Busy Career Day Program Slated

A full day of activities designed to provide students and their parents with information on a wide range of possible vocations and college opportunities is planned at Tahoka High School next Tuesday.

The general public is invited to attend the sessions, said Paulette Brownfield, counselor at the school. She said that the general session from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. in the auditorium would provide information on educational opportunities in both junior college and four-year institutions. Also, a personnel consultant will talk about using an employment agency, how one may improve his chances of getting a job, etc.

Individual sessions on a wide range of possible vocations will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., with adults again invited to participate in any of these.

From 2-2:30 p.m. will be displays by various institutions, with each manning a table to give information to anyone interested. Military recruiters also will be on hand, and Texas State Technical Institute will bring a

career van for student information. At least 34 different career sessions will be going on during the day in various rooms at the school.

Among them will be cosmetology, data processing, petroleum technology, engineering, mechanics, law, social work, photography, health fields, law enforcement, farming, accounting, clerical, broadcasting, architecture, welding, child development, clothing design and others.

Gin Offices Lose Cash To Burglars

An 18-year-old suspect in the alleged rape of a 6-year-old girl in Tahoka has been arrested and jailed and is being held for possible action by the court next week.

Two gin offices in O'Donnell were burglarized during the week, with a total of more than \$1,000 cash stolen. Four other gin office burglaries were reported in Dawson County, three of them Tuesday night, according to information received by the Lynn County sheriff's office.

John Montgomery, manager of O'Donnell Gin & Grain Co., said that office lost about \$300 in a burglary between Saturday and Monday, and Bobby Carroll, manager of Farmers Co-Op Gin, said that institution lost about \$750 cash in a break-in Sunday.

H.H. Hewlett reported his home about a mile southeast of Wilson was burglarized Sunday evening, with an electric razor and radio, valued at \$100, stolen.

Wayne Cogburn, about six miles southwest of Tahoka, reported three rifles and a shotgun stolen from his home.

In jail during the week were one person each for aggravated assault, rape of a child, public intoxication and destruction of public property.

Tahoka Police Dept. answered several disturbance calls.

Activities will continue during the Sunday School hour at 9:45 a.m., with classes all meeting together, and at the 11 a.m. Sunday worship service. Leading the Sunday morning service will be Mrs. Joyce Cooper, who has done mission work in many nations, and Jacinto Alderete, executive director of the Wesley Community Center in Amarillo.

Others who will take part in the activities by leading the various sessions include Steve Moore, director of the Wesley Foundation of Texas Tech. A graduate of Asbury Theological Seminary, he has attended school in Scotland and Israel. Also, Elwood Bartlett, former missionary to Zaire, will be present, and a two-term missionary to Zimbabwe and Nigeria, Larry George, now pastor of Trinity Methodist Church in Duncanville.

Rev. Gene Wisdom, pastor of the host church, said members will be asked to make an annual faith promise to missions during the conference.

DECA Cites Coulston As Outstanding

Tahoka High School Supt. Jim Coulston has been selected as "Outstanding Superintendent of Area VI Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA)."

He is one of only six superintendents in the state to be so honored, and will receive his award from the state organization at the state meeting in Corpus Christi this weekend.

Also planning to attend the ceremonies at the state Career Development Conference in Corpus Christi are Gerald Craig and Jimmie Bingham, next year's officers of the Tahoka chapter of DECA, and the organization sponsor, Mrs. Nancy Montgomery.

The local chapter nominated Coulston "in appreciation of his support" and the Tahoka superintendent was selected from 30 possible superintendents in this DECA area, including a region from Oklahoma on the north to O'Donnell on the south, and from New Mexico east to Wichita Falls.

Museum Considers Projects, Art Show

Tahoka Pioneer Museum board members Monday discussed plans for painting the building outside, acquiring a storage room, sponsoring an art show during the June pioneer reunion, and acquisition of some of Bill Craig's art work for permanent display.

Annual membership notices are to be mailed out soon. The museum operates strictly on donations, and annual dues of \$5 per couple are important in keeping the

museum operating, board members noted.

With the vacation season coming up soon, many travelers from over Texas and the nation will be stopping in Tahoka because of the museum, the board believes. Approximately half of the people who have signed the visitors' registry have been from outside Lynn County. In fact, visitors from 30 states and five or six foreign countries have registered.

Fun, Food Festival Nets Over \$6,500

The second annual Tahoka Fun and Food Festival, with entertainment, food and game and novelty booths, auction of donated items and door prizes was very successful Saturday, according to sponsors of the event, the Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary.

Grace Huffaker, president of the organization, said more than \$6,500 was raised for the auxiliary, and will be used to buy equipment needed at the hospital.

Members of the auxiliary expressed appreciation to all those who worked at the event and all who took part in any way. "We actually had a larger attendance than last year," said Mrs. Huffaker.

