



WHAT IS THE **MOST IMPORTANT** ISSUE FACING CCCCSD AND WHAT IS YOUR PLAN TO RESOLVE IT?

There are many important issues facing our school district. TAKS scores in math and science are a concern. The administration needs to be more proactive in recruiting and retaining certified

math and science teachers.

Truancy is a problem district wide from the primary school through the high school. In the younger grades, parents do not see the importance of attendance. I believe to solve this problem the campus administrators need to continue to educate parents on the significance of going to school every day. The alternative would be for the district to hire an attendance officer.

Another issue facing the district is a decline in the number of students enrolled. This exemplifies the need for a new primary school. Since school funding is based on the weighted average daily attendance per child, the district faces a decrease in state funding. Combining two schools will allow the district to cut utility cost as well and maintenance cost without cutting jobs.

Asbestos, enrollment drop discussed at board meeting

Asbestos removal has started at the primary school building.

During the CCCCSD Board of Trustees regular meeting on Sept. 24, Superintendent Abe Gott said all asbestos was being removed from the building.

Gott said asbestos was found under some carpets, which was not known before, so the price of the removal may increase.

Gott also said the architect firm has been trying to get someone to conduct permit inspections when construction on the new elementary school begins.

Sonora does not have the manpower and the city of San Angelo is not sure if they can do it. Gott said San Angelo charged Irion County \$25,000 for their inspections.

Since Ozona is not incorporated, the school district is not required to have the inspections. If the building were to be inspected, then it would be inspected as if it was in a city and up to city codes.

The board came to the conclusion that Waldrop Construction, the company hired to build the school, should be responsible for inspecting the building. Waldrop Construction has assured the district they are building the school up to code.

"I really don't need to see why we need to pay someone from somewhere else to put their stamp of approval, especially if we are already building it to code," said Board

Member Tom Anderson. **DISTRICT ENROLLMENT DROPS**

Gott reported that the district has 743 students enrolled. This is 53 students less than this time last year.

The high school has an enrollment of 204, which is five students

above the cutoff for a 1A school. If numbers do not increase by

fall of 2009, the district could drop when realignment comes about in 2010.

Gott also reported that participation in athletics has increased with the addition of an eighth period at high school.

Enrollment in kindergarten has increased with 71 students.

If the numbers stay the same, the district will have to hire an additional first grade teacher, said Dan Webb, elementary principal.

TAKS SCORES

CCCCSD received an academically acceptable rating, which fell into the 75 percent of the districts throughout the state that also received that rating.

Gott read a list of area district also rated academically acceptable, which includes Alpine, Bangs, Brady, Bronte, Crane, Grape Creek, Kermit, Marfa, McCamey, Presidio, Reagan County, Rocksprings, Schleicher County, Sonora and Stanton.

Gott said in the region almost all school that received the secondhighest rating of recognized were Class 1A or smaller, such as Christoval, Iraan, Mason, Lohn, Irion County and Menard, but Ballinger and Wall, which are Class 2A, were also recognized.

The two areas where Ozona was low was middle school and high school math, of which Gott said the district has hired extra help and broken up classes down in smaller

However, many high school students would rather take detention than bring their grade up, said Carole Allen, high school principal.

"We try to make contact with parents, but some of our telephone numbers are not good," she said.

Maria Perez, parent liaison, is also sent to the student's house to speak to parents, Allen said.



INSURERS WIN IN SUNSET VOTE

At a Sept. 24 meeting of the Texas Sunset Commission, lawmakers deadlocked on a proposal to require the state's five largest insurance companies to wait at least 30 days before raising rates on homeowners' insurance.

The deadlock translates to a win for insurance companies, so they will be able to increase rates without approval from the state of Texas.

The proposal requiring a waiting period to raise rates was made by Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, who noted that Texans pay the nation's highest rates.

EVIDENCE PRESERVATION IS TOPIC

The collection, storage and preservation of evidence were discussed at a Sept. 25 meeting of the Texas Criminal Justice Integrity Unit.





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
a test in Sonora can save your life

Tolon cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in the United States.

Fortunately, the survival rate is very good when colon cancer is detected early.

Fortunately, too, you do not have to travel long distances and perhaps stay overnight to have this potentially lifesaving test.

The test—called a colonoscopy—is performed by Dr. Mark Edwards in the GI Lab at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital in Sonora.

Each of the women was members of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. Members of the Fort Concho Chapter of DRT, as well as friends and family, attended the ceremony.

Gwenyl(?) Walker spoke of her mother's childhood memories in

"In the evening, the neighborhood children played in the street. During the day, they played in the rocks on the hill. She recalled many happy times in Ozona," Walker said of her mother Blanche Robinson Walker.

Blanche was a graduate of Ozona High School who attended kindergarten in 1918 upstairs in the county courthouse.

She married Lefty Walker in 1937 and the couple ranched in Crockett and Terrell counties.

Blanche also knitted 143 baby booties, was the Cook of the Week, helped run "Lefty's Turkey Patch" for 25 years and was an active member of the chamber of commerce. She was also an active member of the Ozona Church of Christ.

Rick Hagelstein remembered his mother's love of photography, travel and spending time with her friends.

Hazel "Totsey" Robinson Hagelstein married Fred Hagelstien in 1961 (?) and moved to a Crockett County ranch 16 miles south on State Highway 163.

