I swear I would never be so dumb as to think that a vehicle could automatically let air out of its tires.

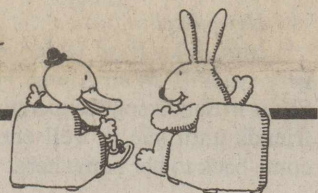
What I read was when in 4-wheel drive, tires flatten somewhat to provide better traction. I never asked him to put air in the tires.

Pastor proposes giant give-away

"In the last week, I've read two articles about the money that we all will be getting from Uncle Sam sometime in the next couple of months," said Rev. Nancy Mossman, pastor of Ozona United Methodist Church. "Both articles suggested that we citizens could do something very significant if we decided to pool our rebates and support a community program in need."

"Think about it. According to news reports, income tax payers will be receiving \$300.00 each as part of the tax reduction plan passed by Congress recently. While \$300.00 is a nice chunk of money, none of us is going to solve any personal financial woes with \$300.00. For example, my biggest financial concern lately is paying college tuition for our oldest son."

The check my husband and I receive from the government will only cover a small fraction of his tuition bill for one semester. But, what if we pool our combined \$600.00 with another couple's \$600.00, and another person's \$300.00, with another dozen

people's \$300.00 - before we know it, those dollars will add up to something significant. Just 12 people putting their \$300.00 together is \$3,600.00. Fifty people pooling their \$300.00 equals \$15,000.00. That kind of money can make a difference for good in our community!"

"There's nothing more satisfying than giving a gift," said Rev. Mossman. "Paul quotes Jesus in the Book of Acts saying, 'More blessings come from giving than receiving.' This is certainly a time when more can be blessed if we were to combine this windfall and give it away than if each one of us kept our \$300.00 and spent it on ourselves."

Rev. Mossman said she believes people are willing to give their money away. The hardest thing will be deciding what to give it to. "People need to believe the money is going to something that they value," she said.

"Call your friends together. Get organized. Give your rebate away! Make a difference for good in our community," urges the pastor.

Bonilla and Stenholm stand strong for Texas sheep and goat industry

Recently Congressman Henry Bonilla and Congressman Charles Stenholm lead the effort to defeat an amendment that would have prevented the Department of Agriculture from making payments to wool and mohair producers. The amendment to the Agriculture Appropriations bill for fiscal year 2002, was offered by Congressman Weiner of New York.

The amendment was defeated by a vote of 155 to 272, with Bonilla and Stenholm leading the debate on the House floor. Both members pointed out many incorrect statements by the Congressman from New York, who during the course of the debate admitted he has never even actually visited a warehouse or sheep and goat ranch.

"We are grateful to all the members of the Texas delegation who voted against the amendment, but especially to Bonilla and Stenholm for speaking on behalf of our industry. This is not

the first time these two members have stood up for our industry and we appreciate it every time." Jule Richmond, president of Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers, said.

The amendment was actually intended to prohibit payments that were provided in the Crop Year 2001 Agricultural Economic Assistance Act, that passed the House on June 26, 2001, without a single objection. This bill provided \$16.9 million in economic assistance to wool and mohair producers.

"The economic assistance has come at a critical time for producers. In many instances this assistance is the only thing that has kept producers in business. We have been hit by both low prices and increased feed bills due to a multi-year drought," Richmond said.

All but four members of the Texas delegation opposed the amendment.

Jeffrey Mendez killed in auto-truck accident

Jeffrey Arguello Mendez died Monday night in a motor vehicle accident in Ozona. Mendez, 18, was a passenger in a car driven by Stephen Michael Perez, 24.

The accident, which happened in the vicinity of the Hwy. 163 and Santa Anna Street intersection, was paged out to emergency services at 11:36 p.m. according to Deputy Steve Kenley.

Perez was driving a 2-door 1984 Corvette which was in collision with a 1993 Mac truck driven by John Strother for G. Q. Salmon.

