ners included in the study ranged from 14 to 24 grams per serving for dinners and 2 to 16 grams per serving for the entrees. Th grams of fat per serving. grams of fat per serving.
This amount of fat in frozen dinners and entrees represents substantial part of the recom-
mended 65 to 75 mended 65 to 75 grams for per
sons consuming about 2000 calories a day, she adds. "Judging the nutritional ade-