Along with the ranching business, which "Totsey" took over after Fred died, she was active in the hospital board, chamber of commerce, historical commission, bicentennial committee, historical society, was di-





rector of the Crockett County Museum and president of Ozona Woman's Forum. She was also an active member of the Ozona Church of Christ.

"Her and her friends had a kind of sorority together, that is what mom loved," Rick Hagelstein said.

Clay Childress said his family is fortunate that his grandmother, Jane Murphey Black, recorded the family's genealogy.

The mother of Bill Black and Judy Black, Jane Black was active in civic clubs and church in Ozona.

"She was quick to work on any worthwhile project," Childress said.

Letter about Pandale roads sent to State Representative

Editor's note: The following letter was sent to State Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, regarding the roads at Pandale. Jess Malone is the son of Barbara Malone, of Ozona. Below Malone's letter is the wording on the petition sent to Val Verde County officials.

I am forwarding you a news article from the Ozona newspaper plus a "petition" from numerous Val Verde County residents to the Val Verde County Commissioner's Court calling for action to improve the Farm-to-Market Road 2083 south of Ozona, Texas beginning at the Crockett/Val Verde County line and continuing southward to Langtry, Texas. I am also providing you with a map depicting the general path of the road in question.

The maintenance of this road by Val Verde County has gone from sporadic to non-existent in the past several years. The road is pretty bad from the Crockett County line south to Pandale, Texas and is almost impassible southward from Pandale, Texas to Langtry, Texas. The concerns voiced in the petition are valid and legitimate as I can attest to having to travel on about 6 miles of this road to get to our ranch. I have recently paid out \$1,800 for front end work on the ranch truck and some of the wear and tear can be attributed to the horrendous road to and from town.

On a more personal note, I will tell you that on two different occasions last year, I took my dying father to town from the ranch to see the doctor during the middle of the night. My mother was with me and held him in her arms as we traveled to the hospital. I wanted to get him to town as quickly as possible and that's pretty difficult when you can't drive much more than five miles per hour and even then you are getting jostled around in the vehicle.

I was frustrated, my mom was upset, and my dying father was moaning from all the pain of being tossed around. I think you get the picture of just how ridiculous this is that Val Verde County has quit maintenance and just how bitter I am about this whole nonsense.

If you recall, we spoke several years ago about this situation and several ideas were discussed including possible annexation of the road by the State of Texas with maintenance by Texas Department of Transportation. This would be a large project given the total length of the roadway estimated at nearly 40 miles.

We, the undersigned landowners, business owners and residents as taxpayers of Precincts 3 and 4, demand a public explanation from the Val Verde County Judge and Commissioners of Precinct 3 and 4 as to their reason for neglecting to maintain the roads and cattle guards of these precincts.

This neglect has caused numerous potholes and our roads are worn down to the bedrock.

This makes dangerous driving conditions because we must try to dodge the potholes and/or drive on the wrong side of the road in attempt to not rattle our vehicles apart.

Our contract postal carrier has complained numerous times and has been unable to deliver the mail many times due to road conditions. We have not had general maintenance on our road in approximately 2 years.

Last year, the county crews were here to repair damage from flooding but only did what was minimally necessary to make roads passable.

This year our poorly constructed bridge was out (impassable) for 5 years and after complaints from our residents (who were stranded) crews were sent to repair the gap created by the flood. A cattle guard that has been reported as damaged and a danger numerous times over the past years was finally patched 5 days ago.

There have been many pleas over the last 2+ years to the judge and commissioners for maintenance with the reply that it would be taken care of within a 7-10 day time frame. But this was only to pacify us as there has been, as stated, no work done.

We have been more than patient on this matter but the time has come for action. Our next step is to the

To the Citizens of Crockett County:

We are troubled by the fact that providing alcohol to minors seems to be an accepted practice in our community. In relation to alcohol, a "minor" is anyone under the age of 21 years. We are equally troubled by those providing illegal drugs to our children. Many lives are being adversely and permanently affected by permissive adults who think that allowing these minors to drink is "no big deal."

As fellow citizens, we know that law enforcement cannot be everywhere at all times. Therefore, it is our duty to refrain from giving alcohol and drugs to the minors in our community. It is also our duty to report those "parties" when they are happening in our neighborhoods. As parents we are responsible for our children and those children entrusted to our care. Our irresponsible behavior gives the signal to our children that it's okay to break the law.

Consider this: How are our actions, or inaction, affecting our children's futures? We need to stand up for what is right and good. We need to show our children, by our responsible actions, that it is beneficial to

do the right thing. This is an important lesson to teach and is a lesson best taught by example.

Drinking can be a serious problem. Additionally, drinking often leads minors to commit serious criminal offenses when their judgment is impaired by alcohol. Behavior that seems harmless can have tragic and life-changing results. Assaults, underage pregnancies and vehicle accidents commonly result from alcohol impaired judgment. For example, one summer (approximately 20 years ago) Ozona lost five teenagers/young adults to alcohol related events. Just this year, we have lost several persons to drug overdoses.

We encourage everyone in Crockett County to take a stand on this issue. Consider the current and long-term effects that alcohol and drug abuse can have on our children, their future and our community. It is never too late to take a stand. Let's be the "Village" our children deserve. Let's equip them to make sound decisions based upon good judgment.



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