A special note was made of an auction of brownies made by Dean Bartley and sold in honor of Juanita Warren, an auxiliary member "who has given and served far beyond the call of duty." The brownies were resold until they brought in a total of \$294.

WOODWORK

WE WENT to a movie the other night, to see "Chariots of Fire," which someone told me was rated the best movie of the year in the Oscar awards, which I didn't watch, because I have never heard of any of the actors or seen any of the movies which get judged every year.

It was the first time the missus and I had been to the indoor movies since we saw "Sergeant York" with Gary Cooper in the summer of 1947, by cracky.

Well, that's not exactly right, since we didn't even know each other then, but it really had been about three or four years. It seems that we saw "Heaven Can Wait" in a Lubbock theater and I remember that I thought paying \$2.50 to see a movie was ridiculous.

Seeing the one last week was even ridiculous, since it cost \$4 per person just to get in. (Please, no letters from English majors).

Chariots of Fire, rated the best picture of the year, is about two runners whose desire is to get into the 1924 Olympics. A religious publication which rates movies that way says the movie is very moral, no bad words, no uncomfortable situations, fit for kids or anybody else to see. So we went to see it, and sure enough, there was nothing morally objectionable in it, a fact we did appreciate. It was a clean production.

It was also boring as heck. It wasn't a bad movie, but it wasn't a good one either. There just wasn't that much happening, and a lot of what did happen went over our heads. It was a little confusing, and besides, those Scots and Britishers don't speak West Texan, and it's very difficult to understand what they're saying.

The actors were the ugliest bunch of people I ever saw, and sometimes we couldn't tell who won the races they were running, because they all looked alike to us.

Later, the group which went to the show wondered how it got rated high enough to win some Oscars. One of the group said he had it figured out: the people who decide who gets the Oscars all have so much hair over their eyes they can't see the movies they're judging anyway.

Anyway, it's a shame it wasn't a more interesting show, because we do like movies with good moral themes and happy endings. But it just missed the mark.

It probably was the best movie of the year, though, judging from what we've read and the ads we've seen on some of the other movies.

was taken. This was the first year the THS student council participated in SMILE, but the project was so well received that it will be done again next year.

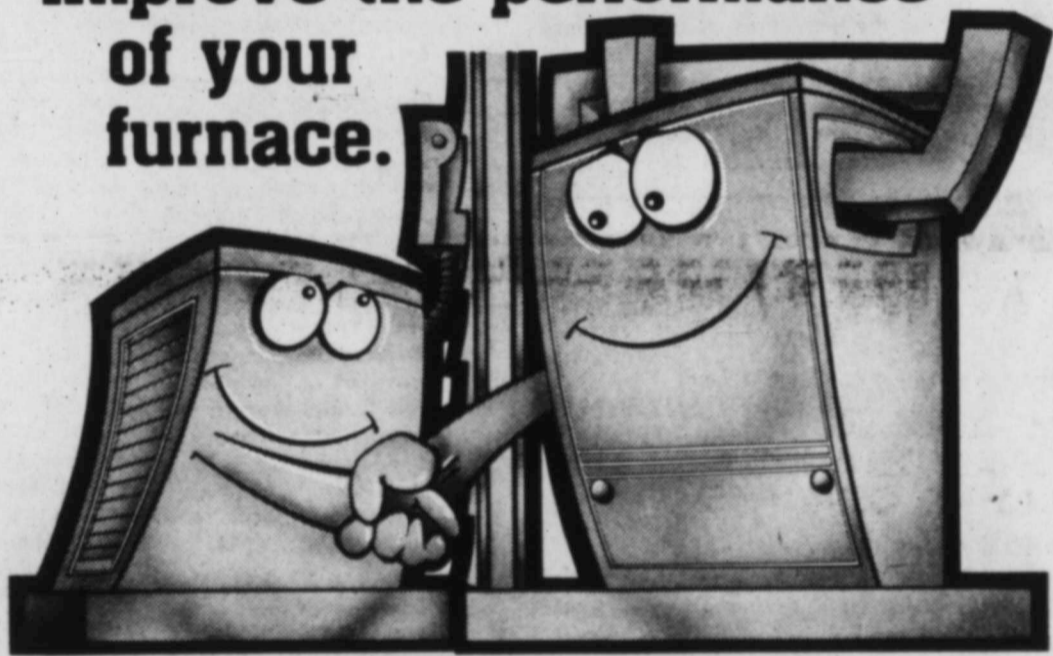

Cold start driving gets bad mileage even in small cars

COLLEGE STATION — Consumers who buy small cars primarily for fuel economy but only drive a few miles to and from work each day might have made their purchase for the wrong reasons, says an automotive engineer.

"If a person only drives a mile or two to work and back each day, he or she won't even get near the estimated mileage," said Rick Tonda of the Texas Transportation Institute, explaining that the vehicle is operating under "cold start" conditions.

