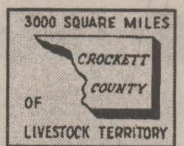

Lions cross country team wins state championship

The Ozona Lions Cross Country Team beat the top teams in the state to bring home the gold medals from the State Cross Country Meet this past weekend in Round Rock.

The Lions scored 65 points to win over Boys Ranch who had 69, followed by Krum with 82 and Wall with 88.

"This was a history making performance by these seven individuals," said Lenny Morrow. "It was flat out incredible."

As Ozona lined up for the race, Morrow said he started looking at the competition and realized that the five schools who have been ranked in the top 10 in the state all year long were around the Ozona team. There were more than 100 of the very best Class 2A runners and 12 of the premier Class 2A teams in the state competing.

"Teams like Boys Ranch, Krum, Paradise, Wall and Salado have dominated all season. Then steps in these skinny little guys from Ozona who were ranked ninth or tenth in the state a couple of times, but were never truly given the recognition they deserve," Morrow said. "However, championships are not won by the prettiest, the luckiest, or the most prestigious. Championships are won with toughness and pride. Ozona has the seven toughest runners in the state of Texas and they came home with a gold medal hanging around their neck to prove it."

Eliseo Treto, a regular at the

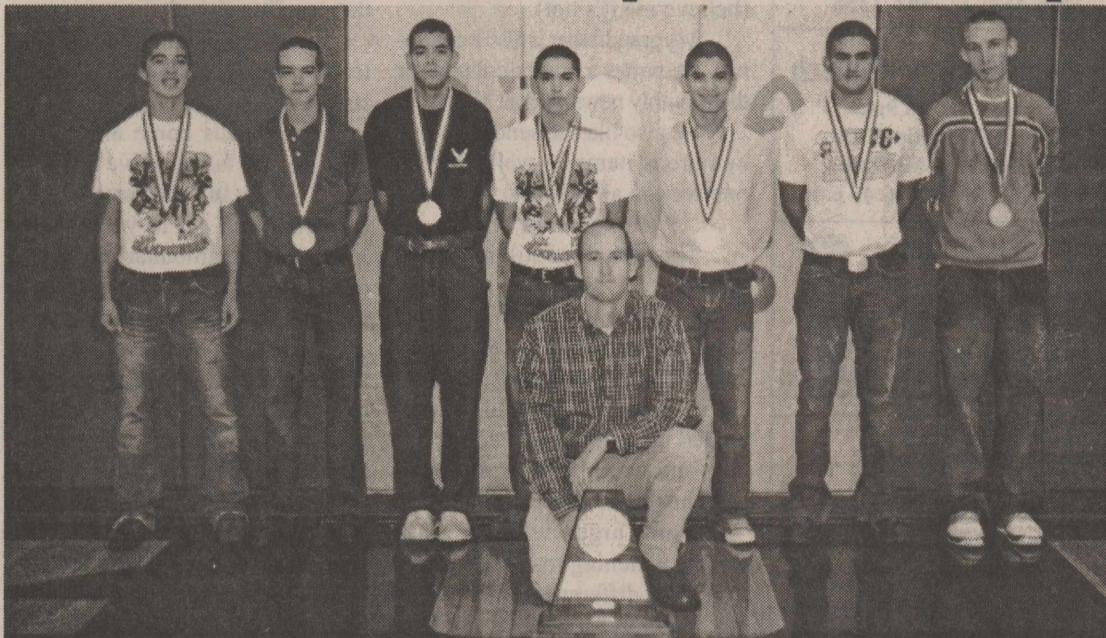

state meet, placed sixth overall with a time of 16 minutes, 21 seconds. This was an improvement over last year's finish of ninth at 17:03.

"Eliseo set the tone with a gutsy race. He ran the best race of his career. His time of 16:21 would have won the individual state championship three out of the last four years," Morrow said.

Levi English was the next Lion to cross the finish line in 17th place at 16:44, followed by Simon Garza in 27th at 17:02 and Tate Collis at 31st at 17:15. Roman Tambunga came in 37th at 17:27, Michael Maldonado was 75th at 18:35 and Derek Fierro finished 94th at 19:40.

"Really and truly this was a

team effort. However, I was a little nervous early in the race. Simon was boxed in much of the first mile and he had to fight the whole race to chase down the pack, but like good teams do someone else had to step up. Levi did that and more. He sailed to the finish line in ahead of three Boys Ranch individuals and a Wall runner that beat him at regional," Morrow said. "Simon then finished as strong as I've ever seen him. The difference in these big meets though is always the fourth and fifth runner on a team. Tate and Roman ran the race of their lives allowing us to pull off the unthinkable. Comparing times through the years, this was the fast-

est 2A State Championship ever and to see these guys step up to the challenge and run with such determination is inspiring."

