

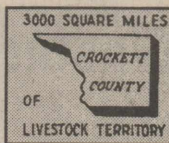

Packed school board meeting reviews budget, discusses meals

Fitness equipment to be sent back

In a packed board room, several community members addressed the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District Board of Trustees about a couple of issues in the district during a called meeting on Aug. 24.

Dan Pullen spoke to the board about the budget. He said the board should look at all expenditures and ask what the educational benefit is.

"We have an extremely expensive school system to maintain in Ozona," Pullen said. "It's your (the board's) responsibility to keep some of these things in check."

Some of the issues Pullen addressed included cutting back on travel expenses, rescinding former administrator's salary stipends and having teachers teach a minimum of four periods a day.

During the review for the 2004-2005 CCCCSD Financial Budget, the board discussed doing away with the \$250 stipend teachers are paid if they don't use their local sick leave days.

There hasn't been much paid on the stipend, and when it was put in two years ago it wasn't as an incentive, said Tom Anderson, board president.

"If it would have worked, it would have worked the first year we did it," Anderson said.

"The more fat we leave in the budget, the more fat that is spent," added Trustee Dr. Marcus Sims.

The board also requested a list of vehicles, what it's costing the district and how much would be saved if some were no longer used.

Athletic Director Jeff Streun recommended that the board work in \$8,400 to recondition the pole vault and high jump mats. Streun said the foam inside the mats was breaking down and this is a safety issue.

Business manager Cynthia Hokit said changes will be made in time for the board to approve the budget for the new fiscal year.

"Once we approve this budget, it's out of our hands," said Trustee Laurie Hale.

The board met last night to approve the budget, but due to press time information was not available. The information will be reported in the Sept. 8 issue of the Stockman.

The board also approved to non-appropriate the exercise equipment, which means the equipment will be sent back to the leasing agents. The proposed budget did not include any money allocated next year for the equipment.

The equipment was part of a program through the National Fitness Foundation which filed for bankruptcy in July. More than 600 school districts, including Abilene Wylie, Fort Worth and those near Houston, purchased fitness equipment from the foundation with the promise they would be reimbursed.

Frank Tambunga, Mack Richie and members of the Band

Boosters addressed students receiving meals on extracurricular road trips.

Tambunga presented a petition with 80 signatures on it that stated people wanted answers as to if students will receive a sack lunch or a sit down meal after games and that the people signing it were not in agreement with a charged parking permit at the high school, the shortage of teachers in the intermediate and primary schools and for remodeling houses that do not need to be remodeling when school buildings are leaking.

"Let's start from the top and cut before we affect our children," Tambunga said. "If we are asking our children to do some cuts then I want our administration to do some cuts."

"I'm not arguing the fact that our kids don't deserve anything to eat. I'm just saying treat everyone the same. I just want to see that the kids get treated the same. I'm here on behalf of the children," Richie added.

The board took no action on the meals at this time.

Last night's meeting did have the agenda item to discuss the parking permits for the campus. That information will also be reported in next week's Stockman.

The board also:

- Approved Crockett County 4-H adjunct faculty agreement.
- Approved health fair and college programs for scholarships.
- Approved opening of bids for the sale of property.

Yellow Jackets sting Lions in season opener

It was a tough opener for the Ozona Lions.

As they faced Kermit Friday night in Kermit, the Lions tried to overcome the Yellow Jackets' quickness and speed as well as the loss of a team member early in the game. In the end, it would be Kermit coming out on top with a score of 14-35.

"We made too many mistakes against a good football team," said Coach Jeff Streun. "We have a lot to correct and a short amount of time to get it done. Our kids, if I know them, will come out in practice this week and work hard at the little things and get better for this week's game against Brady."

The Lions got off to a shaky start with an interception by Kermit on the third play of the game. That would set up the Yellow Jackets for the first touchdown of the game by Kermit with 8:48 into the first quarter.

Ozona's next possession would result in Doug Duncan being injured and knocked out for the

rest of the game. Duncan suffered a knee injury and it's not known how long he will be out, Streun said.

The jackets would score again at the end of the first and then again four minutes into the second quarter bringing the lead to 0-22.