"No matter what kind of car this person drives, he or she will get terrible mileage. They might have been more comfortable in a bigger car and come up with very similar gasoline usage on these short trips. That's just a fact of life," Tonda said.

Federal-aid Primary Highways. Anyone desiring to erect a new sign along these highways must have a state license to engage in outdoor advertising and a permit for each sign.

Existing signs may be repainted or repapered; however, they may not be enlarged nor may lighting be added unless approved by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation or the city which issued the sign permit. Subject to city ordinances, signs may be erected at campaign headquarters.

No signs except official traffic control signs are permitted within the rights of way of any highways in Texas. Maintenance crews may remove any signs not conforming to state law.

Candidates or their campaign managers are urged to contact the nearest district office of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation for further information if they are considering erecting campaign signs.

Speech Therapy Available

Tahoka has been fortunate to have the services of a speech therapist for many years. For the past two years O'Donnell has also received these services.

Good speech is very important to any child learning to read. It is hard to learn a word if you cannot say it clearly. Children learn to talk by receiving encouragement and by aping good models. For young children, simple games as "Patty Cake" and "Peep Eye" may be the beginnings of good speech. Later on, "The Mother Goose Rhymes" may be helpful.

The speech therapist is available in both Tahoka and O'Donnell for consultation and evaluation of speech problems of pre-school and school age children. Early intervention may save time later.

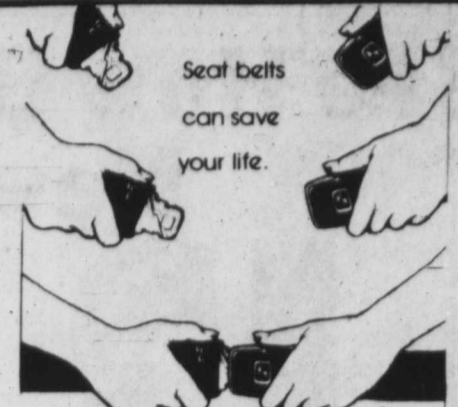
Tahoka and O'Donnell have had about 50 students receiving speech therapy this year.

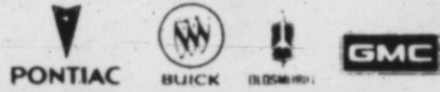

County Scales Are Checked

Lynn County people can count on getting their money's worth in weight through the year if the products are weighed on local scales or gas pumps, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said.

In the county there are 130 weighing devices of different types, ranging from 52 fuel pumps to 43 supermarket scales.

"Our department regularly checks the commercial scales in the county and has found that they conform to our previous surveys across the state. Of those that were above or below tolerance, not many scales were off the significant amounts. Also, as many were giving the customer too much of the product as were giving too little. Because of frequent checks, scales are not out of calibration very long," Brown said.

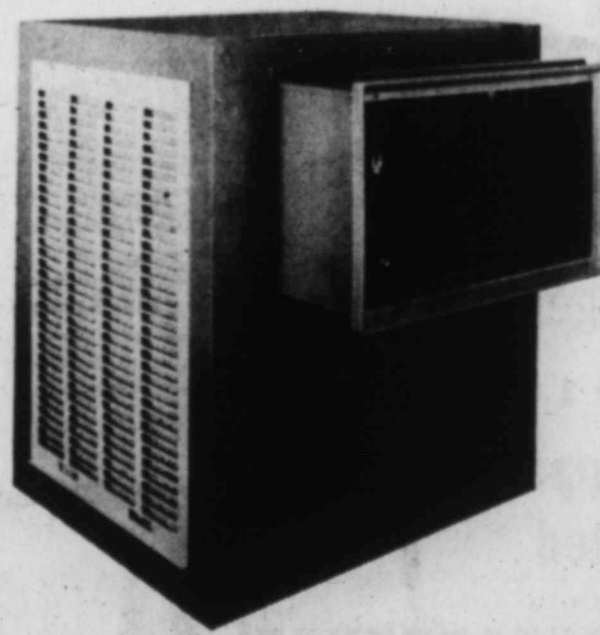

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COTTON TODAY

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

COTTON ESTIMATES RE-REVISED: U.S. cotton offtake during 1981-82 was reduced 100,000 bales to 12.1 million in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's April supply/demand estimate.

The total is 100,000 bales below the previous estimate. Domestic mill use was lowered to 5.3 million bales from 5.4 million, while the estimate of exports remained unchanged at 6.8 million bales, according to the National Cotton Council.

The latest supply figures also were reduced from the prior estimate, falling to 18.3 million bales from 18.4 million. The production estimate was lowered by 100,000 bales to 15.6 million. The revisions leave the carry-over estimate this season at 6.4 million bales, which includes 200,000 bales unaccounted for.

