



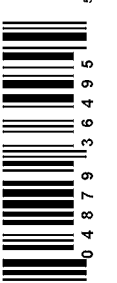

## Primary Runoff Election voter registration deadline April 25

The last day to register to vote in the upcoming May 24 Primary Runoff Election is April 25.

Voters can register at the Crockett County Tax Office.

Early voting will run from May 16-20, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at the courthouse annex.

The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is May 13. Voters can obtain those from the Crockett County Clerk's Office.

Registered voters who voted in the March 1 Primary Election can vote in the same party runoff election.

If a registered voter did not vote in the March 1 Primary Election they may vote in either party's runoff election.

In the Democratic Primary, incumbent Karen Webb and Annette DeHoyos will face each other for the Crockett County Treasurer's race, and Wesley Bean and Max Schroeder will be on the ballot for the Crockett County Commissioner Precinct 3 race.

Webb received 520 votes, DeHoyos had 261, Marie Pierce had 164 and Shelly Childress had 129.

Bean had 134, Schroeder 95 and Mike Preddy 76.

The winner of the commissioner precinct 3 race will face Weldon Nicks, who won the Republican Primary with 47 votes, in the November General Election.

State offices that will appear on the runoff ballot in the Democratic Primary are: Railroad Commissioner - Grady Yarbrough and Cody Garrett; Justice, 8th Court of Appeals District, Place 3, Unexpired Term - Gina M. Palafox and Maria Ramirez.

The Republican Primary runoff ballot will feature state races: Railroad Commissioner - Wayne Christian and Gary Gates; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 - Mary Lou Keel and Ray Wheless; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 5 - Brent Webster and Scott Walker.

## Commissioners continue work on county projects

The Crockett County Commissioners' Court continued making strides on three major county projects.

At their regular meeting Monday, the commissioners approved the preliminary platt for subdivision of the new Crockett County Jail.

Commissioner Pleas Childress III asked why the county is having to subdivide the jail property since it belongs to the county. The new jail will be located between the cemeteries and the south softball field south of Ozona off of State Highway 163.

Jason Clinton with SKG Engineering said the county doesn't have to do this, but since voters approved a \$6 million bond in Novem-

ber 2015 it shows where the money will be dedicated.

"In the public eye you didn't buy the land, but you are developing it," Clinton said.

Commissioner Randy Branch said if the county asks citizens go through the subdividing process, then the county should go by the same guidelines.

"We're playing by the same rules we're giving everybody else," Branch said. Crockett County currently has 22 inmates housed in jail outside the county.

Last month, Rodriguez said the Texas Jail Commission sent him a letter in regards to the current jail population and the new jail. The new jail is slated to have 24 beds.

"We are trying to bring the jail population down, which I guess is a good

problem to have," Rodriguez said.

Rodriguez said the sheriff's office is working with the district and county attorneys in getting the inmates through the court system.

The commissioners also approved the preliminary platt for subdivision of the wellness center property.

Deaton said this is a two-step process. The next step will be the final platt presented by SKG Engineering.

Crockett County Voters approved a \$4 million bond for the center in November 2015. It will be located across from the current Family Health Center of Ozona and the Crockett County Care Center.

The commissioners approved to change current-

ly specified asphalt paving parking surfaces at the new Ozona Clinic to concrete.

The change would cost \$5,500 to change from asphalt to concrete for the parking areas.

Construction on the \$3 million facility started at the end of March. The facility is located at the old north pool across from Lion Stadium. The commissioners issued \$2 million tax notes for the clinic, along with \$1.1 million from the county's money market account.

## Everyone has role to play in preventing child abuse

When it comes to protecting our children from abuse and neglect, we have a real battle on our hands. Consider the latest data from the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services. From 2014 to 2015, cases of child abuse and neglect in San Antonio, the largest city in my district, was reduced by 500 — but the total remained at 7,498, or 12 percent of the statewide total. Specifically during the same timeframe, cases of physical abuse

