Drought Broken But Too Late For Crop This Year

The drouth is broken. weather has hit the plains again. It was ushered in early last Friday norning by a cold wave from the north bringing a heavy downpour of rain, which was followed by low drizzle.

Up to 8 o'clock Thursday morning, 3.05 inches had fallen in Tahoka. Of this amount, 2.05 inches fell on Friday and Saturday and before daylight on Sunday morning. when the skies cleared and everybody thought it was all over.

But clouds overcast the sky again Monday and on Wednesday morning rain began falling again, continuing throughout most of the day. By Thursday morning, The News' rain gauge measured exactly an inch.

The fall last week-end was heavi er east of Tahoka than it was here but it grew lighter west. It was also heavier at O'Donnell. By now, the entire county is pretty well soaked.

Farmers and business men are speculating as to the amount of good it will do. The general opinion is that it depends largely upon when the first freezing weatser weather comes. If frost stays off till November a lot of young feed will be matured and some cotton will be helped. If a frost should come soon, the benefits from the rain to this year's crops woold be nullified.

On the other hand, early crops still in the field have been damaged, other farmers report.

City Finances Are Excellent, Mayor Reveals In Talk

Mayor Joe Bovell gave the lowdown on city finances at the Rotary luncheon on Thursday of last week, and it was a very interesting and highly satisfying report, for it showed that the city's incebtedness had been whittled down to a surprisingly low figure, very low if the funds on hand be taken into consideration.

Outstanding water works bonds issued in 1926, Mr. Bovell revealed, amount to \$39,000, due in annual installments running till March 1. 1966, and can not be paid until due

Outstanding street improvement bonds, issued in 1922 for the brick paying in the business section and down Depot street, amount to \$14,000 in annual installments running till August 1, 1952, also unredeemable; making a total of \$53,000 indebtedness outstanding.

But to offset this in large meassure, cash on hand amounts to \$10,113.30, and Government bonds held by the City amount to \$35 .-000; making a total of \$45,113,30. If the outstanding bonds were redeemable, they could be paid off down to about \$8,000.

City funds are derived from several sources, towit: taxes, the water system, the sewer system, building permits, etc.

A considerable portion of the City's funds come from the water system, the income far exceeding the expenses of operating it. The best paying City property, accord-Mr. Blakney had been in bad ing to the investment and expense while this system cost the company which installed it some fifteen years ago about \$55,000, the City was able to buy it in1940 for \$15,-000. T.B. Infection

Now that tuberculosis in cattle has been reduced to a small fraction of I per cent as a result of the systematic federal-state campaign of eradication, veterinary officials are concerned about the danger of tuberculosis-free herds becoming reinfected. One way that this can happen is from persons who have tuberculosis, present evidence indicates. Dr. A. W. Wight, who directs tuberculosis eradication in livestock for the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, cites a case, recorded in veterinary literature and supported by detailed records, in which four herds of cattle were infected by one person. Because of this danger he urges close cooperation between public health officials and veterinarians engaged in bovine tuberculosis eradication. Some cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, he explains, are caused by the bovine type of the germ and this type can readily infect cattle. Knowledge of the kind of tuberculosis a human patient has is helpful to veterinarians in tracing the source of infection when healthy cattle in the locality become tuber-

Outdoor Center

The back yard has come to be recognized as the center for family outdoor living and should be so treated. It should offer some use for every member of the family and for the guests of the family-a sand box and swing for the youngsters, a lawn for sun-bathing and for family games and a fine tree or two for summer shade. There should be flower borders along the sides for mother and an area where father can grow tomatoes and small vegetables. A pergola or summer house serves many useful purposes, and there may be room for an outdoor fireplace for picnic suppers. Formerly the only use made of the back yard was for vegetable gardens laundry drying and ash piles. The front yard was the only area that received any landscape attention, and it was generally decorated with either two round canna beds or two blue spruce. Family life was strictly an indoor affair as contrasted to today's mode of living.





O. W. BLASINGAME WRITES HOME FROM MANILA

Mrs. Fred Mathews was in the of fice Monday exhibiting a letter which her brother, O. W. Blasingame, had written back home from Manila, after having gone across

Leaving San Francisco with something of a feeling of sadness on July 2, on board the Sea Witch, he and others aboard underwent the usual agonies of sea-sickness. he relates in considerable detail. together with other minor incidents and then he proceeds:

"On the 11th of July we crossed the date line, losing the 12th altogether. On the 15th we saw land, the first since we left the U.S. he second time we saw land was niwetok, one of the Marsalls. We layed there two days. The next stop was (place omitted) on July 19 and stayed there four days. After being on the water four days

more, we arrived at Leyte. "They put us on a barge and took us ashore. When they lowered the door. I thought of the boys that ad raid the supreme price for hat island.