EXPORTS REPORTED: Cotton export shipments for the week ended April 8 totaled 174,600 running bales. This brought total shipments for the season to 4,414,200 bales.

Net new 1981-82 sales of 35,900 bales were reported.

The major buyer was Japan at 26,700 bales. Sales for 1982-83 were 31,000 and the major buyers were South Korea, 13,500 bales, and Japan, 15,800, the National Cotton Council reports.

NCC PRESIDENT TO TESTIFY: National Cotton Council President Ed Breihan will testify this week before the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture.

Breihan is expected to call on Congress to provide the necessary funding for an export credit revolving fund authorized in the 1981 farm bill to help boost cotton and other farm exports. Strong support of needed agricultural research to help reduce production, handling, and processing costs will also be emphasized.

Planting Tips

With the planting season rapidly approaching, now is the time for getting that planting-machine ready for the task ahead.

When preparing to plant any crop, there are three key areas to consider: tires, seed openers, and seed selection mechanisms.

Plant population will vary depending upon tire size, tire pressure and soil conditions, that affect tire rotation. Tire sizes and sprocket settings must be coordinated when calculating desired plant populations.

A simple solution to matching planter tires to the population chart requires a piece of rope about three feet long. With the planter loaded with seed and fertilizer and ready to go to the field, wrap the piece of rope laterally around a planter tire through the wheel rim opening so it makes a ground mark with each forward revolution.

If the chart guide is based on a tire size that travels 86 inches with each revolution, and the distance between the rope mark is 90 inches, for example, a field will be under populated with seed. To determine what the population is going to be, simply divide the desired 86 inches of travel by the 90 inches of travel—the tire is making and multiply this by the desired population—in this example - 26,000. The equation reads: 86 times 26,000 divided by 90 equals 24,844 actual plants per acre. The key factor is 86 over 90 or 95.5% of your desired population. This is approximately 5% less than desired or some 1,200 plants.

Refer to the plant population chart and find a sprocket setting that is close to 5% higher than the desired population (27,000 to 27,500). Use this new setting you will know you are to plant at 5% less than this figure, or close to the 26,000 plants per acre you desire. If you find that the population rate is still off, then

there is a more complicated problem elsewhere in the system. But first, make the tire revolution measurement with the planter fully loaded as this will more than likely establish the correct setting. One such calibration of the planter drive wheels to the chart should suffice for the planting of the entire crop.

The seed openers, whether they are runners or the double disk type, should be checked carefully for wear, obstructions, and proper function. This is a very critical area which determines the proper placement of the seed in the row, and any stoppage or malfunction has a direct effect upon the desired plant population. So, be sure to make the repairs indicated.

The third critical area on all planters is the seed mechanism. It should be checked for worn and broken parts. All parts should function properly.

Plate-type: Worn or sticky cut-off pawls and knockout rollers should be replaced or corrected for free movement. Seed plates should be checked for wear or damage.

Plateless-type: Check for worn or broken parts such as fingers and springs. Proper operation of such parts is essential. Remove and clean all build-up of foreign materials from these mechanisms. Follow the recommendations of the operator's manual for the frequency of inspection.

Air-type: Check the seed tubes for foreign material or potential stoppages. These may be cleaned by simply pulling a piece of cloth through the tube in a manner similar to cleaning a gun barrel. Check for damaged or poor fitting seals that would cause air pressure leakage. Inspect the seed cut-off brush assembly for wear and replace if necessary.

Sales Tax Report Told

State Comptroller Bob Bull-ock sent checks totaling \$31.8 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for April.

Total payments we have sent to these cities so far this year are running more than 19 percent ahead of last year, which means sales of taxable merchandise in these cities are running that much more than 1981," Bullock said.

The city and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

General's Rate Hike Is Opposed

In testimony filed with the State Public Utility Commission, Texas Municipal League rate experts challenged the request of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest for a \$110 million rate hike.

The League's testimony was filed in advance of utility commission hearings, that begin April 15, on General

Telephone's application for rate increases that would raise the monthly charges for some customers by as much as 71 percent.

The Municipal League's analysis concluded that General Telephone's request for \$110 million was far in excess of the amount justified by the company's financial soundness. The cities' study of the company's books indicated that General Telephone was legitimately entitled to a rate hike of just \$23.3 million—about 21 percent of the amount asked.

The increase recommended by TML would give General Telephone a rate of return of about 16 percent, compared to the 18 percent that the full amount requested by the company would provide.

TM also was critical of the company's proposal to charge far higher rates to some of its customers than those in neighboring exchanges. Under the company's plan, a given telephone customer could be charged nearly double what his neighbor pays, simply because of a slight difference in locations.

The fourth Saturday in April has been designated as Texas Wildflower Day.

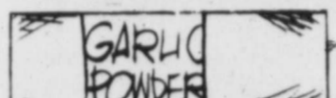
