

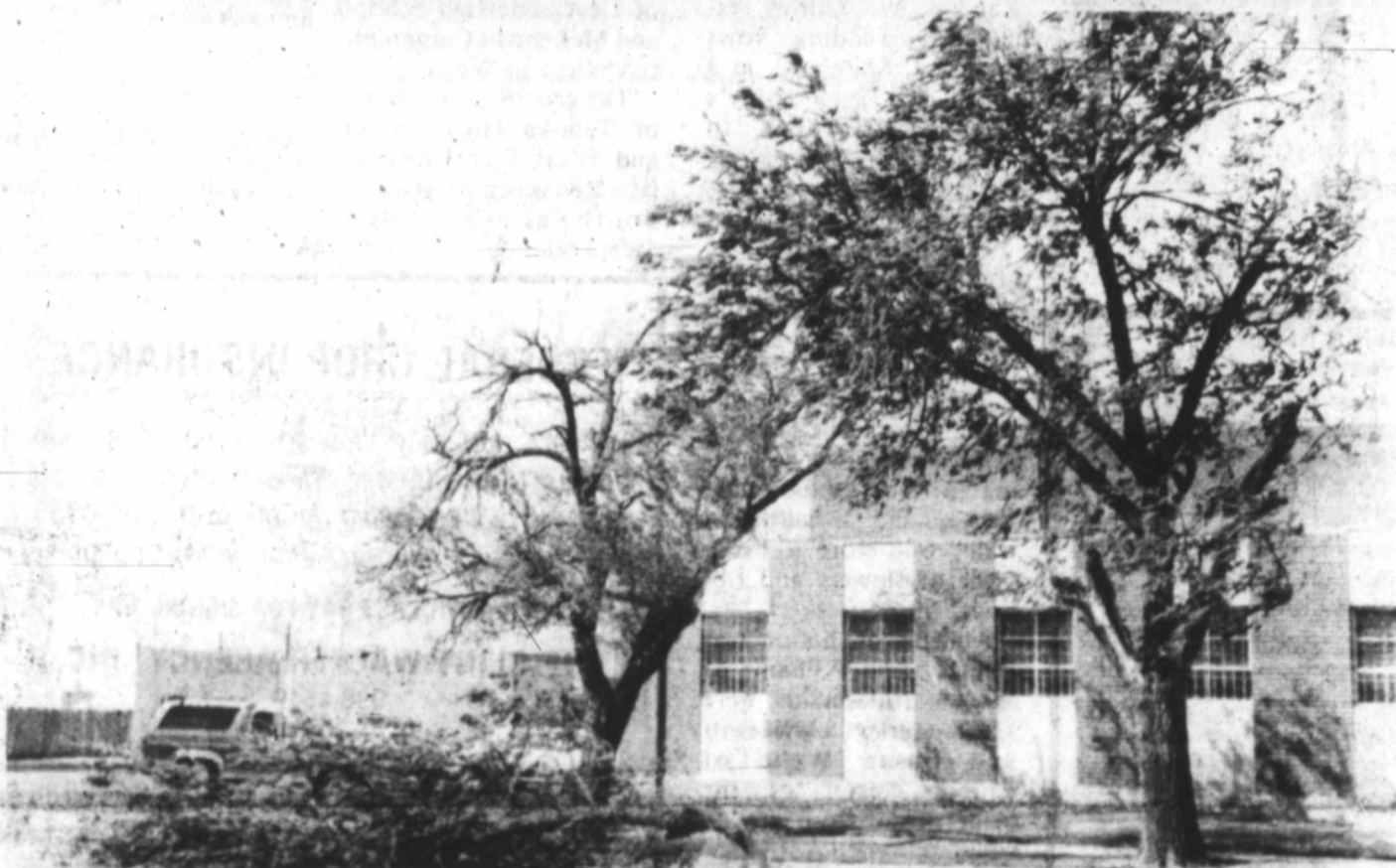

## WOODWORK

A TAHOKA FAMILY wants "the case of the purloined pastry" put on Crime Line, with an appropriate reward offered for information of who stole an entire pineapple cake out of their kitchen and also ate about half of a chocolate cake.