(1,170) and sexual abuse (657) rose slightly, while children who were harmed by neglect totaled 5,770, an 8 percent decrease. In Texas, the total number of victims rose slightly to 66,721. This kind

of data fluctuation is horrendous. Whatever dents we make into this crisis here and there isn't going to cut it. The total number of child victims needs to be reduced dramatically. It's going to take participation from everyone — from lawmakers to citizens — to fight for those who are too young to fight for themselves. While on the Senate Finance Committee, I helped secure an additional \$37 million to aid prevention services, boost-

ing the total dollars spent on child abuse to \$127 million. During the next session, I will continue to advocate for more dollars for this issue. But to make a sizable impact, the community has a role to play that's perhaps larger than government. Too often, caseworkers hear from family members of victims who said they thought something might be wrong in a household, but never spoke out. Child Abuse Prevention Month, which starts April 1,

is about reminding people — whether you're a relative, friend or neighbor — to have the courage to speak up. And if that's the case, and you suspect a child is being abused, call 9-1-1 or the Texas Abuse Hotline at 800-252-5400. Perhaps such a horrific situation doesn't exist in your life, but you still want to get involved? In San Antonio, organizations like the Blue Ribbon Task Force, ChildSafe and Voice for Children are advocating for our children. I encourage you

to seek out similar groups in your area and offer your skillset to the fight against child abuse and neglect. Protecting our children from abuse and neglect is a solvable task. It begins with having the courage to speak out. And whatever progress we make, we should remain dissatisfied until the number of abuse cases is reduced to next to nothing.

## To your health

The "primary cliff" being faced by the more than three dozen community health clinics in our district was first brought to my attention by Nora Tellez, CEO of the Vida y Salud Health Clinic in Crystal City. Unless action was taken soon by Congress, these local clinics and thousands more that operate in underserved communities across the country would face a 75 percent decrease in their funding.

than the cost of taking care of patients. The complicated formula set in place for deciding these payments was flawed, and the temporary patches Congress kept applying just weren't good

enough. This historical bipartisan bill fixed this problem and also included the first meaningful long-term entitlement reform in two decades.

I would say that the net good these clinics do is incalculable, but they actually save the health care industry an estimated \$24 billion dollars every year by providing high-quality preventive health care to patients, allowing them to avoid costly inpatient visits and trips to the Emergency Room. In 2014, more than 217,000 patients in the 23rd Congressional District of Texas were seen at these clinics, which equaled almost 850,000 medical, dental and mental health visits. More than 2,700 people in our district have jobs due to these clinics and their economic output is more than \$250 million. When you consider both the economic and health benefits, there is no question that these health centers are well worth the investment.

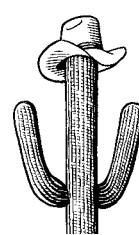
Thankfully, this Congress moved quickly on H.R. 2, The Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act, bipartisan legislation that prevented these clinics from going over the fiscal cliff they were facing. My staff and I have also worked with individual clinics to apply for and receive additional federal grant money, guaranteeing their ability to continue to operate and provide necessary services. Several of the community health center leaders in our district surprised me last month when they visited my office in DC, by presenting me with a plaque proclaiming me a "Rising Star" because of my "vital role in promoting the important work that Health Centers do." As your Representative, I was extremely honored by the designation.

This same legislation did even more though to provide greater access to health care, especially for our seniors. Many doctors were about to consider turning Medicare patients away because the reimbursement payments were getting close to being lower

led a bipartisan Texas Delegation letter with my colleague Henry Cuellar urging the Secretary of Health and Human Services to reverse a proposed cut to a specific form of MA plan that is utilized by over 20,000 seniors throughout the 23rd Congressional District of Texas. With over 15 million seniors enrolled in MA, it is vital that we strengthen Medicare, providing stability for them and their doctors. One more way I am working to protect and expand access to quality health care is through the Information Technology (IT) Subcommittee I chair. Last month, we held a hearing with public and private sector stakeholders to examine the opportunities and challenges in IT healthcare delivery. Because of this exciting digital frontier, I believe that doctors will soon be able to perform medical examinations on patients in rural areas through computer applications and video, saving time, money and hopefully, lives. While the government has an oversight role in these emerging technologies, it is vital that we do not hamper innovation and create unnecessary barriers to development and adoption.

## Supreme Court rules in 'one person, one vote' case

AUSTIN — On a unanimous vote of 8-0, the U.S. Supreme Court on April 4 affirmed that states may continue to draw legislative districts based on total population.