The last time Ozona won a state cross country title was in 1987 when Danny Sanchez took the Class 2A individual title.

On the girls' side, Britney Ramos came in at 21st for her first state meet with a time of 12:15.

"Britney ran a gutsy race. It was probably the best race of her career. She put herself in position to finish with a medal and nearly pulled it off. There was less than 15 seconds between her finish and the Top 10. She has had an incredible year this season," Morrow said.

"Every generation has fought its war, from Pearl Harbor to Baghdad," he said. "We share a strong bond, a love of country and strong emotions to our comrades. Our heroic men and women are

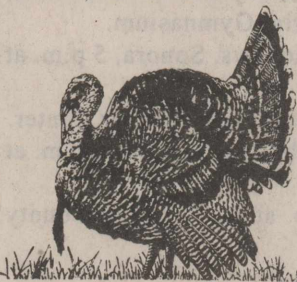

Where would we be in this world without the research done by professors at universities?

I really commend you for your efforts at Round Rock at the State Cross Country Championships this past weekend. The Boys Team and Britney really made Ozona Proud.

The list of past American Ig@Noble winners proves that research done here is much more practical.

They also don't receive a lot of credit for the time they put into their sport-but I'm hear to tell you that cross country is not easy and if you make it to the state meet you've accomplished something.

For example, New Mexico scientists bred a spiceless jalapeno pepper and Don Smith and his father came up with a process for partially bald men to comb their hair in such a manner as to achieve maximum coverage."

Such was the importance of the subject matter that two different teams of researchers, unbeknownst to each other, were working on the same subject.

You need to come by and see our residents snowmen and Santa. The residents love the two.

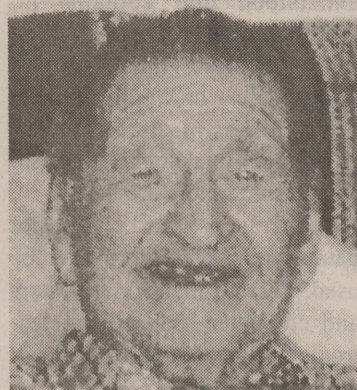

Venison quality depends on the hunter

Has the cook banned all venison from your home's kitchen? There are lots of reasons why people don't like venison, but the truth is, the decisions the hunter makes in the field influence venison quality more than what occurs in the kitchen. Venison is a quality red meat, rich in protein and low in fat. More than 11 million pounds of boneless venison are brought home every year.

How deer is handled prior to the kill and until its meat is eaten should be the prime concern when it comes to human health issues and culinary excellence. The hunter's role in venison quality begins with the animal harvested. A Texas A&M University taste panel found most participants preferred doe venison. That doesn't mean buck venison is low in quality. It simply means a female animal provides less flavor intensity.

Shot placement is another

factor influencing quality that's controlled by the hunter. Hunters should ensure a clean, rapid kill. This reduces stress on the animal and is the ethical responsibility of every hunter. Deer should be tagged immediately and field-dressed as soon as possible. Any method allowing clean removal of all viscera is acceptable. Immediate field-dressing also facilitates rapid carcass cooling. Wear latex gloves when field-dressing any big game for added safety. Debone all meat before freezing and don't eat the brain, spinal cord, eyes, tonsils, lymph nodes, or spleen.

Once field dressing is complete, the hunter is faced with a decision. If cold storage facilities are used, the animal should be refrigerated with the skin on to help conserve moisture. If the whole carcass is going home after cold storage, keep it covered to protect it from the drying

effects of the sun and wind and to prevent contamination from dirt or insects. Large frozen water bottles or gallon milk jugs placed inside the body cavity will help keep the deer cool on the trip home if the weather is warm.

If the decision is made to skin the deer at camp, the hide is easiest to remove while the animal is still warm. Skinning also helps cool the carcass faster. Once skinned, the carcass should be hung in a shady spot and allowed to cool. If insects are a problem, cover the cooled carcass with a fly-proof bag.

In warm weather, quarter and store the meat in coolers with frozen ice bottles. There's no need to wash the carcass unless the abdominal cavity was pierced during shot placement. Added moisture may even enhance bacterial activity, so drain any water that accumulates in the ice chests.

Wastewater class helps area employees save time

Keith McLeroy runs from one group to another around a narrow table.

