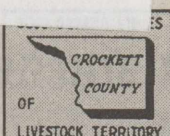

Dialing differently begins Oct. 4

Starting Oct. 4, West Texas residents in the 915 and the newly created 432 and 325 area codes will need to dial 10 digits (the area code plus the seven-digit number) when making local calls between the three area codes.

The dialing change applies to calls placed from a wireline or wireless phone. Local calls made within the same area code can still be dialed using seven digits.

During a six-month grace period that began April 5, the public has been able to make seven-digit local calls between the three area codes. The 432 and 325 codes were created to meet the growing need for phone numbers in West Texas. Between Oct. 4 and Dec. 7, people who dial just seven digits when calling between area codes will hear a recording telling them they need to redial using the proper area code.

Hurricane Isabel had little relevance to many in Crockett County; it didn't navigate up the Rio Grande and bring torrential rains to the area.

Ozona AEP employee Martin Childress personally experienced the aftermath on the East Coast, however. He was one of

several sent from this area to assist with restoring power to millions affected by the storm.

Childress got word Sept. 15 that he was needed to help with repairs and left for Roanoke, VA, the next day in an AEP truck with Mike Hines, an AEP employee from McCamey.

transmission lines and poles, they went on to assist others to restore power. Childress worked in the Richmond, VA, area and at one point told his family in Ozona there were 9,000 poles down and 15,000 crossarms to be repaired.

0. The third quarter marked the sure and certain stomping of the Buffaloes as the Lions came out ready to put more points on the board. With 4:29 left, it was Taylor again with a 5-yard run for the touchdown, and Pagan kicked another successful PAT to bring the score to 20-0 Lions. The Lions got the ball back, and with 1:55 left, scored once again. This time it was a 42-yard Hale pass to Brad Mayfield. The PAT was no good. The score at the end of the third quarter was 26-0.

The fourth quarter was much of the same with Ozona racking up the points. With 8:20 left in the fourth, it was an 8-yard run by Mayfield for the score. The PAT was no good, and the score was 32-0 Ozona. The last score of the game was a 22-yard run by Vince Castro that brought the final score

