## Record Vote Cast In City Election Here Tuesday

Nearly 600 votes were cast in the city election held here Tuesday, and the vote probably would have exceeded that number if the polls had been held open until 7 o'clock, as was expected by many voters. A number of persons arrived at the polling place after the polls had been closed, it is reported, and others probably would have gone if they had not been informed that the polls had already closed.

Clay Bennett and Ivan Cathcart were elected aldermen for the full term of two years and B. L. Parker was elected to fill out the unexpired term of Fred Bucy, who had moved to Brownfield.

Miss Rosemary Nelms was re-elected city secretary.

The heaviest vote ever cast in a city election heretofore was in 1940, when 497 votes were cast.

In a called election held on September 17, 1946, almost that many votes were polled, the total being 492.

## Red Cross Quota Exceeded By \$326

Lynn county went over the top in the Red Cross drive with total contributions amounting to \$326.59 more than the county quota, according to Jarrell Brown, the Red Cross drive chairman.

Seven of the communities exceeded their quotas as assigned them by the county committee, and six of them failed to reach theirs, Mr. Brown reports.

Lynn county's quota was \$1,946.00. The amount of money raised was \$2,174.59.

## Voters Approve School Tax Hike

The people of the Tahoka Consolidated Independent school district voted overwhelmingly last Saturday to authorize the school board to raise the tax rate from \$1.00 per \$100 property valuation as high as \$1.50 per \$100 if necessary to meet the expenses of the school district. The vote was, for the raise, 135, Against it, 26.

The school superintendent, Vernon Brewer, and members of the school board expressed the opinion that it would not be necessary, however, to raise the rate more than 20 or 25 cents on the \$100 valuation, to meet the needs of the school for the ensuing year.

Ross Smith and Alton Cain were elected as new members of the board without opposition. Old members of the board, who were also re-elected without opposition, were Fred McGinty and H. O. Hargett, each for one-year term; and E. R. Tunnell, Weldon Martin, and R. H. Gibson, each for a two year term. The two new members will serve for three years.

## Verner and Elliott Visit Factories

Charlie Verner and J. T. Elliott of the D. W. Gaignat sales force spent most of last week visiting the John Deere tractor manufacturing plants at and around Moline, Illinois, and Waterloo and Dubuque, Iowa.

These have grown to be immense plants, Mr. Verner reports, the employees at one of these plants alone numbering more than 4,000. It was interesting to the News man to hear Mr. Verner describe some of the farming implements being manufactured. One little item which he mentioned is a modern corn planter, which drops the grains of corn with such regularity that when they germinate and the plant peeks out of the ground, the field is already completely checked, so that a cultivator can be run across the field in any direction, lengthwise, crosswise, or diagonally across in four ways.

Mr. Verner says that they still use some horses on the farms up there, however, and the West Texas boys had a little fun at their expense, razzing them as being behind the times.

Implement dealers visit these plants from all the agricultural states, Verner says, usually going from one state or section of the country at a time. His was the third Texas delegation which had visited the plants successfully.

As the News is informed, the chimes are so manipulated as to be heard inside the church only, outside the church only, or both inside and outside the church at the same time.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service sponsored the project, according to Rev. John Rosenberg, pastor of the Church, and raised the funds necessary to purchase the organ and chimes. Mrs. Maurice Small, chairman of the Funds committee, assisted by other members, actually secured and collected the contributions. Mrs. Roger Bell is president of the W.S.C.S.

It is evident that the W.S.C.S. is what its name implies, a society of Christian service.

## Move Revived To Pave Tahoka-Slaton Road

Judge Tom Garrard and County Commissioner E. J. Cooper made a trip to Austin last week and appeared before the State Highway Commission in the interest of the building, or completion, of a state highway running from Tahoka through Wilson and Slaton and thence on through eastern Lubbock and Hale counties to Plainview.

Much of this road has already been built.

It will be remembered that this road was designated as a state highway a number of years ago, but during the war, it lost its designation. However, a good hard-surfaced road has been built south from Plainview through Hale and most of Lubbock counties to the Yellowhouse canyon north of Slaton. Skipping the canyon, another stretch of the road has been paved from the south Bank of the Yellowhouse into Slaton and from Slaton down the Wilson road to the Lynn county line.