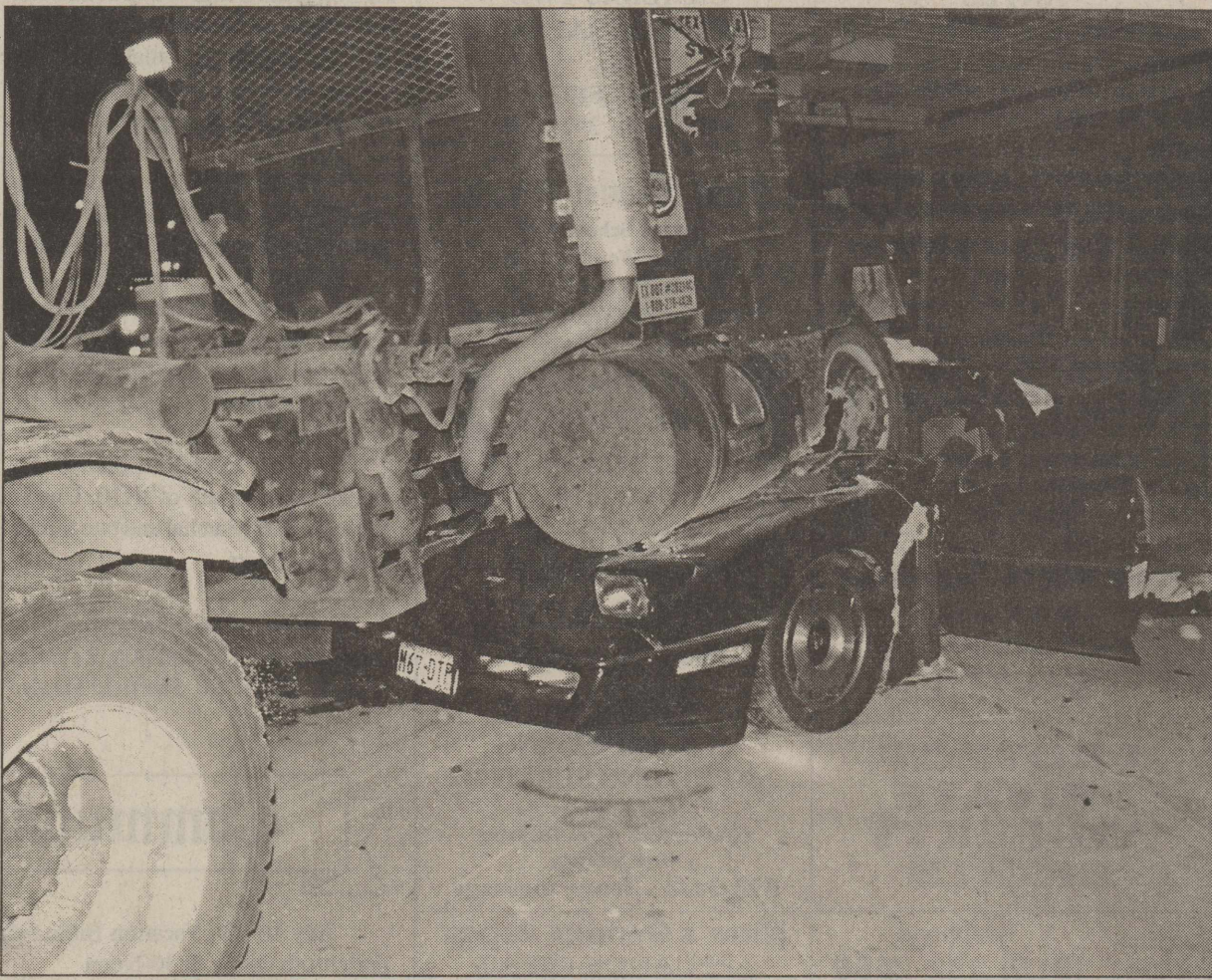
Both men in the Corvette were wearing seatbelts.

Perez was taken by helicopter to Community Medical Center where he was reported stable with head and neck injuries according to a DPS dispatcher.

DPS Trooper Kurt Knapp continued his investigation Tuesday, and no further details were available at press time.

Mendez was a 2001 graduate of Ozona High School where he had been a member of the Lion Band for four years and participated in football, cross country and track. He was employed by T&C Village Market.

Funeral services were pending at Preddy Funeral Home.

What is anthrax and what causes it?

Confirmation of two cases of anthrax in deer from Uvalde and Val Verde Counties earlier this summer set off an alert for the area of the state where most cases occur. Historically, this is a triangle bounded by Uvalde, Ozona and Eagle Pass.

The following information on anthrax is provided by County Extension Agent Roy Walston.

Anthrax is a naturally occurring disease with worldwide distribution. It is caused by Bacillus anthracis, a spore-forming bacteria that can remain alive, but dormant in the soil for many years. The bacteria can "bloom" and contaminate surface soil and grass after periods of wet, cool weather, followed by several weeks of hot, dry conditions.

Grazing animals - such as cattle, sheep, goats, exotic and domestic deer,

and horses - ingest anthrax bacteria when they consume contaminated grass. By the time an animal displays signs of disease, including staggering, trembling, convulsions, or bleeding from body openings, death usually follows.

Domestic and wild swine are fairly resistant to anthrax and although they may become ill, some of these animals recover fully.

Anthrax outbreaks depend on two factors working together: the presence of the spores in the soil...and suitable weather conditions. Outbreaks usually end when cool weather arrives and the bacteria become dormant.

An outbreak may occur one year, but not the next. Death loss may occur in one pasture, while animals nearby remain healthy.

Census figures released for counties

The United States Constitution requires that a census be taken every 10 years to determine how many seats each state will have in the House of Representatives. The census is a valuable tool to obtain statistical data about the nation and its people. Answers to seemingly unimportant or even invasive questions are used to determine such things as planning highway construction, budgeting for grants or medicaid funding requirements.