In the Texas case, *Evenwel v. Abbott*, the question presented to the high court on appeal from the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas was whether the one-person, one-vote principle of the Fourteenth Amendment creates a "judicially enforceable right ensuring that the districting process does not deny voters an equal vote."

Court documents explain the basis of the case this way: "In 2013, the Texas Legislature enacted a state Senate map creating districts that, while roughly equal in terms of total population, grossly malapportioned voters. Appellants, who live in Senate districts significantly overpopulated with voters, brought a one-person, one

vote challenge, which the three-judge district court below dismissed for failure to state a claim. The district court held that appellants' constitutional challenge is a judicially unreviewable political question."

Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, who wrote the court's main opinion, stated that "nonvoters have an important stake in many policy debates — children, their parents, even their grandparents, for example, have a stake in a strong public education system — and in receiving constituent services, such as help navigating public-benefits bureaucracies. By ensuring that each representative is subject to requests and suggestions from the same number of constituents, total-population apportionment promotes equitable and

effective representation." However, while the court affirmed that to draw districts based on total population remains constitutional, it did not suggest that to draw legislative districts based on the total number of registered voters would be unconstitutional.

**REVENUE REPORT COMES IN** Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on April 4 announced state sales tax revenue in March totaled \$2.17 billion, up 2.1 percent compared to March 2015.

"The modest growth in sales tax collections for March was in line with expectations and comes after five consecutive months of declining sales tax revenues," Hegar said. "Stronger growth in receipts from the retail trade, restaurant and construction sectors was

offset by continued weakness in net collections from oil and gas-related sectors."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in March 2016 is down 3.2 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for

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# Ozona and Rankin represented at 27th annual Bataan Memorial

WHITE SANDS MISSILE RANGE, N.M. - The Bataan Memorial Death March is a grueling and humbling trudge over 26.2 miles with multiple elevation changes and through enormous amounts of sand. In fact, part of the course is referred to as the Sand Pit, a tortuous slog through approximately one and a half miles of deep sand. Many of the participants for the 27th annual Bataan Memorial Death March, held on March 20 began showing up before 4 a.m., standing on the parade ground in temperatures around 40 degrees awaiting the opening ceremonies at the White Sands Missile Range. It was still quite brisk at 7 a.m. when Reveille was called, just moments before sunrise.

The Bataan Memorial honors a special group of World War II soldiers, the soldiers responsible for defending the islands of Luzon, Corregidor, and the harbor defense forts of the Philippines under nearly impossible conditions. Fighting in a region plagued by malaria, they were hampered by outdated equipment, and had nearly no air support. They survived on quarter rations and received no medical help.

On April 9, 1942, tens of thousands of American and Filipino Soldiers surrendered to Japanese forces. The Japanese military, ill-prepared to house and maintain POW's, marched the captured forces for days through the scorching heat of the Philippine jungles, over 60 miles during which thousands died. Those who survived were placed on unmarked enemy ships that

would transport the POW's to Japan. Many of those ships came under fire from unknowing US air and naval forces, killing and wounding many more. Once in Japan, the survivors would serve out the remainder of the war facing the daily hardships of a prisoner of war camp.

Sunday's event began with a somber and humbling roll call of the living Bataan Death March survivors, and calling out the names of those who have died since last year's memorial. Sadly, each year there are fewer and fewer responses as many of the survivors are no longer alive or unable to make the trip. The march this year had over 6600 competitors, largely military and ROTC. The youngest participant was 10. The oldest was 98. Some traveled as far

away as the Philippines and Canada.

The most inspiring of the marchers was a sizeable delegation of wounded warrior military veterans, those great men and women wounded in battle. Flags flying high, the soldiers, many of them missing limbs, marched the long course, showing true courage to grateful supporters cheering them on. It was truly a show of the American spirit.

Ozona was represented by Rene Delarosa (US Air Force, Ret., Civilian Heavy Division, 26.2 mile), Raul De La Rosa, Jr. (US Army Veteran, Civilian Heavy Division, 26.2 mile), Sarah Ramirez (Civilian Light Division, 26.2 mile), Dawn Hanson (Civilian Light Division, 26.2 mile), Will Mason (Civilian Heavy Division, 26.2 mile), Susan

Kenley (Honorary March, 14.2 mile), James Cassaro (Honorary March, 14.2 mile), Francesca D'Acquisto (Honorary March, 14.2 mile), and Stacy Chapman Miller (Honorary March, 14.2 mile).

