## Flu vaccine available

Flu vaccine is now available at Family Health Center of Ozona. The vaccine had been expected to arrive late again this year. This year's strains of flu are New Caledonia, Panama and Victoria.

Flu shots will be given between the hours of 6:00 and 9:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Cost is \$10.00. To make an appointment, call 392-3788. October and November are the

best times for persons 65 years of age or older, people with chronic health conditions and health care workers to get flu shots. November is the best time for flu shots for people 50-64 years of age or who live with those 65 or older or those with chronic health conditions.

You can get a shot at any time during the flu season, which extends through February.

## Hubbard brings new kind of hunting to Crockett County

A new kind of hunting comes to Crockett County this weekend. On Saturday, Oct. 13, Perry Hubbard's game birds will be ready for hunting.

Hubbard had no intention of starting a business when he bought a pair of pheasants. His Nebraska father-in-law had often told him about these game birds, and "the first pair I

ever saw, I bought," Hubbard said. He acquired the two in February from a bird hunting business and soon decided he wanted to try raising game birds and running a hunting operation.

"There are not any in this part of the country, and it is something else for people to do," Hubbard explained.

"I didn't even have a pen when I

bought the pair." The first two pheasants went into the dog's pen, then Hubbard decided to get chukar quail, too. This meant building another pen. He quickly had nine pheasants and 12 chukars to begin his breeding program. Next year he plans to add bobwhite quail.

Eggs go into an incubator in the storage area next to his carport. The hatchlings are transferred to a brooder in a nearby barn back of the house, and after five or six weeks, the young birds graduate to a growing pen.

To prevent grown pheasants from killing each other, they are outfitted with green plastic blinders in front of their eyes. They see well enough to the side to eat, but not well enough to fight, he explained.

The first batch of pheasants and chukars hatched on top of their bathtub, said Hubbard. "I thought my wife would holler when I put the incubator in the bathroom, but she didn't." So far she tolerates the game bird business, he said. "I hope it works."

A trip to Booker for a learning session at Harper's Game Farm, vis-

its with other breeders, and a great deal of reading of the game bird breeder's bible, *Game Bird Propagation*, have helped Hubbard start his business. "If I'd read that book first, I probably wouldn't have gotten into it," he quipped.

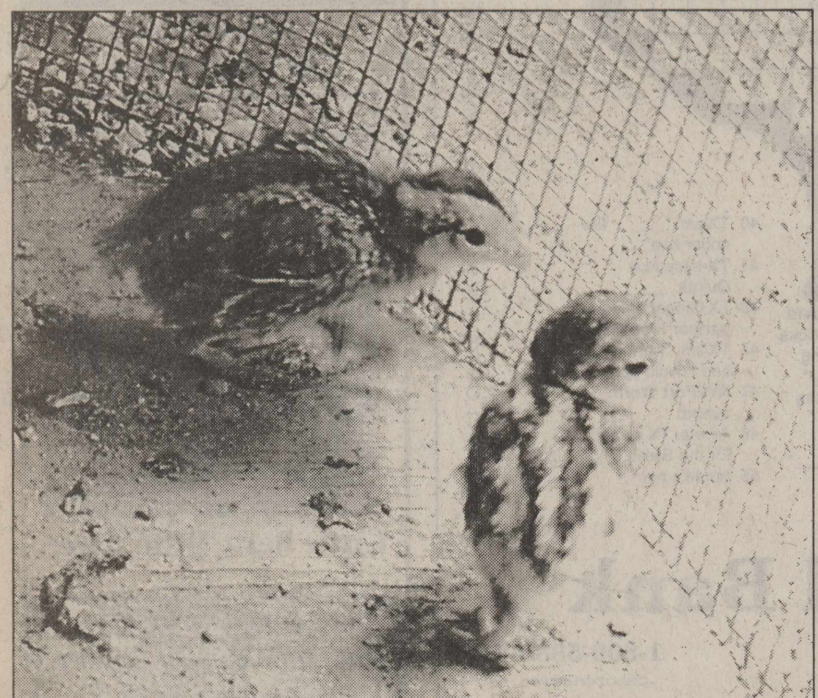
Hubbard is required to be licensed both as a game bird breeder and as a hunting operation. Hunters must also have licenses.

He has more than 100 birds ready for this weekend. "If I run short, I can go to another breeder and get some," he said. Hubbard has a selection of terrain for the hunter. Open, brushy, hilly, the area is up to the client. Hunters have an opportunity to bag a specified number of birds for a set price. Toward the weekend, he will move some birds to ranch pens in preparation for his opening day.

Interested persons are welcome to come to his home and ask to see the birds. Either Perry or Virginia will be glad to show their feathered crop. You may call Perry Hubbard Game Birds at 392-2743.

## Care center laundry expansion outlined

Benny Gibbs, administrator at Crockett County Care Center, is enthusiastic about increasing capabilities at the center's laundry. Gibbs told commissioners Monday that his board has approved a laundry expansion plan which will allow on-site washing of sheets, towels and coverlets.

Gibbs said the expansion can be paid off in 14 months and could result in as much as a \$22,000.00 savings to the facility annually. The care center spends \$30,000.00 to \$40,000.00 a year for these services now according to Gibbs.

Architect Henry Schmidt of San Angelo and his engineer, Paul Wilkerson, have looked at renovating the present laundry compared to a separate building. Renovation is estimated at \$36,900.00 compared to \$70,000.00 for a laundry building at the center, Gibbs told the court.

He has applied for 15 grants for assistance with the project. From those he has received seven responses, some of which are requesting more infor-

mation. One response included an award of \$250.00 toward the laundry expansion.