Judge Garrard and Mr. Cooper were seeking to get the state highway commission to allocate state and federal funds for the paving of the road from that point through Wilson and on to an intersection with highway 87 two miles north of Tahoka. They believe that the chances are fairly good to get this done, otherwise they propose finally for Lynn county to do it as a part of the farm-to-market road program.

Such a road would not only serve many Lynn county farmers but would relieve the heavy traffic over No. 87 in some degree.

Slaton, of course, will favor the paving of the road across the Canyon in Lubbock county as well as the Lynn county project.

## Many New Homes Are Being Built

So many new residences have been built in Tahoka the past year that the News has not tried to mention all of them—only a few of them in fact.

Right now, however, a number of unusually handsome homes are under construction out in northwest Tahoka, or have just been completed. One of these is the new Wiley Curry home on West 3rd Street. Mr. Curry and family having moved into it on Tuesday of last week. On an adjacent lot Judge J. W. Elliott is having another handsome residence constructed.

Two blocks north, the Dr. Skiles Thomas home is nearing completion. When completed it will be one of the handsomest in town.

Just north of the W. B. Slaton residence and on the same block, Bud Milliken has begun the construction of another large and attractive home.

Across the street east of this structure, Condy Carmack already has some of the material on the ground for the construction of another fine residence; and, according to reports, other residences are soon to be built in that neighborhood.

Out in the Roberts Addition, outside the city limits, numerous modern, up-to-the-minute residences have already been constructed and there has hardly been a time in the past twelve months when one or more homes were not under construction out there.

A number of nice but less pretentious homes have also been constructed in other parts of town, especially in south and southwest Tahoka.

Tahoka continues to grow.

And, by the way, that is a model home that Vernon Wilhoit is now building out on the Lubbock highway three miles north of Tahoka. And Marvin Munn's new home up the highway a half mile out of town is likewise a thing of beauty and joy forever.

**EISENHOWER SUPPORTS BOY SCOUT ORGANIZATION**  
 General Dwight D. Eisenhower has accepted membership on the National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America, it was announced last night (Monday) by Amory Houghton, President of the organization.

An advocate of Scouting over the years, General Eisenhower supported a drive for wastepaper conducted by the Boy Scouts throughout the nation during the last year of the war. By collecting 318,000 tons of paper in two months 299,936 Scouts qualified for the General Eisenhower-Boy Scout Wastepaper Campaign medal. A gold replica of it was presented to him in Washington in December 1945. "The Boy Scout Movement merits the unstinted support of every American who wants to make this country and this world a better place in which to live," General Eisenhower said when he received the medal. "Its emphasis on community service and tolerance and world friendship promotes a speedier attainment of the enduring peace among men for which we all strive."

In May 1946, the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America conferred upon General Eisenhower the Award of the Silver Buffalo "for distinguished service to boyhood." It is Scouting's highest award for national or international service.

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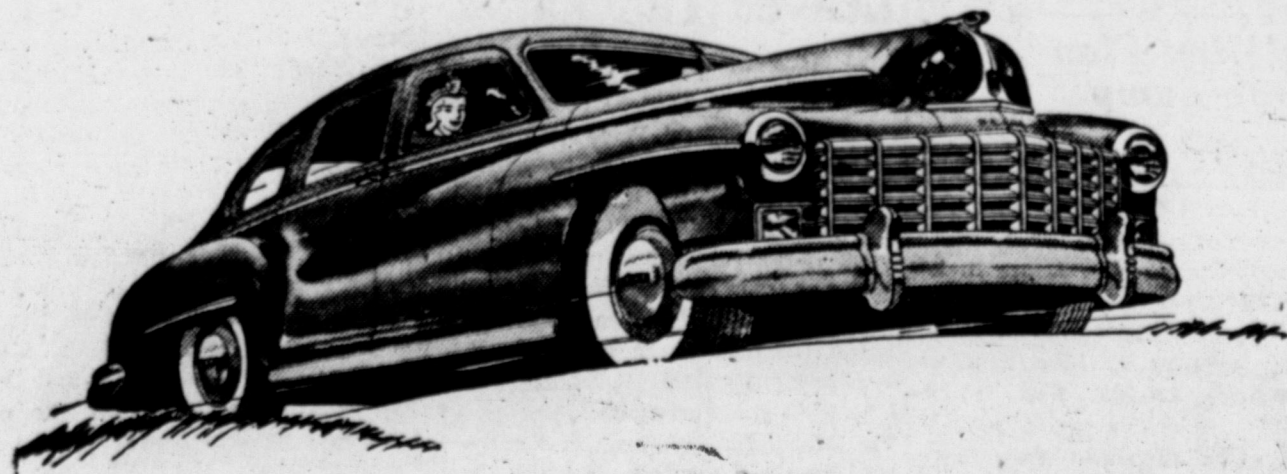