Rankin was represented by Kevin Ray (Civilian Light Division, 26.2 mile) and Lisa Ray (Civilian Light Division, 26.2 mile).

The Heavy Division contestants had to carry a pack of at least 35 pounds. Most carried canned goods and food stuffs to donate to the local food bank. This year a record amount of food was donated with 24,334 pounds carried by participants. Each of the Ozona participants in the Heavy Division finished with packs over 45 pounds. Everyone from the Ozona group finished their respective race division.

### Notice of Proposed Filing of Statement of Intent to Increase Rates for Gas Service

To the Customers of NatGas, Inc. ("NatGas") in and around the unincorporated community of Ozona, Texas in Crockett County, Texas:

Pursuant to the public notice requirements of § 104.102 and § 104.103 of the Gas Utility Regulatory Act ("GURA"), TEX. UTIL. CODE CH.101 *et seq.*, NatGas hereby provides notice to the public that on February 12, 2016, NatGas filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas its Statement of Intent to Increase Rates in and around the unincorporated Community of Ozona, Texas. The proposed rates will affect all of NatGas' approximately 1,192 customers. Of this total, NatGas serves approximately 1,051 residential customers, 107 commercial customers, and 34 public authority customers. The proposed effective date of the rate increase is March 18, 2016.

The proposed rates and tariffs are expected to increase NatGas's annual revenues by \$35,504 or 5.3% including gas costs, or 9.5% excluding gas costs. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. NatGas is proposing to divide the current Residential and Small Commercial tariff into separate Residential and Commercial tariffs. NatGas is also proposing to rename the current Large Commercial tariff the Public Authority tariff. Finally, NatGas is proposing to move all gas costs remaining in base rates to the cost of gas adjustment clause. This will result in a \$3.00 per Mcf reduction in the base rate commodity charge and a corresponding \$3.00 per Mcf increase in the cost of gas clause.

Based on the proposed rate design, the average monthly bills for a residential, commercial, or public authority customer will, excluding revenue related taxes, change by the amount and percent shown in the following table:

## Pre-K and Kindergarten Pre-Registration Wednesday, April 20

OES Pre-K and Kindergarten Pre-Registration for the 2015-2016 will be held on April 20, 2016 from 9 a.m.-noon and 1-4 p.m. at Ozona Elementary School.

Pre-Kindergarten child must be 4 years old on or before September 1, 2016 to be eligible for Pre-k and 5 years old on or before September 1, 2016 for Kindergarten.

Parents must bring their child's: social security card, birth certificate (the official one from the courthouse not the one from the hospital) and current immunization record (in order to attend school, your child must be up to date on their immunizations. Nurse Karen will be present to review the immunization records).

Parents will also need to provide proof of residency and a photo ID in order to register their child. If you are not the parent, then you must bring proof of guardianship. A copy of all these documents will be made and the originals will be returned. This is required by the law according to Chap. 25.002 of the Texas Education Code.

Parents enrolling their

child in Pre-Kindergarten must also bring a copy of their most recent paycheck stub.

Please bring your child with you.

As of August 1, 1999, all children born on or after September 2, 1992 are required to have the following immunizations to begin school:

- For kinder:
1. Hepatitis A -2 doses
  2. Varicella (chicken pox)-2 doses
  3. Hepatitis B-3 doses
  4. DTaP- 5 doses---1 dose after 4th birthday
  5. Polio-4 doses---1 dose after 4th birthday
  6. MMR-2 doses

1. Hepatitis A 2-doses
  2. Hepatitis B 3-doses
  3. DTaP 4-doses
  4. Polio 3-doses
  5. MMR 1-doses
  6. Varicella 1-doses
  7. Hepatitis 3-doses
  8. Pneumococcal 4-doses

# April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month

When we think of driverless cars, we think of new technology that will enable a car to drive without input from the driver.

But, unfortunately, there are already too many cars traveling down the road without input from the driver right now.

