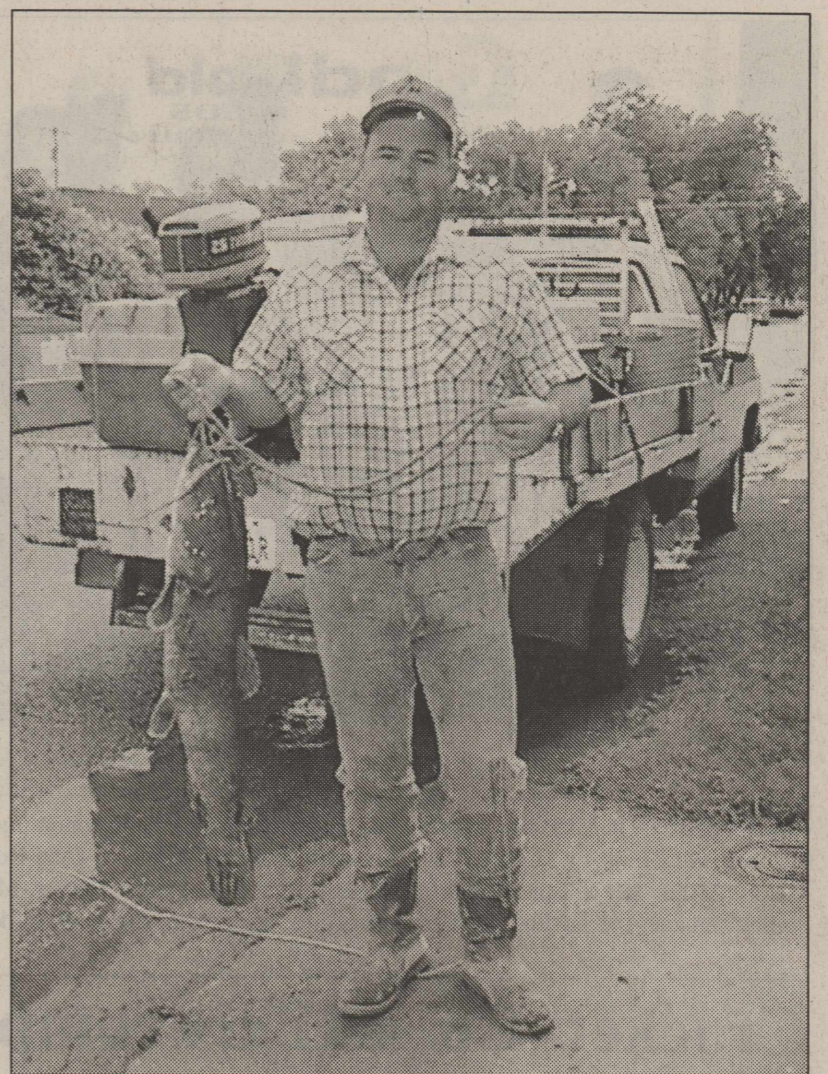
Texas Tech honor students announced

Cool water is the only first aid for minor burns

No matter what folklore you've heard about putting a pat of butter or an ice pack on a burn - cool water is the best treatment.

Minor burns can often be treated at home. For a small injury that does not break the skin, immediately hold the burned area under cool running tap water for one to two minutes or until the pain eases. If the skin is broken, apply a mild ointment or cream.

"Never use ice on a burn. It can cause more damage," says Dr. Gary Purdue, professor of surgery and a burn specialist at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.

If the injury is larger than the size of your palm, seek medical help.

President misses deadline, fails to take action behalf of domestic sheep producers

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Montana Senator Conrad Burns on June 15 called on the president to immediately approve temporary tariffs on lamb imports from Australia and New Zealand. The International Trade Commission (ITC) decided on March 26 to impose some form of tariffs on lamb imports from Australia and New Zealand. The ITC has proposed four separate tariff-based remedies. President Clinton had a June 5 deadline to approve, modify or deny a remedy, but the deadline has come and gone with no presidential action.

In a letter to the president, Burns expressed the need for immediate action.

