Ozona Woman's Forum members and guests took an armchair safari to Africa Nov. 20.

Tour guide Diane Phillips enlightened all with a program featuring her magnificent photography shown on the large screen television at the Senior Center. The photographs were accompanied by music and commentary.

Ms. Phillips was one of 11 on the trek through Tanzania in March to experience The Great Migration of wildebeests and zebras. Highlights of the trip included stops in Arusha National Park, Lake Manyara National Park, and Serengeti National Park. Olduviai Gorge in the Serengeti is one of the most important prehistoric archaelogical sites on Earth. Discovered there in 1959 were fossilized hominid bone fragments dating back 1.75 million years. Further research unearthed other significant finds resulting in Olduvai's recognition as the "cradle of mankind."





Which pain medicine is right for your pain?

Many older adults have pain that does not go away.

Deciding what type of pain medicine to take is not easy. Over-the-counter (OTC) pain relievers are medicines that you can buy without a prescription

that receive pain messages and control the body's temperature. NSAIDs relieve pain and fever by reducing the level of hormone-like substances, called prostaglandins, which your body

makes. Prostaglandins cause pain by irritating your nerve endings. They also help your body control

its temperature. Acetaminophen and NSAIDs relieve pain caused by muscle aches, stiffness and reduce fever. NSAIDs can also reduce inflam-

mation - redness and swelling. OTC pain relievers can be helpful in treating many types of pain, such as pain from arthritis, earaches, back pain and pain after surgery. They can also treat pain from the flu or a cold, sinusitis,

strep throat or a sore throat. Acetaminophen may help relieve headaches and other common aches and pains. It may be used safely by most people on a long-term basis for arthritis and

You generally should not take acetaminophen if you are already taking another product containing acetaminophen. If you have severe kidney or liver disease, or if you have 3 or more drinks that contain alcohol every day, you should talk to your health provider before taking acetaminophen.

With long-term use, NSAIDs may cause gastrointestinal (GI) problems.

These problems range from upset stomach to ulcers to GI bleeding. For minor stomach upset, eating some food or drinking

If certain drugs are taken at the same time, they can interact with each other and change the

way your body processes them. For example, if someone who takes high blood pressure medicine also takes an NSAID, the high blood pressure medicine may not work as well as it

should. Too, many OTC drugs contain the same pain reliever or contain ingredients found in prescription drugs.

For example, many OTC cold medicines contain acetaminophen. If you were to take one of these products and also take acetaminophen separately, you would be taking much more acetaminophen than you intended.



Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples announced on Nov. 29 record agriculture production estimates for 2007.

For the first time in history, he said, projections show the Texas agriculture industry will surpass \$100 billion in economic impact for the state. The previous high was \$85 billion in 2004.

Some of the largest increases this year are from crops used to produce biofuels. Production of grain sorghum was up 440 percent compared with last year, while corn production increased 91 percent, Staples said.

Last spring, the Legislature passed Senate Bill 8, a law requiring random drug testing of Texas high school student athletes, regardless of sport, gender or participation level.

Nearly three-quarters of a million Texas high school students participate in athletics.

The random testing, with oversight by the University Interscholastic League, was supposed to begin in the current school year, but did not, and the UIL has not awarded the testing contract.




