## YOU, TOO, WILL SUFFER

(Dallas News)

Your pocketbook, no matter what business puts money into it, is bound to be hurt if organized labor imposes upon farmers its plans for wage hikes and unionization. Texan Jerry R. Holleman, assistant secretary of labor and former state executive for AFL-CIO, is one of the leaders spearheading this attack.

Hearings were held on Mon., Feb. 26, at McAllen, and Feb. 28 at Midland under Sec. 503, Title V, Agriculture Act of 1949, to determine whether employment of Mexican nationals at 70c an hour or less will adversely affect domestic agricultural workers. It has been proved, time and time again, that domestic labor isn't available to dehorn calves, drag a cotton sack or shovel manure, even when higher wages are offered. It's too easy to work part of the time in a city and draw unemployment compensation the rest of the year.

A worse threat than this, however, is the so-called Farm Labor Recruitment Bill, S-119, now before Congress. It would create a compulsory closed shop in agriculture. It would give dictatorial power to the secretary of labor. It would force farmers to assume responsibilities under contracts, without comparable responsibilities for workers.

All of these objections are based upon careful analysis of this bill by such reputable organizations as the American Farm Bureau Federation, the National Cotton Council, Texas Cottonseed Crushers Association, Texas Cotton Ginters Association and many others.

More than opposition to paying higher wages is involved. Farm employment dropped last month to the lowest level of record. There were 6 per cent fewer hired hands, 4 per cent less family labor working than a year ago. The Kennedy administration is asking for power to retire 50 million acres of farm land into parks and recreation areas. Cotton exports are sharply smaller than a year ago. Dairy prices are weak as supplies of products pile up.

How can farmers pay higher wages and all of the fringe benefits that unions demand under such conditions? The only possible answer is that they cannot stand this last straw on their sore backs—unless they are given more money by the federal government and/or higher support prices for their products.

You, of course, must pay the cost of this, as a consumer and as a taxpayer. So, the farmer's fight against government-imposed controls and a closed shop dictated by Washington, is your fight, too. No matter what you do, no matter where you live, you, too, will lose if the farmer loses.

## INDIAN SPRINGS AT THE CROSSING

In 1824 the Huaco Indians made a treaty with Stephen F. Austin. But in 1837 the Comanche Indians drove the Huacos out.

A city then grew up near the site of the Indian village and took the name Waco. Now Waco is one of the leading cities in Central Texas.

Site of the Indian village also was the site of the first crossing of the Brazos River. In 1917 the Daughters of the American Revolution reclaimed the Indian Spring at the village site and memorialized it.

This spring still flows, near the west end of the old and renowned Suspension Bridge over the Brazos River, in Waco.

## HE DID HIS FULL DUTY

In East Texas, within the city of Palestine, stands a monument for John H. Reagan.

Thereon, you will find a most appropriate quotation: "The old Roman's highest ambition was to do his full duty; Consciousness of having done it was his ample reward."

It is a large monument. It had to be in order to list the accomplishments of Reagan.

Inscribed on it is a list of the positions held by Reagan from 1845 to 1905. They include Probate Judge, Texas Legislator, District Judge, U. S. Congressman, Confederate Congressman, Postmaster of the Confederate States of America, Secretary of the Treasury of the Confederate States, Delegate to the Texas Constitutional Convention, Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, and author of "Memoirs of Secession and Civil War."

manager of Paymaster Cotton Oil Mill Co., at Temple, was named vice-president. The Association's executive committee selected as its chairman R. K. Phillips of Sugar Land. Walker and Phillips have been active in the state-wide organization for over 25 years.

Smith also is vice-president of Plains Cotton Growers, Lubbock; president of the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill; a member of the Cotton Advisory Committee and member of the Texas Tech board of regents. He graduated at Tech in 1937.

He has been connected with ginning since 1935 and chairman of the board of the New Home gin since the mid-1940's. He has served on the Association executive committee since 1957.