"The decision on this case was supposed to have been made 10 days ago," Burns wrote. "Meanwhile sheep producers continue to wait, wondering what is going to happen to their livelihood. It must be decided now." Burns also wrote that he understood foreign policy concerns must be taking a considerable amount of the president's time, but domestic policy should not suffer as a result. "I feel as though the crisis facing the sheep producers of this country is receiving about the same consideration from this administration as agriculture received five months ago in your State of the Union address," Burns wrote. "You gave agriculture 30 seconds of your time during that address. It would take less time than that for you to sign this petition."

In 1998, the American Sheep Industry Association (ASI) filed a petition with the ITC on the harmful effects of lamb imports on the domestic

sheep industry. The petition triggered a six-month investigation, which resulted in the Feb. 9 unanimous ITC ruling that lamb imports from Australia and New Zealand are damaging domestic sheep producers.

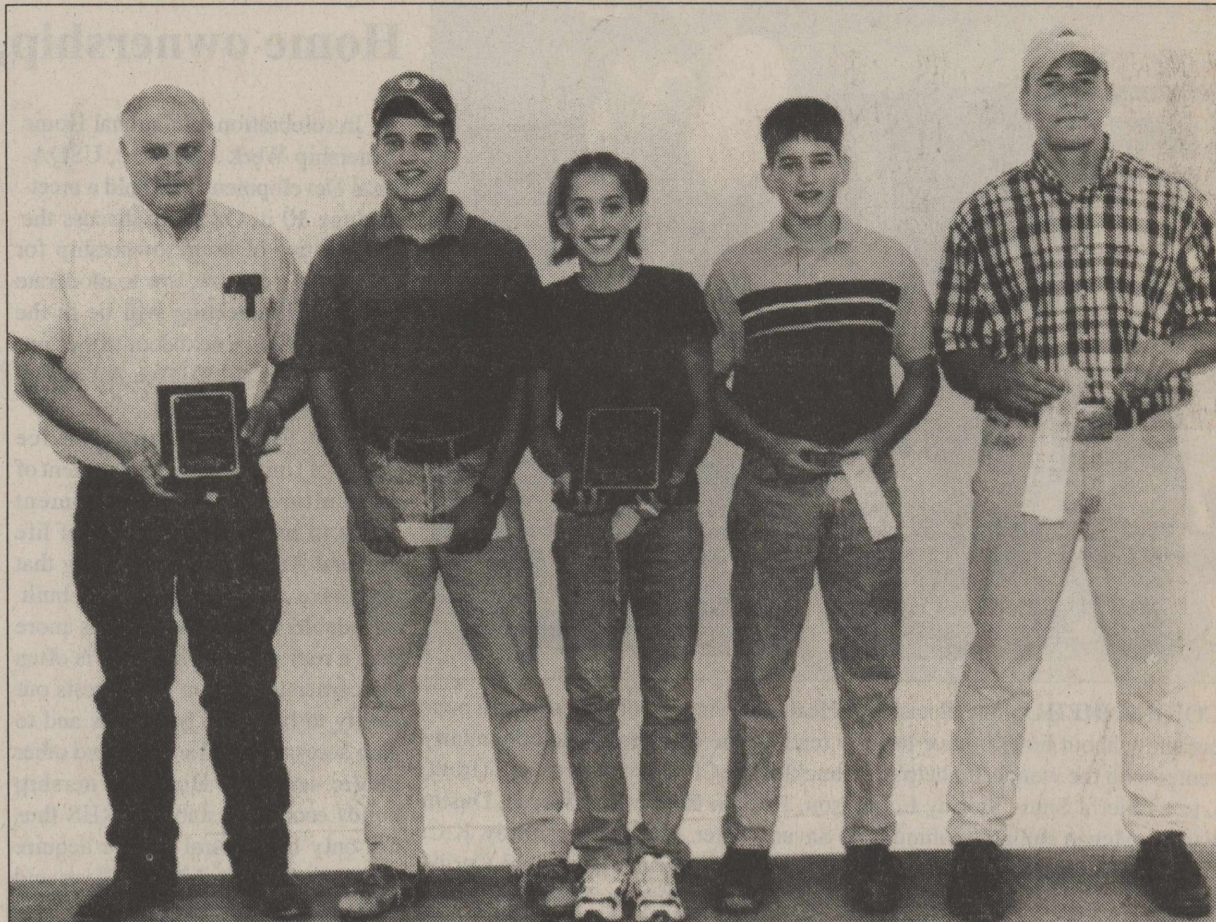
The ITC found that imports of foreign lamb to the U.S. went up 47 percent between 1993 and 1997, and those imports undercut domestic lamb prices by margins of 20 to 40 percent. In 1998 alone, lamb imports from Australia increased by 30 percent over 1997.