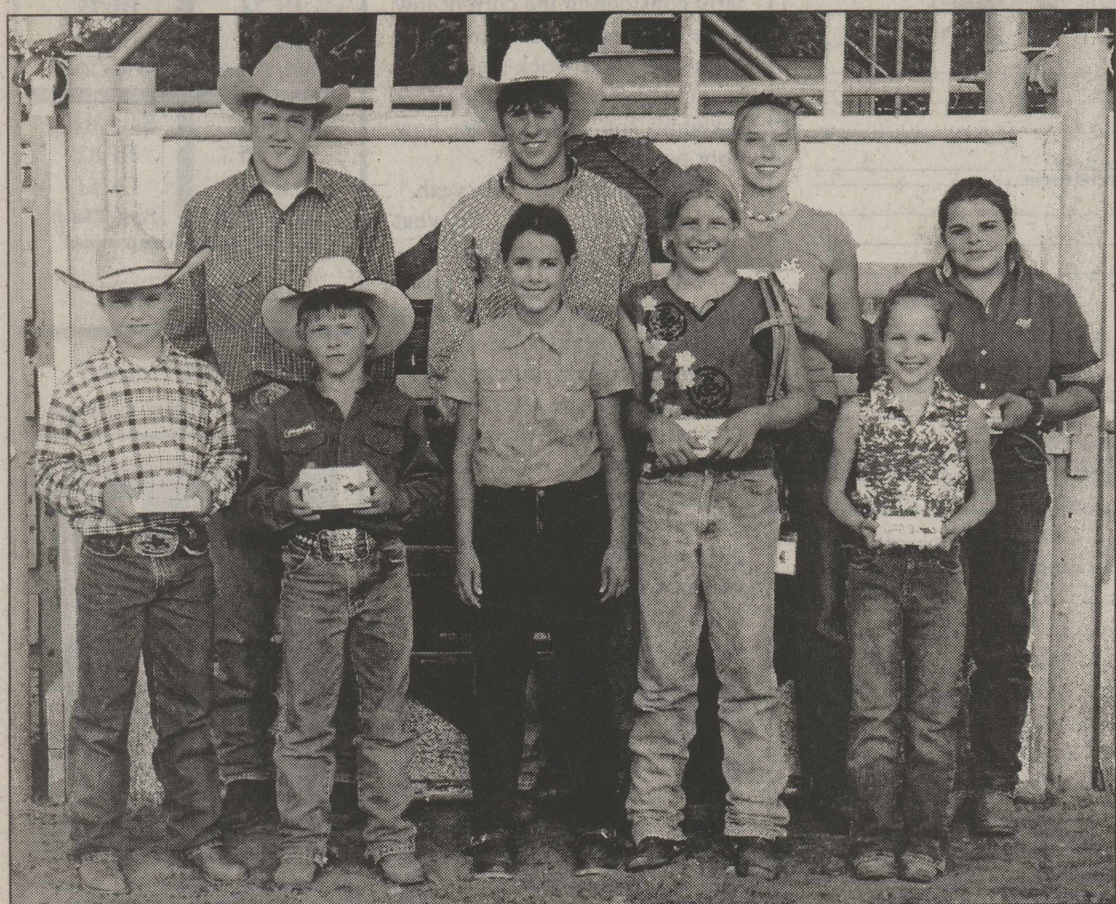

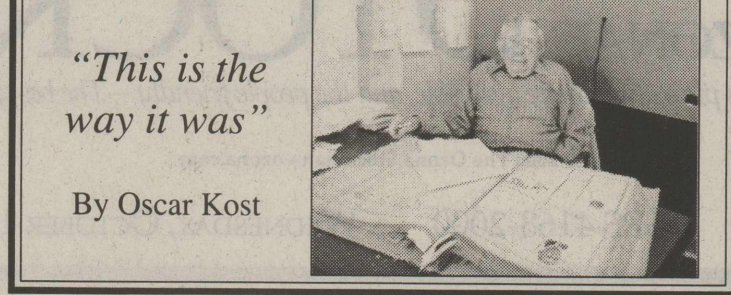

Folktales of Crockett County

From John Fluth
 A rancher came by one day and talked about the Ozona ranchers' problem of the low market for livestock, along with the problems of taxes and high expenses. He offered this example, "John, I can give you 20 sections of land for 20 years. You will not get hunting rights or mineral rights. All you can do is raise sheep, goats, or any kind of livestock. The odds are that at the end of those 20 years, all you will have to show for your work would be an old pickup truck."

In terms of dollars, he might be right. However, there is something besides money that keeps people here in our Ozona that Allan Bosworth called "our dry and bitter land".

Perhaps this story can help us understand what keeps a rancher here: One day, an executive and father of a very wealthy family living in Dallas took his son on a trip to show his son how poor people can be. He took his son to spend a few days on a ranch in West Texas, because the father considered a rancher's life to be hard and impoverished, particularly considering the current low price on livestock that this father followed on the stock market.

On their return trip, the father asked his son, "Did you see how poor people can be?"
 His son replied, "Oh, yeah."
 The father asked, "So what did you learn from the trip?"
 The son answered, "I saw that we have one poodle, and they have four working dogs. We have imported lanterns in our garden and they have the stars at night. Our patio reaches to the front yard and they have the whole horizon. We have a small piece of land to live on and they have land that goes beyond our sight. We have servants who serve us, but they serve others. We buy our food, but they grow theirs. We have walls

around our property to protect us and they have friends to protect them."

With this, the boy's father was speechless. Then, the son added, "Thanks, Dad, for showing me how poor we are."

Can you imagine how that father reacted to his son's observations? Could that executive sit at his desk and feel as powerful, knowing what his son had said? Would that father sit at his desk and long to be in Ozona?