The Association convention — largest of its kind held in the United States — attracted over 6,000 ginners for business sessions and a massive exhibit of gin machinery and supplies. During the program, safety awards for no-lost time accidents were presented to 126 individual gins. Over a half million bales of cotton were processed in these plants.

he and the late Marshall Swann built up the Pioneer Abstract Co. in 1922. In 1928, Mr. Bradley bought out Swann's interest in the firm. Two years later Mr. Swann died.

Born and reared in Kaufman county, Don came to Tahoka with his mother, the late Mrs. Bradley, in 1916. For a while he worked for Mrs. Pat Northeross, who operated an abstract company here while her husband was serving as county clerk. The next year, 1917, he was appointed county treasurer and held this office until 1922, when he went into the abstracting business with Mr. Swann. He was married to Miss Amanda Leedy in 1953.

Incidentally, Marion G. Bradley Post No. 250 of the American Legion is named for Mr. Bradley's brother who died of influenza and pneumonia immediately following World War I while serving with the U. S. Army in Longwy, France.

Mr. Bradley recalls that when he came here in 1916 the present Lynn county court house was under construction. The builder was A. Z. Rogers of Henrietta, and the architect was W. M. Rice of Amarillo.

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# Printer's Ink-lings

Many high officials in the U. S. still believe we can do business with Soviet Russia—after the many lies, acts of deceit, stabs in the back, and frequent repetition by Communist leaders that they mean to conquer the whole world and "bury America." One morning recently on the "Today" TV show, Ambassador Francis P. Plimpton, U. S. representative to the United Nations Space Commission, put up quite an argument in favor of cooperation with Russia. He thinks we should cooperate with the Communists in space development—give them the scientific knowledge we have. Tommyrot! Russia goes so far as to steal any secrets they can from us. Would you pat a rattlesnake on the head, or feed him out of the palm of your hand?

It takes a lot of UNITY to make a community.

We got a thrill out of the hour-long tribute to General Douglas MacArthur on the TV program Saturday night, the picture reviewing his career, military achievements, ending with praise from President Kennedy and Ex-Presidents Eisenhower and Hoover. Of course, there was no word from Ex-President Harry S. Truman, who fired MacArthur from command of U. S. forces in Korea because the General wanted to win the war and Truman wanted a stalemate at a certain line.

Perhaps no one will ever know which was right, but, to say the least, the Korean "police action" was the first war the U. S. ever fought that it didn't intend to win. MacArthur, now hailed as one of the greatest military strategists of all time, declared the only way to hold the Communists in check was to push them out of Korea and show them we meant business. Truman argued such would threaten another world war. On that fateful day when the U. S. was showing weakness, we had the atom bomb. Russia had none. We were making advances in nuclear war, and Russia had not yet stolen sufficient secrets through American traitors to perfect the weapon. Since then Communism has spread over the world and to the very doorstep of America. It seems a shame we have no more Teddy

Roosevelts, Woodrow Wilsons, or even a Franklin Roosevelt. The Monroe Doctrine, either through fear or through efforts at appeasement, is a forgotten scrap of paper.

The MacArthur story reminded us of Ex-Sgt. R. L. (Kid) Gibson, an unreconstructed rebel, a soldier and patriot of the old school, a remarkable character, although just a small Lynn county farmer who died here a few years ago. The "Kid" farmed out near Tahoka Lake, hunted coyotes and jackrabbits, and at 76 became the oldest "Flying Farmer" in America.

"Kid" Gibson, as a youth, joined the Army and fought in the Philippines during the Spanish-American War and remained there for two or three years afterward to become an aide to General Arthur MacArthur, father of General Douglas MacArthur, at a time when the latter was attending West Point, as we recall. Incidentally, the "Kid" knew General John J. Pershing personally and had letters from the General to prove it, as he had fought under him and was the General's messenger boy during the military operations in Mindanao against the Moros during that war. During about four years, the "Kid" saw service all over the Philippines.

Prior to the U. S. invasion of the Philippines during World War II, there was much speculation in the papers and among military authorities about where the invasion would take place—on Mindanao, upper Luzon, Manila Bay, etc. One day, Mr. Gibson remarked to the Printer around at Woodworth's barber shop that he knew exactly where MacArthur would land.

