Cynthia Ann Parker Story **Told Anew in Recent Film**

You should have been there! Several of us from Cottonwood were, and experienced the video showing of "Legend of the Blue Eyed Comanche" as a one-of-akind event. The video film is a as a young girl from Fort Parker, near Mexia, Texas, during the early days of American settlement of the state.

It is the narration of Cynthia Ann's assimilation into the nomadic life of the Comanche Indians, first as a captive slave and then as the wife of Nacona, It is the story of her life as a mother of two sons and one daughter by Nacona. It tells the details of her recapture by the Texas Guards and her return to Camp Cooper in Throckmorton County and the attempts to discover her identification.

After her identification and

return to the Parker family, it is the story of the loneliness and longing of a mother for her sons and daughter and former life as wife of the Chief of the Comanche Indians. It becomes the sad story of a woman, twice captured by opposing forces, and the attempts to make her conform to a new culture. According to the legend she was passed from family to family among the Parker's in an attempt to find her a place where she could be comfortable and happy. It was not to be so, and she died of a broken heart a few years after her return to the Parker family.

One of her sons, Quanah, subsequently became Chief of the Comanche tribe and continued to raid the westward expansion of American culture. He became the last hold-out of his people to move to the reservation in Oklahoma. When he finally did gone but the Indian blankets are a so he became a champion of his people and began to advocate and work for the education and betterment of the Comanches as American citizens.

In the endeavor, he became friends with American presidents and other influential leaders. He visited Washington D.C. and President Theodore Roosevelt visited the reservation in Oklahoma, Quanah Parker took him hunting.

longed for his mother. He took her family name, Parker, as his own and finally had her body moved to the reservation. The Parker family and the Comanche tribe have, in a sense, united and pow-wow in Cache, Oklahoma. 440, Cross Plains, Texas 76443.)

The film, "Legend of the Blue Eyed Comanche" is the work of Steve Compton, of Greenville, Texas. He is the researcher, writer, editor, director and producer of the film and is also CEO of Wolf Productions, the firm that holds the copyright. The film is scheduled to be shown on TV in the near future.

In addition to the film presentation, members of the Callahan County Historical enjoyed Commission presentation of Dr. Jacquetta McLung, a great-great-granddaughter of Quanah Parker, and Anna Thamahkera, a granddaughter of Quanah Parker, by a different wife. They presented artifacts of Indian life in the time of Cynthia Ann and modeled the native dress, made out of doeskin. The dress is well over 100 years old and they told about how it was made, how it is cared for, and its utility as dress-ware.

Paul Davis, an adopted son of Jacqueeta's father, read an episodic poem he had written about the life of Quanah Parker and his place in the history of the Comanche Indians. Paul's wife, Linda, was also present at the meeting.

This meeting was arranged by Judy Luter, a member of the Callahan County Historical Commission. Also attending the meeting from Cottonwood was R.T. and Yvonne Peevy and Wallace Bennett. Sonya Clayton, of Throckmorton, wife of western writer Lawrence Clayton (now deceased), and a writer in her own right, also attended the meeting. Her family was a previous owner of the land in Throckmorton County that was the site of the former Camp Cooper, and also for a brief time was the site of a Comanche reservation. Sonya is very knowledgeable about the legends of the Comanches and Cynthia Parker.

As a side light, Charles Goodnight and Burke Burnett, legendary cattle barons of the Red River watershed, became friends of Quanah Parker and were very instrumental in the life of the Comanche reservation. 

The proposed rule, which was published in the Federal Regismeant to "streamline regulations poses." governing the direct Farm Loan Programs," according to the explanation included in the Federal Register by the FSA. However, the same proposal also included a change in the definition of family farm for purposes of determining eligibility for FSA direct and guaranteed loans.

The proposed change would have established that a family farm "generates or will generate in a typical year annual gross farm income which does not exceed the greater of \$750,000 or 95 percent of the statistical distribution of the income of farms in the State with gross sales in excess of \$10,000 based on the farm data and survey of farm economic factors most recently published by the National Agricultural Statistics Service, USDA or any successor agency." Currently, the USDA has broad guidelines to help their state and local offices determine what may be a family farm in their region.