As an instructor, McLeroy is trying to make sure that both teams are able to find the correct pH balance in the wastewater they are testing in a lab that can be towed on the back of pick up.

The testing is one that Rick Salazar and Lance Reynolds, both of Big Lake, have spent most of the year traveling the state to learn. This time, the two only had to travel 40 miles to Ozona.

The men were part of the Texas Engineering Extension Service's Water Utility Outreach Program that held an Intermediate Wastewater Laboratory Training Session on Nov. 10 at the Crockett County Civic Center. People from Ozona, Big Lake and Eldorado attended.

This is the fourth type of training to be held in Ozona this year through the program that is funded from money received last year from the state's general revenue fund.

The goal is to provide the training to people in rural areas at a lower cost of about \$25 per session. The 32-hour course was being offered for the first time through the program.

Unlike an earlier course that focused on drinking water, this

course was geared toward wastewater and testing that water districts need to do in order to meet requirements by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, McLeroy said.

"We analyze what is found in the wastewater, which then helps us to better treat it," he said. "This one really involves more in-depth analysis."

For the men from Big Lake, the training is one that will soon be used as the city plans on installing a new mechanical plant.

Normally, only two tests have to be done each week, but with the new plant around 25-30 tests will have to be performed each week to meet certain regulations,

Salazar said.

"We (Salazar and Reynolds) have been sent everywhere around Texas to get training," Salazar said. "This one is more hands-on than I thought it would be."

All four classes have been "fantastic" and Ozona is scheduled to receive five more next year, said Doug Meador, supervisor for the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District #1.

"This is something we only dream about," Meador said. "This has been a first-class experience."

Those attending from Ozona were Meador, Dee Keilers, Ricky Ramirez and Charlotte McElwain. Joe Luttrell attended from Eldorado.

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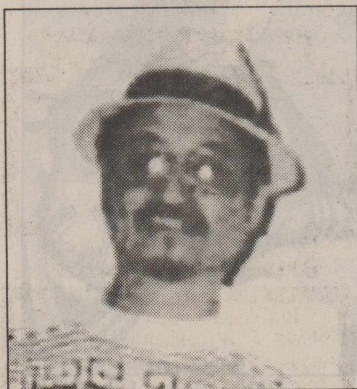

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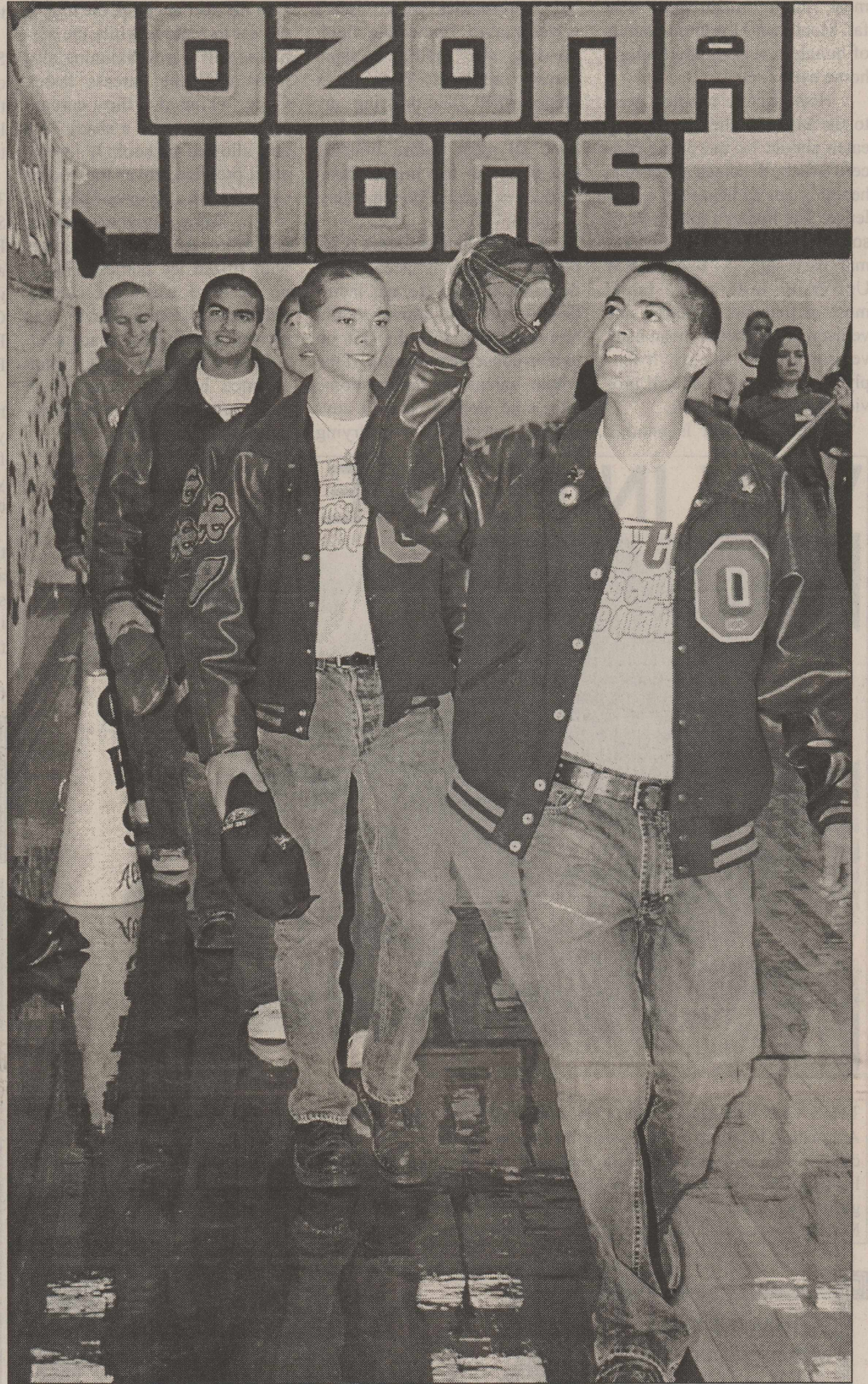