Ozona finally caught a break when quarterback Jordan Long passed to Jared Espino for a 15-yard-run. Two plays later, Long found Espino again for the touchdown. Toby Pagan's extra point was good putting the Lions on the scoreboard for the first time with 3:02 left in the second quarter.

A few seconds later, Nick Perez picked up an interception to score again for the Lions. Pagan's kick was good making it 14-22 at the end of the second half.

"Nick Perez really played well defensively," Streun said. "We need to develop more a running game in order to open up the passing game. It was a weird night. It seemed like if it was going to go wrong it did. We didn't have a lot of breaks offensively and we need to keep the ball longer in order to give our defense a better chance of stopping the opponent."

against the Brady Bulldogs Friday. Brady opened the season with a 54-0 win against Coleman. The game starts at 8 p.m. at Lion Stadium.

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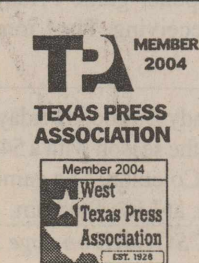
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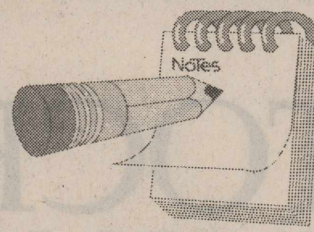
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What's on My Mind

Committee studies up on teacher certification

AUSTIN — How to finance public schools in Texas is not the only issue involving education that the Legislature will look at when it convenes in January.

At a meeting of the Senate Education Committee last week, another buzz word—or words—for something some perceive as bad began the journey to the mainstream: "testing into teaching."

That's academic talk for what some education administrators think is a serious problem with the system—teachers good at passing tests, but not necessarily experienced at teaching your children.

The principal of Austin's new University of Texas Elementary School Ramona Trevino told the Senate committee that a new teacher should not be certified until he or she has handled a class full of kids for a year.

The current method is for a new teacher to demonstrate competency by taking a test.

"Testing into teaching is unacceptable," the principal told the panel. The new UT-run school is a state-approved charter school open to any student. It's also a test tube operation aimed at developing new models for teacher and principal professional development.

The education committee's two interim charges are to study the need for legislation dealing with early childhood and how to grow the number of qualified teachers and retain the ones already on the job.

At three to five years of experience, 30 percent to 50 percent of young teachers become classroom dropouts, according to testimony.

The money, which could tally up to \$400 per teacher, became available Sept. 1, the beginning of the state's new fiscal year.

With money from a Texas Historical Commission fund, the papers were purchased for \$15,600 at auction in New York and presented to State Librarian Peggy Rudd on Aug. 20.

Quit Horsin' Around

I don't understand why sports in which animals are the stars are not more popular than people sports. After all, animal athletes don't beat their wives, record bad rap songs or get accused of rape.

And horse jewelry is not nearly as gaudy as that worn by NBA stars. Equine athletes are much better conditioned than their human counterparts too. Sept. 21 and 22

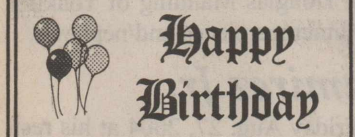
Hospice of San Angelo will host a volunteer orientation Sept. 21 and 22 at the Crockett County Senior Center.

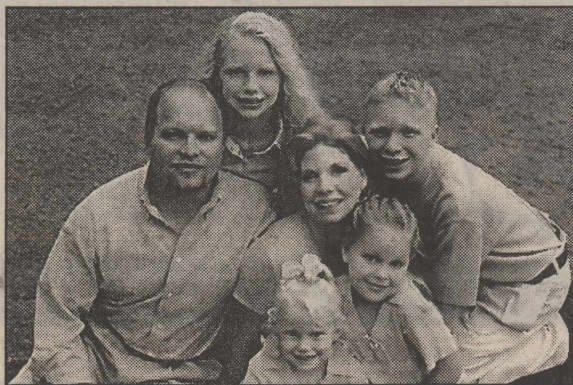

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FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

Care for your lawn in the fall is as important as in spring and summer. Regular care is the key to an attractive and healthy lawn through the fall and winter months. Here are few things you can do to help your lawn survive the winter and recover vigorously in the spring.