#### Local Teacher's Dad Died Recently

Informed that her father, George W. Harris of Bluff Dale, Erath county, was critically ill in a Stephenville hospital, Mrs. Paul Pittman, teacher in the high school here, left for that city Monday of last week. She was joined at Big Spring by her sister, Miss Verna Harris, who is a teacher in the Midland high school, but their father died before they reached Stephenville, passing away at about five o'clock in the afternoon.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday afternoon in the Bluff Dale Baptist Church, Mr. Pittman who hastened down to Stephenville upon being notified of Mr. Harris' death, returned to Tahoka soon after the funeral services but Mrs. Pittman remained at Bluff Dale until Sunday.

Survivors include the aged widow one son, and four daughters. Born in Mississippi on April 23, 1862, Mr. Harris would have been 86 years old had he lived a month longer. He came with his parents from Mississippi to Erath county, Texas, when he was only ten years old and had lived in the Bluff Dale community ever since. A pioneer of the county, he was a leader in every movement for the betterment of the farmer and took a keen interest in all civic enterprise, as well as in the religious and political life of his area.

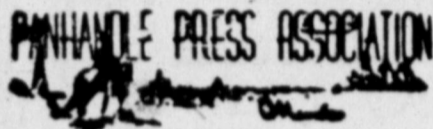

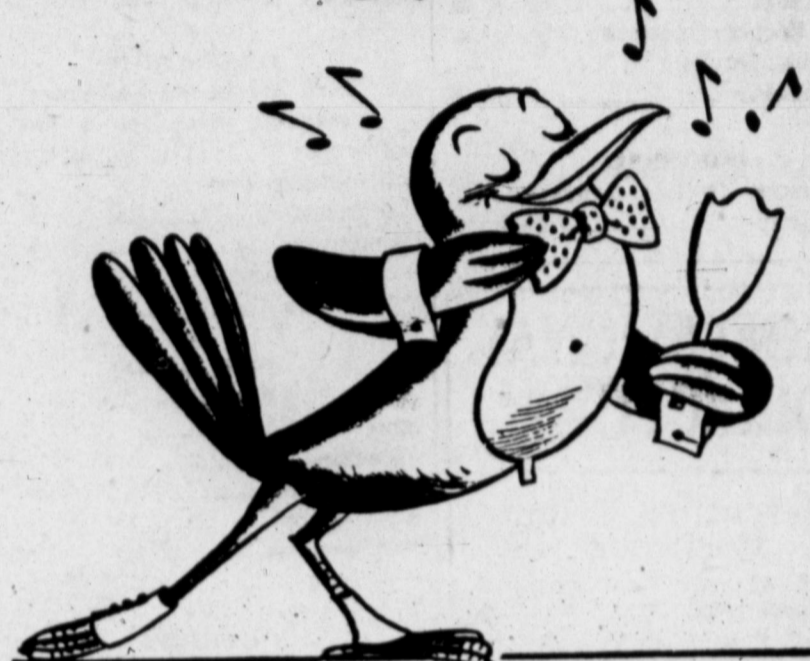

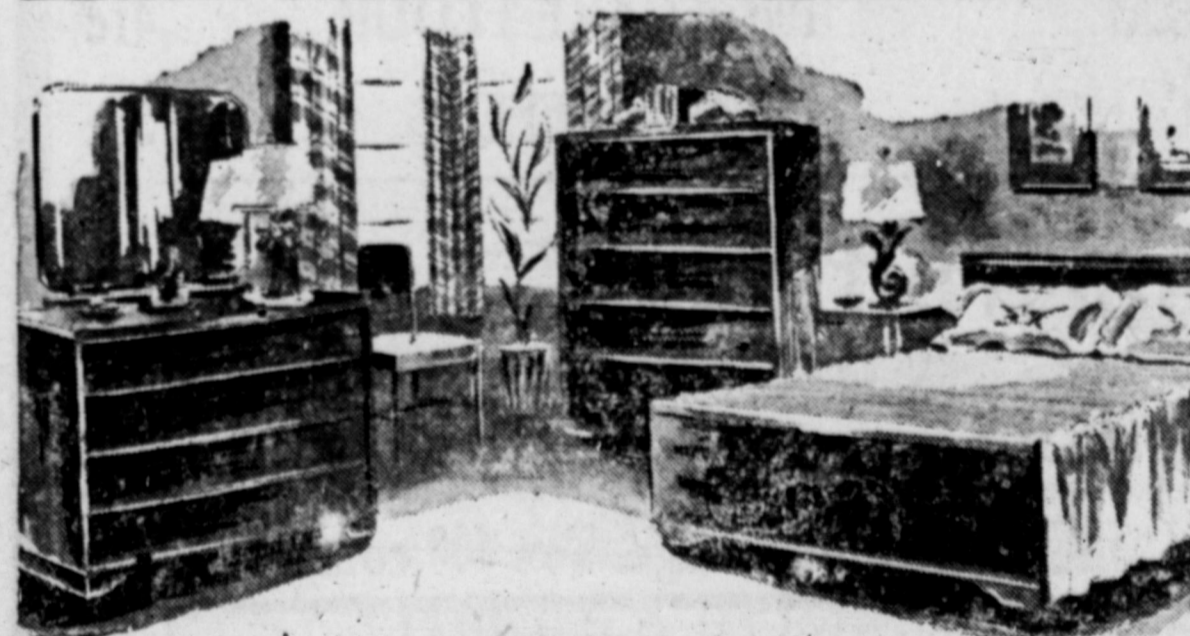

**County Agricultural Conservation Office Has Many Duties**

A farmer behind a desk instead of in front of it is not as uncommon now as it used to be. A good example of this change is the County Agricultural Conservation office. The Lynn County office is located

at Tahoka. The men in charge are the farmer-committeemen elected by farmers last fall and winter. Elections were held in all the farm communities in the county to name community committeemen and delegates to a county convention. The three farmers who administer the county agricultural conservation program were elected by the delegates.

These county committeemen run their own farms and usually are at the county office only long enough to do their required administrative work. They are paid only for the time actually spent in this work and do not draw a regular salary.

Members of the committee are Clarence Church, Chairman, N. S. Parker, Vice-Chairman, and Julian Pirtle, member.