Crockett County's 2000 census revealed a population of 4,099, up 0.5% from the 1990 total of 4,078. Statewide, the population increase was 22.8% to 20,851,820.

Anthrax can occur anywhere, but in Texas, cases most often are confined to a triangular area bounded by the towns of Uvalde, Ozona and Eagle Pass. This area, designated below, includes, portions of Crockett, Val Verde, Sutton, Edwards, Kinney and Maverick Counties. In these counties, many livestock producers routinely vaccinate livestock against the disease. Currently no cases have been reported in Crockett County.

When anthrax outbreak begins, veterinarians will have the initial cases

confirmed through laboratory tests conducted at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory in College Station. Subsequent cases in an outbreak are to be expected and may be diagnosed clinically, based on disease signs and sudden death loss.

Anthrax is a reportable disease, and the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) is to be notified of confirmed and suspected cases. Reports can be made to TAHC area offices, or the TAHC headquarters at 1-800-550-8242.

Crockett County 4-H'ers win first place in shooting contest

On July 6 and 7, the Crockett County shooting squad matched their shooting skills against those of several other counties and competitors at the District VI 4-H shooting competition in Midland. The squad was made up of five shotguns who were: Jake Stewart, Quay Oglesby, Lana Stewart, Josh Long and Brandon Jobe. Lana and Quay were the only ones competing at the senior level.

Jake won second in trap and sporting clays and also placed a low fifth in skeet. Josh placed a second in skeet and a third in trap and then failed to place in sporting clays, but earned the right to be called the Junior High Over-All Shooter. This means he had the best average in trap and skeet.

Now moving on to the senior shooters, Lana and Quay fell short of placings in these events, but they did

come through with the high 2-man team in skeet. Lana also won the lady all around buckle.

Two of the people making the trip possible by hauling the shooters were Kay Stewart and Sally Oglesby. The shooters leave for the state competition in San Antonio today. The team is coached by Eddie Stewart.

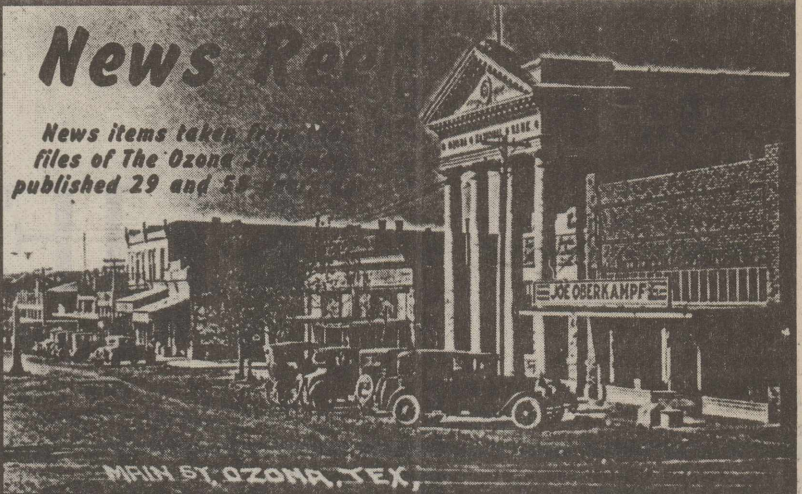

Tech mammography unit here Aug. 1

The Ozona United Methodist Church Wesley Nurse Program is hosting the Texas Tech Mobile Mammography Unit on Aug 1. The cost is \$75.00 and will be filed with your insurance company. Medicare pays for one screening mammography per year and other programs are available to provide funding for those who qualify.

A mammogram is a low dose x-ray of the breast and can find cancers too small to be felt. They can also show changes in the breast tissue that could be a sign of very early breast cancer. When used with physical ex-

Mammography can be a lifesaver for men, too

Although women are 100 times more likely to suffer breast cancer, an estimated 1,600 men in the United States will be diagnosed with the disease this year.

"A lump beneath the nipple is the usual initial sign of breast cancer in male patients," says Dr. Alan Appelbaum, assistant professor of radiology at UT Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas.

Warning signs like nipple retraction, nipple fixation to skin and bloody discharge from the nipple are more common in men with breast cancer than women with the disease.

"Mammography is highly accurate in distinguishing benign breast disease from breast cancer in men," Appelbaum says. "Men who discover breast lumps should consult their physician immediately. A mammogram with benign findings may eliminate the need for biopsy."

amination of the breast, mammography has proven to be effective in saving lives.

Risk factors for breast cancer include being a woman, getting older and/or having a close family member with breast cancer.

The American Cancer Society recommends a mammogram every year for all women age 40 or over. The presence of a strong family history of breast cancer or other factors may alter these recommendations. Check with your health care provider if you have any questions.