The first of September is the time to make your last fertilization of the year. It is one of the most important because it is the key to prolonging fall color and promoting early spring recovery of the lawn. It helps produce a dense turf that resists winter weeds. Fertilizer used in the fall should be higher in nitrogen and potassium and lower in phosphorus. Grasses fertilized this way have shown greater survival during winter months than those fertilized with high phosphorus.

Use a slow release 3-1-2 formula or buy a "winterize" product of your choice, allowing for good coverage. The "slow release" will feed through early

November, and with continued regular watering, produce a "hardy" root stock to survive the winter.

This is also the time to put out the pre-emergent chemicals to control unwanted weeds and grasses. First, identify the type of weed you need to control. For cool season grassy weeds such as rye or blue-grass, use products such as Balan, Amaze, or Team; for broadleaf weeds like henbit, use Gallery. Some of the above products may be available in combination with a fertilizer. Check with your nurseryman for his recommendation.

Watering: When your lawn goes dormant during winter months, it is important to remember the grass is living and needs moisture for survival. During the winter, if it doesn't rain for several weeks, then the lawn should be irrigated. Irrigation before a hard freeze is helpful in reducing freeze injury to the grass. It takes much colder air temperatures to lower the

temperature of a moist soil than that of a dry soil.

When it comes to lawn disease, Brown Patch and Take-All Root Rot are two fairly common fungal diseases that affect St. Augustine grasses. With our recent rains and high humidity, both could become active once the stress your lawn has endured due to summer heat gives way to milder, wetter weather.

- Other fall lawn tips:
- Water during the winter - 1/2 inch/week if rainfall is lacking
 - Aerify new sod - water, food and air must get through that gumbo base!
 - Don't "scalp" your lawn in the fall - mow grass and leave at least 2 inches high

FSA reminds producers of Crockett County committee nomination deadline

The Crockett County Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds America's farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) ESA County Committee nomination process is underway. Sept. 3, 2004 is the deadline for eligible voters to nominate themselves or local producers to serve on the ESA County Committee.

According to Jim Bob Solsbery, County Executive Director, County Committees play an important role in the local implementation and oversight of FSA programs, but the committee system is only as successful as the election process.

"A successful election requires maximum participation from all eligible individuals," Solsbery said.

Solsbery clarifies that in Crockett County, a seat on the county committee is currently open for Local Administrative Area (LAA) #3. This area includes the producers operating in Crockett County east of State Highway 163.

Individuals elected to serve on county committees help ensure

ESA agricultural programs adequately serve the needs of local producers. Committees make decisions on county commodity price-support loan eligibility, establishment of allotments and yields, conservation programs, disaster programs, employment and other issues important to the local agriculture community. USDA is implementing an enhanced outreach program to encourage greater participation in the county election process by socially disadvantaged and minority producers.

"Representation on ESA County Committees should be as diverse as the agriculture industry itself," Solsbery said. "A County Committee should mirror the demographics of the communities it serves - we need and welcome nominations and voter participation from all sectors of the agriculture community - men, women and minorities from all walks of life."