At 55 miles per hour, during the four to five seconds that it takes to send or read a text message, your car is traveling the length of a football field without a driver in control.

Multi-tasking is thought of as a useful skill, but it gets a lot of people into trouble behind the wheel. Most of us incorrectly assure ourselves that we can multi-task and use the cellphone while we drive.

After all, we can walk and chew gum at the same time, right? When we stop and think about those activities — chewing gum and walking — we have to admit that walking is one of those things we do that requires very little brain power.

In fact, it's subconscious and nearly automatic. Unlike walking and chewing gum, both driving and using a cell phone requires higher cognitive thinking. Your brain simply cannot perform two higher cognitive tasks at the same time. Instead, it must switch between tasks. With technology at our fingertips, drivers are constantly faced with distractions, such as talking or texting, which places their safety and that of others at serious risk.

Although cell phone use is not the only distraction in the car, it is one of the most common and is a leading cause of distracted driving traffic crashes and fatalities.

Text messaging is particularly dangerous. Research conducted by the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) found that reaction times double when drivers are distracted by text messaging.

Driving requires the use of our visual, manual and cognitive abilities — texting takes away all three of these at one time. According to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), in 2015 driver distractions killed 463 people and seriously injured an additional 3,076 people on Texas roadways.

In 2015 there were 103,576 traffic crashes related to distraction, which is an increase of 3 percent from 2014. Distracted driving-related crashes are highest among younger drivers ages 16 to 34.

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, and TxDOT is launching the Talk. Text. Crash. campaign to raise awareness of the dangers

associated with distracted driving and to encourage Texans to put down their cell phones while driving. With more than 100,000 traffic crashes in Texas each year involving distracted driving, TxDOT is reminding drivers that using a mobile phone when behind the wheel is a risky habit that they should break.

In 2015, 38 percent of Texas drivers admitted to talking on their mobile phone while driving at least some of the time, according to a survey conducted by TTI, and more than 21 percent of drivers said they read or send text messages, and emails, when behind the wheel.

The Talk. Text. Crash. campaign aims to reduce distracted driving, not only for National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, but throughout the year.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent, Kailey Roberts, from Crockett County reminds drivers to put away their cell phones

and wait until they arrive at their destination to use their phone. Although cell phone use is the most easily recognized distraction, all in-vehicle distractions are unsafe and can cause crashes or fatalities. Keep your eyes on the road and arrive alive.

## April is Child Abuse Prevention Month

Governor Greg Abbott has proclaimed April as Child Abuse Prevention Month and the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS) is stepping up its public awareness efforts in a big way. DFPS is launching a \$1 million public education campaign aimed at helping parents deal with the challenges and stresses that can lead to child abuse and neglect. The Help for Parents, Hope for Kids media campaign includes one month of television ads in the largest Texas markets, radio spots in rural Texas, and a statewide mobile and online campaign from April through the end of August.

On the campaign website, HelpandHope.org, parents will find four new educational videos and many new expert articles and tips to help parents learn to deal with some of the most challenging aspects of parenting - dealing with teens, bedtime battles, crying babies, postpartum depression, toilet training, texting, and much more. The campaign's Facebook page (4MyKid) shares fun and helpful ideas and re-

sources for families. Also in April, Child Protective Services (CPS) is joining with local governments, community groups, service organizations, activists, and other partners to put the spotlight on preventing, recognizing, and reporting child abuse. See more about prevention events in your area on the Events Page of HelpandHope.org.

CPS investigated more than 176,868 allegations of child abuse or neglect in Texas last year. Tragically, 171 children died at the hands of a parent or other caregivers. Another 66,721 children and teens were victims of abuse or neglect and 17,151 were removed from their homes for their own protection.

"Parenting is hard and stressful, so it's crucial that we support parents in every way we can to help prevent abuse," said Judge John Specia, Commissioner of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services. "But if you suspect a child is being abused or neglected, please report it so we can investigate to make sure the child is safe and parents get the help they need."

the state budget, accounting for 56 percent of all tax collections.

## BUSINESS GROWTH NOTED

Secretary of State Carlos Cascos on April 7 announced a 9.9 percent increase in the number of new, for-profit Texas businesses in March compared to the same month last year.