The Printer sort of smiled in disbelief, and the "Kid" said, "OK, get a map and I'll show you why he will land at Leyte." We got the map and Gibson pointed out the exact spot, which even yet seems a little fantastic coming from an ex-Sergeant. Gibson explained, "I know the people and the terrain, and MacArthur does too," as he went into detail in describing the terrain of the different islands and the nature of the people who would not cooperate with the U. S. forces. A few weeks later, the U. S. forces did land at Leyte.

And now among the fading embers, These in the main are my regrets: When I am right no one remembers, When I am wrong, no one forgets. —Cheer.

The House has already approved a bill to raise postal rates, and the proposal is before the Senate. First class mail will be raised from four to five cents. Second and third class rates will be raised again, this time very substantially, if the Senate approves. Second class mail applies to newspapers and magazines. The raise will amount to more than 52 cents on a year's mailing of The Lynn County News to all subscribers outside the county, which we will be forced to pass on to these subscribers as our subscription price barely covers the newsprint and mailing costs.

We think the raise is exorbitant and unjust. In the past 10 years, the rate on newspapers and magazines has already been raised 155 percent. Eighty national magazines

have been forced to suspend publication, and many more will be forced to quit if the new raise is approved.

People depend on small town weeklies, dailies, and even magazines for information. Farmers, businessmen, householders, students and professional people depend on these publications to keep up with the times. They are almost vital to a democracy. A hundred years ago, our government recognized this fact and made special provision for the dissemination of news of what's going on at home, in government, and around the world.

Most newspapers have raised little objection to postal raises in the past, but now the rates are getting oppressive. Too, plans are already in the making to raise the salaries of postal workers, and the postal deficit will not be wiped out as backers of the raise in rates claim.

If the Post Office Department really wanted to operate within its budget, we believe it could. We're not running the Post Office Department, but may we suggest that they could modernize their equipment, cut out the "junk" mail carried at a big loss and which hardly anyone wants, quit carrying the 25 million pieces of Communist propaganda a month that it distributes at the American taxpayers' expense, raise the price of airmail and cut out the tremendous subsidy to airlines for carrying such air mail. In addition, the government could quit requiring the post office to give such services as selling duck hunting stamps and taking wildlife, livestock and farm censuses. It could cut down on the vast volume of government mail, and the franking privilege generously used by members of Congress, A. & M. College, the Armed Services, and all the other agencies down to the Peace Corps. Some people in a position to know say the Post Office Department is the one agency of our government that can operate without a deficit—if it just practiced these economies—without a postal raise.

Once upon a time we had a government that spent only what money it took in, or had in prospect. How long would you as an individual, or any business institution, last if you or a business continuously operated at a loss—borrowed money to indulge in extravagances? What a heritage debt we will leave our children!

Everyone in the county should hear Dr. C. L. Kay, vice president of Lubbock Christian College, when he speaks in the high school auditorium the night of April 16 on "The Opposing Forces of Democracy." The meeting is sponsored by Lynn County Home Demonstration Clubs as a part of National Home Demonstration Week.

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## Automation Comes To Lynn Farms; 2,042 Tractors Now In Operation

(Special To The News)  
New York, April 2—Automation, on farms in Lynn County, is moving forward quietly but swiftly.

With much less fanfare than accompanies the progress toward automation in industry, local farmers have been steadily adding to their mechanical equipment.

They have realized for a long time that machinery, rather than horses and hand labor, is the key to better profits. The big obstacle has been the financing of the expensive apparatus.

How well they have been succeeding is brought out in the latest Census of Agriculture, just released.

It shows that there are now some 2,042 tractors in use on Lynn County farms, including wheel, garden and crawler tractors.

Although such mechanization is taking place in most sections of the county, to a greater degree in some areas than in others, the advance has been more evident locally.

On the basis of the number of farms in the county, there are now 235 tractors owned per 100 farms, well above the 194 per 100 in 1954, when the previous census was taken.

It tops the average in the United States, 138 per 100 farms, and the 122 in the State of Texas.

Similar advances are noted locally in the number of motor trucks, balers, harvesters and other power equipment in use.

Despite this mechanical revolution, there still appears to be a place for the horse on farms in Lynn County.

