

Cause of fire could be ruled as undetermined By MELISSA PERNER Editor and Publisher

Answers about the fire that killed two Ozona children may

never be resolved. Crockett County Fire Marshal Steve Kenley said that as of Monday he is ruling the cause of the fire as undetermined unless something major appears on the results of the toxicology tests on the two children. Kenley said he was still waiting on the tests Monday.

The preliminary autopsy report stated that the children died from smoke and soot inhalation, Kenley said.

An arson dog was also brought in to sniff for accelerates, even though Kenley said he didn't see anything in the fire remains to make him think there

The mobile home did not have electricity, but that a candle was burning before the fire

First Assistant Fire Chief Brian Morrow was in the second truck to arrive on the scene that night. Morrow said that when it

comes to fires like this, a house of this type is often engulfed within seven minutes.

"We knew the fire load was large. We couldn't have done anything different," he said. "It's unfortunate those two kids had to be in there."

"The fire was so intense due to the construction and model of that mobile home," Kenley added.

Eighteen fire fighters responded to the April 11 fire.

The children's deaths were in more than 60 years.



Ag secretary responds to Bonilla's call on ag cuts

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Bonilla, R-San Antoinio, and other members of Congress, the U.S. Department of Agriculture culture budget cuts that negatively affect Texas farmers.

"I'm pleased the administration has heard the concerns of farm state members such as istration to ensure a viable future for agriculture," Bonilla

The original USDA budget proposed sharp cuts in agriculture programs throughout Texas and the nation. The budget proals, eliminated the three-entity

study published by Texas A&M University for the USDA's Payment Limits Commission in 2002, researchers at the Agriculture and Food Policy Center found that payment limits would force many family farmers out of business.

Bonilla joined fellow members of Congress and lobbied the USDA to reconsider the damag-

Secretary of Agriculture Mike Johanns made the following statement: "We believe the President has presented a budget that has some reasonable suggestions for reducing the costs of our farm programs. However, we acknowledge that many of these policy proposals, such as the reduction in the payment limit, are quite sensitive. We recognize Congress may have other proposals to achieve these savings,

gibility for marketing loans. In a and we are willing to work with Congress on other cost savings recommendations."

This concession by the administration allows congress the flexibility to find savings, which will least affect farmers and ranchers.

"As long as I serve as chairman of the subcommittee, I'll do everything within my power to protect Texas farmers and ranchers. It's never easy to lobby against the administration, but in this case it was for the good of our farmers and provided a positive effect for all involved," Bonilla said. "Secretary Johanns and the USDA recognize that our federal government should not punish certain states based on the crops they produce."

As Chairman of the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee, Bonilla oversees all agriculture funding.

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

Texas surf group makes waves over special beach bills



non-profit group dedicated to preserving Texas' beaches making waves about House Bill 1603 and

its companion Senate Bill 740, hoping the Legislature and all Texans interested in the state's long coastline will take a closer look at the measures.

Introduced by Rep. Dennis Bonnen (R-Angleton), the House bill relates "to the authority of certain political subdivisions to erect or maintain shore protection structures and the location of the line of vegetation in relation to those structures."

The measure would amend the Natural Resources Code to exempt the municipal utility district for the Treasure Island subdivision at San Luis Pass in Brazoria County from the Texas Open Beaches Act. The Texas chapter of the Surfrider Foundation says the measure, which reads like a local bill aimed at a local problem dealing with beach erosion caused by the fast-moving waters of San Luis Pass, would privatize the public beach and create a legal precedent that could lead to further loss of public beaches.

Land The House Management Committee voted 8-0 on April 7 to send the measure to the floor. Only two people testified on the bill - Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson and former Sen. A.R. "Babe" Schwartz of Galveston.


Large cheeseburger and fries, please...


