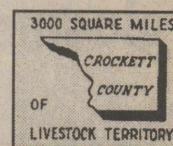

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## Board terminates primary school principal's contract

During a special called meeting, the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Board of Trustees voted to terminate primary school principal Robert Lacy's contract effective Aug. 1.

The board met for nearly an hour and a half in executive session Thursday night before they approved 4-0 the decision. Board members Kenny Wadsworth and George Ybarra were absent, and member Veronica Fierro left after the executive session.

Lacy now has 15 days to prepare a written request to the education commissioner in Austin if he chooses to appeal the decision, according to the Texas Education Code.

If that happens, the school district then would have 15 days after the date of Lacy's request to file a response, the code stated.

From there, the commissioner would appoint a hearing officer for a hearing.

Lacy has been on suspension without pay since the end of May. Intermediate school principal Manley Holmes has been acting principal for the primary school

as well as performing regular principal duties at the intermediate school.

Superintendent Jim Ramage had no comment about Lacy's termination, other to say the board will take no action right now into finding a new principal.

Lacy has been principal since 1999. He was previously employed as superintendent in Eola Independent School District from 1979-1983, Harrold ISD from 1983-1985 and Paradise ISD from 1985-1990.

In 1990, Lacy moved back to Water Valley to go into his family's ranching business before he was hired by CCCSD in 1999.

The board also approved several new teacher recommendations.

They are Angela Bureson, Shauna Yeager, Karen Moore and Benny and Shana Granger.

Bureson and Yeager, both of Ozona, will be employed at the intermediate school.

Holmes said he is anticipating four teachers each for the third, fourth and fifth-grades for the upcoming school year. There will be 48 students in fifth-grade, 59 in fourth-grade and 63 in third-grade.

Dr. Marcus Sims said he was concerned with so many teachers for the number of students.

Ramage said this is part of departmentalization, which will enable the district to create a loop from second to third grade. He also said that the district has not hired a teacher for every one that resigned.

"We've got to have four teachers in order to make a true loop," he said. "The TAKS test was considerably harder than last year. We're going to be a whole lot close to everything being level."

Sims said his concern was the budget.

"I don't want to be cheap, but I want to be efficient. I am for the education of the kids and not against raising the tax rate if we need to, but I'm also for spending less if we can."

Moore, who will be moving to Ozona from the Kaufman School District, will fill a position as seventh- or eighth-grade English teacher.

Shana and Benny Granger, who will be moving from Iraan, will fill positions in both the middle school and high school.

## Congressman Bonilla addresses Ozona residents on various topics

The war on terrorism, the federal deficit and the upcoming presidential election were some of the topics discussed by U.S. Rep. Henry Bonilla, R-San Antonio, on June 30 in front of the Crockett County Courthouse.

Several Ozona residents and neighbors joined Bonilla as he not only spoke, but answered questions as well.

On the war in Iraq, Bonilla said he was happy about the recent developments in being able to turn the country back over to the Iraqi government.

"If this war wasn't important then why is every terrorist focused on getting us out? This is a battle that will go on well past our lifetime," he said. "This is a cancer that the earth is facing, and as long

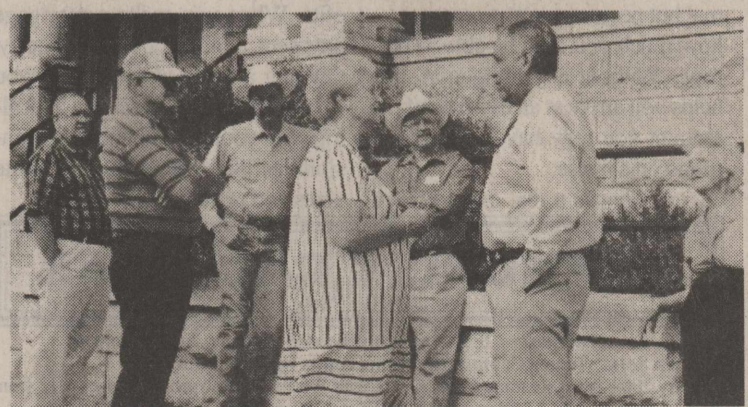

Bonilla also said that moral is high in our military and that the American people should be proud of what the United States is doing in the war today.