Burns has taken an active role in the process leading up to the president's decision, submitting two sets of written comments to the ITC supporting domestic sheep producers. Burns urged the implementation of a two-tiered tariff program, which sets one tariff for imports below a quota and a higher tariff for imports above that quota.

Burns has also introduced country-of-origin meat labeling legislation to further assist Montana's ranchers and sheep producers and will soon introduce legislation requiring price reporting at packing houses.

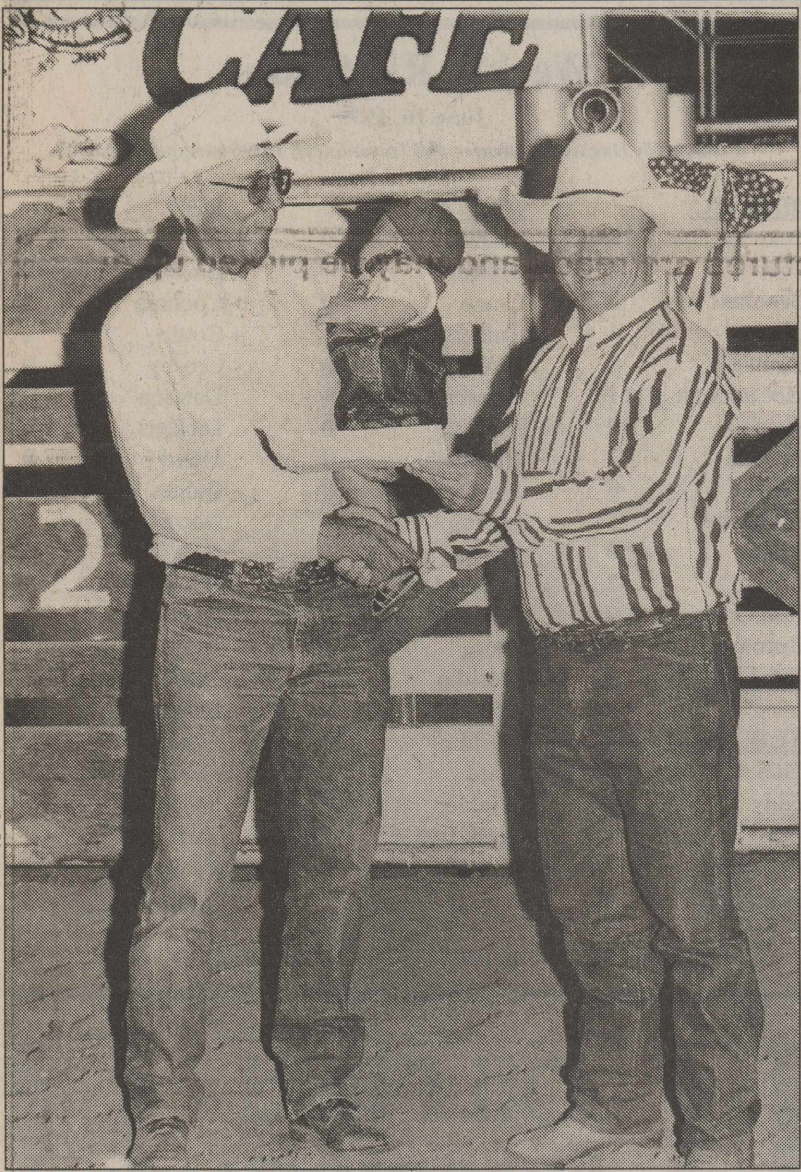

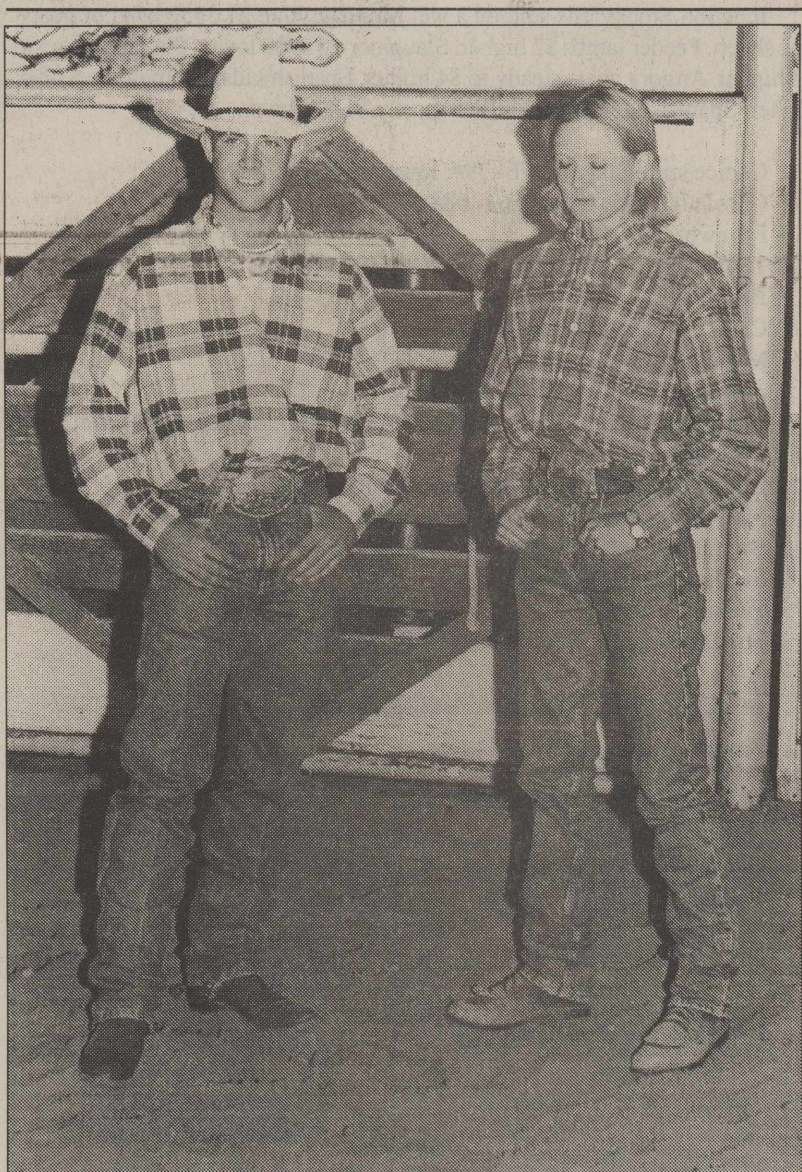

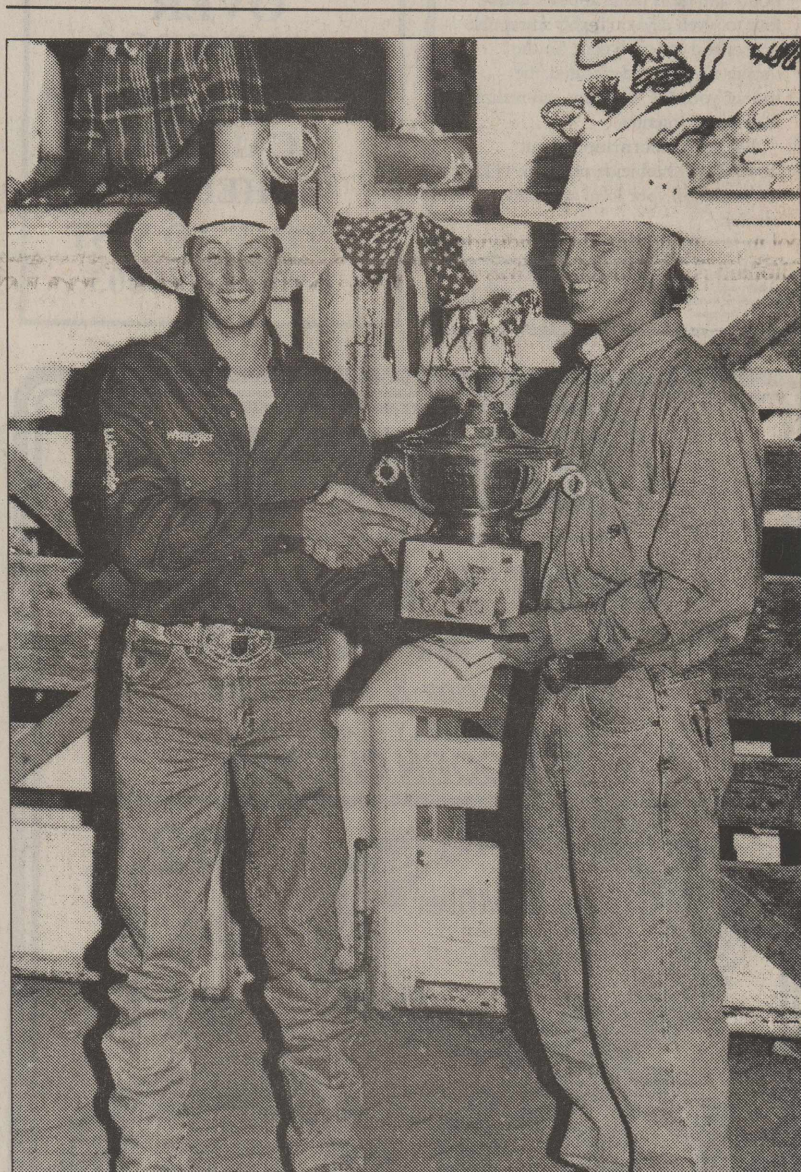

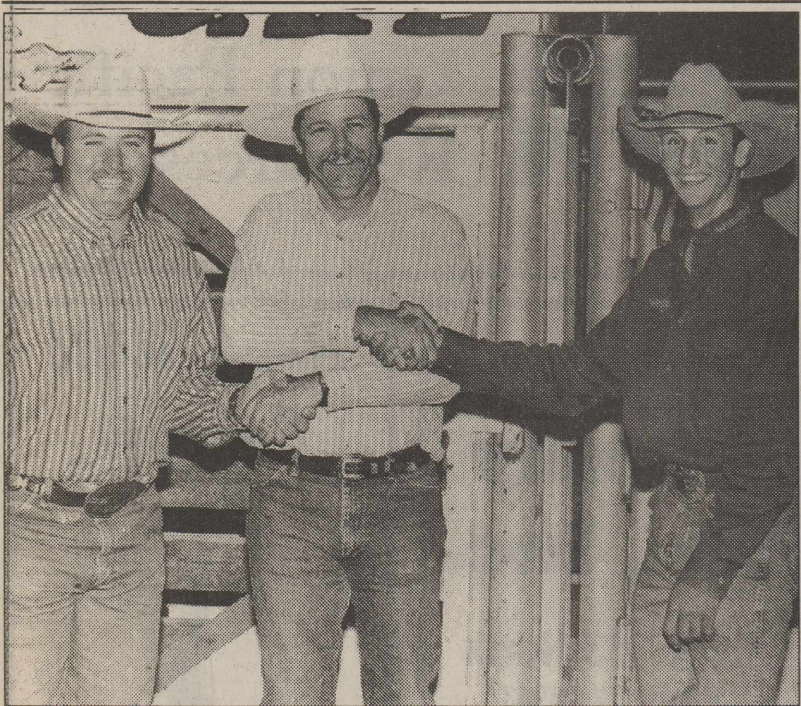
