A telegram received by Mr. Wilson this morning stated that 10,000 families are depending upon assistance, and more than \$8 million will be needed; Bailey County's 'rock bottom quota is set at \$160, which surely will be forthcoming.

Vocational agriculture is a course which is set up to help the high school boy get started in farming, or in some field directly or indirectly connected with agriculture. This group would include almost every individual living in West

Books tell us that the FFA is a self supported organization of, by, and for boys studying vocational agriculture. However, in order to really understand what he organization is and what it means to those who are active members of it is almost impossible unless one is or has been a member himself. The organization recognizes and awards its members for outstanding achievements. It unites Agriculture students on a national basis, and helps to develop every talent

evidenced by any member. To a boy who is about to enroll in ag, the biggest question would probably be, "What will a boy study, as a freshman, in vocational agriculture?"

First, the boy will be started on a supervised project. He will have a livestock or a crop project that he will carry throughout the school year. Ag boys are encouraged to develop their judgement and to think for hemselves.


Freshmen agriculture students attend classes for a double-perlod five days a week. Through work on a notebook and by going on field trips he will learn the course by actually doing the

Some of the important things taken up by freshmen are leadership, Future Farmer work, improving of livestock and plants, soil conservation, elementary farm shop, and how to make a living at "home".

With all the work which has to be "put out" by the freshman ag. student it is only natural for him to ask, "How much credit will I receive for this work?"

If the student makes a passing grade in his class room, and carries on a satisfactory, supervised project program, he will receive 2 credits on his high school ranscript. All profit in dollars and cents gained on an FFA project is the boys, and he is encouraged to begin saving by placing his earnings in the FFA "thrift bank". At the end of the year a boy is given the opportunity to continue his agricultural training in Ag. II, and if his proect program has ben a success he is advanced from the FFA rank of Greenhand, to that of