Bonilla said as always it's a difficult problem in finding a middle ground, but that he feels with the economy looking up things could be turning around again.

As for the presidential election, Bonilla said he feels it will come down to the wire with President Bush pulling out front.

"For every person that likes Bush, there's another person that hates him," he said. "I don't know how our country evolved like this. A lot of people in this world would like to see this president go down in flames. Americans should look at that and how they vote."

Texas Silver-Haired Legislature member Brigitte Rogers said she was concerned about the new Medicare-approved drug discount card program, and how middle-class income people are the ones that will mostly likely be hurt from the program.

## Care center receives health foundation grant

Safer and better door latches are in the works for the Crockett County Care Center.

The center has received a \$2,750 grant from the San Angelo Health Foundation that will help pay for new latches on 34 doors in the building.

"It's to assure safety and that we meet government requirements," said Benny Gibbs, care center administrator.

The current latches the center has on their door are called roller latches. The latches have been linked as the cause of death for residents in some nursing homes across the country that caught fire last year.

As the heat of the fire approaches the latch, the roller expands and enabling the door to be opened, Gibbs said.

According to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, nursing home and health care facilities must have new latches installed by March 16, 2006.

The two-year time period is due to the financial burden associated with replacing roller latches, Gibbs said. The grant amount will cover all 34 door replacements for the care center, Gibbs said.

"There are nursing homes a lot bigger than ours that will be a lot more expensive," he said.

The San Angelo Health Foundation awarded \$698,164 to 11 Concho Valley organizations. The foundation considers requests for funding on a quarterly basis and has committed in excess of \$19 million for community facilities and projects in the seven years of grantmaking.

Applications for funding are accepted on an on-going basis.

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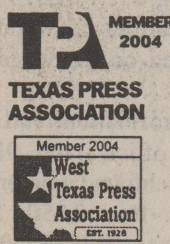
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## What's on My Mind

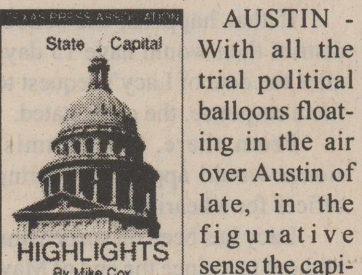
### NEWS REEL JULY 5, 1945

## Political balloons fill Austin with hot air



### AUSTIN - With all the trial political balloons floating in the air over Austin of late, in the figurative sense the capital city looks like Albuquerque during the national hot air balloon races.

If the 2006 gubernatorial primaries were held this week, these are the rumored contenders on the Republican ballot:

- Gov. Rick Perry
- Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn
- U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison
- U.S. Commerce Secretary Donald Evans
- Former presidential spokesman Karen Hughes
- The Democratic balloon ballot: U.S. Congressman Jim Turner.
- Austin public relations guru Roy Spence.
- Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn (This is not a typo: There's some buzz she's thinking about returning to her party of origin. Or that she'll run as an independent. Some buzz, too, that what she really wants to be is lieutenant governor.)

**Speaking of balloons...**  
 The Legislature's Joint Interim Committee on Nutrition and Health in Public Schools heard testimony recently that Texas kids are decidedly chubbier than their counterparts elsewhere in the nation.

A recent survey showed that Texas fourth-graders are 68 percent heavier than the national average, with eighth-graders weighing in 21 percent heavier.

Unless these kids cut back on their high-calorie dishes, testimony continued, the number of overweight Texans could double by 2040 with the number of obese Texans tripling. That would cause the attendant health care costs to put on a little weight too, to \$40 billion from \$10 billion.

**One in 2 million...**  
 Not exactly like winning the lottery, but last Friday a visitor to the Bob Bullock Texas State History Museum became the two-millionth person to walk into the downtown Austin museum since it opened in April 2001.

The visitor (because of early holiday deadlines the name was not yet available) received a welcome from museum director Lynn Denton, Austin Mayor Will Wynn and Austin Convention and Visitors Bureau head Bob Lander.

In addition to several handshakes, the surprised walk-in got a confetti shower, a gift basket and a free membership to the museum.

### Special session still in limbo...

Still no date set for a special session on educational finance. The governor said last week that until the legislative leadership comes up with a plan acceptable to all, he does not want to call lawmakers back to Austin.