"The first day there I was on KP. Directly after dinner I got a break and was headed for Army Tent (Recreation Center) when suddenly an accident occurred. A boy opened up a drum of gas and went all over him and caught on fire. I grabbed up a blanket and ran to him. He was crying, 'Put me out! Put me out!' A flame was coming from his mouth and his clothes were burned off of him I threw the blanket over him and put out the flames. We looked for the gas in the other barrels to go up any minute. When I pulled the blanket off of him his hair fell off and he said, 'It is no use, boys, I am done for.' And he died that night. He had a wife and baby about two years old, and I can still hear that boy crying for help. It all occurred in a rice field and we were in mud up to our knees.

"The days came and went, and that place was a nigtmare. The chow a cog wouldn't eat, and they treated us about like dogs. They had Jap prisoners of war and they would put them to cutting weeds and put us on a garbage detail. They got off on Sundays but we had to work just the same.

"We shipped from there boarded a landing ship-tank, 935. We passed islands all the time. I never say so many in all my life. The ship was so rough I thought it would tip over. The sailors got sick and I didn't feel so good myself. Finally, we reached our destination, and it was Manila. The sunk ships in the harbor were as thick as flies. It was 4 p. m. when we unloaded and it was 11:30 p. m. before we got to bed.

"The next morning I went to chow and it was best I had eaten since I left home, and it is still that way. I've been here two weeks and I've been on K. P. part of one day. Eat and sleep is all I do. This is heaven compared to Leyte. The monkeys are as thick as rats over here, and the fruit is plentiful.

"Manila sure is a big city but it sure is shot up and in a mess. It rains here nearly all the time and the mud is like gum. I went on a sight-seeing tour, and the mud knee-deep on the side walks.

"Every thing sure is high. We visited a meat market. The meat lies out in the open and the green flies swarm all over it. They even slice their fish without gutting them, and the people go for it. They even bring buckets to our mess hall and yet the garbage out of our mess kits.

"The Red Cross sure is good over here. They give us something to eat and drink every night.

" I talked to a Filipino man the other day and he told several things which the Japs had donesome of them concerning him and



Off the Bonin Islands we saw the B-29s pass overhead on their last hostile run to Japan, and soon after received the word that Hirohito had accepted unconditional surrender. We were, naturally, happy to hear it, but also a little restrained since having previously heard several false reports. At any rate, all tendency to relax our degree of readiness was abruptly spiked the next day when a torpedo crossed our path just ahead of the bow. Right then we decided that while the Japs may have accepted surrender terms, there are always the 10 per cent who never get the word. We maintained our usual sharp lookout.

The next thing I knew we were joining the Third Fleet, about 300 miles off the Japanese coast, with orders to prepare to transfer at sea a thousand Marines and Sailors to the Ozark. The Third Fleet, as you probably know, is Admiral "Bull" Halsey's outfit, which inbattleships, cruisers, carriers, etc., that had been bombing and bombarding Japan. These major units of the fleet each carry a group of "Fleet" Marines, who antiaircraft batteries, and - plus landing force sailors from the same ships - were the ones we took aboard.

The first ship to come alongside was the U. S. S. Bon Homme Richard, one of the Navy's big carriers. As she came along-side our port side line-throwing guns fired lines across and breeches buoys were rigged, fore and aft. In a few minutes, men were pouring across the 75-foot gap between ships as fast as the chair-buoys could be hauled over and back, At the same time the U. S. S. Wisconsin came alongside our starboard side and as she got in position the ship's band on the Bon Homme Richard played 'Don't Fence Me In," dedicating it to the Ozark

Ironing Tips The wrong side of the garment is often the light side for ironing. Clothing specialists advise ironing on the wrong side all dark-cofered cottons, also linens, rayons, satin weaves, cropes and woolsthe last always protected by a pressing cloth. When garments of these fabrics are turned to the right side, they may need to have a few wrinkles smoothed out, but the less the iron is used on the right side, the better the appearance generally. White and light-colored cottons are ironed on the right side. Heavy fabrics of parts of clothes that are double in thickness generally need to be ironed on both sides. Embroidery may be smoothed out quickly on the right side, then ironed on the wrong side over a thick, soft pad or Turkish towel. If the fabric shows shine where it is pressed on
