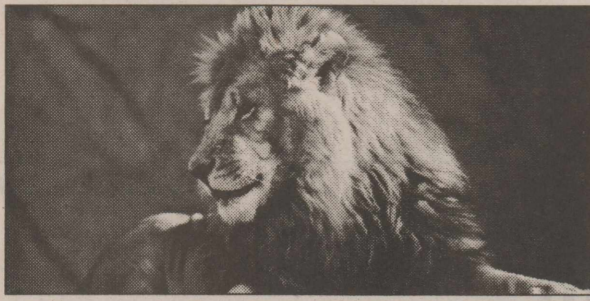
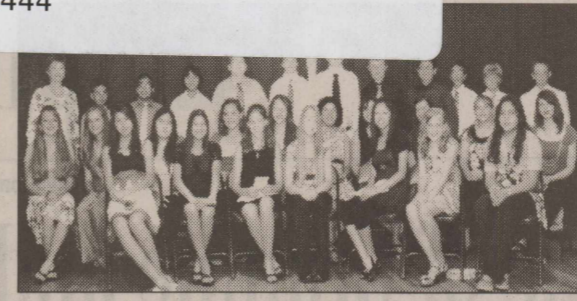

Sneak peek: tour shows off new park

A place to go hiking, bike around, ride a horse or watching birds is planning on being open in Crockett County this year.

Local officials and community members had a sneak peak at the Escondido Draw Recreational Area (EDRA) Monday night. The off-road vehicle park, located 30 miles west of Crockett County off of County Road 406, will not only be a place to take Jeeps, motorcycles and four-wheelers, it will also contain an area for those wanting an adventure on foot, bicycle or horseback.

During the tour, Texas Motorized Trails Coalition (TMT) officials spoke on how the east panhandle and the far east side of the property, which borders neighboring property owned by the Cox family, could be used for non-motorized activities, such as mountain biking, hiking, equestrian, bird watching and be open to local and area Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

This area is around 600 acres of the 3,400-acre park.

The park itself has a "healthy" bird population and, with some management, the population should improve, said Beryl Armstrong with the Environment Defense Fund.

Armstrong has been working with TMT on conducting a bird survey of the park. Due to TMT receiving federal grant money, environmental and ar-

chaeological surveys have been conducted on the park.

Armstrong said only one protected species have been found, a bird called the black-capped vireo. Sites have been marked in the park so trails can be routed around the areas where the bird breeds. Early to late April and early May is the breeding season, Armstrong said.

No motorized vehicles will be used during the time in which the bird is in the park, Armstrong said. Non-motorized use through the areas will be allowed in the bird's breeding sites.

A Texas A&M survey team will be at the park this week surveying the number of black-capped vireos.

As far as archeologi-

cal sites there were several significant that was found. These areas will be strictly off limits, Armstrong said.

TMT will have parking and camping facilities at the top of the mesa adjacent to County Road 406.

TMT is planning on drilling a water well, installing a septic systems and constructing a bathhouse with rest-

rooms and showers.

At the end of this property will be an automatic gate, which will close at 8:30 p.m. when the park is not in operation. Everyone will need to be back at the camp zone at the time, said Tony Eeds, TMT President.

Opening date for the park has not been set yet, but Eeds

Superintendent search begins at tonight's board meeting

The search for a news superintendent begins tonight during a special meeting of the Crockett County CCSD Board of Trustees.

The meeting starts at 6 p.m. at the Administration Building.

On the agenda is to interview applicants in consideration for the position of Superintendent of Schools. This is listed to be discussed in executive/closed session. Any action the board takes pertaining to discussion in executive session has to be voted on in open session.

According to John King, who is helping the board with the superintendent search, 31 applications have been turned in for the superintendent position.

Tonight's meeting will be King's first opportunity to share with the board all the information about the interview process and the applicants.

Details of the number of applicants to interview will also be decided by the board tonight. The board can only interview about three maximum at any meeting due to the length of interviews, King said.

The board will also meet at 6 p.m. Monday, May 18.

On that agenda, the board will meet again in executive/closed session to interview applicants in consideration for the position of superintendent.

Also on the agenda is possible action to name a Lone finalist for superintendent.

County Road Superintendent retiring in 2010

Ozona Royals baseball is back

In 1988 the Ozona Royals Baseball Team brought home a league championship trophy.

Jeff Sanchez still has the trophy and remembers when semi-pro baseball was a big part of Ozona life.

That baseball spirit is alive again as the Royals will field a team this summer as part of the San Angelo Baseball League.