Wayne and Rachel Huffaker said they came home Friday night to discover the pineapple cake and pan missing, and the chocolate cake turned so that it was not immediately obvious that the back side of it had been eaten out. They also found a note signed with the names of three neighbors, saying "We sure enjoyed the cake..." but Jim, J.E. and Gerald all denied any knowledge of cake-snatching activity.

According to Huffaker, authorities have two good suspects in mind, but one is too large to fit into a cell and the other too skinny to hold with handcuffs.

EVEN IF you don't have any money, sales people are battling fiercely to get what little you have. Never before in history have just plain citizens been so bombarded with sales pitches or schemes to separate them from their money.

Many of the sales plans are good, and those who advertise properly (in the newspaper, of course) are offering a real service

to people who need to know what services or goods are being offered. People who don't read the ads sometimes discover later that they could have bought something for less than they gave for it. Of course, there are always the unlucky ones who buy something at regular price today and tomorrow somebody puts it on sale for half off.

There are many sales types most people could do without.

One or twice a week nearly everyone who is around a phone gets a call from somebody in California or Dallas or Michigan selling anything from life insurance to screwdrivers. They always have a set sales pitch which some dummy has decided sells more folks on the average than just telling the truth right out. And, there are the door-to-door types, many of them quite obnoxious, with knives, books, cleaning solution, luggage or whatever.

For the most part, people are better off buying things right at home from merchants they know. The money stays at home, the merchants make a profit to help support the community, and the buyer has a product or service worth his money because the person who sold it to him wants to be able to serve his or her customers again.

## Family's Storehouse Ransacked

The backyard storage house at the home of John Draper, 6th and Ave. L in Tahoka, was ransacked by thieves during the night Saturday, with items totaling \$2,131.35 in value stolen.

Among the things taken were a chest of drawers, ladies blouses and other clothing, two Coleman coolers, fishing equipment, including a Brute Super trolling motor, hedge trimmer and 100-foot yellow extension cord.

Tahoka police answered a call at approximately 3 a.m. Saturday that involved a family disturbance. No charges were filed on any family members.

Police investigated three subjects for soliciting in the city without a permit. No charges were filed.

Police arrested a juvenile and issued a written notice for disorderly conduct for fighting in front of Thrift-Mart parking lot at 10:51 p.m. on Saturday. The youth in question was taken to Lynn Co. Sheriff's office for further discussion with juvenile authorities.

In jail during the week were the juvenile and one person for driving while intoxicated.

## School Board Resets Meet

Tahoka School Board met Monday night to canvass votes and confirm the election of three members to the board. The board also voted to reschedule the regular April meeting for April 19.

Beth Huffaker was hired as a regular teacher. She has been substituting in classes formerly taught by Gary Pinson, who left the system to become head coach at Phillips.

## Write-Ins Keep Mayor In Office

Voting was spirited in Tahoka in Saturday's city election with incumbent Mayor Mel Leslie, who wasn't seeking another term, heading polling in a mayoral race that had no candidates on the ballot. He received 266 votes. Tom Cloe, who had run a write-in campaign, received 25. Roy Stephens had 23 and Dalton Wood 10. Fourteen persons received write-in votes.

Leslie, who has been mayor for 22 years and was on the city council four years before that, had not filed for re-election, but had decided he would serve if written in. He begins his 23rd year as mayor.

In the race for city councilman, Dalton Wood received 159 votes to lead the field of many write-ins for one spot and W.O. Wharton, the only councilman on the ballot, regained his place by a total of 303 votes.

Two incumbent trustees sailed back into school board seats in the three-place election. Joe Hays took

318 votes, Bettye Green 317 votes and new candidate David Midkiff 327 votes. Challenger Larry Ruiz took 87 votes.

In O'Donnell voters turned out in heavy numbers to vote down a proposal to allow livestock in the city limits. The issue failed 162 to 57.

