Though cut from the House's version of a school finance bill, the concept of using video lottery terminals (AKA slot machines) to relieve Texans and visitors of enough money to help the state's school districts may end up back in the Senate version of the bill.

Those in favor of legalizing slot machines at racetracks and Indian reservations and possibly allowing casinos in the state, say the devices could raise more than \$2 billion a year for Texas. That, supporters argue, may sound more attractive to lawmakers than hiking business taxes.

One idea rolling around would have the state collecting a \$25,000 license fee per machine and as much as 60 percent of the revenue.

Work on the bill begins in the Senate this week with the special session clock ticking toward a

HOW CAN YOU RECOGNIZE A PIPELINE LEAK? Signs of a pipeline leak include:

A hissing or roaring sound.

Any strange or unusual odor in the area of the pipeline.

A dense white cloud or fog.

A spot of dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise green

Liquid petroleum products on the ground.

Flames occurring, if the leak has ignited.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO IF YOU SUSPECT A LEAK? If you know or suspect that a pipeline is leaking or is damaged, LEAVE THE AREA IMMEDIATELY.

Your personal safety should be your first concern. Also:

Avoid driving into vapor clouds

Avoid direct contact with the escaping liquids.

Avoid creating sparks or sources of heat, which could cause liquids or vapor arising from them to ignite and burn.