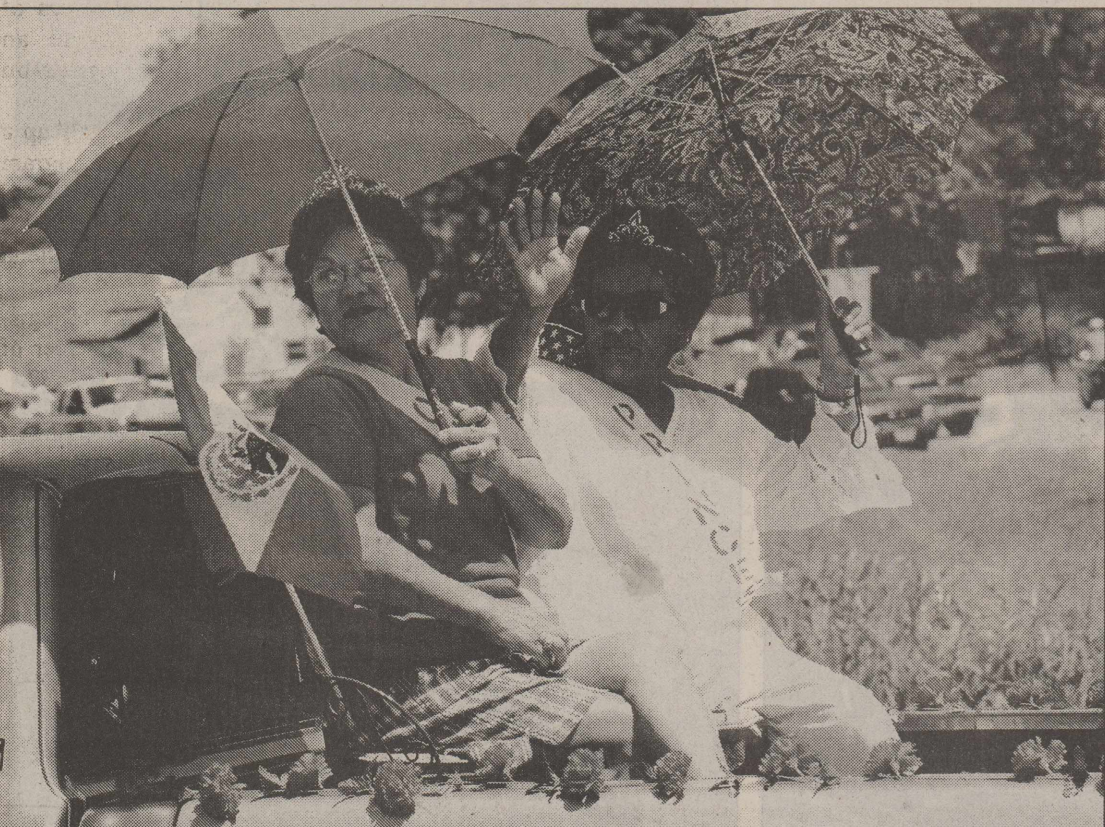

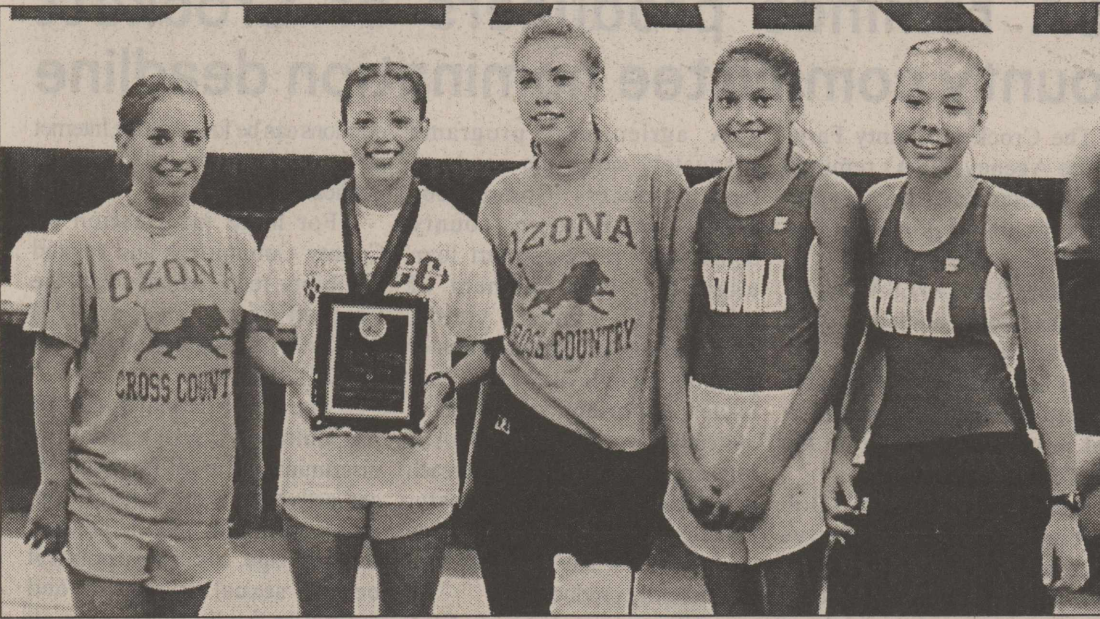

The Freshmen Lions will face Brady at 6 p.m. at Lion Stadium.