Texas secretary of state Geoff Connor steps down



AUSTIN - No one found the post-election cabinet shuffle in Washington particularly out of the ordinary, but back at the ranch in Texas, Secretary of State Geoff Connor announced his intention to step down at the end of the year.
 Of course, secretary of state in Texas is vastly different from being U.S. secretary of state. In Texas, the office oversees a very important process - the election system.
 Gov. Rick Perry is expected to name Weatherford businessman J. Roger Williams as Connor's replacement. Williams has been a major fund-raiser for President George W. Bush.
 The appointment would mark the 105th secretary of state in Texas history.
Prefiling begins...
 With the next legislative session only two months away, lawmakers have begun prefiling bills.
 An early eye-catcher is Rep. Warren Chisum's (R-Pampa) bill proposing submission to Texas voters of a constitutional amendment defining marriage as a sanctioned relationship open only to male-female couples.
 That will assure Texas plenty of national media attention.
 Other prefiled bills would create a school voucher system, allow law enforcement officers to set up DWI check points, install a business activity tax to replace the existing franchise tax, restore funding for low-cost children's health insurance (as well as those who are employed but poor) and require record votes in the House and Senate.
Supreme Court judge named...
 Gov. Rick Perry has appointed Houstonian David Medina, his former legal counsel, to the Texas Supreme Court.
 Medina will fill the vacancy created when Perry elevated Wallace Jefferson to chief justice to replace Tom Phillips, who retired earlier this year.
 The 46-year-old Medina served as a district judge in Harris County from 1996 to 2000.
 "This is a highly qualified jurist who has lived his life in a way that is admirable," Perry said after announcing Medina's appointment. "I let his record speak for itself."
 Two years after he left the bench, Medina was charged with driving while intoxicated. His trial ended in a hung jury. Medina pleaded guilty to making an improper lane change, paid a fine and the original charge was dismissed, the Houston Chronicle reported.

Heflin-Vo race update...
 Harris County election officials have declared Democrat Hubert Vo the winner in a close race against 11-term incumbent Rep. Talmadge Heflin, but Heflin is expected to request a recount or file a challenge.
 Once absentee and provisional ballots had been reviewed, Harris County officials said that Vo led Heflin 20,693 to 20,662, a difference of only 31 votes.
 The final outcome has implications well beyond Houston. Heflin is chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, one of the most powerful posts in the Legislature.
Changing retirement rules...
 During the last legislative session, lawmakers passed a bill providing for a golden parachute for state employees willing to retire early.
 Those who qualified could leave with a one-time payment amounting to 25 percent of their annual salary.
 Now the buzz is that some thought is being given to an opposite strategy: changing the Employee Retirement System's Rule of 80 (a state employee can retire if his age and years of service add up to 80) to a Rule of 85. Unless the change comes with a grandfather clause, that could postpone quite a few state employee retirements.