Led by league president Kevin Brown and Head Coaches Lalo Rodriguez and Willie Fierro, the team will host their first game at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, May 17, at the south softball field.

The team started practicing three weeks ago. Around 20 members make up the Royals.

"We know not all of us will get to play, but everyone is okay with that," said player Albert Talamantez.

The 10-week season will comprise of 20 games. Each game will be a double-hitter with seven innings played,

a 30-minute break and then another seven innings.

Ozona will be in a league comprised of six San Angelo teams, Big Lake and Sonora. The majority of the Royals games will be played in Ozona.

The highlight of the season will be the All-Star Game to be hosted June 19 in Ozona. There will be a homerun derby and fireworks at that game.

"We know the game. We've just got to get back into playing baseball," Sanchez said. "It'll be a test. There hasn't

been men's baseball here in more than 10 years."

The history of the Royals begins in the late 1960s. The semi-pro team was active until 1996, with the team's major highlight being the 1988 championship.

Since then, men's softball has been featured in Ozona, but not baseball.

"We need to get back into baseball form, softball is so much different," Sanchez said. "It will be a challenge to see which guys stick around."

Moore, who is retiring February 2010, said that the department has increased in the parks area over the last few years, which requires more work.

"It is less stressful on one individual," Moore said. "When I first started, I was just doing the roads and that was a lot easier job. However, this job works pretty good like it is. Only one man has to decide where to shift power."

All of the commissioners agreed that a detailed job description is needed before deciding any further on the position.

Moore also said that due to the economy, there are a lot of people without jobs and that someone out there may be able to fit this position. Moore also said no one in the road department has approached him about his position.

"All of this depends on the person's qualifications. This gives us something to think about. I think it's good if we can hire inside, but still there may be someone outside that can do this job," said Commissioner Pleas Childress.

"We have several issues here," added County Judge Fred Deaton. "We're going to be slowing down on a lot of what we do. We all need to have our heads geared down toward replacing (Moore) sometime next year. I think we should wait a little while before we make a decision. We need a good job description and to be planning and working on this."

ANIMAL CONTROL MOVED TO ROAD DEPARTMENT

The commissioners approved a motion to manage animal control out of the road department.

With the motion, the commissioners gave Moore the authority to hire an animal control officer out of his department.

Moore said Petra Hernandez, who is currently working at the road department and part-time as a bailiff, expressed interest in the position and will start work as the new officer immediately. Hernandez has worked for the county for 16 years. She previously worked as a deputy in the sheriff's department. Hernandez will also continue her bailiff duties as well.

During the April meeting, the commissioners approved adopting Chapter 826 on rabies from the Texas Health and Safety Code as a county ordinance.

Under the Rabies Control Act, a person can be charged if they fail or refuse to register or present registration for a dog or cat they own and the animal is required to be registered under the ordinances or rules adopted by the county.

Punishment for violating the act is a Class C misdemeanor, which is punishable by a fine not exceed \$500.

The act also states that dog and cat owners must restrain their animals, that each stray dog or cat can be declared a public nuisance and can be detained or impounded by the local rabies control authority.

Owners must also have their dogs or cats vaccinated against rabies by the time the animal is four months old and at regular intervals thereafter,

the act states.

Deaton said the sheriff's office has stated that they will assist in issuing citations and helping with dangerous or biting animals.

The commissioners also approved adopting Chapter 829 of the Texas Health and Safety Code declaring Crockett County population under 75,000 and making it exempt from the requirement of having a licensed animal control officer.

However, Moore said Hernandez was interested in becoming licensed.

MUSEUM ELEVATOR

Discussion took place on a new elevator for the Crockett County Museum.

The Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation denied the museum's request for installing a 1,400-pound elevator, which is a smaller elevator than they originally looked at installing.

The request was denied due to not being able to prove the smaller elevator was feasible and that cost was not a consideration, said Henry Schmidt, architect.

Schmidt said the department's rules on accessibility standards are changing at the end of the year, but he wasn't sure if any of the changes will help the museum.

The museum has been working on the elevator project since July 2004.

Cost for the smaller elevator is around \$200,000, which is \$100,000 over what the museum planned.

"You can almost build a new building for what you can put an elevator in," Deaton said. "I'd rather see someone build a new building for that much money than a new elevator."

Museum Board Members said they like the current location of the museum and the multiple-story structure for displays.

People in wheelchairs have used the building to get to all three floors by going outside to get to the bottom floor and using the elevator to get to the third floor, said Cathy Carson, board member.