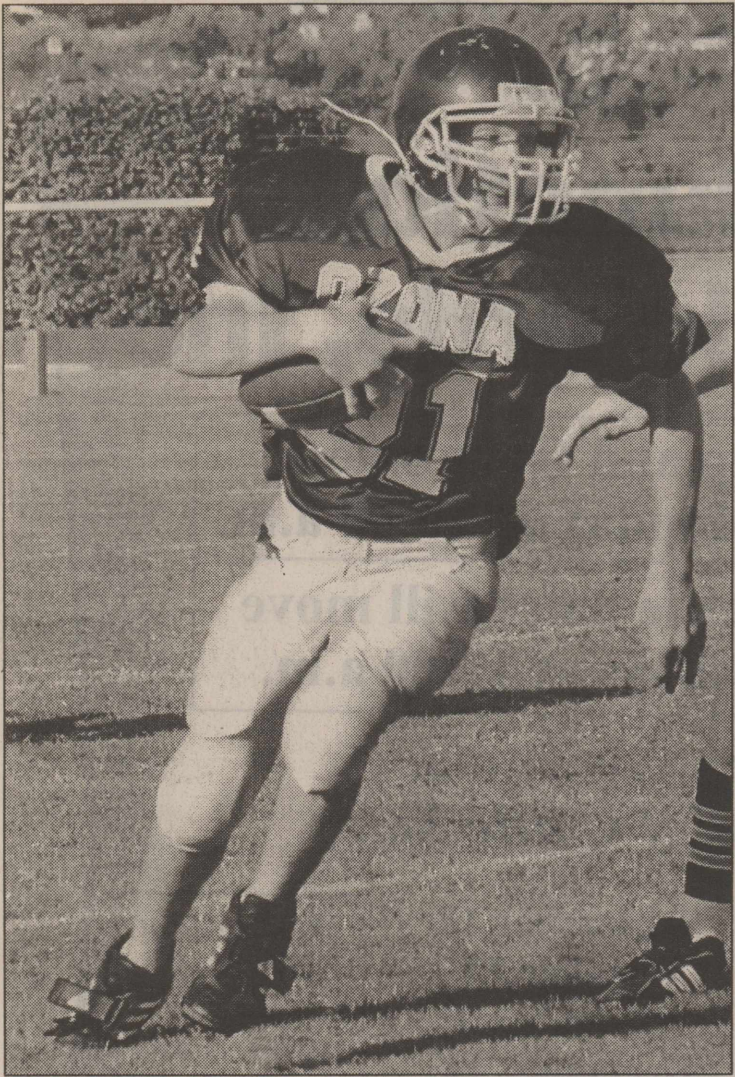

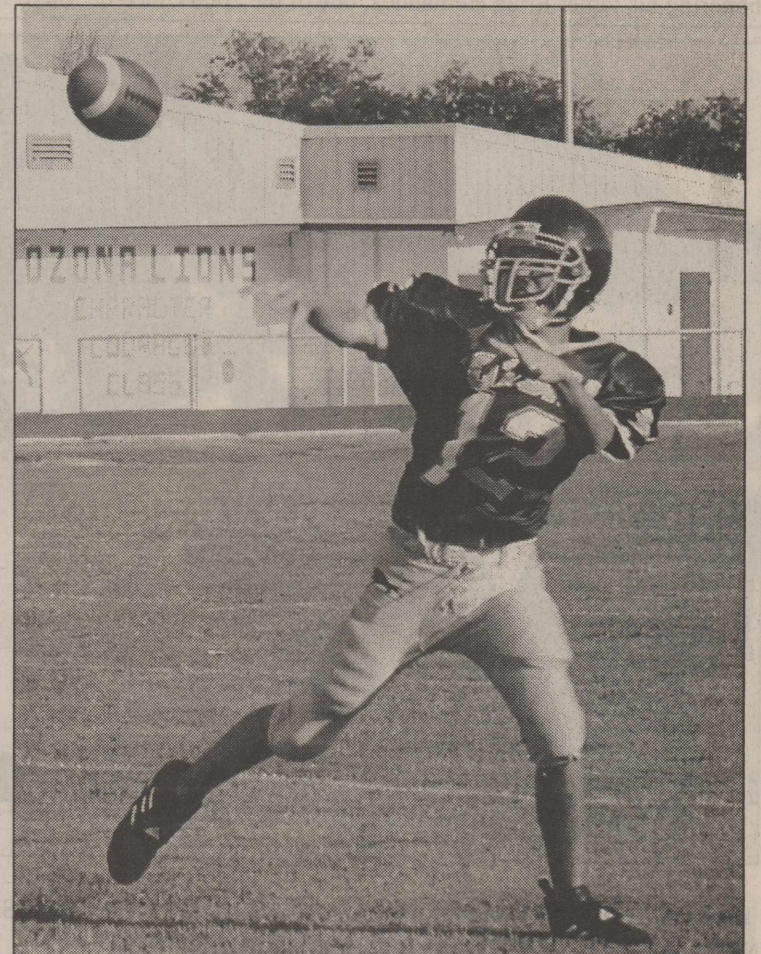

Watch out for e-mail and fax fraud

Better Business Bureaus continue to express concern about money SCAMS. It is hard for a lot of people to believe someone would fall for these "easy money" SCAMS, but it continues to happen. It has happened in Crockett County this year.

Now a SCAM, originating in South Africa is using e-mail and fax messages to ask people to help them move money out of Nigeria, South Africa, New Zealand, Brazil or Great Britain. The reasons for the request change but the message remains the same. They want access to your personal information and lead you to believe you will make a lot of money with no effort.

The letters ask for help, usually for some needy cause, by allowing "them" to deposit foreign money in your bank account. The cause may be to assist a widow undergoing major medical treatments, to

