> **Children May Not** Work On Farms **In School Hours**

With the coming of spring planting,' Texas farmers were reminded today that while the Fair Labor Standards Act permits children of any age to work on farms after school

and during vacation, it prohibits farm work by children under 16 during school hours. This reminder comes from Dallas' William J. Rogers, Regional Director of the U.S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Public Contracts Divisions, the agency which ad-

ministers the Act. He said that the child-labor provisions apply to local oungsters and children of migratory workers alike. The ony exception to the law is in he case of children working exclusively for their parent of egal guardian, he added.

To make sure of the age of any young worker he hires, the armer should ask for and obain an age certificate. These ertificates, which serve as