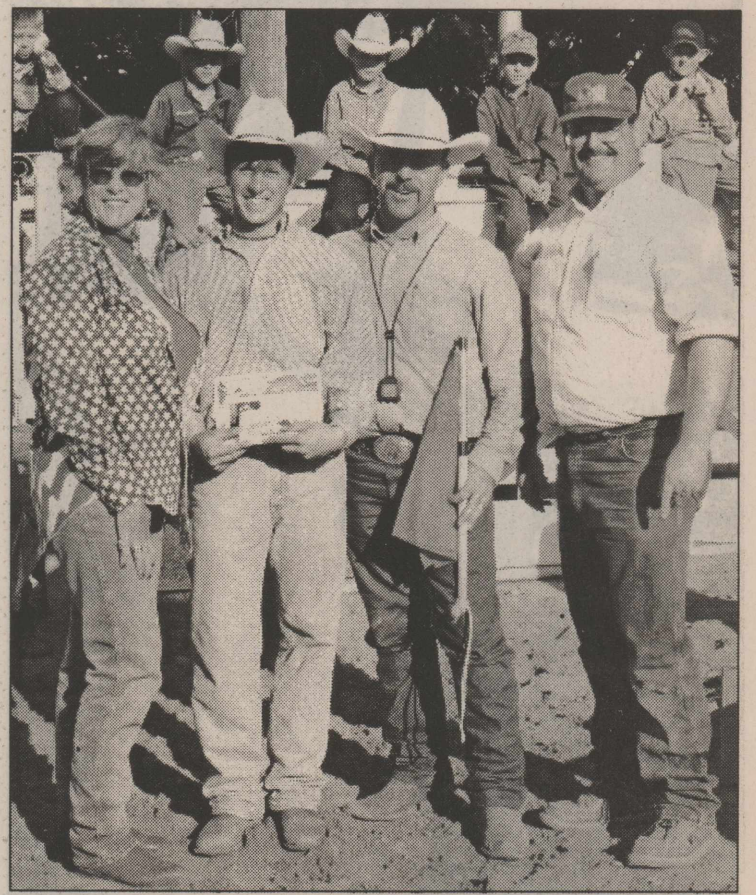

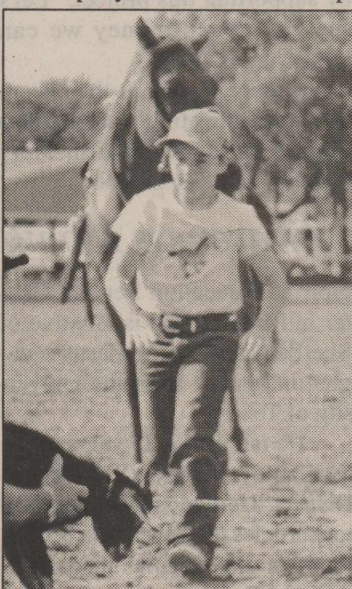

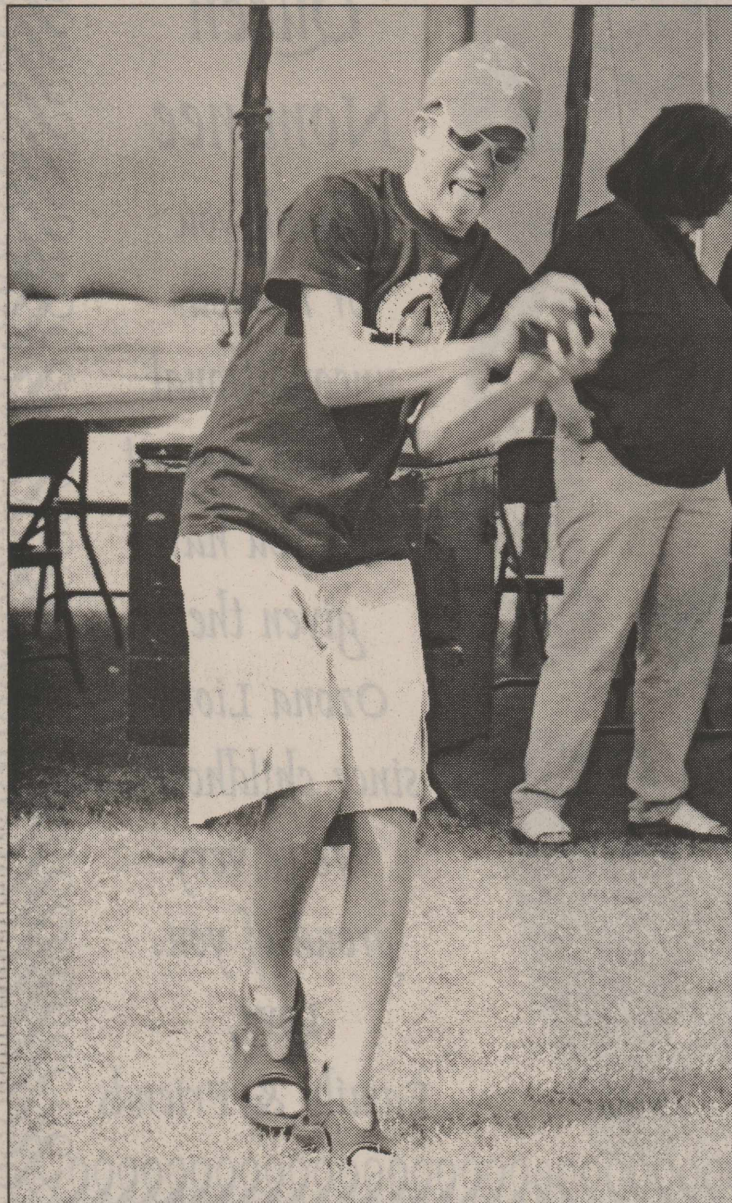

Creation of the new area codes will not affect rates or local calling areas. Calls that are local today will continue to be local calls after Oct. 4. Dialing long-distance calls within the three area codes will also not change.

The public should continue to dial "1," plus the area code, plus the seven-digit number to place a long-distance call. Dialing 911 to reach emergency services and 411 to reach directory assistance will also not change.

During the remainder of the grace period, consumers and businesses are encouraged to reprogram their telecommunications equipment and services including computer modems using dial-up service for Internet access, fax machines, speed-dialing lists, call-forwarding services and any other equipment that automatically dials telephone numbers.

Wireless phone users especially are encouraged to contact their provider or visit their provider's nearest wireless retail store because it may be necessary to reprogram their handset with the appropriate area code. Security or alarm systems and business

phone systems also must be programmed to handle the new dialing pattern.

The 325 area code will serve Abilene, Brady, Brownwood, Kingsland, Rising Star, San Angelo, Snyder and surrounding communities. The 432 area code will serve Alpine and southward to Big Bend National Park, Fort Davis, Fort Stockton, Midland, Odessa, Pecos, Seminole, Van Horn and surrounding cities. Far West Texas, including Clint, Dell City, El Paso and Fabens, will remain in the 915 area code.

In 2002, the Texas Public Utility Commission decided to introduce two new area codes in the 915 region to meet the demand for new telephone numbers. Demand is growing rapidly as West Texans and phone customers nationwide increasingly have a choice of companies to provide telecommunications service, and these competing companies require phone numbers for their customers. NeuStar Inc., the national administrator for area codes, selected 325 and 432 as the new area codes for the eastern and central parts of the 915 area code region.

the safety and security of the landowners we serve. Quick response to an emergency might help save a life, or critical minutes gained in the event of any tragedy," said Larry Williams, chairman of the board.

The board of directors agreed that it would be beneficial if emergency personnel were looking for uniform signs rather than each landowner trying to build something on their own. As a promotional project for the SWCD any money that is earned goes back into local conservation.

To verify your correct 911 address, contact the 911 addressing coordinator's office at 392-8888 where you will be given your 911 address. Once you've obtained your 911 address, come by the Crockett SWCD office located at 201 11th Street to purchase your sign. Cost is \$10.00 for a single-sided sign or \$15.00 for a double-sided one. Our office is open Monday through Friday.

