

Here's how some of our trations came about.

### **EASTER BUNNY**

The Easter bunny was introuced to American folklore by he German settlers who arrived n the Pennsylvania Dutch counry during the 1700s.

The arrival of the "Oschter laws" was considered "childood's greatest pleasure" next a visit from Christ-Kindel on Christmas Eve.

The children believed that they were good the "Oschter laws" would lay a nest of colred eggs.

The children would build heir nest in a secluded place in he home, the barn or the garden. Boys would use their caps and irls their bonnets to make the ests

### EASTER EGGS

Originally Easter eggs were ainted with bright colors to repesent the sunlight of spring and vere used in Easter-egg rolling ontests or given as gifts.

After they were colored and tched with various designs the ggs were exchanged by lovers

Austrian artists design patially since we have had so much terns by fastening ferns and tiny plants around the eggs, which are then boiled.

The plants are then removed revealing a striking white pattern. The Poles and Ukrainians decorate eggs with simple designs and colors.

A number of eggs are made in the distinctive manner called pysanki (to design, to write).

Pysanki eggs are a masterpiece of skill and workmanship. Melted beeswax is applied to the fresh white egg.

It is then dipped in successive baths of dye. After each dip wax is painted over the area where the preceding color is to remain.

Eventually a complex pattern of lines and colors emerges into a work of art.

In Germany and other countries eggs used for cooking where not broken, but the contents were removed by piercing the end of each egg with a needle and blowing the contents into a bowl.

The hollow eggs were dyed and hung from shrubs and trees during the Easter Week.

The Armenians would decorate hollow eggs with pictures of Christ, the Virgin Mary, and other religious designs.



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



TRAIL **TEXAS PECOS TRAIL BOARD OF DIRECTOR** TEXAS HISTORICAL COMMISSION YEXAS SERVITASE TRAILS PROSEAN The Texas Pecos Trail and your community The Texas Pecos Trail Region (TPTR) is one of ten re-

gions comprising the Texas Heritage Trails Program, which is overseen by the Texas Historical Commission (the Commission). This award-winning state economic development initiative encourages the discovery and enjoyment of Texas' unique historic and cultural resources. So what does this mean for the communities throughout the 22 counties that make up the Pecos Trail Region?

It means that the TPTR Board and the Commission are now laying the groundwork to promote the region as a prime destination for heritage tourists. ## House passes version of state budget for 2008-2009

report, "Counting Costs and Calories - Measuring the Cost of Obesity to Texas Employers."

"The costs are shocking, and the future could be very grim if we don't take action now to reverse this trend. The trend in obesity is avoidable - not inevitable - but we must take action now."

**PERRY SIGNS 'CASTLE DOCTRINE' BILL** 

Gov. Rick Perry on March 27 signed into law Senate Bill 378, extending Texans' rights to use deadly force for self-defense in their home, vehicle or workplace. The law takes effect Sept. 1.

Under SB 378, Perry said, a person's right to stand their ground extends beyond the home to vehicles and workplaces, allowing reasonable use of deadly force when an intruder is:

 Committing or attempting to commit a violent crime, such as murder or sexual assault;

• Unlawfully trying to enter a protected place; or

· Unlawfully trying to remove a person from a protected place.

The law also provides civil immunity for a person who lawfully uses deadly force.

#### SENATE CONFIRMS **KIMBROUGH**

The Senate Committee of the Whole on March 28 confirmed Jay Kimbrough as conservator of the Texas Youth Commission. Kimbrough had been serving as special master of the ailing state agency since early March, when he was appointed to the post by Gov. Perry.

Allegations of sex abuse of inmates and official wrongdoing at the agency are under investigation.

As conservator, Kimbrough has legal authority over the agency. He will act as chief executive, overseeing day-to-day operations while directing the investigation. Already, some high-level officials have left, employee firings are