A spokesman for Perry said the governor believes whatever the Legislature does probably will require a constitutional amendment vote, which means a session would have to act in time to get something on the November ballot.

That could happen as late as early October.

### Tragic anniversary remembered...

A decade ago, Texas gained one record no one wants to brag about: The deadliest single day on the state's nearly 80,000-mile highway system.

That was July 3, 1994, when 43 people died in traffic crashes in Texas in one terrible 24-hour period. Three multi-victim crashes (with 14, 11 and six deaths) added to the "routine" holiday death toll.

"We don't ever want to see another day like that," said Texas Department of Transportation Executive Director Mike Behrens. "We build our highways to be as safe as possible, but we need a little help from our drivers. Please don't drink and drive. Obey the speed limit and wear your safety belt."

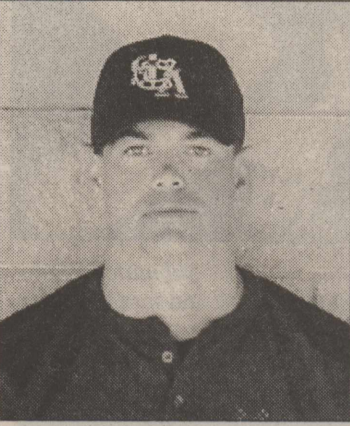

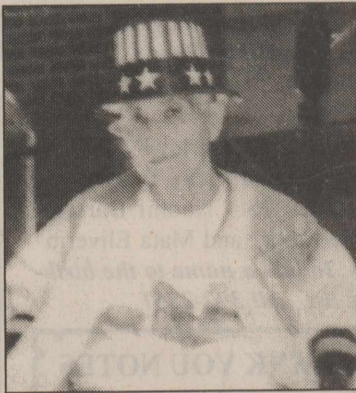

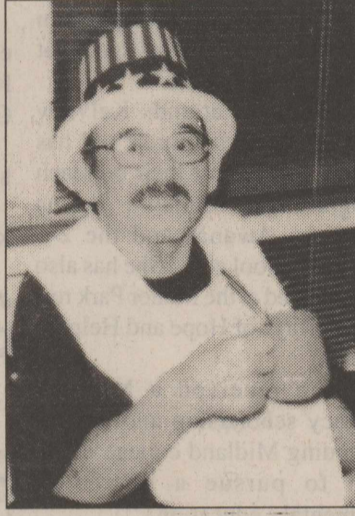

English teacher and Benny Granger will be the head girls track coach, middle school girls' basketball coach and teach the Alternative Education Program.

The couple previously taught 10 years in Sundown before moving to Iraan.

Resignations from Travis Breitschopf and Gwen Jamerson were also approved.

The board also approved several changes to high school guidelines.

Parking passes will be issued during the upcoming school year to high school students.

The passes will be color

coded for certain parking spots, students will have to pay for the passes and students without a drivers' license will not be issued a parking pass, said high school principal Steve Taylor.

Students that do not have parking pass will not be allowed to park on school property, Taylor said.

The board also approved changing policy guidelines for athletics, the drill team, cheerleading and other extra-curricular activities to state that girls who are pregnant must have a doctor's permission to participate. Other guidelines approved

were: high school students will only be allowed to wear shorts during the first and last six weeks, a student can count a TAKS score as a semester test grade making them exempt for their semester test if the student is happy with their TAKS score and if they meet the attendance requirement and if a junior passes all parts of the exit level TAKS, they can be exempt from all finals their senior year if they meet other requirements such as attendance.

The next scheduled school board meeting is 6:30 p.m. July 27 at the administration building.

The bill that was passed by Congress in November was more complicated than originally thought and it needs fine tuning, Bonilla said.

"I don't know what the magic answer is. It is a complicated issue and now we have to try to fix it," he said.

Bonilla also said that more responsible, domestic exploration for energy resources is needed.

"When the energy bill is done, I will support that and will over and over again," he said. "We need to get our re-

fineries up again." Bonilla's stop was part of his travels to several West Texas towns for this month's District Work Period.

"So often, the media spins the issues and makes them confusing for even the most intelligent people to understand. This is my chance to quell the rumors and give solid and realistic answers," he said. "I consider it an opportunity to catch up with old friends and made some new ones."