The three places on the O'Donnell city council will be filled by incumbent Tommy Woolam with 210 votes; incumbent David Smith, with 185 votes; Billy Edwards, with 199 votes. Others on the ballot were Joe Morales, 57 votes; Jeri Akard, 41

votes; and Kenneth Vestal with 105 votes.

Incumbents Robert Bessire and Larry Lynn Moore and former board member Kenneth Eaker won O'Donnell school trustee positions with 242, 194 and 234 votes, respectively. Challengers included former board member James H. Sanders with 151 votes, Elida Gutierrez with 77 votes and David Sepeda with 46 votes. Sammy Rogers received 33 votes as a write-in candidate.

In the New Home city election incumbent Mayor Clifton Clem, who

## GTE Plans Push For Rate Boosts

General Telephone Co. plans to seek rate increases which will raise a one-phone residence charge from \$7.45 to \$11.20 per month, and boost the basic business telephone charge from \$19.75 to \$29.90 per month.

These proposed increases, which GTE officials said would be part of an overall increase proposal of 23 per cent—but 13 per cent of this would go to taxes, were reported to Tahoka City Council Monday night by GTE representative Charles Orum. Orum was accompanied by Gary Ribble of GTE.

Orum said the company's profit margin last year was only about 9 per cent. He also said the increase in local phone rates comes as a result of deregulation which allows competition in long-distance areas, noting that no increases in long-distance rates are proposed. GTE's proposals will be heard by the Public Utilities Commission.

Council members canvassed votes of last Saturday's election and sworn in were Meldon Leslie, for another term as mayor, Cap Whorton for another term as councilman and Dalton Wood as councilman. Leslie

and Wood were elected by write-in votes. Also present were councilmen Tom Cooper, Richard White and Jim Solomon.

Bids on paving and/or curb and gutter work on 29 blocks in the south and east portions of the city under phase two of a three-year Community Development Block Grant program were opened. Apparent low bidder was Lipham Construction Co. of Aspermont with a bid of \$233,963, cannot be awarded until the Housing and Urban development agency has approved the contractor.

The paving work is scheduled to be completed by fall.

Following a public hearing on the budget, at which nobody showed up, the council adopted a budget for the coming year calling for expenditures of \$294,524 in the general fund. The water and sewer fund budget is \$213,680 sanitation funds budget is \$89,910 and revenue sharing budget is \$31,600.

All the budget figures are very close to what they were in the previous year. Anticipated revenue is based on the current tax rate.

## We Hate To Do This, But...

Because of increasing expenses of publishing the newspaper, and especially because postal rates on mailing papers have continued to go up, subscription prices and single-copy prices of the Lynn County News will be increased May 1.

The cost of subscriptions will be raised only 50 cents per year. This means subscriptions in Lynn and adjoining counties (Terry, Garza, Dawson and Lubbock) will be \$9 per year, subscriptions elsewhere in Texas will be \$10, and outside the state will be \$11.

Single copy price will be 25 cents; the price at present is 20 cents per copy.

Subscriptions renewed before May 1 may be paid at the current lower rate.

was unopposed, breezed to victory with only 37 voters going to the polls. Gaylon James won an unexpired one year term to the city council; Leroy Nettles and David Gandy won two-year city council seats. All of the candidates were unopposed.