The secretary of state's office processes new business filings. Some 16,511 certificates were filed in March, a required step in creating new Texas for-profit corporations, professional associations, limited liability companies and limited partnerships. That was almost 1,500 more entities created than in March 2015. The March 2016 numbers also reflect a 7.7 percent increase from February 2016 filings of for-profit business formation totals.

"Our office not only saw growth in new businesses created in March, but we also see a continued trend of increased business formations," Cascos said.

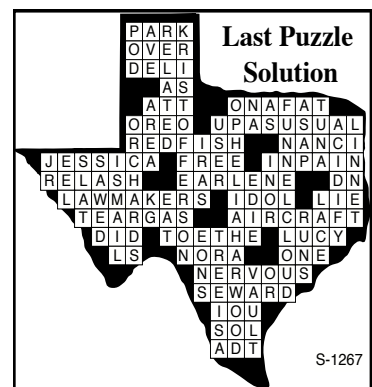
Furthermore, as the end of March was also the end of the first quarter of calendar year 2016, Cascos noted that during the period his office accepted a total of 46,117 certificates, a 10.5 percent increase compared to the first quarter of 2015.

## 'DON'T MESS' TURNS 30

The Texas Department of Transportation launched its "Don't Mess With Texas" anti-litter campaign in 1986 with a Cotton Bowl television spot featuring "The Eyes of Texas" played by legendary Texas blues guitarist Stevie Ray Vaughan.

According to an April 6 TxDOT news release posted in advance of an April 9 statewide litter cleanup, nearly half a billion pieces of visible litter still pile up along state-maintained highways in Texas each year. Seventy percent of this litter is small trash such as napkins, cigarette butts and fast food wrappers. In 2015, litter cleanup efforts cost \$32 million. Violators can face fines starting at \$500.

With a nod to that auspicious beginning three decades ago, Texas Transportation Commissioner Jeff Austin III reminded citizens the campaign "is more than an iconic slogan, it's an appeal to our Texas pride to keep our great state beautiful and litter-free. It also serves as a reminder that each of us has a responsibility to put trash where it belongs and not toss it alongside our roadways."

**APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION.** Circle Bar Truck Corral, Inc., P.O. Box 1498, Ozona, Texas 76943, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a major amendment to TCEQ Permit No. WQ0014240001, to authorize a reduction in BOD<sub>5</sub> monitoring frequency from once per week to once per month, a change in the pH effluent limit from 6.0 - 9.0 standard units to 6.0 - 11.0 standard units, the use of influent flow measurement to comply with the permitted effluent flow, and a revision in the buffer zone requirements from ownership of the buffer zone to obtaining a legal easement on part of the buffer zone not owned by the applicant. The proposed amendment also requests to remove all applicable Interim phase provisions, because the facility is already operating in the Final phase. 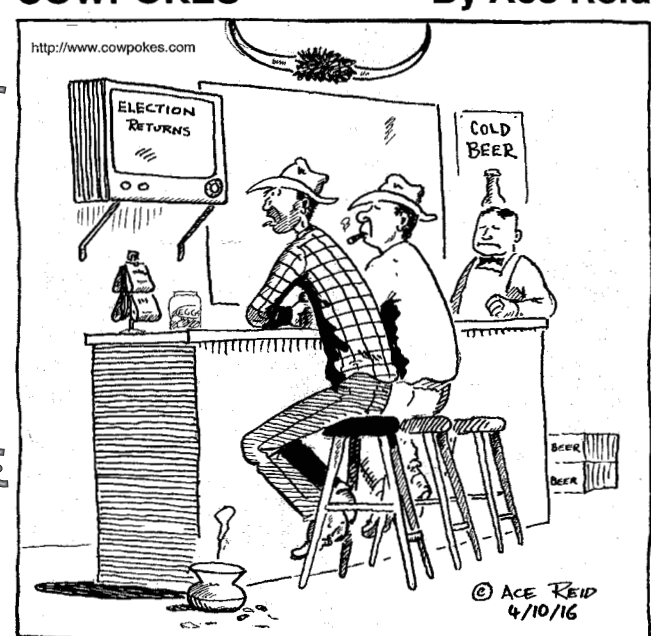