Bonilla presented Crockett County Judge Johnny Jones a flag

that was flown over the U.S. Capitol Building to be flown for the Fourth of July holiday.

Bonilla has represented Ozona since 1992. He was the first freshman to sit on the Appropriations Committee in 25 years. Bonilla is chairman of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee and is a senior member of the subcommittees on defense and foreign operations.

His congressional district is the largest in Texas and spans more than 800 miles of the Texas-Mexico border.

Due to the high water flow, the group encountered two class

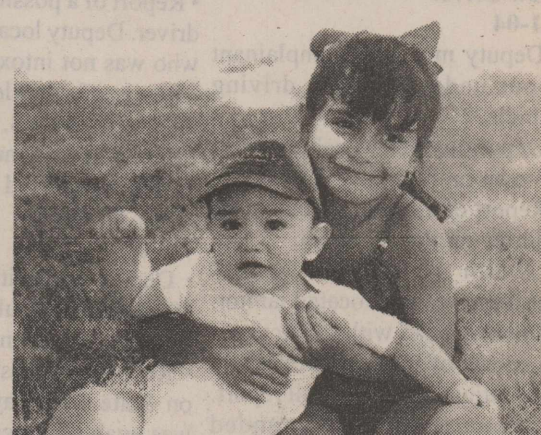
IV rapids, two class III rapids and several class II rapids.

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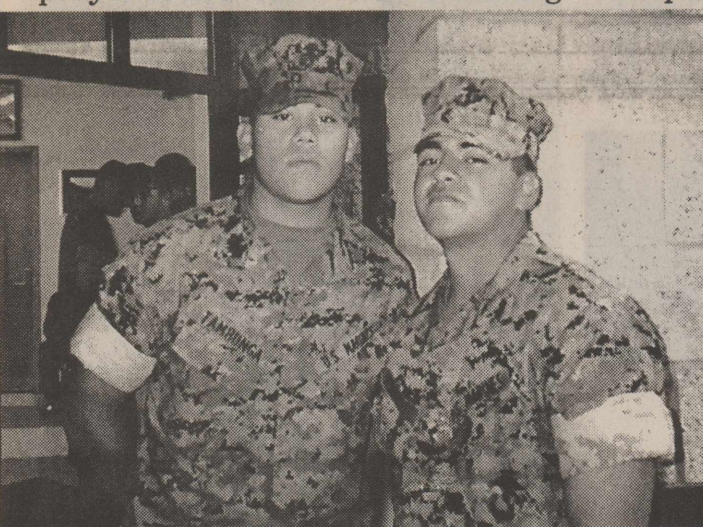

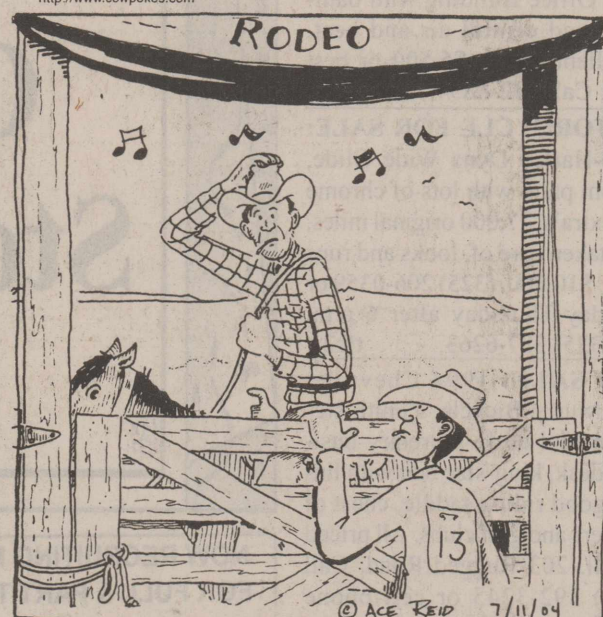

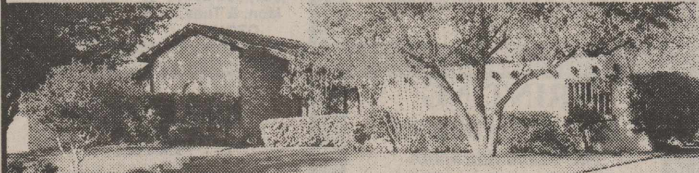