Former Baird graduate, Buddy Hart being honored at Abilene Public Library June 5

A reception honoring Jesse Conner "Buddy" Hart, former POW of World War II, will take place at the Abilene City Library at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, June

Buddy Hart is a 1935 graduate of Baird High School.

A book, Buddy-World War II POW # 1831, A Story of Courage and Patriotism, has been written about his life by Charles G. Anderson, Sr. The book will be available for anyone who might want a copy at the reception.

Buddy- World War II POW #1831

When T/Sgt. Buddy Hart floated down toward the snow covered mountains of Czechoslovakia on February 22, 1944, his chances for survival were slim. A German Messerschmitt buzzed near his parachute and he closed his eyes and prayed the strafing that he knew was coming. It never came, but another deadly game was being played by the Nazi pilot which nearly cost Buddy his life.

The burning plane was circling above and Buddy thought his crew members had died. Later. that evening, he found that miraculously all had survived, but their ordeal was far from over. He looked on in horror as the Nazis beat his copilot, Ed Brady, unmercifully. Before liberation other men of World War II who on May 1, 1945, Buddy had lost showed the Nazis the true meanhalf his weight, suffered through a winter without shoes, saw a lynching and was nearly killed by a mob at Frankfurt. He suf- ever made it home. Buddy was fered humiliation and torture as one of these, but his life was the Germans laughed at him.

After processing at Dulag Luft in Frankfurt, Buddy spent time in Stalag Luft VI, IV and I. The author has interviewed many of the men who served with Buddy. Some, however, never came home. Buddy had three close

friends who died in the war -Red, Albert and Carl. Buddy and his fellow POWs were forced to eat rats, mice and maggot filled that God would save him from meat to survive. "Once, we chased a cat down and feasted on it for several days by pouring more water in the soup," Buddy said. "Then, we chewed on the bones until they were all gone."

Buddy's ship landed in New York on July 5, 1945. "I cried," he said. "I had not cried for a long time, but when I saw the Statue of Liberty and knew that I was free, I broke down. So did many others.



Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension wildlife specialist at San Angelo, said "The name of the series is appropriate, but misleading." "Some folks shudder at the thought of 'appreciating brush," said Rollins. "But the paradox of 'brush' and 'appreciation' in the same sentence is intentional. The word 'appreciate' not only means 'to value or admire highly,' it also means 'to judge with heightened perception' and 'be cautiously or sensitively aware of.' "Landowners today are more concerned about managing their landscapes for multiple uses, not just for livestock. I'm amazed at how quickly the phrase 'Brush Sculpting' and its practice has caught on. Since it was first coined in 1997, this practice of intentionally leaving some wildlife cover in an aestheticallypleasing pattern has been used on literally thousands of Texas

"Whether you look at brush from under the brim of a cowboy hat (livestock prospective) or a camouflaged cap (hunter's perspective), you'll find good, useful information to help you achieve your brush management goals at these workshops.

Judon Fambrough, senior lecturer with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University, will be the keynote speaker at this workshop. His message will be to understand the impacts brush has on land value, both positive and negative.

Morning topics will include: "Plant Biology Relative to Management," "What Species Are Out There?," "How Much Brush is Enough/Too Much?" and livestock, quail and deer consider-

They will include talks on plant identification, brush management site inspections and discussions and demonstrations of various brush control methods and equipment. Spray Schedule For Pecan **Nut Casebearers**

Time is approaching to start scouting for one of the most important nut-infesting insects of pecans, that is the pecan nut casebearer. The adult casebearer is a gray almost black moth about 1/3 inch long. The moths are active at night, when they lay eggs on pecan nuts. From research and working with producers we are confident that an egg lay will occur 7-10 days after the first catch of the moths using pheromone traps. In Callahan County our first significant catches were made around May 8-11. Eggs are oval, flat and tiny, just large enough to be seen with the unaided eye. Nut clusters with eggs can be tagged with a piece of ribbon and checked each day to determine an exact hatch date. Insecticides need to be applied 1-2 days after first egg is hatched. With catches on May 8-11, nut entry is predicted to occur 12-16 days after this catch which

would give us the spray schedule of May 20-26. Proper scouting is suggested to determine the best time for insecticide ap-However.