The administrator also reported on a plan to enlarge the dining room at the center. Extending the room to the west is deemed to be the best solution. A roof and concrete slab are already in place outside the dining room.

Gibbs also talked with the court during his report Monday about reimplementing the scholarship program at the center. A plan involving scholarship assistance of 80% tuition and 100% book expense is being considered.

For every \$175.00 of tuition paid, the scholarship recipient would be required to work at the center for one month. If the student is dismissed from the educational nursing program or does not meet the committee's rules and or guidelines, said student would be responsible for repaying the amount of the loan within 60 days.

## Library joins TexShare program

Commissioners used part of their Oct. 8 meeting to re-vote on insurance items handled at a called meeting Sept. 28. They approved general liability insurance and commercial inland marine insurance, which covers some off-road equipment. An agenda item to approve an interlocal agreement with Trident for the Texas Association of Political Subdivisions Pool was tabled for lack of information.

Judge Johnny Jones told the court he has been informed that the new general liability policy excludes organized races and stunts such as rodeos. The possibility of having groups provide their own special events insurance was discussed. This type insurance for a one or two day event could cost a minimum of \$500.00, Jones said. They agreed to see if the county can get blanket special events coverage.

Commissioners voted to adopt a new policy regarding use of the county library. By doing so, the door is opened for local library patrons to participate in the TexShare Library Card Program. Through this program, those with TexShare cards may check out books at any participating library in the state.

Recommendations by the library board that Laurie English and Judy Churchill be appointed to the board were accepted by the court. They will replace Kay Baker and Mike Brown who have resigned.

Work is almost complete on County Road 102 where rerouting is being done. The old section should be ready to be closed to the public this week, and the new section ready for use according to Eddie Moore, road and parks superintendent. Commissioners Rudy Martinez, Frank Tambunga, Pleas Childress III and Freddie Nicks voted to approve the change. Judge Jones abstained.

Moore indicated that he has enough gravel left from paving season to apply the second coat to the parking lot at the Senior Citizens' Center. Several roads will also receive spot repair.

Calvin and Keith Fitzhenry of Texas Calkaf met with commissioners to submit a preliminary plat for a subdivision of property they have purchased in Crockett County. The court voted to accept their preliminary plat for the 3,909 acre subdivision, which is part of the former Marshall Montgomery Ranch. They established a subdivision in Sutton and eastern Crockett Counties several years ago prior to this county's requirement for

plats. Commissioners voted to enter a contract and agreement with Midland County for detention of juvenile offenders and also voted to enter an agreement with Tom Green County for placement and treatment of adjudicated juvenile offenders.

The court also approved, in two separate votes, interlocal agreements with Emerald Underground Water Conservation District and the school district for property tax collection. Collection of these taxes is done through the county tax assessor/collector's office.

They also voted to impose a fee on those who do not pay their court ordered fines and fees. In a separate agenda item, the court approved entering a contract for collection of such fines and fees with McCreary, Veselka, Bragg and Allen, the firm which collects the county's delinquent taxes. This contract for collection is done under a new statute. There is no cost to the county, and the collecting firm gets 30% of what they collect.

Also approved was a resolution establishing rules and regulations regarding use of excessive force during nonviolent civil rights demonstrations. This resolution is required as part of the water district's community improvement grant funds from which are administered by the county.

For the second time, commissioners tabled action on adopting an order in accordance with the Local Government Code, Section 240.002 as amended which prohibits the keeping of certain wild animals. This must be adopted by the end of December, Judge Jones said. Commissioners are able to determine which animals are on the prohibited list, he said.

The sample list includes lions, tigers, ocelots, cougars, leopards, cheetah, jaguars, bobcats (except for trapping purposes), lynx, servals, caracals, hyenas, bears, coyotes, jackals, baboons, chimpanzees, orangutans, gorillas and hybrids of these animals.

Two proclamations were approved by the court during the course of the day. One proclaimed Chamber of Commerce Week and the other declared October to be Longtime Residents' Rights Month.

Reports were presented by Sheriff Shane Fenton, Joyce Young for the civic and youth center, Shanon Biggerstaff for the chamber, librarian Louise Ledoux, Benny Gibbs, care center administrator, Eddie Moore for the road and parks departments and by John Stokes, auditor.

#### BEEF HOMINY SKILLET

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/4 c. chopped green pepper
- 1/2 env. (2T) chili seasoning mix
- 2 T dry onion soup mix
- 1 (16 oz.) can yellow hominy, drained
- 1/4 c. water
- 1/2 c. (2 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese

In skillet, brown beef. Drain off fat. Stir in hominy, green pepper, water, chili seasoning and soup mix. Cook and stir until heated through, about five minutes. Sprinkle cheese over meat; cover and cook until cheese melts. Serves 4.

sang for staff and residents. This was enjoyed by everyone. Pat Nicks visited with staff and residents.

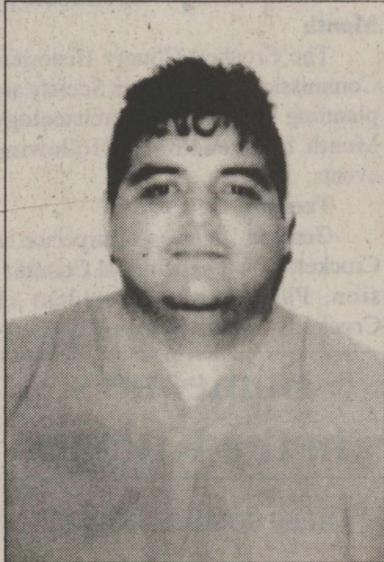