help the family of a person killed in a plane crash, or to help the Presidential Task Force on oil spillage clean-up.

The letter usually includes messages similar to the following: "We respectfully invite your kin attention to the transfer of U.S. \$25 million into your personal/company offshore account." "...You will receive 20% of the total sum, 10% for miscellaneous expenses and the remaining 70% is for me and my colleagues" and "It is our sincere conviction that you will handle this transaction with absolute confidentiality, maturity and utmost sense of purpose.

The letters will also request copies of your company letter-head, bank account numbers and in some cases information about how your company does business.

The SCAM is designed to gain access to your bank accounts or to have you send them earnest money. The chance for quick and easy money is more than some people can resist.

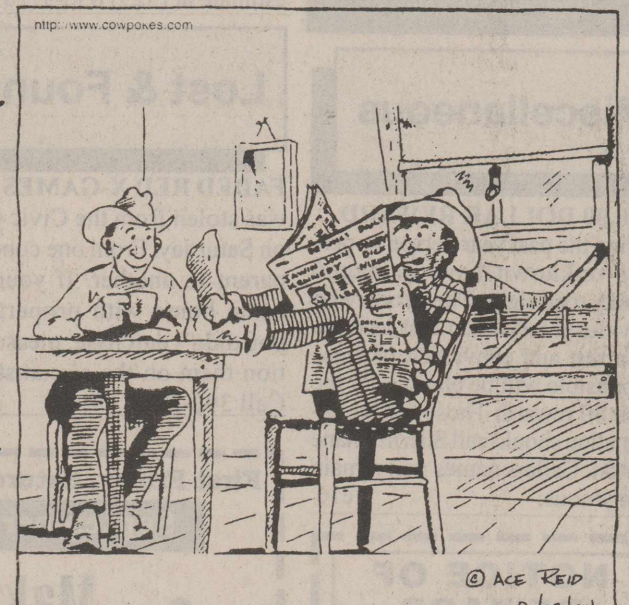