Forage Sorghum Produc-

tion Meeting June 11th Callahan County Cooperative Extension is holding a forage sorghum production meeting June 11th at the test plots located two miles south of State Highway 36 on State Highway 283 at the home of Miller and Marian Scott. The meeting is designed to give producers an opportunity to compare some of the different varieties of summer annual forages that are now available to help them plan for

next years growing season.

The meeting will begin with registration at 9:00 am. With the program starting shortly thereafter. Dr. Billy Warrick, San Angelo-based Extension agronomist, will open the program with a discussion of site selection, soil preparation, seeding rates and fertility. Dr. Warrick will also discuss prussic acid and nitrate poisoning as it is associated with sorghum forage production. Dr. Calvin Trostle Extension Specialist from Lubbock, will then discuss the general principles for high quality forage production. Dr. Trostle will discuss advantages and disadvantages between conventional sorghum/sudan crosses (haygrazer), Sorgo-sorghum/ sudan (3-way crosses), Brown mid-rib sorghum/sudan (BMR), Photoperiod-sensitive sorghum/ sudan, forage sorghum and Hybrid pearl millet. The varieties that were planted and will be available to be viewed include: 4 Ever Green, SX17, Nutri Plus BMR, Forage Master BMR, SS 200 BMR, PS 210 BMR, Forage King, Fame, Cattlegrazer II, and Hay Delay. The meeting will conclude with a sponsored

Three continuing education unit (CEU) credits for participants with a Texas Department of Agriculture Applicators License will also be offered.

Persons planning to attend are asked to contact the Callahan County Extension office at (325) 8541518 by June 4 for meal planning purposes.

MAY/JUNE GARDEN CHECKLIST

* Check plants for insects and diseases. Destroy badly infested plants. Spider mites can be especially troublesome at this time. Select a chemical or organic control, or use insecticidal soap.

* Supplemental irrigation is essential for many ornamental plants such as coleus, caladium, geranium, dahlia, azalea, and camellia during the hot, dry summer days ahead. Water lawn and garden thoroughly, but not too frequently.

* There is still time to plant some of the colorful, heat-tolerant summer annuals. Directseed zinnias and portulaca, and purchase plants of periwinkle, salvia, marigold, and purslane. Be sure to water transplants as needed until roots become established.


* Removing faded flowers from plants before they set seed will keep them growing and producing flowers. A light application of fertilizer every 4 to 6 weeks will also be helpful.

* June is the time to select daylily varieties as they reach their peak of bloom.


 Advocacy leadership with SB 374 in the 76th Texas Legislature to provide the best access to assistance for elderly Texans and Texans with disabilities.

Brush Appreciation Day set for May 27 in Baird

"Some folks shudder at the thought of 'appreciating brush," said Rollins. "But the paradox of 'brush' and 'appre-

Callahan County Extension ciation' in the same sentence is intentional. The word 'appreciate' not only means 'to value or uled a "Brush Appreciation admire highly," it also means 'to judge with heightened perception' and 'be cautiously or sen-

sitively aware of,' "Landowners today are more concerned about managing their landscapes for multiple uses, not just for livestock. I'm amazed at how quickly the phrase 'Brush Sculpting' and its practice has caught on. Since it was first coined in 1997, this practice of intentionally leaving some wildlife cover in an aesthetically-pleasing pattern has been used on literally thousands of Texas acres.

"Whether you look at brush from under the brim of a cowboy hat (livestock prospective) or a camouflaged cap (hunter's perspective), you'll find good, useful information to help you achieve your brush management goals at these workshops.

Judon Fambrough, senior lecturer with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University, will be the keynote speaker at each workshop. His message will be to understand the impacts brush has on land value, both positive and nega-

Morning topics will include: "Plant Biology Relative to Management," "What Species Are Out There?," "How Much Brush is Enough/Too Much?" and livestock, quail and deer considerations.

The afternoon programs will be field studies, weather permitting. They include talks on plant identification, brush management site inspections and discussions and demonstrations of various brush control methods and equipment.

Registration will begin at 8:00 a.m., adjournment is set for 5:00 p.m.