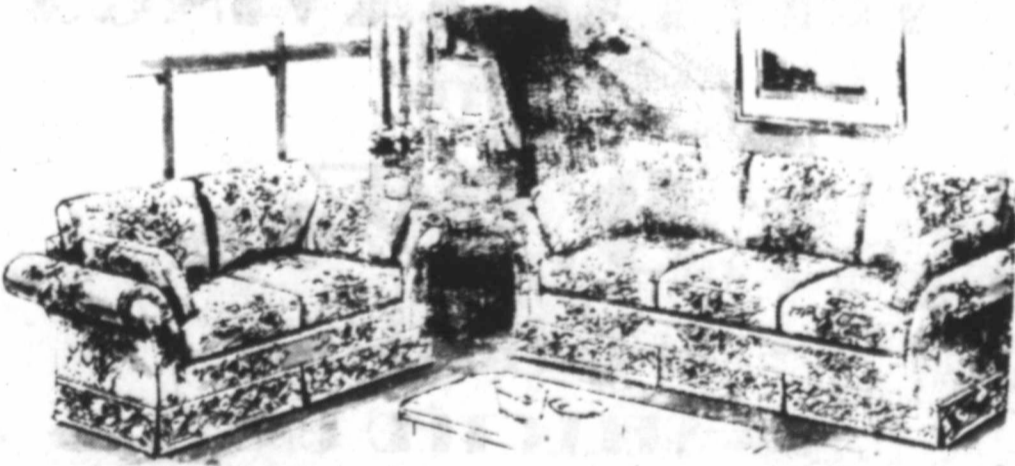

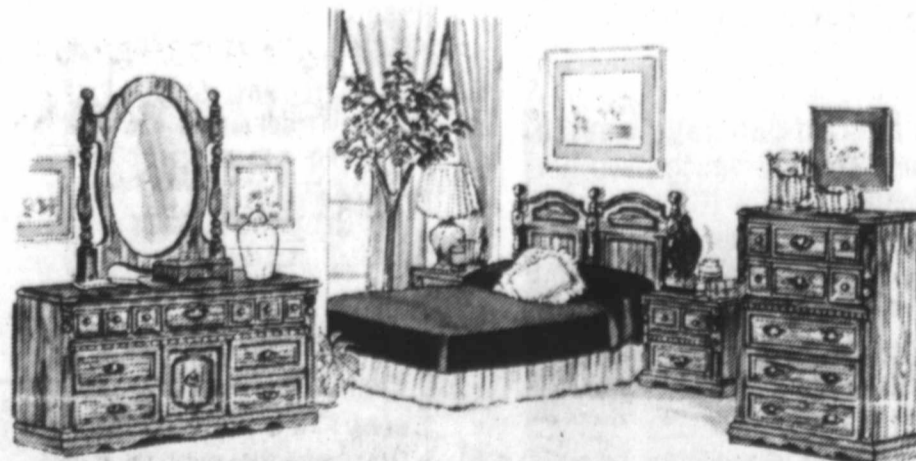

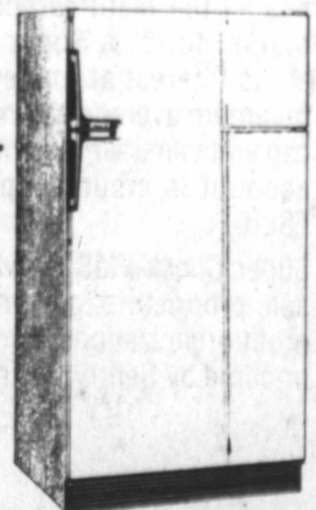

TIGA president. Woolam was vice president and a member of the executive committee. He also was on the board of directors from Lynn County from 1974 to 1977 and from 1980 to 1983.

## Underground Water Level Measurement Is Completed

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has completed its annual program of measuring depth-to-water levels in the 37

wells in Lynn County. These wells are part of a larger network of more than 950 observation wells scattered throughout the District's 15-county service area.

Jerry Funck was able to complete all measurements of "static" water levels in observation wells and tag them with the District's identification sticker for owner information.

"Several irrigators stopped me in the field to ask about declines and what their water was doing," said Jerry. "We have initial results for each of the 15 counties, but tabulated data on the entire observation network readings is not expected to be complete until mid-year." Lynn County's 1982-1983 depth-to-water table below surface minimum reading was at 24.14 feet, and the maximum level read was at 156.23 feet. This year's average change in depths-to-water in the county was +3.09 feet, which compares with a 1981-1982 county reading of +0.45 of a foot. Comparing the rate of change calculated this year for these wells shows a minimum decline change of +12.20 feet and a maximum decline change of -1.40 feet.