The census reports a total of 334 horses and mules locally, as against 295 tabulated five years earlier, although most or nearly all, probably, are saddle horses.

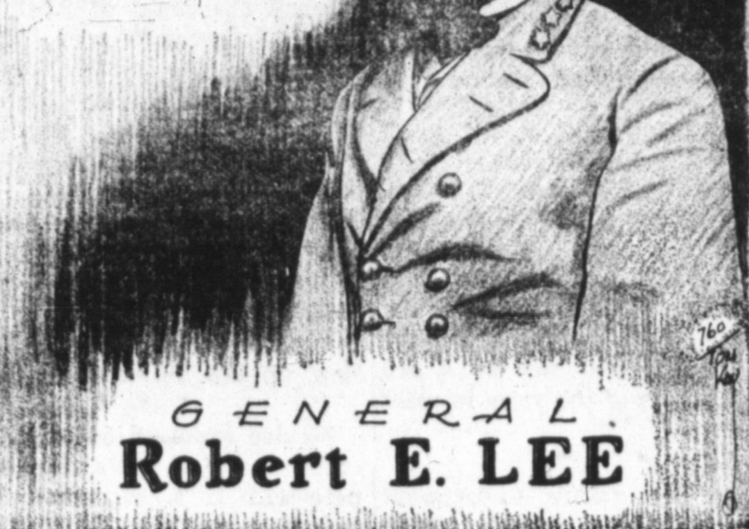
This, however, is quite different from the situation in most parts of the country. Throughout the United States, the number of these work animals on farms has dropped from a peak of 25 million to a mere 3 million in a period of 30 years. In the last five years alone, there was a 28 percent reduction.

The greater productivity on the average farm in the United States, due in great measure to automation, has failed thus far to give the farmer a sufficient return for his labors and his investment. The problem is one that still defies an adequate solution.

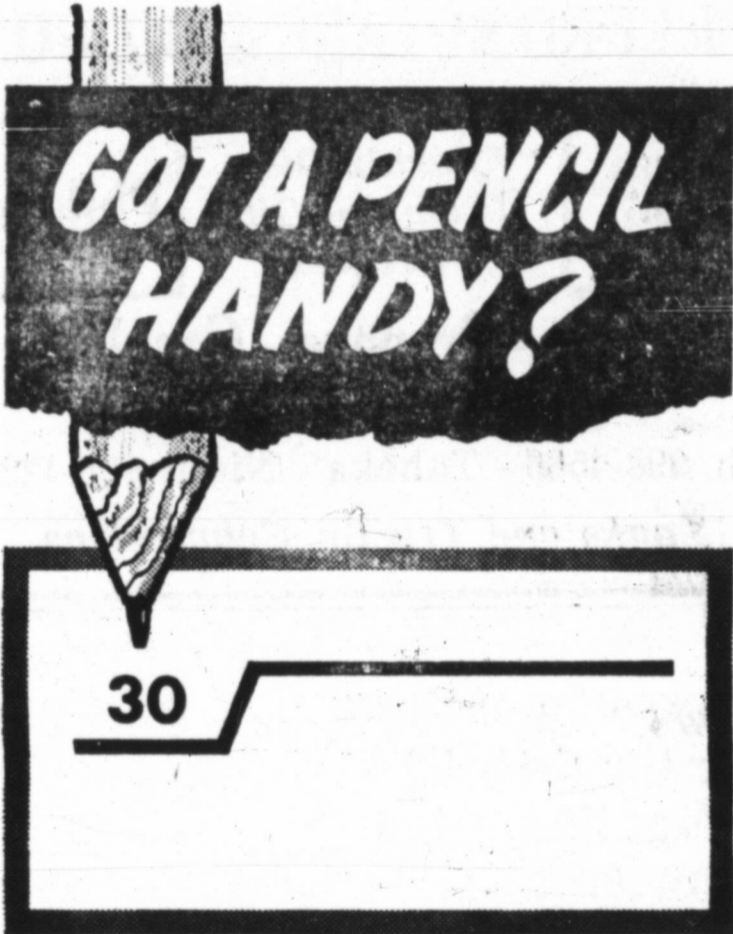