"It's awkward but it can be done. We are handicap accessible to the bottom floor. If we put in the larger elevator, it might damage the structure," Carson said.

Deaton said the museum should put out for bids on the elevator due to the economy. Deaton said the museum may be able to get some "decent bids."

"I would think that maybe some contractors are out there that are hungry," Deaton said. Schmidt said there would not be any additional cost, other than advertising, to put the elevator out for bids.

OTHER AGENDA ITEMS:

Ty Williams presented a report on maintenance and work needed on the flood control dams. Williams presented a list of recommended maintenance for each dam. Every year the seven dams and channel have to be inspected, and the emergency action plan has to be kept up to date and on file with county officials and with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

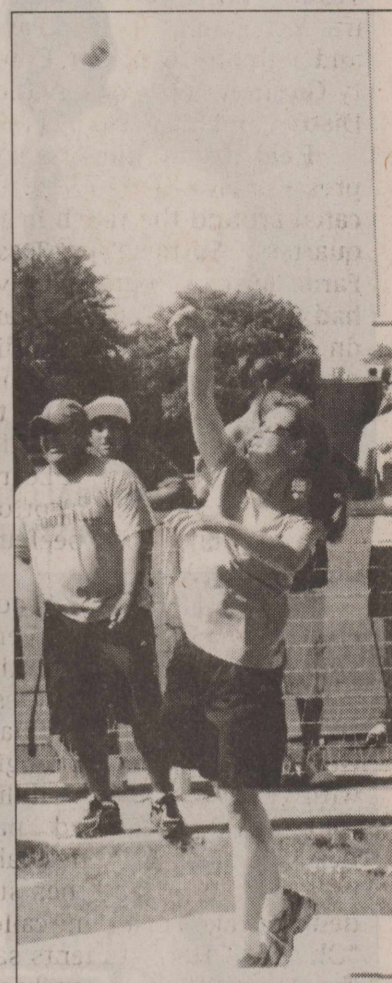

Sixth grade participates in Marty Acton Memorial Field Day

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) has sponsored the local sixth grade field day for several years, but this year's event had a new twist. The Marty Acton Memorial Field Day, in its first annual appearance, was hosted by Jack and Jodie Baggett of the Baggett Ranch south of Ozona.

Organizations present included the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Texas Farm Bureau, AgriLife Extension, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Crockett County Groundwater Conservation District and local producers.

Field day volunteers gave presentations at stations located around the ranch headquarters. Sutton Page, Texas Farm Bureau representative, had the mobile Learning Barn on site. The trailer can display up to seven commodities with two sections being portable. The various commodities displayed in the Mobile Learning Barn include, corn, cotton, grain sorghum, pork, beef and dairy, to name a few.

Chase McPhaul, Crockett County Extension Agent, spoke about the opportunities available for those interested in the 4-H program. Mary Humphrey, Wildlife Biologist with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, educated participants about wildlife, habitat conservation and then students engaged in a game called "Oh Deer!" Here students saw the direct effect of overhunting, under hunting and habitat degradation.

Randy Herring, ranch manager, had a special treat for the day's partakers. He gave a working sheepdog demonstration at the ranch. Using voice commands, he and his dog were able to work and pen a herd of sheep in front of his audience.

Three stations at the ranch were conducted by NRCS employees and covered soil, conservation and software and technology. A fourth location was in Johnson Draw behind the Ozona Middle School. Here, Ty Williams, District Conservationist in the Ozona Field Office, spoke to participants about the work that had been completed in the draw along with work and efforts needed to keep seven flood control structures in working order for the county. The Ozona Garden Club, local students and the NRCS planted bluebonnets in the draw behind the school last year. Students could visually see the results in the draw, as Williams pointed out the hundreds of bluebonnets that have bloomed this spring.

"The Johnson Draw Project was something that a lot of individuals in the community had a part in," Williams said, "we can all take pride in our work here, and use this as a tool to educate area students and producers."

The noon meal was prepared by Crockett SWCD directors Jack Baggett, Pleas Childress and Ira Childress. Sharon Martin, Crockett SWCD technician, prepared all of the educational outreach material for the students and teachers. She provided each participant with a bag filled with fact sheets, snacks, pencils and other items that could be used back in the classroom.

"Marty Acton was an exceptional individual," Williams notes, "this event truly reflects part of his passion for educating all of our area youth."

The first Marty Acton Memorial Field Day will go down in the history books as a success, and will bring many more years of education and outreach for those that will be part of it in the future.
