Tahoka held the upper hand all through the game, though greatly outweighed by the visiting team, but was never able to push over a score. The Bulldogs penetrated the 20-yard line three times, once carrying the ball to the 2-yard line, but each time something happened to stop the threat, while the nearest the visitors came to scoring was the 39-yard line. The Bulldogs had seven first downs to the Tiger's four, three of the latter beging in the last two minutes of play when Saton clicked with a couple of passes and a lateral to carry the ball to mid-field and their only serious scoring threat, but the final whistle stopped that threat.

The Bulldogs, for the first time this season, displayed the fighting spirit for which Bulldog teams in the past have gained renown on the South Plains.

4.38 Inches of Rain Breaks Drought, And Retards Crop

Clearing skies and warm sunshine brought broad smiles Wednesday to the farmers and business men of Lynn county. This is one time when they were ready to cry "calf-rope" to the weather man.

A slow rain fell 'throughout the day Tuesday and on into the night. adding 1.32 inches of moisture to that which had already fallen. The total rainfall in Tahoka this month, beginning Wednesday morning of last week and continuing intermittently until Wednesday morning of this week, amounts to 2.33 inches. Two and .05 inches nad fallen during the last three lays of September. During these two weeks, therefore, Friday morning, September 28 to Friday, October 12, a total of 4.38 inches of water has fallen.

Most of this rain has fallen slowly and soaked deep into the soil. The weather was cool most of the time also, and a continuation of such weather much longer might 3:00 o'alock Thursday afternoon by have done more damage than good to the crops. Much of the open cotton has been left stained and dirty. This may or may not entail onsiderable loss depending on the cind of weather we may have dur-

ag the coming days and weeks. The low temperatures and cold rain also had a tendency to retard the maturing of the grain crops. but these crops will be greatly helped if killing frosts and freezing weather do not come before the first of November.

But, however much or little these rains may help this year's crops they are calculated to give a good start for next year's crops. Many wheat patches will be sown soon

The common name, limberneck, ather aptly describes the leading symptoms of the disease. Moore says it is accompanied by leg weakness, drooping wings and stupor. Death often occurs within one day.

The best protection is to keep flocks away from dead carcasses, decaying plants and similar materials. Fresh, clean range is one of he safest places for the birds.

Wet cool weather such as we are now having is especially conducive to an ever increasing amount of poultry diseases. Perhaps the most common poultry diseases prevalent at this time are the common cold and roup. No single factor can be said to cause this trouble, but exposure to unavorable conditions such as crowding, poor ventilation, dampness, cold drafts and the presence of internal parasites, weaken the ird. When the vitality is thus reluced, the organisms normally present in the nasal passages may develop to a point where they cause trouble.

The wise poultryman knows, o course, that an ounce of preventon is worth two pounds of cure, but a lot of poultry troubles still occur from neglecting to take the necessary precautions to prevent troubles show up, immediate removal of the cause should be the first control measure to employ. This usually means that a thorough cleaning up and disinfecting of the poultry premises would be order. Thus supplying surroundings, ventilation without drafts, and a well-balanced ration usually eliminates the trouble. All sick birds should be isolated from the flock to prevent further spread-

Floating Drydocks Change Concept of Sea Warfare

Enough electric equipment to furnish a good-sized factory plus a small hotel is installed on each floating drydock the navy is using to make emergency repairs of warships far from their most advanced permanent bases

These floating factories, recently revealed to be in action, are changing the concept of naval warfare by enabling strategists to plan oceangoing operations without dependence on the availability of fixed bases. Whereas the old static concept of sea strategy required ships to operate within an approximate range of 2,000 miles from a permanent repair base, floating drydocks make it possible to establish bases as they are needed and as near the fighting zone as desired.

In operation these mobile drydocks prepare a warship for repair by literally lifting the damaged vessel out of the water, thus giving workmen access to any part of the hull or deck, the same as if the ship were being overhauled on land. This is achieved by admitting water to sealed compartments so that the drydock submerges. When this is accomplished, the damaged vessel is floated over the dock or the dock is submerged under the vessel. Then water is pumped out of the compartments, and the drydock, with the ship under repair now nestling on it in a rack, arises to the surface. In this position, the damaged ship s completely out of the water, with its hull exposed, and examination or repair is made possible.







We pointed out that we had handled the appropriations of funds for, and maintained the secrecy of the atomic bomb project, and we recommended against the release of the atomic bomb secrets.

We told the President that members of our armed forces, particularly those abroad, were impatient with delays in the discharge program — that the War Departmen: was losing prestige among the servicemen. We urged a speedler cascharge program.

In the course of our conversation, I brought up the question of our six million bales of surplus cotton and asked the President to place the government behind a program for the earliest possible disposition of this cotton. He said that he was greatly interested and was already giving the matter consideration. The friendly nations of the world need our cotton. Moreover, it will be up to defeated Germany and Japan to produce their food and provide their clothing.

In Berlin recently I was told by the military staff that Germany was being permitted to resume certain non-war industries, and that the revival of the German rayon and synthetic fiber industry was being considered. I insisted that America ought to see to it that the cotton textile industry is favored, affording a sales opportunity now and later for American cotton.

I think our government has good oportunity to work out a program for the profitable disposal of cotton surpluses. Members of Congress from cotton producing areas have been requested to join in this effort, and the Departments sideration to the question.

Lt. Boydstun Home From European War

Going into the army five years ago as a private, Lt. W. W. (Bill) Boydstun came home last week as lieutenant, having won promotion fter promotion and various awards by sheer courage and gallantry on many of the battlefields all the way from Casa Blanca in northern Africa, through Sicily, France, Germany, and Sudetenland into Czechoslovakia, being near Belsen when the Germans "blew up."

Wounded three times, Lt. Boydstun licked his wounds as it was and went on fighting without hospitalization except when he stepped on a mine in Northern Africa and sustained severe injuries to both legs. He was kept in the hospital six weeks that time. In that Tunisian campaign, he says, and his outfit saw some of toughest fighting or the war. He had landed at Cas Blanca on November 18, 1942, and it was five months before his division, the First Artillery, got its part of the job done and were sent over to

As proof of this, he cited the fact that of 160 men composing an infantry company, all but four or five of them were either killed or severly wounded.

The fighting was tough on through France, and it was in that campaign that he received his second wound, being shot in the shoulder with a machine gun. They entered Germany near Aachen and on that very day he was struck by shrapnel in the back.

It was in Germany that he received a battlefield commission as lieutenant. Awards given him included the Silver Star for gallantry in action, the Bronze Star, and of course the Purple Heart.

Lt. Boydstun, when interviewed by a representative of the News. was too modest to attach any importance to his promotions and the awards given him and claimed no more credit than any other soldier. It took a rigid cross examination to bring out the facts we did get.

After the German surrender, he remained at the Army station near Belsen until sent back to the coast for embarkation, and he arrived back in New York on September 22. He was expecting to receive his discharge today, Friday.