Since the committee is not in the office all the time, Clint Walker is in charge of office operations. Other employees are Dorothy A. A'sup, and Ima F. Marshall. Hubert Tankersley is field man.

A major portion of the job of the county committee is administering the Agricultural Conservation Program. This starts with suggestions for the program a year ahead. The committee soon will be sending in recommendations for the 1949 program and farmers now are being invited to give their ideas to community committeemen or send them to the county office.

A major responsibility at this time of the year is meeting with farmers, explaining program practices and agreeing on conservation plans for the year. In this way farmers get the details on how practices must be carried out and the help available. To qualify for assistance the farmer is obliged to carry out conservation practices as specified. Checks are made to see that practices are carried out to assure the desired results.

Other programs administered by the county ACP office are crop loans and other price-support measures, and other work as assigned.

**CHINESE STUDENT SPEAKS TO WILSON BROTHERHOOD**

Joe Ma, Chinese student in the Texas Technological College, was the principal speaker at the meeting of the Wilson Baptist Brotherhood Monday night. Tahoka men attending the meeting included Judge Tom Garrard, E. J. Cooper, Dub Kenley, A. L. Smith, E. I. Hill, and M. H. Brasher.

The President of the Brotherhood is Floyd Heck. Prior to the program refreshments were served.

The speaker was introduced by John Heck of Wilson. Ma gave much interesting information about the Chinese people and Christian missions in his mother country. As we understood the speaker, he was a member of the Methodist Church, having been converted to Christianity in a Methodist Mission in China. Also he gave some interesting information respecting education, agriculture, economics, and finances in his country.

Ma has been a student in the Tech only three months but evidently had a good command of English before coming. He had become quite a hero in the eyes of American soldiers, we understand, by risking his own life to save a number of them overseas, but he made no reference to that in his talk. He was evidently very good natured and flashes a winning smile, and though not a fluent speaker he literally exudes good will and friendliness. If all the four hundred million Chinese were like Joe Ma, China would be a wonderful country.

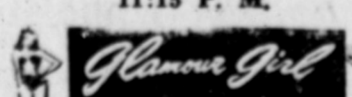
