

Commissioners approve bid for bathhouse during monthly meeting

The Crockett County Commissioners approved a \$298,750 bid from Jenschke Builders LP for construction of the 2,300 square-foot bathhouse at the new swimming pool during Monday's monthly meeting.

The commissioners' approval comes with the stipulation that Scott Hay of Hibbs and

Todd engineering firm checks out the references of the company. The company, which is located in Ingram, has previously done construction work for local resident J.R. Bhakta.

The Pecos River Basin drains all or part of 12 counties in the West Texas area including Andrews, Crane, Crockett, Culberson, Ector, Loving, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Val Verde and Ward.

The river is the only permanent source of surface water between the Colorado and Rio Grande rivers. It is a tremendously important resource to the area, both agriculturally and recreationally.

Over time, flows of the Pecos River have significantly declined. Today, under low-flow conditions, the river flow is only a trickle at some sites. Lowered water quality has drastically altered the river's aquatic community.

No longer does it have a healthy and diverse community of aquatic plants, invertebrates, microorganisms, fish and amphibians.



> A: My husband was a quick learner. It only took two weeks before he was sleeping on the porch and making his messes outside.

Q: What should I do when my husband has an "accident"?

A: It's a well-known fact that husbands don't think the way that humans do. Behavior should be divided into two parts: the mess and the act that created the mess. If you reprimand your husband AFTER he has used the dishwasher to clean greasy engine parts he will think you are punishing him for doing any work whatsoever and will never do any labor ever again. 

Diabetes facts and figures

Diabetes is a serious illness. But the good news is, it doesn't have to be a life-threatening one.

Early diagnosis and treatment, and good management practices are the keys to a long diabetes.

According to the American Diabetes Association (http:// www.diabetes.org/main/application/commercewf) when a person has diabetes, his or her body doesn't produce insulin (type 1) or properly use insulin (type 2), a hormone needed to convert some foods into energy. No one knows what causes diabetes, although genetics and such factors as lack of exercise and obesity may con-

icans with diabetes - but only about 11.1 million diagnosed. This means nearly one-third – 5.9 million people with diabetes - don't know they have it.

The costs of all these cases of and healthy life for persons with diabetes is enormous. The ADA estimated the total direct and indirect cost in 1997 (the most recent year figures are available) to be \$98 billion.

> Of that, \$44 billion was medical and treatment costs, and \$54 billion was for indirect costs, such as disability.

> A simple blood test by a health care provider is required for a diagnosis of diabetes. However, being aware of the

urination, excessive thirst and extreme hunger, blurry vision, increased fatigue, irritability and unusual and unexplained weight

Once the medical diagnosis has been made, proper treatment and management can make life healthier for the person with diabetes. A combination of exercise, weight control, proper diet and sometimes medications can keep the person - not the disease - in charge of his or her life.

Commissioners reinstate the burn ban

The Crockett County Commissioners approved the reinstatement of the burn ban for another 30 days during Monday's monthly meeting.

The burn ban states that outdoor burning in Crockett County is restricted.

The burn ban stated that outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission are not prohibitied. These are for

firefighter training; public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; planting or harvesting of agricultural crops or burns that are conducted by an approved Prescribed Burning Association, National Resource Conservation Service, the and/or Texas A&M Agricultural Experiment Station or prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

All burns shall be reported to the Crockett County Sheriff's Office at 392-2661 and the Fire Chieff at 392-2626 prior to commencing, together with the name of landowner, location involved and expert to be on hand.

The burn ban does not prohibit outdoor cooking in a properly contained area which is attended at all times.

Violation of the burn ban is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.

Notice to business personal property owners

All Business Personal Property owners in the Crockett County Appraisal District need to be aware of a change in the law that will affect your responsibilities in the rendition process and which could ultimately affect the amount of taxes that you pay.

Senate Bill 340 amends Chapter 22 of the Texas Property Tax Code which concerns the yearly rendition of business personal property. The current deadline of April 15 remains the same; however businesses that fail to render by that date will be assessed a penalty equal to 10 percent of the total tax amount

Further, a penalty of 5000 can be imposed if a person files a false report or statement with the intent to commit fraud or evade taxation, or if the person alters or destroys information presented to the Appraisal District.

If you have received a rendition form from the Appraisal District and you no longer own taxable business personal property in the district, you must return the form indicating that fact and the disposition of the property.

cannot be attributed to any one specific factor. However, some of the problems that are having an effect include increased water use, dams that alter flows, natural variations in rainfall and climate, riparian community destruction and the spread of saltcedar and other invasive species.

In order to improve and preserve this resource for the future, a cooperative plan, driven by landowner and public desires, is needed.

The Pecos River Basin Assessment Program is currently working towards an overall Watershed Protection Plan for the Texas section of the Pecos River. WPPs serve as a mechanism for addressing complex water quality problems that cross multiple jurisdictions.

WPPs serve as a tool to better leverage the resources of local governments, state and federal agencies, and non-governmental organizations.

The planning process integrates activities and prioritizes implementation projects based upon technical merit and benefits to the community, promotes a unified approach to seeking funding for implementation, and creates a coordinated public communication and education program.

Stakeholder visions for the river gathered at these meetings will be incorporated into and will guide the development of this plan.

The Pecos River Basin Assessment Program is a collaborative effort of Extension, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Water Resources Institute, the U.S. International Boundary and Water Commission, and Texas Clean Rivers Program. Funding for the project is provided by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board through the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Clean Water Act Section 319(h) Grant Program.

sign from public office in June. DeLay's decision came with a pending U.S. Supreme Court ruling regarding the Texas redistricting plan he spearheaded in 2003, and as federal ethics investigators continued to scrutinize DeLay's activities and those of certain of his associates.

Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle said De-Lay's decision to withdraw from the race and resign from office would not affect the state's prosecution of the former U.S. House majority leader on state felony charges of money laundering and conspiracy in connection with the redistricting.

Gov. Perry said he would not call a special election to replace DeLay on the November ballot. The Republican district executive committee will field a replacement candidate.

The Houston Chronicle reported DeLay will be eligible to receive a federal pension of nearly \$67,000 per year in retire-

DeLay said he planned to take up residence in Virginia.



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
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