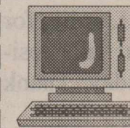
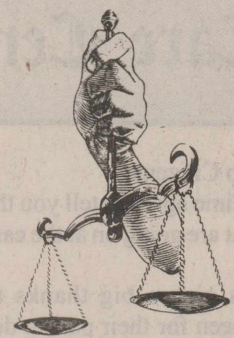

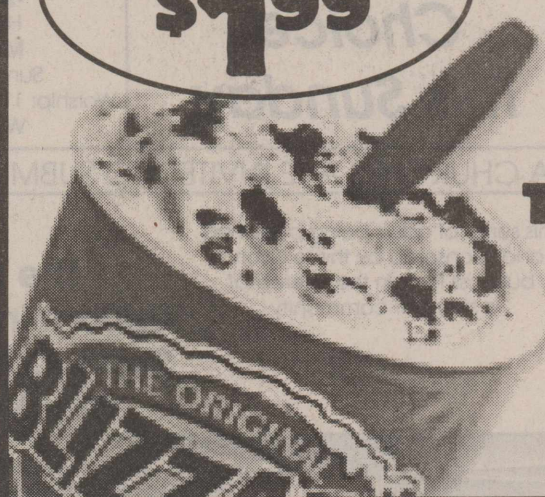

nagging injuries and continue to improve their times every week.

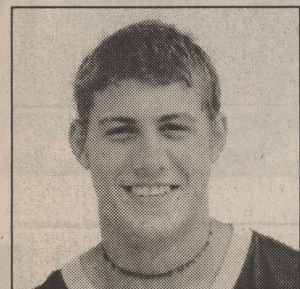

Dorper research trial at Barnhart station

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's research flock of Dorper sheep still has room to grow, and donations are being solicited. The flock was started earlier this year in response to producers' questions concerning just where the hair-type sheep might fit into Texas agriculture.

Dr. Dan Waldron, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station geneticist who oversees the animals, said his initial research project calls for 100 Dorper ewes. "We're currently just over a quarter of the way there," he said. "That's enough to get started, but I'm still looking for more donated ewes for this project."

Waldron's study will evaluate lifetime lamb production in a range sheep operation. Dorper and Rambouillet ewes will be bred to rams of a third breed to produce crossbred lambs. These crossbred lambs will be evaluated for growth and carcass traits. The project will probably last from six to eight years. After the first few crossbred lamb crops are produced, the Dorper ewes will be bred to Dorper rams to produce high percentage Dorper replacement ewes to maintain the flock's numbers.

Waldron said the Dorper sheep, which is typically white with a black head, was developed as a meat-producing animal in South Africa, which has climate and rainfall patterns similar to that of West Texas.

The sheep didn't reach the United States until the 1990s. There are still relatively few Dorpers in the country, which makes them expensive, thus out of reach for most production-oriented research programs.

"Dorper research in the United States has been done with crossbred animals due to the purebreds' high cost," said Waldron.

"These crossbreds usually result from mating Dorper rams with non-Dorper ewes. While this research has provided valuable information, an evaluation of Dorper ewes under range conditions is needed to assess their production relative to the Rambouillet, our most prevalent range breed."

Waldron recently received ewe lambs from several members of the American Dorper Sheep Breeders' Society. These were donated as the result of an earlier appeal by Waldron who wants a representative breed sample to make the research trial more meaningful.

"The Experiment Station is not interested in getting into the purebred Dorper sheep business," said Waldron. "But we are interested in providing sheep producers with the information they need to make a valid breed comparison for lamb production. No offspring from donated ewes will be sold as breeding stock."

Waldron said the Dorper is a hair breed rather than a wool breed. A sheep producer with Dorper ewes will not have shearing costs, but will also have no wool income. The Dorper pelt will not have the same end use as that of a wool breed, and this may make a significant difference to the producer's bottom line.

Breeders contributing lambs thus far are: Philip Glass, Water Valley; Michael Suddeh, Fredericksburg; Keith Kugler, Wyandotte, OK; Broadmead Farms, Amity, OR; and Riverwood Farms, Powell, OH.
